Bears and panthers were almost as common as rabbits are at the present time, and it was imperative that frontier families constantly guard their livestock against depredations. Many stores are told of attacks by these animals on human begins. Most of these are the product of ignorance and imagination; but attacks did sometimes occur. <br> The following story is wellknown among older Texans, and, like many another such story, its location has often been changed to suit the teller. | The name of the unfortunate family has been lost, but the tragic event took place in the old settlement of Alameda in what is now Eastland County. <br> The original Alameda community was situated along the north side of Mansker's Lake, which is a sectionof the old channel of the Leon River isolated by an ancient change of the river's course. The houses, al log cabins, were built more or less in line along the lake. There were six or seven houses, all within sight of one another. <br> There was a young couple in the settlement who had on ly one child, a baby a few months old.
