

# Fireworks Caused 23 Texans To Lose Eyesight

Fireworks and the Fourth are a patriotic combination. Yet too often the combination misfires and results in the tragic stories that can be found in the Independence Day files of the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness.

"These stories are of youngsters -- and their parents -- who learned too late "Don't play with fireworks; they're not toys," says John L. Mann, M.D., an ophthalmologist who is chairman of the Society's State Medical Advisory Committee.

"Fireworks belong at licensed public displays,"

AUSTIN--The Texas
Department of Public Safety

as 49 persons could die in
traffic accidents across the
state during the Fourth of
July holiday period.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said the estimate is based on the anticipated volume of traffic and the previous holiday deaths.

"Independence Day can bring more motorists to our streets and highways compared to a regular weekend. We are estimating fewer deaths than we had during the Fourth of July holiday last year because thus far this year we have experienced a decline in traffic fatalities," Adams said.

Last year, 55 fatalities were recorded during the 78-hour period, but subsequent deaths from serious injuries brought the final count to 64 for the three-day holiday.

Adams said if drivers would stay sober, slow down and use seat belts, their chances for survival would increase.

"Drivers who speed or are intoxicated pose the greatest threat to law abiding motorists," Adams said. "Some people will insist upon drinking excessively and attempting to drive during this period. We will do our best to remove these individuals from the roads," he said. "If a person drinks, this is his personal business, but if he drives drunk — that's police business."

Adams encouraged motorists who observe drunken drivers to report them to the nearest police agency or Highway Patrol.

said Dr. Mann. "There, their colorful patriotic skybursts can be enjoyed without endangering life or property. But when private individuals start playing with fireworks, trouble and tragedy are inevitable."

As proof Dr. Mann cited a survey Prevent Blindness conducted a year ago among Texas ophthalmologists that indicated that 23 Texans were blinded or lost most of their sight on July 4th because of fireworks. An additional 49 people suffered eye injuries ranging from second degree burns to corneal lacerations. He added that the Consumer Product Safety Commission also reported last year that, nationwide, over 11,000 were treated in hospital emergency rooms for fireworks-caused injuries; 1,600 of these were to the eyes.

"What these figures show is that there is no such thing as a safe fire-cracker," Dr. Mann emphasized. "Even seemingly harmless sparklers sizzle at 1500° F and can give a burn that will quickly take the sparkle out of the eyes of any youngster who has been playing with one."

"But the most dangerous projectiles are bottlerockets. Bottlerockets caused almost all the cases of blindness reported in the Texas survey and over half of the other injuries."

"The majority of injuries were to teen-aged males who seem prone to 'horse play' when they get a hazardous projectile such as a bottle rocket in their hands," he said. As examples, he told of two boys who jokingly 'waged war' with lighted bottlerockets and of two others who competed with each other to create the biggest bottlerocket blast. In each instance this "Fourth of July fun" resulted in a boy blinded and cosmetically disfigured.

To prevent such tragedies, Dr. Mann said that the Society would like to see fireworks strictly controlled throughout the state and is disappointed that all of the bills introduced recently in Austin to strengthen existing laws have apparently died in legislative committees.

"Preventing fireworks injuries is better than trying to cure them. Even with all the miracles of modern medicine, it is not always possible to save the sight of a child who bends over a firecracker, only to have it explode in his face. That is why Prevent Blindness urges all parents to insist that family fireworks be limited to public displays, and no exceptions permitted."

The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness is an affiliate of the National Society to Prevent Blindness, now celebrating its 75th year of preventing blindness through programs, education and research.

## **Hightower Backs Bill Boosting Farm Wineries**

AUSTIN--The Texas wine industry is "on the brink of bringing in a gusher," Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower told a Captiol news conference Thursday. "Basically, all we need to do is turn it loose and get out of the wav.

