





Eastland County cattlemen who have not treated their cattle for grubs should do so between now and September 1.

Grub control can be achieved with a variety of systemic treatments which includes sprays, dips, pourons, spot-ons and feed mixes. However, insecticide impregnated ear tags being used for biting fly control do not control cattle grubs.

During late fall and winter, grubs appear on the backs of livestock. It's too late to begin control measures then since most of the damage has already been done.

The cattle grub is the laran animal. The eggs, glued to hairs, hatch within a few days, and larvae (worms) enter the skin at hair follicles. The immature stages then migrate through the animal's body for six to eight months and reappear in the animal's back in the fall and winter, forming knot-like marbles or cysts.

Cattle grub losses are displayed in a variety of ways. Besides damaging meat and hides by their feeding activity, they lower beef cattle gains and reduce milk production throughout the year. Profit losses are estimated to cost Texas cattle producers \$8-10 million each year.



Zoning Use Regulations And Development Standards

Zoning is a means to control the use and development of land for the benefits of the citizens in a community. Ideally, these controls on real estate lead to compatible land uses within the community.

Generally, each municipality is divided into districts based on land use. The three principal districts in an urban area are residential, commercial and industrial.

Each of these types of districts can be subdivided into additional, more restrictive districts. For example, the city of Dallas has 32 types of zoning districts, the city of Lufkin has 12 and the city of Mineola has five.

The larger the municipality, the more numerous the types of zoning districts.

The uses of real estate are limited to those defined by the zoning ordiance. Most zoning ordinances list the permitted uses in each district. If you want to know more about zoning in your city, call your city planning offices.


Over a three-year period ending in 1980, households in the U.S. cut energy use by 17 percent. This production reflects moves to increase insulation, maintain more modest temperatures in the home and convert to alternative types of energy.

public information urging conservation, undoubtedly the primary impetus was economic. Fuel costs were rapidly increasing, and

federal tax credit was created as an incentive for investment in conservation improvements.

Energy costs rose so rapidly that the average household actually paid higher bills in 1980 than in 1978, despite the reduced use. Without conservation, however, the bills would have been higher.



Have I told you of Kevin Metford (not his real name, of course) who was our Medical Officer at Jebel Dhanna? Jebel Dhanna was that faraway place with a strange-sounding name on the desert coast of Abu Dhabi near the Qatar border. Another "poineer outpost project", it had to be completely self-sufficient. And that meant that, with 37 "Staff Types" and almost 300 Indian, Pakistani and Arab craftsmen and coolies, medical facilities had to be provided. Dr. Metford, his Indian male nurse and their two-bed "dispensary" provided those facilities.

Our British partner had recruited Dr. Metford, straight out of school and internship. And he was indeed something else. Born and brought up in the Limehouse Section of London, he had never been off the tight little island kingdom before. Indeed, he'd hardly ventured outside the limits of the City of London. He'd never learned to drive an automobile!
