Support Asked In Chest Drive

President Ivan Webb of the Cisco Community Chest urged everyone to support the organization in the 1982 finance drive that began Dec. 1st in a statement Thursday. Mr. Webb's statement follows:

"The Community Chest drive is beginning and needs your support, as well as the support of every business in Cisco. The Community Chest is a composite of 13 organizations that need financial help. The funding of these organizations is primarily accomplished through a concentrated effort from one fund raising drive rather than 13 fund campaigns. The following is a list of the organizations and their allocated budget set by the Community Chest for 1983: Girl Scouts \$3,000, Red Cross \$400, Public Library \$1,000, Child Care Center \$1,200,

Girls Softball \$1,000, ABC League \$1,000, Little League \$1,000, Salvation Army \$400, Mental Health \$150, Boy Scouts \$3,000, West Texas Rehab Center \$500, Texas United Community Service \$50 and Cisco Welfare Association Reserve \$1,000.

"As shown by the above list the amount needed is \$13,700, which is only \$200 more than last year's fund. Last year's fund only raised 2% of the \$13,500. I know you can realize the importance of each of the above organizations to Cisco, especially to our youth.

Bank Plans To Open In New Facility On Monday

The First National Bank of Cisco, the community's 57-year old financial institution, will open for business Monday, Dec. 6, in its new \$1,400,000 facility at the corner of Conrad Hilton Avenue and West 5th Street.

A work force of some two dozen persons, plus most of the bank's 27 employees, expected to complete moving everything from filing cabinets to the money supply from the old facility at 708 Conrad Hilton Avenue to the new location two and a half blocks north by late Sunday.

The large clock in front of the bank was moved Wednesday, and moving vans and pickups began moving items from the old building Thursday and con-

tinued Friday. After closing time at 6 p.m. Friday, moving operations were stepped up. Moshier Vault Co. of Dallas came in Friday in readiness for moving safe deposit boxes and other safety equipment plus the money

supply. Security was provided for the weekend move by Cisco Police and the Eastland County Sheriff's office, plus a group of off-duty DPS and other officers.

President L. D. Woolley said the First National Bank would be ready with seven teller cages plus four drive-in windows at the regular 9 a.m. opening time Monday. Finishing touches on the new building were completed by contractors Friday and Saturday.

A formal open house will be held by the bank from 1:30 to 4 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 12, Mr. Woolley announced.

Features of the new facility, in addition to the motor banking equipment, will be a new "Banker 24" Service, which will afford customers the opportunity to handle many of their regular banking transactions through automated machinery located in the new bank. It will be available for after-hours use.

The new service will be available to customers shortly after the bank opens in the new location. Equipment installation was underway and will be completed in a few days, bank officials said.

Jerry Morgan, executive vice president, and Brenda Lane, cashier and vice president, recently went to Canton, Ohio, and spent several days studying the Banker 24 system. The service will be available 24-hours per day to customers of the bank to make deposits, withdraw cash, transfer funds, pay MasterCard accounts, and obtain information regarding their accounts.

The new Bank facility will have three vaults—one for safe deposit boxes, one for money, and another for important records. The bank will have 400 more safe deposit boxes than were available at the old location. Bank officers will all have private offices.

Work started on the new building in December, 1981. The bank had occupied the old location since it was founded. The old building had been expanded twice to meet the bank's needs. The building was sold a few months ago to First National Indemnity Co., which has offices in the building. Bill Philpott of FNIC said that plans for the bank building were not complete at this time. FNIC, Joe Cooper CPA and Sunland Life Insurance Co. will continue to have offices in the old building.

Within a few days, the bank's large Randy Steffen mural—long a community show piece—will be moved to the new facility. The collection of Steffen paintings have placed in new frames and will be hung on the office walls of bank officials at the new location.

The Press plans to publish a special section of the newspaper on Dec. 12th in connection with the bank's formal opening. The edition will have pictures of bank employees and stories about the new facility, the history of banking in Cisco, and other features.

Founded in 1925, the First National Bank's growth has been steady over the years. Total resources stood at an all-time high on Nov. 30, 1982, when they passed the \$7,000,000 mark.

