'These contributions make the trip possible and more beneficial to the people in the villages that we will visit. The villagers and the mission team express their



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Homemakers Unite Against Drugs

A leadership project of the 22,680-member Texas Extension Homemakers Association has resulted in a united effort in support of the Texans' War on Drugs Program.

A resolution adopted recently by the entire membership pledged the support of Extension Homemaker groups in the war on drugs at both the community and county levels, according to June Cline, organization specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Extension Homemakers are concentrating their leadership efforts, Cline says, in four main areas:

1. Speaking in their communities to increase the level of awareness about the harmful effects of drugs.

2. Monitoring court cases than involve drugs to see that offenders do not get off without receiving the full measure of the penalty that fits the crime.

3. Forming parent peer groups in schools, communities, and churches with parents, and getting together to develop guidelines for their children to follow to help prevent drug involvement.

4. Encouraging drug awareness programs in schools and making drug awareness part of every

teacher's in-service train-

Goals of the Extension Homemakers organization are to promote wholesome family relationships and to share community responsibilities with other organizations, Cline says. The anti-drug educational effort is one more voice among many throughtout the state that should bring a clear message to drug dealers and users about their being unwelcome in Texas.

The Texans' War on Drugs committee was established by Gov. Bill Clements and is chaired by Dallas businessman H. Ross Perot. The committee, of which TEHA President Billie Mc-Craw is a member, established a three-pronged approach to combat drug abuse: education and prevention; legislation; and law enforcement.

The action arm of the Association's committee responsible for the implementation of education and prevention has been instrumental in establishing and strengthening community and family groups throughout the state, Cline

The level of awareness of drug abuse has already increased considerable, and programs involving parent and various civic organizations are making progress in the effort to eradicat this menace to Texas youth,

Stenholm Opposes Pay Raise

In a tricky bit of legistlative maneuvering, Congress approved a 15 percent pay increase Tuesday(December 14, 1982). Congressman Charles W. Stenholm opposed any increase, but due to placement of amendments was forced to cast one vote that made it appear that he supported the 15 percent increase.

The procedure involved a three-step process

1. If Congress had not acted, a 27.2 percent increase was due to go into effect automatically.

2. The first amendment would trim that 27.2 percent increase to 15 percent.

3. The second amendment would continue the current cap on Congressional salaries, meaning NO pay raise at all would be allowed.

Stenholm voted for the first amendment, even though he opposed any increase. A vote against this amendment would have approved of the 27 percent increase. Had he opposed the first amendment, (to cut the increase from 27 percent 15 percent, the higher increase would have gone into effect.

"As far as I am concerned, the key vote on this issue was passage of the rule that allowed this 'Catch-22' situation to develop on the House floor,"

Stenholm said. "I strongly opposed that rule. Those Members of Congress that supported a pay increase for themselves should have had the courage to be up-front and present the issue before the House and the American people clearly, with no

legislative subterfuge.

"I have voted against any increase in Congressional pay since I have been in office and I really fail to understand the logic of those in Congress who could support such a move at this time, given the current economic conditions the people we serve are up against," Stenholm said.

Only one more vote was needed on the final amendment to stop the pay increase, with the amendment to continue the salary freeze failing by a 208-208 tie vote.



Some single persons are combining their incomes and budget with other singles when applying for home purchases. This can make the purchase affordable and economically acceptable to the buvers.

Singles who use this method for home purchase are becoming known in the real estate market at "mingles."

Such a large number of single individuals are joining forces to buy homes that some builders are designing to suit their needs. For the mingles market, there are special floor plans, usually townhomes or small detached homes, with two master bedrooms instead of one or

two smaller bedrooms. Before shopping for a loan, prospective house-sharers should put their business arrangement in writing. Items to consider are: paying the bills, sharing the common rooms, pets, party hours, property maintenance and improvements and dissolving the partnership.

AVOIDING FOOD PLAIN

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has prepared maps showing flood prone zones caused by watersheds in metropolitan areas.