To "turn it loose," Senators Lloyd Doggett (D-Austin), Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) and Bill Sims (D-San Angelo) and Rep. Bill Coody (D-Weatherford) are proposing a "Texas Farm Winery Act" to provide grape growers a greater ability to sell directly to consumers and to promote their products. Among other items, the bill would allow wineries to (1) sell directly to retait stores and restaurants. (2) to provide wine at nos charge for wine tastings or judgings. The bill would also ease restrictions on the type of carriers authorized to transport grower-produced

"I have no doubt that Texas--in the not-too-distant future--will be a major wineproducing state," Hightower said. "In 1975, there was only one commercial winery in Texas; today, there are 13, and it's predicted that we'll triple that number in just four years if we give the wineries half a chance. Dozens of excellent wine grape varieties are ideally suited to the soil and climates in various parts of our state, and at a time when our farmers can't make a profit growing the more traditional crops, grape growing and winemaking are increasingly-attractive alter-

"A good-sized vineyard requires relatively little land and water." Hightower explained, "and we can produce wines to compete with the best that California has to offer. The market is there, and this bill will help open it up a little so our grape growers can get in there and compete on a more equal

"The Texas Farm Winery Act will give our Texas producers a shot at keeping a bigger portion of the marketing dollar, make Texas wines available to consumers at a lower price, increase sales and give a boost to this

burgeoning industry." Doggett, senate co-sponsor of the bill, said development

of a viable Texas wine industry would bolster both agriculture and tourism in

"We hear a great deal of talk about Texas being the 'Third Coast,' comparing say, our movie-making and entertainment industry to those in California and New York. We can be the Third Coast in the wine industry, as well, and compete significantly with other sections of the country. This new industry can be a great boon to Texas, particularly to our rural areas where our farmers and small towns have been suffering so badly from the depressed farm economy," Doggett said.

"And speaking of California, many people are familiar with going to Northern California on wine-tasting tours from vineyard to vineyard, and we could have the same thing right here in Texas if we get this industry moving along. The advantage of that would be, again, not only to agriculture and to the farm areas, but it would add to a tourist industry that is ncreasingly important to the



"That one item would go a long way toward helping to overcome the natural skepticism of many people who haven't yet tasted any of the surprisingly good Texas wines already being produced by our grape growers," Hightower said. "Right now, we can tell a wine fancier. 'Try it, you'll like it, but the law says we can't give him a free sample, so a lot of people never get around to tasting our Texas wines. Synthetic Pyrethroids Help **Horse Owners Control Flies** COLLEGE STATION --Horse owners have a relatively new weapon available to them in the constant battle against house

Synthetic pyrethroids do a good job in controlling house flies in barns when used in conjunction with a total management system, Dr. Cliff Hoelscher told some 400 participants at a recent Horse Short Course at Texas A&M University.

"Synthetic pyrethroids offer considerable potential in pest control because they have a low level of toxicity and can be used in low volume and low concentration," Hoelscher, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, pointed out. "The key thing is that they be used correctly so that insects won't develop resistance to them. This means following ticide and using management strategies to keep fly populations to a minimum."

Two chemicals used in synthetic pyrethroids for fly control are fenvalerate and premethrin. A number of commercial products are on the market that contain these insecticides, Hoelscher noted.

"Although pyrethroids are relatively expensive, they are effective and are used at low rates, so a little goes a long way," said the entomologist.

Hoelscher advocated an automatic spraying or fogging system for effective control of adult house flies in a horse barn. Such a system would cost about \$1,000 to install, depending on the size of the horse operation, and would cost about \$600 a year to operate--cost of the pyrethroid insecticide.

"Such a system would effectively control all house flies and other flying pests in the barn," Hoelscher said. "Of course, house fly control must be a constant practice, so it's also important to use residual or space sprays to control incoming flies."

In addition to using residual or space sprays, the entomologist emphasized the importance of good sanitation in the barn area, use of physical barriers such as screens to keep flies out,

and bait stations where flies can be killed with various types of bait forumlations.

Hoelscher also told short course participants that the future looks good for continued improvements in insecticides, including insect growth regulators which are just coming on the market. The annual Horse Short

Course was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas A&M's Department of Animal Science.

