

Bacteria as Plant Food Increases Grain Yield The use of bacteria as food for plants is the basis of a new preparation known as phosphorobacteria, developed at Leningrad institute. Each gram of the preparation con-tains up to 200 million specially cultivated bacteria, which on reaching the soil transform complex organic matter containing phosphorus into soluble salts from which the plant can draw nourishment. The bacteria increased crop yields.







MORE PEOPLE TO FEED-LESS ACRES CULTIVATED

"Soils and Men," in the Yearbook of Agriculture for 1938, gives a table showing the results of the amount and rate of erosion on our cultivated lands of the United States. This table shows that, according to the 1935 census there were 415,334,931 acres of land in cultivation. Only 160,948,703 acres, or 39 per cent of this land was of such character it could be culivated continuously without danger of erosion damage.

There were 76,255,449 acres of this total of such nature, that is, severely eroded, steep, shallow, stony or infertile soils, that economic crop returns could not be expected if it were retained in cultivation. The remaining crop land comprising 178,130,779 acres should have erosion control measures applied to protect it against additional deterioration by erosion.

Between 1935 and 1940 there was a loss of over 3 million acres of crop land each year from erosion. Since there is little land that may be put in cultivation, the picture may be presented this way: The population is increasing by more than a millior a year while the land is being washed and blown away at a rate of more than 3 million acres a year.
