
I hope you will make a new year's resolution to get your life in order with God so you may look forward to the coming days with a much brighter outlook.

### **DPS Official Reviews Proposed DWI Laws**

With state and national clude: statistics showing that some 50 per cent of highway accidents involve drivers under the influence of intoxicating liquor, the Texas Legislature will consider proposals in the session beginning Jan. 11 to enact new penalties for DWI offenders.

This statement was made Wednesday noon by Sargeant Jerry Mathews of the Eastland County office of the Department of Public Safety in a talk at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club. Lion C. B. Dill was program chairman and introduced the speaker.

In 1981, 4,700 persons about the same number of people as the total population of Cisco - lost their lives in USA accidents, and 50 per cent of the accidents involved DWI drivers, Sgt. Mathews said. He added that there have been 10 fatalities in Eastland County accidents this year and that five of the number involved DWI drivers.

Last January, the governor appointed a 17-man task force to study the DWI problem and to recommend changes in state laws, Sgt. Mathews said. These recommendations will be presented to the new

1. Raise the legal age for young people to buy liquor from 18 to 21 years. This would reduce teenage accidents by 28 per cent, the study showed.

2. Make it unlawful to have open alcoholic containers in moving automobiles. The present laws do not cover

3. Increase the fines for DWI conviction and let 40 per cent of the money from fines go to cities instead of 100 per cent to counties. Twenty per cent would be used by police to upgrade equipment. The same percentage of fines collected outside cities would go to sheriff's departments for equipment needs.

4. Suspend driver's licenses of those convicted of DWI for a few months and for longer periods for repeat convictions. Impound the cars of DWI violators who drive with a suspended

5. Suspend for 90 days the driver's licenses of those arrested for DWI and who refuse to take breath tests. Make refusal to take the tests an automatic conviction. (If the test shows a DWI suspect's blood to have .10 of achohol, he would automatically be considered

6. Establish three levels of punishment for DWI conviction, depending on the seriousness of the accident. A jail sentence would be manditory in cases where death resulted or a driver was convicted of a 2nd or 3rd DWI offense.

Sgt. Mathews said that statistics show that DWI was the leading cause of traffic deaths involving teenage drivers. He urged Lions to write their state legislature members to urge support of the new regulatory proposals. He added that "there will be strong resistance due to the automatic provisions of the proposed new laws."

In other action, the club voted to donate the sum of \$35 to a Cisco Welfare Reserve Fund administered by City Judge Jasper Cook. He explained that the fund is near depletion due to no Community Chest money and that assistance has been given lately to a young mother of two children. Club members added another \$35 to the club's check to provide

\$70 for the fund. Vice President C.B. Dill presided in the absence of Ivan Webb. He announced that the club's board and officers will meet next Monday night with the Cisco Evening Lions Club to help make plans for a District 2-E-1 Mid-Winter Conference scheduled in Cisco Jan. 15th. The club's board of directors will meet next Tuesday at 7

But on the activities of County Government - it is getting to where about the only thing we can predict accurately is the rise in cost of all goods and services. We spent \$2,310,334.05 to run the County in 1982. We anticipate this will be about 15% higher in 1983.

"The 1982 figure is considerably higher than that of former years. For one thing,

the county is now paying \$40,000 per year to help support the new Central Texas Appraisal District, as mandated by state law

"We also had to repair the courthouse this year. A heavy rain in Oct. 1981 caused some interior damage to the basement, as well as to the curbs, gutters, and sidewalks. Fortunately there was no great structural damage, and the builling is

back in good shape. Inflation is supposed to be down, nationwide. But on things we really need, the opposite seems to be true. Our County bills for utilities and telephone service are really up. Social Security taxes went up for all employees, and hospital insurance almost doubled. (Tripled, in some cases). County employees received a raise

We have had no really new road equipment for a long time, other than four brush cutters. And heavier traffic has caused a lot more maintenance work.