President Woolley, who joined the bank in 1964 when resources amounted to \$5,000,000 credited the bank's progress to the general good business health of the community it serves.

"We are part of a very fine community," Mr. Woolley said. "A bank's progress is a barometer of the area it serves. We are very proud of our community and try very hard to merit the confidence that we enjoy."

Old Santa Due In Parade

Old Santa Claus was scheduled to make his first appearance of the 1982 Christmas season in Cisco at 10:30 a.m. Saturday (Dec. 4) in the annual Cisco Christmas Parade. He was to ride a float and to distribute candy to children along the parade route.

Numerous floats and individual entries were expected to help make the parade an outstanding affair, according to Chamber of Commerce officials. Bands of Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College and the CJC Wrangler Belles were planning to participate.

Santa plans return trips to downtown Cisco on Dec. 9th and Dec. 16th. CofC officials said. All street decorations were in place as the new Christmas season approached.

Worker Dies In Ditch Accident

Teddy Charles Patterson, 23-year old pipeline construction worker, lost his life in a sewer line ditch cave-in on Front Street in Cisco last Tuesday afternoon. Authorities concluded Wednesday that the mishap was accidental.

The young man, a native of Floydada, was the operator of a backhoe machine for Rhode Pipe Co. of Silverton, contractors for a \$160,000 10-inch sewer outfall line project in Cisco. The company had expected to complete the Cisco job by the weekend but work stopped after the accident and was not expected to be resumed until Monday.

The collapse of a ditch some 10 feet deep covered Patterson around 3 p.m. Tuesday. City Policeman Jackie Hobbs responded to a call and was the first official on the scene. He had summoned an ambulance by radio.

Officer Hobbs said that he could see Patterson's hair in the bottom of the ditch when he arrived. Some 25 men, including city employees and volunteers, began digging the young man out of the cave-in. Frank Young and Leon Boles assisted Officer Hobbs in directing rescue operation. City Manager Mike Moore also helped direct the work.

Besides his wife, the young man is survived by two daughters, Krissy and Brandi, both of the family home in Abilene; his parents, Charles Patterson of Abilene and Cynthia Bryant of Hobbs, N.M.; three sisters, a grandmother and grandparents of Floydada.

Young Patterson had been an employee of the Rhode company for some five years, and Carman Rhode, president, described him as "a very dedicated, skillful employee." His father is a stockholder in the company and was serving as project manager for the Cisco project.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at City Park Church of Christ in Floydada. Burial was in the cemetery there. The young man was born July 29, 1959, and grew up in Floydada. He finished high school there and married Karen Janette West on May 20, 1978, in Floydada. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Harvest Operation Inc. Drives Stake For Wildcat

Cisco-based Harvest Operation Inc. has driven stake for a 4,000-ft. Eastland County wildcat for oil or gas, about one mile northwest of Cisco. The explorer will be known as the No. 1 Jacobs. It is in a 27-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, Section 84, Block 4.

EnRe Corp. of San Antonio has finished two new producers in Eastland County's D.R.S. Field, both located about 10 miles northwest of Cisco.

The No. 2 Mitcham "G" flowed at the rate of 125 barrels of oil per day, along with 225,000 CF casinghead gas. Tested on a 12/64 choke, the well had flowing tubing pressure of 135 PSI. It bottomed at 4,112 feet and will produce from perforations 3,912 to 3,918 feet.

The No. 2 Mitcham "H" - wed 12 barrels of oil daily on open choke. It will produce from perforations 3,896 to 3,902 feet into the hole. Bottom hole at 4,313 feet.

Pumping 75 barrels of crude per day on open choke, the No. 1 Tarver "A" has

been finished in the Hawk-Eye Field two miles west of Romney, Eastland County.

The well was drilled to 1,184-ft. total depth. It was perforated to produce from the Adams Branch Formation, 1,125 to 1,134 feet into the hole.

Drillsite was in a 120-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, NW/4 Section 57, Block 3, with Ridgeway Oil Exploration of Houston as the operator.

