for the full current nickel-agallon exemption off the top. The remainder of the \$11 million will be prorated on a per-gallon basis to all gasohol blended with alcohol made from out-of-state feedstocks.

"At the current level of gasohol sales in Texas." Hightower said. "that \$11 million exemption will prorate out to the out-of-state gasohol at about two cents a gallon. That's not a lot, but coupled with the nickel-agallon federal tax exemption.

Most police departments rely upon the oral issuance of the Miranda rules in different states, (see Texas of both the warnings and

waiver questions. Their officers are supplied with cards, on one side of which appear the warnings to be read, and on the other the waiver questions to be asked. Many are prepared, or at least approved, by the local prosecuting attorney.

Most Eastland County police officers use a locallyprepared card.

Justices of the Peace generally use a detailed Miranda warning which is printed on a sheet of legal paper. This is read to the accused, who then signs. Juveniles are read a different set of rights, and parents may be present. State officers in the county use a state-produced card.

Professor Fred E. Inbau, writing with John Henry Wigmore, Professor of Law Emeritus, Northwestern University, has addressed the question of Over-reaction on Miranda in an article published in the Journal of Criminal Law and Criminology and reprinted inthe FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, April 1983.

"The Supreme Court, at the earliest opportunity, ought to overrule Miranda,' he says, "Or else uphold the validity of the test of confession admissability enacted by Congress shortly after Miranda, as part of the 1968 'Omnibus Crime Bill'."

He suggests that as part of a three-pronged approach to the problem, with the other prongs including reconsideration of Miranda practices by police and prosecutors, and suggestions that courts moderate their apprehension over possible reversals because of shortcomings in Miranda formalities.

**Texas Code Of Criminal Procedure** 

Art. 38.22. When Statements May be Used

Sec. 1. In this article, a written statement of an accused means a statement signed by the accused or a statement made by the accused in his own handwriting or, if the accused is unable to write, a statement bearing his mark, when the mark has been witnessed by a person other than a peace officer.

Sec. 2. No written statement made by an accused as a result of custodial interrogation is admissible as evidence against him in any criminal proceeding unless it is shown on the face of the statement that:

(a) the accused, prior to making the statement, either received from a magistrate the warning provided in Article 15.17 of this code or received from the person to whom the statement is made a warning that:

(1) he has the right to remain silent and not make any statement at all and that any statement he makes may be used against him at his trial;

(2) any statement he makes may be used as evidence against him in court;

(3) he has the right to have a lawyer present to advise him prior to and during any questioning;

(4) if he is unable to employ a lawyer, he has the right to have a lawyer appointed to advise him prior to and during any questioning; and

(5) he has the right to terminate the interview at any time; and

(b) the accused, prior to and during the making of the statement, knowingly, intelligently, and voluntarily waived the rights set out in the warning prescribed by Subsection (a) of this section.

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