"Maintaining the new jail, of course, costs more than the old one. The county has not been able to pay any of the principal on the cost of

the new building - we have just been ble to keep up the interest on the loan. The lowering of the interest rates will assist us; we might be able to pay some of the prin-

cipal in 1983. "But in spite of increasing costs here," he adds, "We have fared much better than most other counties. For we still have oil development, giving a huge boost to the local taxes and economy.

Right now the Romney vicinity has proved to be a leading area in shallow production. And over near Ranger, the secondary recovery of oil by Sun Oil Co. appears to be right on schedule.

What were some of the other important events of 1982, Judge Bailey?"

The weather continued to make news in '82, with heavy, unseasonable rains in the spring, and a long dry spell in the summer. Peanut production was 'way off, as well as that of some other crops. Farmers and ranchers continued to have difficulty with low prices for

### About Film Storage...

Q: I was reading an article in a photography magazine and found a reference to storing film in the refrigerator. Now, I'm not exactly a new photographer, but I'd never heard of this practice. Does it have any benefits? I know that film should be used before the expiration date stamped on the box. If I do that with my film, should I store it in the refrigerator anyway? And if so, what benefits are there? I might add that my wife is against the idea, already. So it will take some pretty good arguments to get her to change her mind.

D. B., Chicago, IL

A: How much film do you want to store and how large a refrigerator do you have? Actually, the practice of storing unopened containers of film in the refrigerator is common, especially among pros who need to be assured that the film they shoot on assignment is as fresh as possible. Storing film in the refrigerator eliminates the two major reasons for film deterioration--heat and humidity. Too much of either can result in the premature deterioration of film, especially color film. Ideally, storage conditions should be around 40 degrees F. and 40 percent humidity-about what the average family's icebox offers. In addition to the benefit of delaying deterioration, refrigerated film storage has the added benefit of extending the shelf life of film. While no hard and fast laws exist, you can generally assume that, if your film has a stamped shelf life of, say, one year, you can increase that to two years--about double--by storing the film in the refrigerator.

And, for those of you already thinking ahead, yes, you can also freeze-store film. By doing that, you can actually triple the recommended shelf life


However, there are some drawbacks to cold storage. The first is that the film must be taken from storage and allowed to warm to room temperature while in its sealed container prior to shooting. This can mean up to several hours for frozen film. If you remove the film from its container before it has reached room temperature, it may gather condensation, which can mar the surface.

As a happy medium, why not try storing some film in the freezer, yet keep a nominal supply in the refrigerator and even more at room temperature. As you shoot the warm film, replace it with film from the refrigerator, which you may replace with film from the freezer. In that way, you'll have a continual supply of fresh film and not have to worry about those tedious "warm-up" times.

Q: I recently picked up an old view camera at an auction. It seems to work fine. All the shutter speeds seem about right-at least as far as I can tell. And the aperture ring is functioning. My problem is I don't know the first thing about shooting a view camera. Can you give me some information on where I can go to learn? I'm not interested in taking a course. I just want to pick up some basics so I can load the holders with film and have a little fun.

A: I hope you're not looking for detailed operating instructions, for those are only available in the owner's manual, which I assume turned into worm food years ago. If you'd like to know generally how your camera operates--and, more specifically, how to take quality viewcamera photos--I can recommend a very interesting book entitled, The View Camera, Operations and Techniques, by Harvey Shaman (Amphoto, New York, NY, 1979). In it you will find everything from the equipment to focusing, film, setting up, and using the various tilts and swings. Have Fun!

## Telephone Options To Save Money

Consumers with touch tone dialing can save money on long distance calls by investigating discount services available to them.

"Companies offering these services provide a variety of rates and plans. Take time to investigate alternatives before selecting a service, since benefits and limitation vary," reports Beverly Rhoades, consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Discount service is presently available in 15 to 20 cities in Texas, but the locations served vary with the company. Rhoades recommends checking the local telephone directory for

ticular location. Names of the companies include MCI, SPRINT, ITT.

WESTERN UNION and U.S. TEL, the specialist adds, and there may be others. Many toll free numbers are offered through credit card companies-and consumers receive an itemized bill for calls from the long distract credit card company rather than the regular telephone

'Perhaps the greatest drawback to the service is the amount of numbers that must be dialed before completing a call on the service. You are given a local access number and then your personal authorization code.