The maps indicate land in the 100- and 500-year food plain but do not designate the areas of more frequent flooding. Consequently, when you hear of property that is in the 100-year flood plain, investigate further to discover the actual estimated flooding frequen-

You may call the Corps of Engineers' regional offices for flood plain information about specific locations, but remember flood plains may change as land is developed.

Most homes in flood prone areas qualify for national

BUYER TIPS FOR TIME-SHARES

Are you considering a time-share arrangement of property? If so, here are some tips.

Find out if it's a deeded time share, where you actually buy an interest in the real estate or a nondeeded time share, where you simply buy the right to use the property annually for a specific period for a stated

number of years. Ask yourself: are vacation plans subject to last-minute changes? Are you willing to vacation in the same place every year?

Look at finance charges, annual fees and travel expenses. Compare the cost of the time share with rates for similar accommodations in the area. Impute an interest rate to your cash outlay. Evaluate investment claims and try to make a realistic assessment of its future

Resale of your time share may be difficult since you may have competition from the company that sold you the time share. Your share

of profits will be limited by

the portion you own.

UPS AND DOWNS OF AD-JUSTABLE MORTGAGES

The new adjustable rate mortgages allow a homeowner's monthly payments to rise and fall with current interest rates.

To limit the amount of change in these payments, some loans provide for payment schedules which do not fully reflect the change in interest rates. These loans place an absolute limit on payment increases or adjust payments less than the in-

Unfortunately, these types of loans can create problems when rates go up because the payment is insufficient to cover interest on the loan. The shortfall is applied to the principal balace with the result that the balance owed rises rather than gradually being reduced. This feature helps make mortgage payments more predictable.

On the other hand, the homeowner's equity may be reduced if the house's value does not increase in proportion with the debt. In extreme cases, a loan default may be induced.



Voting Behavior Analysis Commissioned

The Secretary of State, as Chief Election Officer, is responsible for providing Texas voters with a uniform election process, and to that end, he must ensure that the campaign process and structural components of elections are made available in such a manner as to encourage voter participation.

An analysis of the factors impacting the behavior of the registered voter in the general election was commissioned along with an analysis of attitudes of the registered voter on modifications in our electoral process and their attitudes of ethical practices in political campaigns.

The overall consensus of the election analysis is that

registered voters in Texas favor: 1) consolidation of all State and local elections on Saturday; 2) holding all local elections on a few specified dates, and at the same time polling places in each specific precinct; 3) prohibiting the personal use of unexpected campaign funds by political candidates and office holders; 4) requiring officeholders who have more than one year remaining in their term of office to resign before running for any other office; 5) electing state judges without regard to political partisan affiliation or on a non-partisan basis; 6) allowing Initiative and Referendum in Texas; 7) holding Presidential Preference Primary election

The analysis of the 1982 general election is the third in a series of election analyses and the collective impact of these anlyses are to establish base data on the profile and attitudes of the Texas voter and provide Texas election officials and elected leaders with insights as to the attitudes and preferences of the registered voter on the State's election

To that end, they will shortly be announcing recommendation to the 68th Texas Legislature regarding election reform from these four sources.

The Christmas Poinsetta

Weekly fertilizing with a dilute liquid fertilizer with a reading of 20/20/20 is required for maximum growth and beauty. You must remember that the red (pink or white) bracts is not the flower. The tiny yellow center cluster is the flower of the poinsettia.

Poinsettias resent drafts and are easily damaged by spraying of insecticides. They need short days and long night to bloom. Light at night prevent flowering and the formation of the bracts. The old myth that the poinsettias are poisonous has been recently disproved. If you like plants and enjoy working with them, you may want to pick up some poinsettias after Christmas and try to make them bloom for the next year.



Crackdown on fraud

Has someone ever placed a long distance call and charged it to your phone number without your permission? Placing a call and charging it to another number is a third-number call. Charging that call without the third party's permission is fraud.

