

Property Seizure Allowed For Nonpayment Of Rent

David S. Jones

Did you know that most leases allow the management to seize personal property, such as radios and cameras, for nonpayment of rent, if the provision is underlined or in bold print in the lease?

Without a written lease that specifically gives the right of seizure, the manager must go to court to seize the property

In addition, a tenant cannot be locked out of an apartment for failure to pay rent. However, the manager may change the door lock when rent is ovedue if written notice is left on the door telling where the key can be picked up at all hours, regardless of whether the overdue rent has been paid.

If a tenant moves prior to the end of the lease term, that tenant is liable for the rent to the end of the lease. The amount the next resident pays in rent for the unexpired lease term of the previous tenant, however, must be credited to the previous tenant. Know and comply with your lease terms for a pleasant renting experience.

PURCHASING NEW HOME AFTER SELLING CAN CUT TAX BILL

If you have owned your home for several years, you have probably found that its value has gone up.

Consequently, if you were to sell the home, a net gain would be realized. According to the Internal Revenue Code, this gain must be reported on Form 2119 as taxable income.

A number of exceptions allow you to postpone such taxation. For instance, none of the gain is taxable if you can meet the following conditions. First, your old house must have been your principal residence; second, another principal residencecosting more than the sales price of the former residence-must be purchased within a specified time.

For residences sold after July 20, 1981, you have two years to acquire the replacement residence. If you have specific questions about these tax rules, contact a tax

EXEMPTION FROM GAIN ON SALE OF HOME

If you are a home owner aged 55 or older you may be aware that you are eligible for a tax exemption of \$125,000 on the gain from the sale of your residence.

You may not, however, be aware of some of the fine points relating to this provision. For instance, you can only use this exemption once in your lifetime.

BLOWN IN INSULATION

If you are married and claim the exemption on a joint return, neither you nor your spouse are eligible to claim it again. If you or your spouse should later remarry, neither partner in the new marriage can claim the exemption.

Should you and your spouse file separate returns, however, you are each allowed a separate exemption of \$62,500. There are additional requirements for claiming this one-time tax exemption. For those call your local office of the Internal Revenue

Texas Theme Park Is Closer To Reality

JARRELL-Plans for a new major theme amusement park to serve the I-35 corridor metropolitan areas of San Antonio, Austin, Killeen-Temple and Waco became two steps closer to being carried out June 6.

The first step was the signing of an agreement by a new corporation called "Prairie Dell Lake Amusement Park Inc." to purchase the 75 acres formerly used by the Matterhorn Restaurant in Bell County on I-35 between the Prairie Dell and Jarrell exits. The seller is a bank which originally financed the construction of the Matterhorn Restaurant facility.

The former Matterhorn property includes a 70 ft. high concrete replica of the famous Matterhorn Mountain, 36 recently constructed buildings, a 3.3-acre fishing and boating lake with a wide and long concrete walkway along the edge of the lake, and a working miniature railroad with two trains, one-

half mile of track and a depot inside the former Matterhorn Restaurant which was located inside the Matterhorn mountain replica.

The scale, scheduled to be completed on or around June 15, 1983, provides that 10 of the 75 acres will be separatley deeded from the balance of the land.

"The separate 19-acre parcel, which has some frontage on I-35, will be used to construct a recreational vehicle park and campgrounds to be called "Pririe Dell Lake Camping World," noted Phillip Fry, president of Prairie Dell Lake Amusement Park Inc. and a developer and operator of mobile home parks and RV/camping parks in Arizona, Texas and

the Midwest. The second step, also on June 6, was the signing of a joint venture agreement to purchase \$5 million worth of major amusement rides from the owners of the rides once used at a former

amusement park in Ohio. The rides purchased include an eight-story high giant ferris wheel, a large sky ride with 80-ft. high supporting towers, a Super Roundup ride, a portable bumper car building with bumper cars, a flying scotter, an aerial rocket ride, a Tilt-a-Whirl, a Scrambler, a Rotor, and a wide variety of children's rides and other amusement park rides and equipment.

The next step being taken by Prairie Dell Lake Amusement Park Inc. is the organization of a joint venture of Texans to build the largest wood roller coaster in the world.

"Seven million dollars of capital is required to construct such a coaster," noted Fry. "To qualify as America's biggest coaster, the Prairie Dell Lake coaster will have to have a first-thrill train drop of 180 feet and enough track length to give a four-minute ride of screams and thrills."