These combined numbers are usually 12 to 13 digits. If you get a busy signal or a wrong number, you have about 20 numbers to redial," Rhoades explains.

Cisco has touch-tone dialing, Eastland and Ranger customers do not.

Other considerations in order to select the best service are accessibility and line quality. Ask a friend who has the service if lines are generally available when needed, and if it is possible to hear as well on the discount lines as on regular long distance lines.

Before actually "signing up" with a discount service, ask these questions to determine if you can really save money with the service:

calls? There's generally a monthly minimum charge and may be an additional per call, monthly or annual fee. If your long distance bills are not large enough, the service charges can "eat up" your saving. To determine the benefit, consider the amount saved per call. Discount rates offered range from 15 percent to 80 percent-depending on the company and the time of day

the call is made. Get specific rates from each company and the time of day the call is made. Get specific rates from each company that services your area. Natuarally, if you make most of your calls during the highest dis-

count times, you will save

more. The discount rates are in addition to the normal discount rates offered through the regular telephone com-

· Are most of your calls to cities covered by discunt services? Cities serviced vary with companies, but most large and some mediumsized U.S. cities are covered. U.S. TEL allows you to call any city or town in the U.S., except Alaksa. However, Texas residents must call from a town or city currently serviced by the company.

· How much will it cost you to call the local access number from your home phone? If you live in the suburbs and the access number of the phone service is in the central city, the call to access the service might be a toll call.

· Do you make many long distance calls from other phones in your city and from other cities? Generally, calls can be made from other phones in your home area can usually be made from any city serviced by the company, but some companies charge extra for this

Even with an extra fee, these "credit-card" calls can save you money if the initial discount is great enough. The service may also be accessed for calls generally made collect, if a family member lives in-or is visiting-another city. You can give him or her the appropriate access number for that city, reminds Rhoades.



### Why Lot Prices Are Higher In Dallas Than Houston

One of the long-running debates between Dallasites and Houstonians concerns the price of housing. It's been documented that the average house price is higher in Houston than in Dallas.

But Dr. Richard Peiser of Southern Methodist University has completed a study which reveals that when similar houses in equivalent locations are compared, it turns out that the home in Houston cost \$4,000 to \$10,000 less than a comparable one in Dallas.

One reason, says Peiser, is that lot prices are lower in Houston. The primary reason for higher development costs in Dallas appears to constrain the supply of land available for immediate development, says Peiser.

More regulatory hurdles exist and developers in Dallas are more dependent on other agencies-such as utility companies-to open new sections for development

FORECLOSURE

If you are facing default on your home mortgage, there are a number of steps you should take.

your house should face south. Such an exposure generally is the most pleasant and energy efficient.





# TESCO & NRC Issues Report

Texas Electric today announced that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission has issued inspection reports on construction and operations activities at Comanche Peak.

The inspection of operations activities occurred during November and all areas inspected were found to be satisfactory.

The inspection of construction activities covered a period from April through September. This construction inspection identified an unresolved item regarding the piping support verification program and summarized findings on an earlier reported notice of violation regarding the Comanche Peak Unit 1 polar crane.

In addition, a notice of violation was issued involving an allegation made by a former inspector at Comanche Peak that he had not received the required training for his position.

The NRC inspector determined that, while the individual was qualified for the particular job, the documentation of stated

training could not be verified.


The former employee had made a total of some 20 allegations before and during public hearings on an operating license for Comanche Peak in September. All his other allegations were refuted or found to be unsubstantiated or of little technical merit by the NRC investigation.

Following a number of extensive surveys and questionnaires the Texas Secretary of State Office is making certain election law recommendations to the Texas Legislature.

A detailed summary of each Recommendations follows

I Texas should hold a Presidential Preference Primary on its Regular Primary Election Day. A majority of the registered voters surveyed after the Novmeber 2 general election agreed that Presidential Preference Primaries should be held in Texas. Currently, the political parties in Texas select their delegates to the national presidential nominating conventions without voters registering their preferences at the polls while in other states, voters select their delegates to the national nominating conventions through presidential preference primaries.