Snow Oil helped round out a highly productive week with a new producer brought on line in the R.E.B. Field, six miles north of Eastland.

Breckenridge-based Ridge Oil Co. has staked location for four new wells in Eastland County's Northwest Ranger Field. The wells include the No. 1 Squyres, located in a 100-acre lease, F.M. Harms Survey A-161; the No. 2 Nanie Walker, located in a 247-acre lease, E. Packwood Survey A-1410; the No. 1 conner, in a 57-acre lease, DI&CCo. Survey; and the No. 1 McDonald, in a 126-acre lease, in the McDonald Survey A-16.

Projected total depths are 3,525 to 3,600 feet. The wells will be spudded four miles north of Ranger, three miles northeast of Ranger, two miles north of Ranger, and two miles northeast of Ranger, respectively.

Nimrod Operating of Cisco has filed first production data for a new producer in the Hawk-Eye Field, 10 miles south of Cisco. Designated as the No. 13 Maxwell, the well pumped 28 barrels of oil per day on open choke.

Location is in an 80-acre drilling unit in the H&TCRR

Survey, S/2 SW 14, Section 14.

Nimrod took the hole to 1,140-ft. bottom. It will produce from a perforated interval in the Adams Branch Formation, 1,080 to 1,090 feet into the wellbore.

Cisco-based Morning Star Oil and Gas has staked location for the No. 2 Lillian Hansen, a 4,100-ft. developmental try in Eastland County's Lake Cisco Field. Drillsite will be in a 160-acre unit in the SPRR Survey, Section 501, four miles northwest of the Cisco city limits.

The Yellow Mound Oil Co., operating out of Cisco, has filed for permit to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental probe in the Eastland Regular Field, about 14 miles southeast of Eastland. The well will be known as the No. 1 Craighead. It will be spudded in an 80-acre unit in the H&TCRR Survey, Section 8, Block 2.

A Midland operator has staked drillsite for a 1,500-ft. Eastland County wildcat, three miles south of the Romney township. The well will be known as the No. 1 Mims. It is in a five-acre lease in the Antonio Miller Survey Lot 3, Stephenson Oil and Gas of Midland is the operator.

Locations have been staked for two developmental ventures in the Eastland Regular Field, about two miles east of Cisco.

The wells are designated as the No. 2 and No. 3 McCauley, both under permit for 4,100 feet of hole-making.

The operation will be in a 171-acre lease block in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey, Section 45 Block 3.

Location has been staked by Hazlewood-Patterson Co. of Ft. Worth for a 1,600-foot Eastland County wildcat. The explorer well will be known as the No. 1-A Powell. It is in a 39-acre lease in the H&TCRR Co. Survey, Sec.

58, Blk. 2, one mile north of Romney. It is aimed at either oil or gas production.

Lubbock-based Sentry Oil Inc. has filed for permit to drill the No. 1A Whiteside, a wildcat for oil to be located eight miles northeast of Rising Star. With projected total depth of 1,250 feet, the well is in a 300-acre lease in Eastland County's Joseph Rubarth Survey, No. 100.

A wildcat for oil, located three miles northwest of Rising Star, is scheduled for spudding by Petro-Mack Inc. of Abilene. The well is located in a 240-acre lease of Eastland County's ET RR Co. Survey, Sec. 25, Blk. 2. The well is to be designated as the No. 10 G.P. Brawler "A" and has a proposed depth of 1,200 feet.

Houston-based Ridgeway Oil Exploration & Development Inc. has turned in first production figures for its No. 2 & 3 Tarver-A, two successful developmental wells in Eastland County's Hawk-Eye Field.

Drillsites were in a 120-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 57, Blk. 3, one mile west of Romney.

The No. 2 well is pumping oil at the rate of 180 barrels

per day, the well was tested on an open choke. The well was taken to a total depth of 1,170 feet, after entering the pay zone at 1,104 feet. Production interval will be 1,104 to 1,114 feet into the hole.

The Lord blessed our work as we went into the Churches and worked with the people, telling the story of Jesus.

I was invited by my brother-in-law, Bryan Ross, area missionary for the San Angelo-Big Spring Association to be a member of his team.