Prairie Dell Lake Amusement Park will open on a limited basis sometime in middle or late summer.







COLLEGE STATION --When the smoke cleared from a recent study comparing feedlot and show steers at Texas A&M University, only minor differences were apparent.

Results of the study were aired at a Steer Production and Evaluation Symposium at Texas A&M May 20-21.

The study compared 46 steers that were put on a performance test last October in the same location and fed the same ration. The only difference was that some were halterbroken and handled as show steers while others were treated as feedlot

Objectives of the study were to evaluate the performance of both feedlot and show steers and to relate this performance to the endproduct of the beef cattle industry-the practical production of beef. The symposium featured these steers as live animals, frozen

animals and carcasses along with comments and opinions from a host of experts representing all phases of the cattle business.

Both groups of steers in the study compared favorably in growth and average daily gain during the 168-day feeding period. The show managed steers had a faster total growth rate-5.25 inches (measured at the hip) compared to 4.69 inches-while the feedlot steers averaged 2.25 pounds of gain a day compared to 2.19 for the show steers.

From a carcass standpoint the steers again compared favorably. However, several of the steers that were placed lower by judges during a live evaluation actually graded better from a carcass standpoint than the higher placed steers.



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

State Production Above 900 Million Barrel Figure

Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association reports that an 11th consecutive year of production at the maximum effective recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' oil fields kept 1982 petroleum production in the state above the 900-million barrel figure.

Avery Rush, Jr., chairman of the Dallas-based Association, says that figures compiled by its staff show the total petroluem output of

901,910,343 barrels included 871,780,379 barrels of crude oil and 30,129,964 barrels of condensate from wells in 214 of Texas' 254 counties.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 2,487,169 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 6,814 barrels per day. Production in 1982 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 132,594,726 bar-

Crude oil and condensate production last year was 26.8-million barrels below the 1981 figure, a drop of 2.9-percent. This compares with a 3.3-percent drop in 1981 production from the year previous, Rush said.

Also in a positive vein, 1982 production pushed the state's cumulative production total since 1866 to more than 47.5-billion barrels. However, for the 10th consecutive year, crude oil and condensate production in the nation's No. 1 energyproducing state was down after peaking at nearly 1.3-billion barrels in 1972.


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

ding from the transplant. In the ensuing weeks, my own interest in the case has gven me a deep awareness of many of the important issues we now face in regard to transplants, including the questions of the cost of such medical care and how a donor is located.

Amidst the excitement of the medical miracles brought about by today's organ transplants, we often overlook the serious moral and ethical quesitons involved; questions being confronted on several fronts at

Ashley's case illustrates several of these important issues. Financial problems have now been resolved and Ashley's doctors at the University of Minnesota Hospital have said her condition is as good as it is going to get, before she enters a period of steady decline. Only a donor liver is needed.

At the request of her family. I worked to try to attract national media attention to Ashley's need; attention that had proved successful for other transplant patients.

The father of one of those patients-Jamie Fiske-made an appeal for Ashley at a recent high level conference on transplants attended by a wide array of medical professionals across the country. Members of my staff questioned the Surgeon General of the United States at that conference, asking what hope could be held out for those patients in immediate need, such as Ashley.

Those efforts have triggered other questions: What of that child whose Congressman chooses not to speak up in his or her behalf? Is their need lost in the midst of publicity that only a few such cases receive? How can you justify such efforts for one child, when there are many, many others also waiting for

Even as I recognize the validity of those questions, my answer is a simple one: At some point in almost every parent's life, a nagging quesiton presents itself, usually in the dark of night. If there were a fire and I knew I could save only one of my children, which child

would I save? The answer to that age-old question is, "You would save the first child you could.'

So, in Ashley's case, the answer is the same. How can any member of our society say, "No, if I can't help them all, I won't help even one."


Ultimately, as individual

transplant cases receive widespread attention, public awareness of the overall need is achieved. It is through that public awareness - that emotional impact that one child's fight for life can have - that we will all move closer to the point where we, as parents, as doctors and emergency room personnel will be able to break through the grief of a death of a child to be able to give the gift of life to another, unknown child.

Certainly the media has a role to play in this massive public awareness campaign, but you and I as individuals have an equal role. We begin by talking with family members; by signing a donor card and making our family, friends and physician aware of that decision; by asking our service club or church group to sponsor discussions to help increase

awareness. In short, it is our responsibility to care and then go beyond talking about

an issue such as this to acting upon that issue in the best manner possible.
