

Late Marion Ellis Fry Will Be Inducted Into Hall Of Fame ching in the Cisco area.

The late Marion Ellis Fry of Cisco will be inducted, posthumously, into the American Polled Hereford Association's Hall of Fame Monday, November 8, 1982. The induction will be at the 60th National Awards Banquet in Kansas, City, Mo., at 7:00 p.m. in the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

A picture of Mr. Fry and his hat, which will be bronzed, will be permanently kept in the Hall of Fame.

Mr. Fry was born September 5, 1887, in Brown County, Texas, and he passed away September 6, 1961, in Cisco, Texas.

A cattleman and rancher all of his life, Mr. Fry bought his first Polled Herefords in 1927 in Brown County. In 1943, he moved to Cisco and operated ranches in Eastland and Callahan Counties until his death.

In the early 1930s, Mr. Fry formed a partnership with his two sons and their ranches were operated under the name of M.E. Fry and Sons. The junior partners were the late Henry Fry, who maintained a herd of Polled Herefords until his death in 1982, and Douglas Fry, who continues in ran-tions of good citizenship.

Early in his ranching years, M.E. Fry recognized the growing interest in Polled Herefords and the need for organization in the development and promotion of the breed. He became a member of the American Polled Hereford Association in the early 1930s and was a lifetime friend of the late B.O. Gammon, a pioneer in Polled Hereford activities.

M.E. Fry was a charter member of the Texas Polled Hereford Association. He helped organize the Brown County Polled Hereford Association and served as its president for many years.

Using his natural ability and lessons learned from experience, M.E. Fry built the third largest herd of quality Polled Herefords in the United States. He sold breeding cattle in the Eastern market, but his primary interest was in the development of a market for Polled Hereford bulls for use on western ranges. He achieved considerable success in the field.

Over the years, M.E. Fry always found time to discharge fully all obliga-



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
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County Vote Pendulum Swings Back Democratic

traditionally Democratic Texas voters flirted with Republican candidates long enough a few years ago to elect the first Republican governor since Reconstruction and encourage a record number of Republican office seekers in the General Election of '82 - but it appears to have been a passing fancy, as the voting booth doors proved to be revolving as voters went back to the Democratic columns in droves.

Countians stayed with their Democratic D.A.; four precincts joined to re-elect the Democratic County Commissioner; and fell in step with the rest of the state in going to the Democrats which made Texas one of the key states in the nation where a "statehouse was lost" to the present ad-

Veteran Precinct Two County Commissioner Jack Blackwell won handily over Challenger Republican Robert Butler, 1,065 to 225.

Olden, Ranger, Desdemona and Lake Leon voters vote in that precinct.

On a total the county joined the state in okaying all of the six proposed constitutional amendments, with only Carbon voting against Nos. Five and Six, and Desdemona and Olden voting against No. Six.

From the top of the ballot, Eastland County voted with Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, 3,603 over Republican Jim Collins who got 1,848.

Cong. Charles Stenholm of the 17th District got 4,343 votes in Eastland County.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby got 3,461 and Strake, 1,874. Attorney General Candidate Jim Mattox got 3,436 and Bill Meier, 1,838. Comptroller Bob Bullock drew 3,298 and Challenger Mike Richards, 2,004 here. Treasurer Ann Richards, got 3,683 and Clark, 1,594. Mairs got 3,573 for land commissioner; Jim Hightower, 3,762 for Agriculture Commissioner; Jim Nugent 3,965 for Railroad Com.; and Democrats Robertson,

KITCHEN STORAGE SPACE IN THE HOME

Before buying a home, examine the amount and configuration of the storage space in the kitchen. For a family of four, experts at the Federal Housing Administration recommended a minimum total shelf area of 50 square feet.

But beware of cabinets designed primarily to make the kitchen look like it contains a lot of storage space. Shelves which are only six inches deep are useless for storing most items.

FHA experts also recommend that a kitchen for the average family contain a minimum of 11 square feet of drawer space. Again, don't just look at the amount, but also the configuration.

Shallow drawers don't hold much, and the rear half of extremely deep drawers is hard to reach and tends simply to accumulate unus-





Both broadleaf and coniferous trees and shrubs are attacked by this pest. These include: willow, cedar, sypress, white pine, box elder, locust, sycamore, maple, wild cherry, sumac, persimmon, arborviate, and ornamental evergreens. Bagworms become exceedingly abundant every few years, but



When there are too many bags to handpick or the trees and shrubs are too large to reach safely, then the infested plants can be sprayed. However, insecticide application should be made in the spring soon after the eggs have hatched or while the larvae are small and actively feeding.

We had frost in Eastland County this past week and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forages.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed with 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10 -15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic materail since their intake will be limited.

3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.

4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available veterinarians.

For the past several decades the forecast by the government and news casters have told us that shortly we would not be able to produce enough food to supply the fast increasing population of the world.

The U.S. farmers have bought larger machinery, rented the land that we had in the lay out program and have over produced Cotton, corn, wheat and feed grains.

During over production times like these, if the farmers want to help themselves, they need to go back on acreage controls enough to cut down the surpluses.

The government is never going to help the farmer, they must learn to help themselves. They need to somehow limit production to a point where there is no large carry over from

They depend on the government to support prices and it lets them down each time the production goes beyond the de-

The farmers have been convinced that wheat, corn and feed grains are not economical for making alcohol.

It would only take a few minutes to find out what it would cost to make alcohol out of corn and at \$1.80 per bushel, would find out that it would make fuel cheaper than oil.

At the close of the assembly Oct. 28, James C. Suggs, also of Fort Worth, will be installed as regional minister and president of the approximately 120,000 Disciples in Texas and New Mexico - some 10 percent of the Disciples' membership in the United States and Canada

Rea became regional minister of the Christian Church in the Southwest in 1973 after serving for four years as associate regional minister.

Before joining the regional staff in Fort Worth, he was executive secretary of the Christian Church Commission of Greater Kansas City, minister of Ridglea Christian Church of Fort Worth and director of church development of what is now the Christian Church in the Southwest. He also served

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pastorates in Temple and Galveston, Texas.

A Lubbock, Texas, native, Rea was graduated from TCU with a B.A. degree and from Brite Divinity School with a B.D. degree. Culver-Stockton College and TCU awarded him honorary doc-

Rea is moderator of the Christian Church's Conference of Regional Ministers and Moderators. He also is on the board of the Christian Board of Publication as well as the boards of TCU and Brite. Through recent years, his primary interests church-wide have been restructure, structure and function, the chaplaincy and new church develop-

He and Mrs. Rea will continue to live in Fort Worth after his retirement.

His plans include interim ministries, work with his hand (especially in refinishing antique furniture) and setting up seminars on the "how tos" of ministry for young ministers.