More than six million dollars was lost by Southwestern Bell in suspected fraudulent third-number long distance calls in 1981. We investigate these calls and assist law enforcement agencies in bringing cases against the individuals involved. But, just as consumers pay for shoplifters through higher costs for goods, it is the honest customers who help pay for the fraudulent call losses through higher rates

Positive Authorization Needed Before Completing Calls

The company is now taking stronger action against fraud. We are changing the way we authorize third-number calls. Under the old system, operators placed a third-number, long distance call before verifying the call with the

Today, if you make such a call from a public phone, the operator will try to get authorization from the third party. Before your call is completed. the operator will call the number and ask if the charge will be accepted.

This process takes about 35 seconds. In 1983, operators may be required to get verified permission before completing long distance calls to a third number. It may take a few more seconds of inconvenience. but it means an eventual savings for customers as we tackle this multimillion dollar problem.

Beginning in January: the first of two major decisions affecting the telecommunications industry takes effect. (The second significant change -- the settlement of a federal court case against AT&T will be

Life Of Christ On Display At Christus Gardens

GATLINBURG, TEN-NESSEE - The gentle blue haze which touches the treeshrouded slopes of eastern America's highest peaks gives them their name - the Great Smoky Mountains. The half-million acre national park which protects and preserves vast stretches of these magnificent mountains is the most visited of all our national parks.

And its gateway city is Gatlinburg, by all odds and in all seasons one of the most appealing little resort town in the East. It's a fine place to shop for ntive handicrafts, enjoy excellent down-home cooking, and get to know some of the friendliest, most welcoming folks you'll meet anywhere.

For two decades, Gatlinburg has also been home to a most distinctive visitor site, internationally-renowned Christus Gardens. So strong is its appeal that some persons have been known to complete a tour, by another ticket, and re-enter to view the displays again.

In a handsome low-lying contemporary structure of native Tennessee and Georgia marbles, complementing rather than competing with its serene mountain setting, Christus Gardens depicts scenes from the life of Christ in a series of

life-sized dioramas peopled with amazingly realistic wax

For its painstaking attention to detail and authenticity alone, Christus Gardens would be outstanding. Add to that such a sensitive treatment of its subject, and it becomes truly unique. It's as if pages of a giant-sized Biblical picture book were unfolding before one's eyes, each viewed to the accompaniment of an appropriate musical background recorded by the Christus Gardens

First diorama in the series depicts the Nativity, accompanied by the universally recognized strains of "Silent Night." Other scenes which follow include Christ at the age of 12 being questioned by the elders in the temple, the temptation of Christ by Satan, John the Baptist presenting his disciples to Jesus, and the Sermon on the Mount, backgrounded with a musical rendition of "The Lord's Prayer."

One especially moving scene shows Christ with a smile on his face, blessing little children. A masterful diorama of the Last Supper depicts the artist Leonardo da Vinci's famous painting of this subject. Following scenes show the Crucifixion, Jesus appearing to Mary

Magdalene at the empty tomb, and the Ascension, accompanied by a triumphant rendition of Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus."

An adjoining rotunda houses Christus Gardens' priceless collection of coins from Biblical times, considered the finest in the United States and one of the three finest in the world. There are 168 coins in the entire collection, dating from the 6th century B.C. To 1192

Among those of special interest are the Shekel of Tyre - the type of coin which made up the 30 pieces of silver paid Judas for betrayal of Christ, the Biblical "widow's mite," the Biblical tribute penny, and one of the rarest gold coins in existence, a 10th century Byzantine Empire coin which was the first to portray the head of Christ.

In the rotunda is also displayed a notable collection of Bible, some quite old. Many are treasured family Bibles contributed to the Gardens by visitors.

In the jewel-like patio garden which visitors see after touring the galleries is an unusual Carrara marble sculpture, the most photographed single feature in Gatlinburg. It is a concave carving of the head of Christ,

so skillfully crafted that not only the eyes but the entire face seem actually to turn and follow the movements of persons walking before it.

