### **Three County Convictions Are Upheld By Higher Court**

Three recent 91st District Court convictions have been affirmed by a higher court, and a stiff sentence pronounced in 91st in connection with a no-good \$11 check.

The conviction of Roland Murray Owen of Cisco in the 91st District Court for Failure To Stop and Render Aid has been affirmed in part by the Court of Appeals. Owens was convicted for

the August 3, 1980, automobile-motorcycle collision in Cisco wherein Allen Cory Stinson was killed and Vickie Hooser was seriously injured.

The jury assessed Owens' punishment at the maximum of 5 years in the Texas Department of Corrections on each count

The appellate court

reformed the conviction of the second count. Owens was represented by Wm. T. Palmer and Emory Walton, Criminal District Attorney, prosecuted.

The final conviction of Boby Ray Freeman, Sr. of Ranger has been affirmed by the Court of Appeals.

Freeman was convicted in the 91st District Court on December 2, 1979, for the felony offense of Driving While Intoxicated, Subsequent Offense, at which time he received a 2 year probated sentence.

On September 20, 1982, his probation was revoked by Judge Jim R. Wright after which he appealed the revocation of his probation

to the Court of Appeals. Freeman was represented

by Ben D. Sudderth of Comanche and the case was prosecuted by Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton.

The Court of Appeals has also affirmed an Order by Juvenile Judge Jim R. Wright that a 15 year old Eastland boy had engaged in delinquent conduct. The evidence at the trial of the subject youth showed that the youth was found with parts of a stolen bicycle and that he admitted his participation in the theft.

In a recent hot check case, Judge Jim R. Wright assess-

ed a \$200.00 fine and costs against a young man for writing a hot check of \$11.50 after extensive efforts had been made by various officials to get the young man to pay the check.

If you are selling your home, it is important that you select a knowledgeable realty agent

To begin with, find out which brokers are most active in your neighborhood. Ask these brokers about sales commissions, services, multiple listing exchange membership, advertising, open house commitments and names of clients.

Before listing your home with the broker, phone the client references to see if former sellers would list that broker again. Be careful to select a broker who understands today's complex financing arrangements.

In addition, solicit each broker's suggestions on how to package your home to make it attractive to potential buyers. Finally, be cautious about signing a listing for longer than 90 days. If the home doesn't sell within 90 days but the agent is doing a good job, you can renew the listing.

FLOODPLAIN FACTS

Do you live in a floodplain? A floodplain is that part of a water shed subject to inundation by rising flood

A 100-year floodplain is an area that might be expected to flood once on an average of every 100 years. This is a statistical statement, however, and also describes an area that may flood three times within 300 years, with all three floods occurring in one year.

The movement of a large volume of water down a water shed over a short period of time makes the width and depth of the stream channel incapable of carrying the water. Factors that contribute to flooding are: speed and duration of rainfall, the size of the water shed, stream channel and floodplain, and the kind of

ground cover present. For more information, consult the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers or your city planning depart-

Unless you've kept up with the market, you'll need professional assistance to find out the value. If you wish to determine an appropriate price to put on the house when you sell, a real estate

agent can probably give you an estimate basked on a market analysis.

But for legal and tax purposes, you need a market value appraisal provided by a real estate appraiser. Market value is not the same as the probable price but is the highest price you would receive under a specific set of conditions.


You'll find that knowing market value is necessary for filing estate tax on inherited property, for condemnation proceedings and for appealing property tax assessments.

#### CONSEQUENCES OF CO-SIGNING

With credit harder to obtain today, many people are asking friends and relatives to co-sign for loans.

Co-signing occurs because the borrower does not have acceptable security to offer. When individuals co-sign, they are accepting the risk that the lending institution refuses to accept. But now more and more people are defaulting on their loans, leaving their co-signers to pay the notes.

Studies by Cornell University show about half of all cosigners are asked to make payments. So before you cosign a loan, get everything in writing for the borrower and the lender. Ask the lender to

Have you ever made the statement, "I'm going to get myself and my house organized!" If you are an average homemaker, you have probably said this to yourself many times.

I have some hints on how to organize your home. But remember, you can't get organized overnight. If disorganization took years, organization won't happen overnight. The important thing is to have a systematic plan for getting organized. Then you can tackle each goal individually, step-by-

Here is a potpourri of ideas of what to do and how to do

Assess your clutter realistically. Just how much of it do you really need to save? Unless you want to create a National Museum in your home you need to learn when things should be discarded or recycled.