Registered voters were asked "Assuming presidential preference primaries were to be held, should they be held on the same day and at the same location as regular party primaries in May?" Almost three-fourths of the registered voters surveyed stated that presidential preference primaries should be held on the same day and in the same place as the regular May primary election. Shortening the campaign period would give the incumbent an unfair advantage and stifle the development of the two party system in

However, to hold a regular primary closer to the general election together with a presidential preference primary would in effect render the outcome of the presidential preference primary moot in Presidential election years due to the holding of party nominating conventions in late summer. It should also be noted that the percentage of registered voters surveyed in November 1982 in favor of a combined regular May primary and presidential preference primary exceeds the percentage of registred voters surveyed in May 1982 who are in favor of holding primary elections closer to the general election. In addition, holding primary elections during the summer months could in fact result in a lower voter turnout due to summer vacations and college students away from their campuses at which they vote.

Registered voters surveyed clearly favor holding a presidential preference primary in conjunction with the regular May primary elections and the holding of these two elections in May would decrease the cost of holding separate elections to the State, increase voter turnout, and lessen "voter fatigue."

II Texas should hold a unitary primary similar to the unitary primary conducted in the States of Alaska and Washington.

Texas should hold a unitary primary election in which all political parties' primaries are held together in the same polling place in each precinct by trained election officials rather than party personnel with only a plurality required to nominate to the general election; therefore, no primary runoff elections.

Texas is one of only four states that does not hold a unitary primary. The states of Washington and Alaska hold unitary blanket open primaries using a single ballot and under this system, the highest vote-getter from each party advances to the general election. The general election, therefore, is essentially a runoff election between the parties.

A majority of the registered voters surveyed after the May primary election were in favor of a unitary primary in Texas. A significant 62 percent of the registered voters surveyed who did not vote in the May primary said that they either 'definitely" or "probably" would have gone to the polls if Texas had held a unitary primary. Over 60 percent of the registred voters surveyed after the November 2 general election agreed with the registered voters surveyed in May and favored a unitary primary system in Texas. Changing to a unitary

primary would diminish

'voter fatigue' because there are fewer elections in which voters must go to the polls. Texas now holds five elections - two primary elections, two primary runoff elections, and the general election - under the unitary primary system there would be only two elections- a primary and a general election. Cost of elections would therefore also be greatly reduced. The total cost of holding a single primary election would be substantially less than holding two primaries and two runoff primaries. Changing to a unitary primary would save at least the cost of the two primary runoffs which amounted to \$2.5 million in Texas in 1982. Consolidation of polling places, election workers, and election equipment could have saved Texas taxpayers between \$3.6 million and \$4.8 million in 1982, and will save them between \$4 and \$6 million in

1984.

A move to "take politics out of the judiciary" would result in election of judges who are in essence elected solely on the basis of their judicial experience and qualifications. It is also argued that partisan politics can bias a judge's necessary independent perspective. The non-partisan election of judges is supported by the majority of registered voters surveyed after the 1982 primary and general election and should receive the attention of the state's elected leaders.

IV Local elections in Texas should be consolidated on three or four specific dates each year and be held at the same polling places within each precinct.

In some Texas counties, there have been as many as twelve county wide elections in a particular year for city races, school district races. party primaries, etc. A majority of the 50 states, in an attempt to limit rising election costs, have consolidated

elections. Nearly three-quarters of the registered voters surveyed after the May primary election favored consolidation of state, local, and school board elections on the same day, at a single polling place, with votes cast on a single ballot. More than four out of five of the respondents surveyed after the November 2 general election favored holding all local elections on three or four specified dates in the same location within each

Consolidation of elections would reduce the cost of elections, increase voter turnout, decrease "voter fatigue," and minimize voter confusion. Combinging election workers and elec-

tions. Voters would be more encouraged to vote of the process appeared more simple and convenient and confusion surrounding the various elections would be minimized under a streamlined and consolidation election process.