Sun Exploration and Production Company of Eastland, with the approval of the Eastland County Commissioner's Court, took the time to replace an old county bridge over Colony Creek on County Road 454 between Morton Valley and Ranger and did it in quite an unusual

After ripping the old bridge out, Sun took two railroad chemical cars, laid them in the creek and filled in between and over the old cars with base material creating a new bridge that does not have a weight limit.

According to Sun Oil the new bridge is more valuable to them, for transporting purposes, then the old bridge which had a weight limit and was in need of many repairs.

The idea was first brought up to the comissioner's court on April 25 but final approval did not come until June 2.

Sun first contacted the North American Car Corporation in Roscoe, Texas for the purchase of two railroad chemical cars.

The cars were sent to BC Construction of Eastland and Ranger to have each end of each car cut out and to have each car cleaned and stripped of the chemicals they once carried.



Sun Oil representative Houston Satterwhite said, "Sun's concern for the wildlife and the environment went into the cleaning of the cars. Sun Oil didn't want any chemicals from the cars washing into the creek."

Once the chemical cars were cleaned and cut open the county assisted Sun Oil in tearing out the old bridge and hauling off the junk and debris that had became entangled at the base of the

A bulldozer then went to

work shaping the base of the creek for the cars. The cars were then sent to the work site and set in place.

Trucks then dumped rocks in between the cars and on each side to build the road up to the top of the cars. Sun Oil then rip-rapped around the sides to control against erosion and flooding. The top of road was then filled with a medium size rock and finished off with a base material giving Eastland County and Sun Oil a new bridge and one that does not have a weight

Some of the metal pipes and rails were kept from the old wooden bridge and used as orange painted guard rails on the new bridge.

The actual construction on the project started on Monday, June 13 and was finished on Wednesday, June 15, resulting in a three day pro-

The cars used in the bridge measure eight feet in diameter and 30 feet long and have a three-quarter

inch thichness of steel.

Jim Brandon, who is the senior construction supervisor for Sun's Central Texas Division was in charge of the project and Jill Johnson was the production foreman.

Houston Satterwhite commenting on the finished bridge stated, "The building of the bridge was of best interest to the citizens of the area that use the road and to Sun Oil as well."

This project by Sun Oil is just one example of how oil companies, environment, and man can work together to benefit the community and its companies which are important to its survival.



gram observed that the increase in price sounds big when you consider it on an annual basis.

Councilman Linton Batteas didn't believe many lights could be eliminated and he wasn't for turning them off.

The same view was expressed by Councilman Ivan Webb, who doubted if many could be cut off. He suggested upgrading some.

City Manager Moore noted that the expiring WTU contract has been in effect for 10 years and that the new contract, in effect, updates rates that have not changed in the decade. He added that WTU is applying for a increase of some 12 per cent in other electric rates and that the PUC will be considering it soon. "We have no voice in the matter," he said.

Manager Jack Kennedy of WTU's Cisco Office, answering a question, said his company has raised all but the street lighting rates substantially in the past five years. He said the street lighting contract was standard for all cities in WTU's territory and that many cities are already paying the new rates.

Councilman Ingram made a motion that the new contract be approved. The motion was seconded by Councilman Webb. They voted

"yes" and Councilmen Bobby Rains, Brad Kimbrough and Linton Batteas voted "no." Mayor Ritchie abstained, as he usually does, voting only when there is a

Mr. Kimbrough said he voted "no" because he doesn't think the city can continue to absorb increases

in utility rates. "The only

way to get a 'fair shake' is

for the Public Utility Com-

mission to be elected by the

voters, not appointed by the governor, and then they would think before acting."

Mr. Kennedy said the company's new rate structure would become effective July 1 with or without a contract.

Officials indicated that the contract would be considered again at a future meeting. Without a contract, it was noted, rates could be changed more often than every five years.

As high interest rates continue, seller financing may be an attractive alternative to those who want to sell their homes.

If you are considering financing the sale of your home, here are some hints.

A short-term loan with a competitive interest rate should provide you with a marketable financial instrument. But make sure the interest rate charged complies with existing usury limits.