Christus Gardens' impeccably groomed grounds are beautifully landscaped, surrounded in autumn with flaming red, gold and russet

mountain hardwoods.

Christus Gardens is completely non-denominational. and appeals equally to those whose interest may be primarily in religion, history, sightseeing - or a combination. To date, visitors from all 50 states and some 60 other countries have signed its guest book.

Indicative of its universal appeal, many have been from non-Christian nations such as Thailand, Israel, Egypt, Syria, Laos, Japan, the Republic of China, India and Russia.

To call Christus Gardens a tourist attraction is to oversimplify. It is that, of course, but it's something much more. It's the dream-cometo-reality of a most remarkable personality, Ronald Ligon of Franklin, Tennessee. Youthful still, Ligon was a young man, teens when he first developed the idea of the gardens. As with so many meaningful projects, it had its beginnings in adversity.

Ronald Ligon was stricken with tuberculosis while a student at Nashville's Vanderbilt University. For a time, it was doubtful whether his health would be restored. And the young man had time to do some serious thinking. He resolved that if he became well again he would devote whatever time and effort might be required to building a significant memorial to Jesus Christ.

All in all, Ligon traveled some 80,000 miles to see existing memorials in other countries. He visited the greatest museums of Europe to view paintings and artifacts, talking to museum directors, medieval scholars and teachers, determined that every minute aspect of each figure and diorama would be as authentic in costuming and setting as

scene having arrived barely in time by chartered plane. Besides the compelling subject matter, there is another obvious reason why so many visitors return to Christus Gardens for repeat

visits. The attention to detail

is so comprehensive that

new facets become apparent

on each successive viewing.

For example, the animals

in the Nativity scene, which may seem at first to be wax figures too, prove on second glance to be real, provided by one of the nation's best known big game taxidermists, Louis Ray of Jackson Hole, Wyoming.

In the scene depicting Christ meeting the elders in the temple, the high priest wears a colorful breast-plate of gem stones, each representing one of the 12 tribes of Israel.

Genuine palm trees in one diorama were specially transported from the Everglades. The pottery in one of the favorite scenes, Christ with the children, was fashioned at nearby Pigeon Forge pottery by outstanding art potter Douglas Ferguson, who did infinite research before producing appropriate stoneware authentic for this period.

Ronald Ligon today is the picture of vibrant good health, a friendly, enthusiastic, outgoing man

with three handsome sons of his own. He laughts now when he talks about that bleak day his father telephoned to say he would no longer be able to help him financially.

"I know now that's the greatest thing my father ever did for me," he muses. 'You know, so much of what can be accomplished in this world is measured by how much work you want to put into it. Then, I knew I had to work as I had never done before to succeed. And," he added, "sometimes your biggest asset can be a liability. I was young and enthusiastic, and people responded. They wanted to help me."

As well as being a popular four-season family vacation center, Gatlinburg is a notable second home and retirement city. During autumn, there are spectacular foliage displays in the Great Smoky Mountains, and mid-winter when conditions are favorable, there's skiing on Mount Harrison.

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

Oilmen Want Caution In Gas Legislation

A Lubbock independent oilman has wired the Texas Congressional Delegation that two-thirds of the increased cost of natural gas to residential consumers is due to costs other than th eprice of the gas. He urged their support to delay natural gas pricing legislation effecting producers dur-

ing the "lame duck" session. 'Some congressional leaders want to freeze natural gas prices and interfere with producer sales contracts," he said Rex Fuller, Lubbock, Chairman of the National Energy Policy Committee for the 5400-member Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association (TIPRO). "But wellhead price freezes will have no effect on 90% of the factors which have caused consumer price increases," Fuller continued.

"The most recent Department of Energy data show that for every one dollar increase in natural gas prices, only 32% represented the additional cost of natural gas. The other 68 cents was increased cost of transporta-

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Fuller said that a thorough hearing on natural gas deregulation should be held in Congress early next year. He pointed out that while