V Current office holders with more than one year remaining in their current term should be required to resign their current office when seeking election to a different statewide office. A majority of the

registered voters queried on the "resign to run" issue after the May primary and November general election agreed that all office holders with more than one year remaining in their current term should resign to run for a new statewide, district, or local office sought. The State Constitution currently has this provision for municipal and county officials, and Texas voters want it expanded to state officials as well.

It has been argued that the citizens of Texas elect office holders for their full term of office and for those office holders to campaign for a different office with more than one year remaining in their current term constitutes a disservice to the electorate. The registered voters of Texas surveyed on two separate occasions support the "resign to run" provision and the state's elected leaders should give serious examination to amending Texas law in this regard.

VI An election central vote tabulation project should be statutorily carried foward by the Secretary of State's Office.

Since 1916, the Texas Election Bureau (TEB), a nonprofit organization of statewide media representatives has tabulated vote totals in 119 elections, including 30 general elections.

Beginning with the 1982 November 2 general election, the Secretary of State's Office tabulated vote totals

and the project was known as the Secretary of State Election Central. The directors of the TEB voted not to tabulate the votes and instead supported a merger of experience with the Secretary of State's Office.

On November 17, the Board of Directors of the TEB voted to institutionalize the project in the Secretary of State's office via legislation to be proposed to the 68th Texas Legislature.

In nine states, the central tabulation of votes on election night is provided by the state. In ten states a private organization is used, most often a media organization. However, 28 states have no method of centrally compiling election results. No information was available for the two remaining states.

The Chief Election Officer of the State has responsibility for ensuring uniform administration of Texas' elections and election laws, and to that end, prompt statewide election returns in a quasi official manner will reduce the opportunity for election fraud and postelection electioneering. With the support of the Texas news media, the Texas Election Bureau's Board of directors, and the state's county clerk's the state-sponsored vote tabulation project was a succesful undertaking that should be continued through legislation by the 68th Texas Legislature. VII Constitutional amend-

ment elections in Texas should be held in presidential and gubernatorial election years. At least 25 percent of all registered voters should go to the polls before the state constitution can be amended. Prior to each constitutional amendment election, the Secretary of State should provide a written summary of the advantages and disadvantages of the proposed amendments to each registered voter.


In light of the facts that: (1) only 12.2 percent of the state's registered voters participated in the 1981 Constitutional Amendment election; and, (2) numerous hotly contested local issues were also present on the ballot, it has been suggested that constitutional amendments be placed on the general and presidential election ballots as a means of encouraging voter interest. A majority of the registered voters surveyed after the general election agreed that constitutional amendment elections should be held in conjunction with presidential or gubernatorial elections. Since Texans have

historically turned out in greater percentages to vote in these elections, it is assumed that constitutional amendments would receive greater attention by the elec-

Registered surveyed after the November 1981 Constitutional Amendment Election indicated that a major reason for not voting in the election was "a lack of information" regarding the election or the proposed amendments. In Texas, constitutional amendments are explained and advertised in newspapers statewide in English and Spanish, on two separate occasions prior to the election. In five states, the Secretary of State conducts an extensive mailing of constitutional amendment literature to registered voters. Based on the response from survey participants following the 1981 constitutional amendment election, and the fact that over 70 percent of the registered voters surveyed after the general election support the proposal that the Secretary of State provide a written summary of the advantages and disadvantages of proposed amendments to each registered voter, it is recommended that the Texas Secretary of State provide each registered voter with a written summary of the pros and cons of each proposed amendment to assist in educating the public on these important

issues. Given the far reaching impact of constitutional amendment elections, and the fact that a minority of the registered voters in 1981 participated in the election, it is necessary that at least 25 percent of the state's registered voters go to the polls before amendments are added to our State Constitution. A majority of the respondents in the 19892 general election survey agreed that at least 25 percent of all registered voters should participate in constitutional amendment elections before a proposed amendment can become

The implementation of the three proposals cited above regarding constitutional amendment elections would further ensure that decisions affecting the daily lives of all Texans are indeed the will of a significant proportion of the Texas electorate.
