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

Many families shopping for a new home are discouraged by the cost of housing. Costs for land, construction and money have increased greatly. They want more space. They want a

larger house. But perhaps families could adjust to the present housing situation by rethinking their shelter needs. For example, as much as one-third of the space in the average American home is "wasted." With that in mind, here are some ideas for using space more efficiently.

A "living-den" may be used more often and cost less than a separate living room and en. Bedrooms can be smaller if storage space is adequate.

A small, well planned kitchen saves steps and is likely to be more satisfactory than a large, poorly planned one.

With more thought to the efficient use of space, more families can buy housing that will meet their needs but still be within their budget.

INTERIOR DESIGNS FOR THE HANDICAPPED

If you are planning a new house which will be used by a wheelchair resident, careful planning and a little extra out the heat in summer, but expense can make life much easier for that person.

inches with interior doors of the sliding or pocket type with 32-inch openings. Eliminate thresholds and increase hall widths to 31/2 to

The bathroom should permit a five-foot turning radius with the fixtures arranged for easy transfer to the toilet. Grab bars and lifting aids are a must, and make certain they are attached to a firm support.

Set the vanity high enough so the wheelchair can go underneath. Finally, install automatic garage door openers and covered entries. All these items make life at home easier for the handicapped, but independent,

CASH IN ON FREE SOLAR ENERGY

Energy from the sun is free, so why not "cash in" on it when building a home?

Positiong your home in relation to the sun's movement throughout all seasons can save money on utility bills. A house should be oriented along an east-west axis, with the longest walls and largest roof plane facing south to take advantage of winter sun and allow for easy shading in the summer.

Family rooms, living rooms and similar areas used frequently in daylight hours, plus walls that have the greatest number of windows, should be located on the south side. Shade these windows from the summer sun by using overhangs, porches or trellises

These ideas will help keep will allow winter sunshine to enter windows and lower the heating bill.

Trucking Deregulation

House Of Representatives

Jim Parker-District 65

The most controversial and signficant legislation acted on by the House of Representatives to date has been the trucking deregulation issue disposed of last week.

My immediate reaction in these type issues is to get the government out and allow the free enterprise market system to work; however, in reality, that feeling must, I think, be tempered with the understanding that some sectors of the economy are so important to the public good that the government has a strong interest in regulation for that public good. Public utilities are a good example and I think motor freight in Texas is another example.

Our entire economy, national, state and local, is predicated upon transportation system for the shipment of goods in the stream of commerce and merits some regulation to assure that at least minimum standards

are maintained.

My ultimate decision was to retain the regulatory aspect under the Railroad Commission but to ease the entry of persons wishing to be in the trucking business.

My real dilimma came about as a result of the proposed amendment by Representative Simpson that was touted as a "Farm and Ranch Exemption" amendment. The amendment proported to exempt the same agricultural commodities exempted by the Federal Intercompact Commodities Act and sounded really good until one began to inquire as to the actual commodities concerned. Very conveniently, and probably intentionally, the members were not given a list of exempted items but through a certain amount of diligence I was able to obtain a listing and discovered that the amendment was in no way a producer's amendment but was in fact a processer's amendment masquerading under the disguise of "agricultural relief." The

amendment would have ex-

empted all packers, processors, canners, etc., and would have allowed them to "shirttail" onto the agricultural aspect. I voted "no" on the amendment.

Virtually all members of the House appear to be cognizant of the plight of the ag economy and desirous of making beneficial changes; however, there always seems to be some sector of the economy that wants to get a free ride along with ag interest. Of course, the best example is urban developers who take advantage of ag use ad valorem tax evaluation to hold property, in many cases worth millions

I am proud to convey the fact that we did become aware of this yet additional attempt to ride the ag interest issue and were able to defeat the attempt; and, ultimately we have a very good agricultural product freight exemption section which was proposed and carried successfully by

Representative Joe Hanna. More and more each day, it becomes apparent the degree of importance of being aware of what is going on and having all the input possible prior to making a





Cancer Answer Line

Question: Is chewing tobacco or habit forming?

ANSWERline: Smokeless tobacco doesn't carry the health hazard warning that cigarettes do, but it's tobacco just the same and is habit-forming. The nicotine in it lifts you up first, then lets you down. That highlow effect on your nervous system sets you up for continued need. Thus habitual use of chewing tobacco and snuff causes other health hazards. Among these are leukoplakia, the leathery white patches inside the mouth caused by direct contact with and continued irritation by tobacco juice; less sense of taste resulting in the urge for more salt or sugar; receding gums and tooth decay. Approximately five percent of diagnosed leukoplakia cases develop into oral cancer. Besides these health hazards it means more bad breath and dis-

ANSWERline: A study in Boston. Mass, at Brigham and Women's Hospital showed some association between tale and ovarian cancer in women who regularly dusted their genitals or sanitary napkins. It was found that 32 women who did have cancer had used talcum. and that only 13 of the women in the control group used it that way. It was suggested that the presence of asbestos in the powder might be involved, in view of the similarity of the ovarian cancer to mesothelioma or cancer of the chest lining which has been definitely linked to as-

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



"We believe that responsible parties should abstain from 'quick fix,' short-term solutions and continue with the transition to free markets for new gas contemplated by the Natural Gas Policy Act of 1978, and thereby assure continued adequate supplies at reasonable prices," Willians

Several energy-related bills have been submitted to the 98th Congress, many of which would override existing contract provisions between producers and buyers of natural gas. Williams warned that legislation which might infringe on the sanctity of contract obligations could cause severe disruption within the natural gas industry, with both utilities and their

customers being penalized. Lone Star Gas Company is aggressively and successfully negotiating with producers to control gas purchase costs, Williams said. Many of the company's contracts provide for price renegotiation between buyer and seller.

In addition, Lone Star is continuing to secure voluntary price concessions. To date, prices have been lowered in 130 contracts, a reduction of about \$85

million by December 1983 in gas cost to the company and for the benefit of consumers. The marketplace is slowly but assuredly correcting itself," Williams said.

reserves recently has faller nearly 20 percent, and the prospect of less funding for the increasingly expensive search for natural gas will cut the number even more.

Indefinite price escalator clauses, which allow periodic adjustments in the cost of gas, assure producers of recouping current and future costs of producing gas, and many of these clauses permit downward price moves as well as upward. Abolishment of the escalator clause would, Williams added, result in short, probably year-toyear, contracts with little encouragement for exploration and development of new natural gas supplies.

If new legislation is enacted stipulating what provisions gas purchase contracts may contain, economic uncertainty would result in an almost certain shortage, he explained. because producers would not be able to finance new capital investments.


The NGPA continues to be the best compromise to insure future gas supplies at competitive prices, Williams said. The gas industry is resolving current problems through voluntary renegotiation and exercise of existing contract provisions.