To provide adequate protection in the event of foreclosure, require at least a 20 percent down payment. This should reduce the risk the property cannot be sold for enough to cover your loan. Include and enforce a late charge in your loan documents

Check your buyer's credit. A credit report usually is inexpensive and simple to obtain. Finally, make certain you consult an attorney prior to signing any loan agreement.

#### REAPPRAISAL HAS EF-FECTS ON TAXES

Many taxpayers do not realize the implications of a general reappraisal for tax purposes. In some cases, reappraisal may mean a higher property tax payment. In other cases, it can actually produce a lower tax

The amount of your property tax assessment depends upon the appraised value of your property and the tax rate. The appraised value multiplied by the tax rate determines the amount of the tax you owe. The higher the rate, the higher the tax for a given appraised When a general reap-

praisal occurs, most taxing jurisdictions reduce the tax rate to help offset gains in value. It is possible that tax rate reductions can exceed an increase in appraised value, resulting in a lower tax assessment. But homeowners seldom experience such results.

They have no assurance. however, of being able to do so, and if they cannot sell or refinance, they face losing the property through foreclosure.

Balloon payment loans were prevalent in the early 1900s but many property owners were financially ruined when their loans came due in the 1930s.

So, before you commit yourself to a purchase involving a balloon payment loan, be sure you can handle the final payment-even if the due date is five or 10 years away.

by a nonresident alien. In general, land within the boundaries of a city or town cannot qualify. Land within such boundaries can qualify,

however, if the city or town does not provide services or if the land has a history of continuous agricultural use for the preceding five years.

#### TEXAS BUSTIN' AT ITS SUN BELT

Figures from the nation's new census indicate why the housing market in Texas is stronger than in many parts of the country. Population in the Sun Belt is booming.

The western region added 8.3 million people and the southern region added 12.5 million. Thus, the Sun Belt states accounted for 90 percent of the nation's total population increase in the

By comparison, the Northwest grew by only 75,000 between 1970 and 1980, while the north central region

gained 2.2 million. As a result of these wide disparities in population growth, the South and West now have more people than the North for the first time in the nation's history.

The need to provide shelter for all these people makes for a vigorous housing demand.

## Tx. Leads In Jail Overcrowding

One of the reasons that Texas has a problem with overcrowded jails is that this state puts more of its citizens per capita in prison than any other state in the nation, according to the director of the social work program at Texas Christian University.

"We have gone overboard on the idea that the response to crime is to lock people up, and it's not a good response," said Art Berliner.

The United States imprisons a greater percent of its population than any other country, except the Union of South Africa and the Soviet Union, he said, both of which are considered repressive regimes.

"If your idea is to take punitive measures against offenders you might say,

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'Well, it's not overcrowded; they don't deserve any better.' On the other hand, if you see prisons as a device for helping people straighten themselves out and become productive members of society, you might take a different point of view." Berliner continued.

The sociologist said that 97 percent of all people who go to prison leave and return to civilian life. "Since 97 percent of them are going to come back, we really ought to do something to prepare them to take a law-abiding, productive place in society.

"I would say that prisons at least should have very strong educational and vocational programs, and that we should make every effort to see to it that when a man or woman leaves prison he or she is literate and has a job skill," he noted.

While prisons do have some rehabilitation programs, they are most often underfunded, he said.

Another reason for overcrowded jails is that many of the inmates don't need to be there. It is unnecessary to imprison perpetrators of non-violent offenses, Berliner said.

"The average citizen thinks the response to crime has to be more prisons. I think we need to think of diversionary arrangements such as probation, fines, restitution, community service and halfway houses,"

Not only would that be more productive for the offender but it would also save money for the taxpayer. It costs from \$20 to \$50 a day to keep a man in prison, but only \$2 to \$3 a day to keep him

under surveillance in the community.

## **Home Economist Reports Consumers Should Save Energy**

COLLEGE STATION-AS the summer heats up, utility bills start inching toward their peak. Now is the time for consumers to focus on energy thriftiness to save money on those bills, says Bonnie Piernot, a home economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Although the "energy crisis" is behind us, says Piernot, residential energy use will not be getting any cheaper.