After my two weeks at Fortaleza, I flew to Teresina and met my friend, Alvin Hutton and his wife Katie. Alvin and Katie have been missionaries in Brazil for 34 years and Alvin has been a leader in Boys work, establishing the Royal Ambassador Program in Brazil.

They had been making a tour of the work in Brazil and I was privileged to join them on their trip. Alvin and I had been boyhood friends in Abilene, going to the same church and being members of the same R.A. chapter.

On the trip in Brazil, they traveled 9,000 kilometers and I was with them for almost half of the trip. We were on the road for 75 hours—over all kinds of

This convention honored the founding of Baptist work by The William Bagby, in Brazil in 1882. Many people from all over Brazil and the United States attended this convention.

After the Convention, I went to Rio Dourado to Alvin Hutton's home at the Baptist Camp called "Setio do Sossego" which means Place of Quiet.

I also visited in the City of Rio de Janeiro and Belo Horizonte.

I found the people very friendly and nice to Texans. I made many friends and hope some day to go again to Brazil.

Having made this trip to another country makes me more aware of the fact that we in the U.S.A. and here in West Texas, need to pray for our country as the Brazilians do: "My Country for Christ This is my Prayer!"

Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Leni Celia Reed, a registered dietician, has released a report on the relationship between diet and cardiovascular disease.

She states "the link between diet and heart disease means many of us need to re-examine our eating habits. Eating for a healthy heart means cutbacks in dietary cholesterol fat, sugar and alcohol plus adjustments in carbohydrates."

To incorporate those thoughts into guidelines it is suggested you try the following: to decrease cholesterol limit egg yolks to not more than three weekly, including those used in cooking. Shellfish and organ meats (liver, sweetbreads, heart and kidney) are also cholesterol-rich. Two or three ounces of these foods can be substituted for one egg yolk.

To curtail foods high in saturated fat, keep red meats to five, or fewer, small servings three to four ounces, cooked weight, a week and limit these to lean well trimmed cuts. Avoid regular luncheon meats and frankfurters. Include lean portion dishes like fish, skinless chicken and turkey, and bean entrees.

Next week we will continue to discuss Dr. Reed's thoughts in regard to diet and heart disease.