Organize the storage space in your home. Kitchens and closets can usually benefit from periodic reviews. If storage is to be functional, store items used frequently close to the area where they will be used. Place items so they are easy to see and reach.

Learn how to deal with paper. From magazine clippings to financial documents, you can only do three things with the paper that enters your life: throw it, use it, or file it. Set up a home filing system to keep

the papers readily accessi-Some organizers recommend using different color folders for stashing your papers. And don't forget about the alphabet!

Learn to make the most of your time. Use a central family calendar to keep track of everyone's activities and responsibilities. Write your shopping list according to the location of supermarket items. Use odd moments and waiting time for mini-projects. Don't over-organize your time.

Organize routine tasks, like housecleaning. Make a list of housecleaning activities to be completed weekly, monthly and annually. Schedule them on your calendar. Divide responsibilities among family

Set up filing systems for clippings and written information using colors - dots stars. Keep the system simple. Use just a few good key words or you'll forget how to use the system.

Schedule an annual garage sale and have a special spot to store things you plan to sell or give away.

Take advantage of biorhythms - know when you best suited to complete certain tasks. Organize them ahead of time and complete them when your productivity level is at its peak.

#### **Photograph Thyself**

Remember that old Biblical saying, "Photograph thy neighbor as thou photograph thyself"? Well, something like that. The point is, if you spend all your people-taking time photographing others without stopping from time to time to take a self-portrait, you're missing some fun, some good experience, and possibly some top-notch photos.

Think about it for a moment. Who best knows who you are and how to "capture" the real you if not, well, you? Surely there are times when you've looked at yourself in the mirror and thought, gee, the old guy doesn't look to bad! Or maybe you were on a business trip and stopped to do a little siteseeing. Wouldn't a shot of you in the scene make for a more interesting photograph?

Then, too, there are times when you and a friend or your spouse would look good in a photo together. Without a third person present to snap the shutter. what's your option? Or maybe the old gang from J. P. Morgan High gets together and everyone there wants a photo...of everyone there. Can you deliver?

Today, cameras of every format and type come equipped with self-timers--those little gizmos which, when set, delay the snapping of the shutter for from 5 -15 seconds or so. And that's just enough time for you to set up the camera and get in on the action. If you know how to go about it.

For starters, when photographing more than yourself, set the camera on a tripod or other very firm, stable support. If you don't have a tripod, it sometimes helps to set a small beanbag or other flexible, weighted object on the camera to prevent it from moving accidentally during exposure.

Next, set the scene as though you were going to take the photo without you in it. If necessary, do all the preliminary stuff like posing, focusing, and metering. Then imagine another body in the viewfinder--

yours. Pre-visualize where you'll be and what you'll be doing. To the left of Patty with my arm around his shoulder, for example. Set the self-timer, press the release, and run like crazy to get into the scene before the shutter is tripped. Then try to look casual...like you've been standing around, waiting for the photo to be taken, all day.

If you're the only one in the scene, you'll need a mark so you know where to stand once you release the self-timer-governed shutter. It helps, too, to place a chair or some other object in the scene while you're setting up so you'll have something to focus on. Move the object before pressing the release, of course.

As an alternative, you can run a tape measure from the camera's film-plane mark to the spot on which you'll pose and set the camera's focusing ring accordingly. This isn't likely to be quite so accurate as the preceding pre-focusing method, though, so use it only when absolutely necessary.

There are other ways to take self-portraits, of course. One of the most frequently used is to shoot your image in a mirror. In that way, you can see exactly what you're getting before you get it. Unfortunately, that often includes the camera, if you're shooting handheld. Mirrors aren't selective enough to exclude certain unwanted objects from their reflections. To beat this problem, you can mount the camera on a tripod set off to one side and out of the scene. Then you can step before the mirror and use a cable release or the self-timer to trip the camera's shutter.

Just remember when focusing around a mirror that the distance from you to the mirror is only half the distance necessary for a correctly focused shot. If you're standing six feet from a mirror, holding a camera to one side, the correct focusing distance is six feet from subject to mirror and whatever the distance from mirror to camera film plane.

They neither initiate investigations or prosecutions of crime, nor execute plans to rehabilitate criminals. Their role is intermediate-to protect the innocent, to assure fair trials, to apply the law, to instruct a jury or, if trial is held without a jury, to determine guilt or innocence, and to fix penalties for those found guilty.