The Data Resource Energy Forecasting Service Inc., estimates that residential electric rates will rise an average of seven percent in the next year.

Careful use and purchase of household appliances can help consumers cope with increases

According to Piernot, a family resource management specialist, work habits of the cook have a major influence on the energy use for food preparation. Research shows that energy usage varies by as much as 50 percent among people doing identical meal preparation tasks with the same kitchen

Heat settings also affect

energy consumption on an electric range. For example, you can bring a pot of potatoes to a quick boil on a 6 inch unit at the high setting. Once boiling has begun, the cooking temperature could be maintained at a low setting for about 20 minutes. But if medium-low heat is used instead, 100 percent more energy will be used than is actually needed.

Even the use of a utensil with a fitted cover when cooking with water is an energy-saver. The lid prevents the loss of heat from the pan by evaporation. Six times more energy is required to change water to steam than to bring it to a

Consumers can also avoid heavy usage of high wattage electric equipment such as dishwashers and washing machines at times of the day when the demand for power is highest, since utility companies may charge more for power during these peak

So use of appliances at night when air conditioning use is reduced can produce energy savings.

Many consumers believe that replacing their old appliances with more energyefficient appliances will reduce utility bills. "Although their direct utility

costs may go down, the purchase itself may not be especially cost-effective," states Piernot.

There is little point in buying a new cooking appliance simply because it promises energy thriftiness, she says, since the purchase price might not be worked off for years. For example, it would take 131/2 years to earn back the cost of a \$500 microwave oven that reduces your electric bill by a maximum of \$27 annually.

Unless consumers must replace old equipment that is in poor condition, they would be better off concentrating on the efficient use of what they presently own, suggests Piernot.

## **Hunter Education** Course Scheduled

A complete course in hunter education has been scheduled for 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. on July 17 and July 24 in Eastland, according to Bob Mueller and Ken Underhill, hunter safety instructors.

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instructions in rifle, shotgun and bowhunting safety, outdoor ethics, conservation, survival, game identification and wilderness first aid," said Mueller.

Those students successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter safety card from the Texas Parks

and Wildlife Department. The course fee is \$1.00 per student to cover registration and materials.

More than 80,000 Texans have already been certified as safe hunters. Even though this course is not mandatory to hunt in Texas, it is mandatory in 29 states before a hunting license can be pur-

#### Julia Worthy

How the Declaration of Independence ever got written is one of the minor wonders of the modern world.

American affairs were a long time boiling down to the point of Ben Franklin's assertion that, "We'll all hang separetely if we don't hang together.'

The American considered typically representative of his 2,500,000 fellows in 1763 was the farmer. Extreme poverty was rare in a country where the rewards of thrift, hard work and diligence were visible in well-stocked farms and all the home comforts one could wish.

The lines of demarcation between even the farmers were early drawn along the Atlantic seaboard. Nationality and religion were of as much importance as economics and politics were to the minds behind the hands getting warmed up to tug the Liberty Bell.

Your idea of the American Revolution may coincide with the one I had for years, but I hope you were smarter than I. In case you weren't, I'll explain.

I read a lot of poetry in my youth, and the "embattled farmers" that "fired the shot heard "round the world" is the image of the Revolution that stuck with me. As a matter of fact, it is uncertain whether one of the embattled farmers fired first or if it might have been a redcoat.

The "midnight ride of Paul Revere" probably was more representative of the actual instigators of the revolt than

There was far less equality in the towns than in the rural sections. Unrest and revolutionary ideas generated from the towns where discontented urban workers welcomed democratic ideas, thought about them, wrote about them, and eventually

did something about them. The rural dwellers expended most of their energies in making a living and conquering the wilderness. They should have thought a little more about minding the store when the "store" concerned the laws by which they were governed.

The colonial assemblies did make steady progress in extending their own authority and reducing that of the Crown. However, the common man's suffrage was losing out to property qualifications.