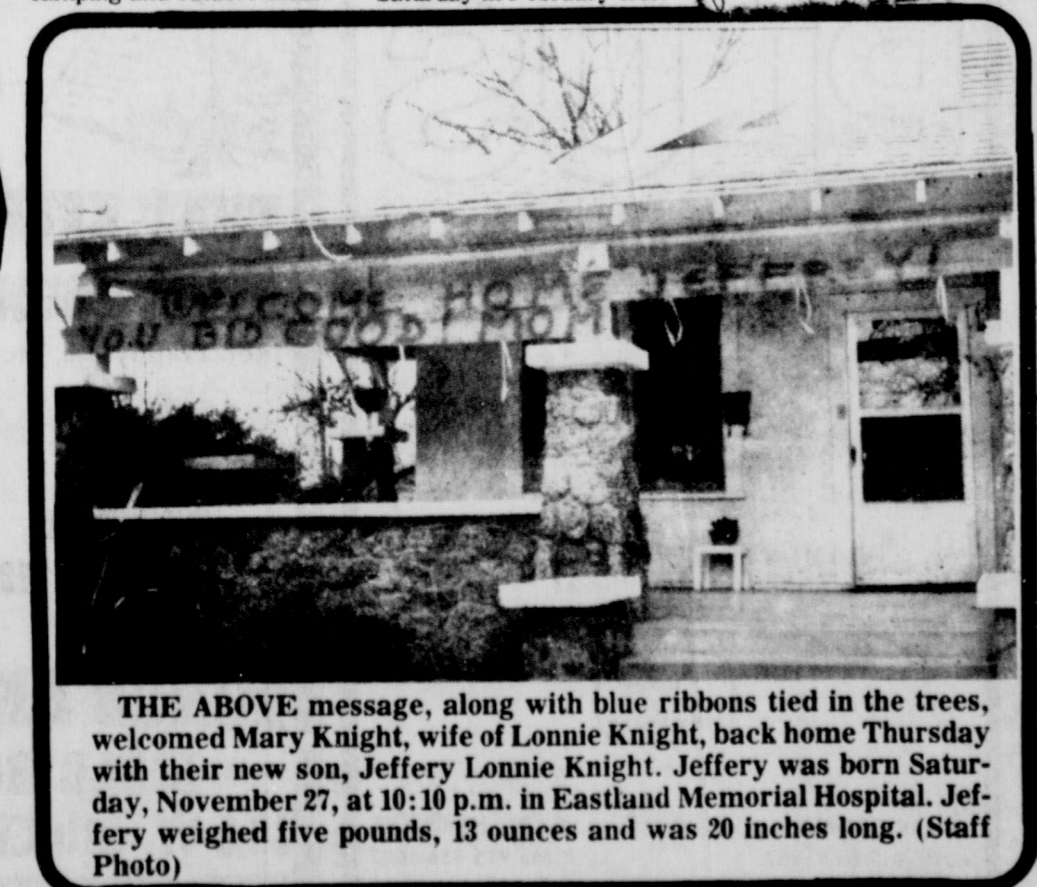

Storage areas should be clean, dry and free of odors. Unshelled nuts will store for about twice as long as shelled nuts. Although shelled pecans weigh less and take less space than unshelled nuts, they absorb moisture and flavors readily, become "dirty" and stale easier and consequently require good packaging and more careful handling. Pecan kernels will lose quality in storage; therefore, the lower the storage temperature the longer their quality is retained.

Pecan growers normally air-dry nuts in-the-shell after harvesting. However, pecans harvested in early November or during wet weather should be air-dried in a well-ventilated area before storage. This will help prevent molds on the shell surface as well as inside kernels while in storage.

If you are a landlord, here is one way to screen prospective renters. Require them to fill out applications before accepting them as tenants.

Some of the more detailed applications ask for name, social security number, salary, employer, supervisor, bank and the names of present and previous landlords. This help you determine the applicant's reliability. Along with the application, you can ask for a deposit of as much as one month's rent, which must be returned if the applicant is turned down as a tenant.

A credit check may be requested from the local credit

bureau, and you may ask for a letter from the applicant's employer, confirming the salary statement. It is really a matter of judgement when it comes to granting a lease, but checks on the prospective tenant will give you some basis for that judgement.

ADJUSTED MORTGAGE LOAN ALLOWS INTEREST TO VARY

For years mortgage lenders have been talking about needing greater flexibility because of inflation and rising interest rates. Yields on mortgages have not kept pace with the in-

creasing cost of loanable funds.

In response, the Federal Home Loan Bank Board has issued regulations for the new adjusted mortgage loan, which allows federal savings and loan associations to offer mortgages with interest rates that can change as often as every month.

There are no limits on increases in interest rates and monthly payments. Changes in the interest rate, however, must be tied to changes in an index beyond the lender's control.

Lenders must lower the mortgage rate if the index goes down, but increases are

optional and can be passed on to the homebuyer through the monthly payment, the principal or the term of the loan up to 40 years.

RENTING HAS ADVANTAGES

While much has been said about the advantages of owning a home, there are advantages to renting as well.

Renting means freedom from financial risk. A house can lose value, especially if it is not kept up. If you are forced to relocate quickly, you may not be able to get your money back when it comes time to sell.

Neighborhood quality can decrease if other owners do not keep up their homes or if there is increasing crime, noise, traffic or other problems. Renting means freedom from a long-term commitment.

Typically, mortgage payments extend 20 or 30 years. When you rent, your money is not tied up for a long time. And renters do not have the maintenance problems that owners have.

Remember, renting has advantages and disadvantages. Examine both before deciding whether to rent or buy.

HIGH INTEREST RATES CAUSE TROUBLE FOR SAVINGS AND LOANS

You may have noticed news of financial trouble for many of the nation's savings

and loan institutions. The industry cites high interest rates as the source of its current problems.