"Basically, courts administer case loads. They accept pleas of guilty, which account for nearly 90 per cent of all convictions, but even in so doing they take precautions to be sure that the accused understands the charges against him, that he desires to plead guilty, and that he is competent to do so. In a trial the courts assure fairness in selection of a jury-and determine what evidence is admissible. A jury, or in its absence, a judge will find facts fro the relevant evidence, and the judge will apply the law and in most jurisdictions fix the sentence."

Lice are the culprits and they reproduce rapidly during cool weather.

Uncontrolled, lice can soon infest a whole herd, because with cold weather, cattle tend to bunch up more and the pests can easily move from one animal to another. Heavy hair coats on animals during cold weather also afford protection for the parasites and allow increased reproduction.

Costs to the cattlemanboth in control efforts and dramatic production lossesincrease as lice populations

There are two types of lice--bloodsucking and bitingand both infest cattle. Sucking lice pierce the animal's skin and suck blood while biting lice feed on particles of hair, scale, scab and skin discharges.

Lice infestations irritate animals, causing itching, scratching and rubbing on fences or anything else available. This produces denuded areas, bruises and lacerations on the affected animal. Heavily infested animals will have an unthrifty apperance and will suffer weight reduction, decreased milk production, anemia or even death.

Lice infested animals may also be more subject to respiratory diseases such as pneumonia. Heavy lice infestations often stunt calves. Undernourished cattle of any age usually have the heaviest infestation.

Some cattle appear to be physiologically more susceptible to lice than others and thus have higher pest populations. Such animals are called "chronics" or "carriers" and are usually instrumental in reinfesting the herd annually in spite of repeated insecticide treatments. 'carrier' animals is a helpful management practice in reducing lice pro-

Insecticide control of lice is not difficult to achieve but there are some problems. Most insecticides don't kill eggs; therefore, retreatment is required in two to three weeks t prevent another buildup. However, if the initial treatment comes late enough in the season, there may not be enough time for lice to build to economic levels again before warm spring weather.

Spraying and dipping infested animals with proper insecticides is an effective means of controlling lice. However, control measures are usually required when winter conditions are most harsh-a time when cold stress is a good possibility and respiratory diseases prevalent. Some of this problem can be prevented by treating animals on a day when they can be dry before sundown.

Pour-on and spot-on grubicides labeled for lice are effective and considerably reduce the problem of cold stress associated with dips and sprays. However, the possibility of a host-parasite reaction is always a threat if the material is applied after the cut-off date for grub con-

Systemic grubicides labeled for lice control usually recommend a lower rate than that to control grubs,

effective against lice. The product kills all stages of lice-eggs, nymphs and adults. One application is adequate for season-long control if the entire herd is treated and no untreated animals are later introduced into the herd.

Only a small amount of chlorpyrifos is required, thus eliminating cold stress from soaking animals with sprays and dips. The insecticide is not a grubicide, so it can be used anytime without fear of a host-parasite reaction. However, this product

is not labeled for dairy animals, bulls over 8 months, or purebread exotic breeds.

Whichever lice control program is used, the cattlemen should be certain to read label directions and pay particular attention to warnings, restrictions and preslaughter intervals.

Additional information on control of lice and other external parasites of cattle is available in the publication, "Suggestions for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry," at the County Extension Office.

CONTROL OF GRASSBUR

Because of their variation in texture, growth habit and color, weeds create an unsightly appearance in turf grasses. maintenance is the best means of controlling weeds. Thorough and infrequent watering, adequate fertilization and proper mowing are important steps to weed control. However, lawns damaged by insects or disease, wear or other problems are highly susceptible to weed invasion.

Grassbur, goosegrass, and crabgrass are the major grassy weeds which cause problems in lawns during the summer. These are annual grasses which emerge from seed each year. These weeds can be controlled with preemergent herbicides applied in the early spring. Preemergent herbicides prevent the seed from germinating. Examples of preemergent herbicides recommended for the control of crabgrass and grassbur are Balan\* and Dacthal\* . Preemergent herbicides are not harmful to existing vegatation.

The best and most effective form of weed control is good lawn fertilization and maintenance program. Weeds invade thin, wear stands of grass. Killing weeds with chemicals will not keep them out unless followed by management practices that encourage the grass to grow vigorously enough to compete favorable with the weeds. Herbicides are not a miracle answer to lawn control, but merely a useful tool in a total lawn maintenance program.

In heavily infested lawns two applications may be necessary. The recommended chemicals will give about three months of protection. Postemergent application of a contact herbicide such as MSMA will give in season control of annual grasses in bermuda grass. Only use materials recommended for St. Augustine grass should be used in St. Augstine lawns, as the turf might be damaged by some materials that are safe for Bermudagrass.