Merchants and planters had the wealth and the representation in the assemblies. They advocated home rule in the name of popular liberty, but the idea was to transfer the powers of the Crown to themselves, not to make the people sovereign.

Popular leaders had to prevail against the British government and the Colonial oligarchy in colonies that seemed more enthusiastic about a fight among themselves than against the

How such different peoples as the Scotch -Irish, French Hugenots, and Anglo-Saxons with all their different customs-oh, don't forget the Quakers-how they ever got a delegation to Philadelphia

Declaration

to make a formal declaration of independence ranks close to a miracle, not to mention a wonder.

We might not be celebrating the "glorious Fourth" at all if Thomas Jefferson had not been able and willing to draft the formal Declaration of Independence.

The delegates were getting restless. It is reported that the horseflies were biting, and it was hot. The delegates had to get back to tending to their own businesses instead of the nation's. Nominally, there was a committee; actually, Jefferson burned the midnight oil.

Jefferson's reduction of ideas to paper melded and welded the doctors and lawyers, farmers and merchants, sailmakers and glassblowers, barbers and fiddlers, drovers and draymen into the force that has been moving these United States ever since.

Whether you pop a firecracker, wave a flag or go fishing this Fourth of July, give a thought to the freedom you have to choose what you'll do.

The Rev. John A. Holmes, Vicar of the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Eastland, reports that the official seal of the Ft. Worth Diocese is now complete.

The territory of this historic Diocese reaches from Tarrant County on the east through Eastland County on the west; from the Oklahoma line on the north

#### **Traffic Deaths**

Captain G. J. Matthews, Highway Patrol Commander of the Abilene District of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Excessive speed and Driving While intoxicated will prove to be highway killers dueing this July 4th holiday weekend." "Those two violations of the traffic law will in all probability, account for more than one half of the estimated 49 traffic deaths during this holiday weekend," Captain Matthews said.

Last year, during the July 4th weekend, 64 traffic deaths were tabulated by the

Texas Department of Public Safety. The DPS will again be conducting "Operation Motorcide" during this weekend. "Operation Mororcide" is a time when all fatal traffic accidents are reported to the DPS headquarters in Austin so they can be tabulated and information can be released to the new media. This is done to try to focus public attention on the dangers of driving during peak holiday periods, hoping to hold death toll as low as possible, Matthews added. He stated, "We have to have voluntary compliance of the traffic laws, by the majority of the motoring public in order to be successful in reducing acthrough Brownwood, Dublin and Stephenville. The Holy Trinity Church serves the Eastland County area.

Each Diocese of the Anglican Communion has an official seal which reflects something o the nature of the life of the Diocese.

"In this new seal our heritage and committment to our Lord's mission are artistically set forth," states the Rt. Rev'd. A. Donald Davies, Bishop of Ft. Worth. He explains the meaning of each symbol.

"FT. WORTH the See City, is indicated by the fortress battlements which divide the Shield through the center horizontally.

"THE LONGHORN STEER, a symbol of a major industry within the Diocese, is also a reminder of the frontier spirit and the venturesome nature of the people of god in this part of the country

of God's nourishment of the created order, flow beneath the steer. The Trinity and Brazos rivers are our links with other Dioceses and peoples in Texas.

THE STAR has a two fold meaning. In Christendom the five pointed Star symbolizes Christ and it also stands for the Lone Star State of Texas.

"THE GRIFFIN, symbol of guardianship of the Faithful, is in the upper left corner. The Griffin, half lion and half eagle, is an ancient symbol used by the Celtic people of Great Britian.

"THE KEYS OF ST. PETER depict the authority of the Apostolic ministry bestowed upon the Church by our Lord.

"THE BISHOP'S STAFF, in black and silver, resembles the crozier used by the Bishop.

"THE BANNER carries a motto: LOS BRAZOS DE DIOS. or 'The Arms Of God'. Written in Spanish to reflect the Hispanic culture in Texas, the motto is a reminder of our Servanthood. While Christians are upheld and supported by 'the arms of God', Christians are cognizant that by His Grace we are to be 'the arms of God' in the Lord's work and mission in today's world."