The high rates push up the cost of deposits for a savings and loan because the S&L must compete against other investment opportunities for these deposits. Most savings and loans offer certificates which pay interest based on current market rates. When these rates rise, the cost of certificates rise accordingly. Yet the loans made by savings institutions are long term, and yields lag behind the cost of funds.

Most savings and loans can withstand short-term losses while waiting for interest rates to "come" down, but if interest rates remain high, the losses could become serious. Deposits, of course, are insured up to

\$100,000, so there is no danger of any depositor losing money.

TIPS FOR PURCHASING RURAL LAND

Buyers entering the rural land market for the first time should realize that buying land is a complex task, and it may not be wise to purchase hastily.

If you are considering rural land investment, contact a real estate agent, look at the listing and compare the asking prices with the actual prices of land sold in the region in recent years. Take some time to look at several pieces of property that seem attractive to you.

Most investors have reasons for purchasing rural land—appreciation, prestige, recreation. Whatever your reasons, become familiar with the market before making a decision.

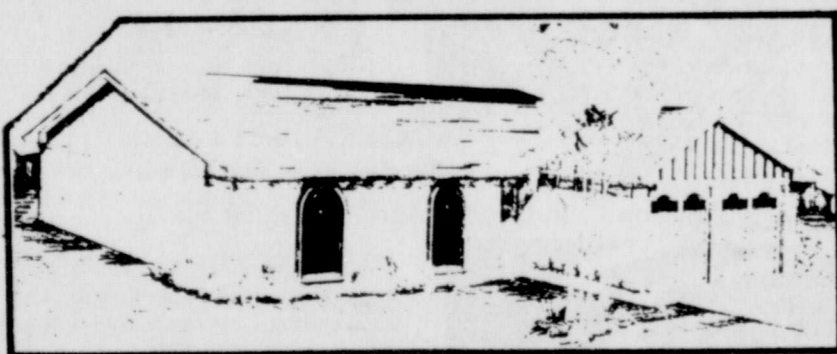

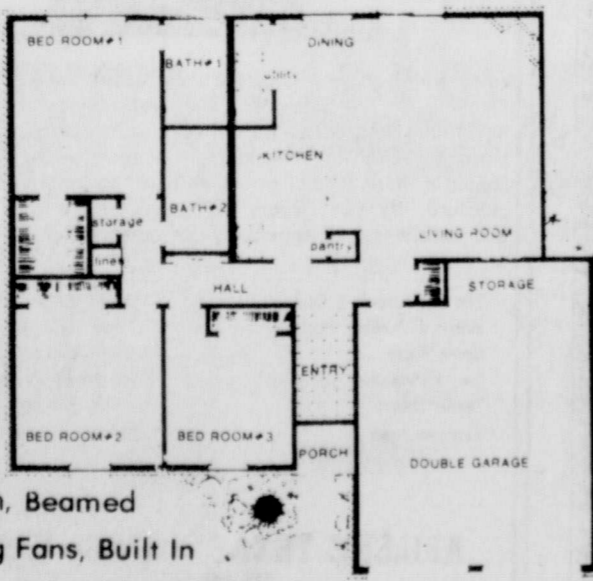

On the East side of Pogue Industrial Park - R&J Construction has future plans for an office and equipment yard, using a railroad caboose for their office. This company is owned and operated by Roy Barnhill and J.D. May also the developers of the East side of the Pogue Industrial Park.

The next business on the East side, was built by Mr. White of Eastland Office Supply and Tim Tannich a local dentist as an investment and were thereby responsible for Paul Duncan and his wife to move from Abilene and set up their business as Duncan Veterinary Clinic. Many fine reports have come to me by satisfied customers who speak of their gentleness with animals and devotion to their trade.

On the east side, the next business is E.S.I. with main office in Midland. Mike Dawson the local manager offers oilfield services and mud logging, using a sizable number of mobil units for on the site services. Carol Senkel is responsible for locating this business in Pogue Industrial Park. Also Senkel construction built the office and warehouse facilities for E.S.I.

R&J Development are in the process of completing plans for a freight line, dock and warehouse to be located on the east side of Pogue Industrial Park.
