

The third annual membership drive for Cisco's and Eastland's ambulance sevice is currently underway, says owner Tom Patterson, with July 31 being the last day to join for the year 1963-84.

The membership fee is only \$39 per person or for a family with children under 19 years of age living at home. The membership fee is \$3 larger this year, but the increase is less than one cent per day. Mr. Patterson stated, "The increase had to be implemented due to the fact insurance companies

Members of the service are not financially obilgated for the difference of what a third party does not pay. Because of this fact, Medicare has rated the Patterson Ambulance Service very high.

"The most important fact for the citizens of Cisco and Eastland to realize, is the ambulance service is a community endeavor and not necessarily a personal one," related Mr. Patterson. He went on to say, "I would like to continue with the membership being supported by the citizens of Eastland and Cisco as it has in the past. Without the continued support we will no longer be able to provide an

ambulance service to these communities."

At present 400 members for both cities have joined the service, but it is far short of the 1,600 needed, with the deadline drawing near. Mr. Patterson is quick to say non-members will be expected to pay cash for services rendered by the ambulance. This had to be implemented this year due to the outstanding debts the service has incurred.

New residents of the communities need to be aware of the fact that Patterson Ambulance is the only ambulance service available in either city.

Memberships are valid 24 hours after being purchased and remain valid through July 31, 1984. With a membership a person has ambulance service to any hospital(for admittance only) within a 60 mile radius of Eastland. This is available as many times as necessary with no further financial obligation to the patient or guardians. All third party assignments will be accepted. Reduced rates are also available to members for clinical or medical facilities requiring an ambulance locally or out of

"If I could receive the same support every year as I did in 1982-83 then I will never raise the membership fee above \$39", stated Mr. Patterson. He went on to say, "The more memberships we can obtain, the more we can reduce the fee. The people set their own price." He is quick to praise the people who have sup-

ported the ambulance ser-

vice with their memberships, especially the ones who continue to join and have not used the service as yet.

Mr. Patterson also encourages people to buy a membership for a neighbor or loved one. "This is a gift that could save their life," he says. The people of Cisco and

Eastland need to band together for their communities, before it is to late, to insure that a very much needed service will be provided.

NOTICE TO WATER CUSTOMERS OF HIGH TURBIDITY

## Rain Becomes Crucial To 1983 County Peanut Crops

By Gary Slade Staff Writer

KOKOMO-"Rainfall in the next 40-60 days will determine what kind of crop the peanut farmers will have in Eastland County." said DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent.

That statement may be very true as much of the soil around the peanut crops has started to dry up from the lack of rainfall this summer. Last year (1982) was a wetter year during the three summer months then what this summer has shown so

In June of 1982 6.54 inches of rain fell on Eastland County crops, June of 1983 had under half that amount with

3.07 inches of rain. July was a dry month in 1982 with less than one full inch (.91) of rain falling. July 1983 has been a worst disaster so far with only .04

of an inch of rain falling. August 1982 recorded .44 of an inch, August 1983 does not

look promising. So what happens if the farmers do not get the necessary rain? The county economy could stand to lose up to 10 million dollars in lost revenue. One county official estimated that a good peanut crop in Eastland County is worth about \$10 million dollars to the county.

That money is what farmers use to buy new cars, trucks, equipment and general goods with in the county. If no rain falls, so does the spending in the county

Not all hope is lost since many farmers have put in automatic irrigation systems for backup in dry weather.

One such farmer is Albert Hendricks, of Kokomo. Although he planted his crop late because of the late cold spells he said he plans to start irrigating the week of July 25 if he doesn't get any

His peanut vines are up, a nice green color, and are starting to bloom. That bloom is when the moisture is needed.

After the bloom is pollinated a peg is formed and grows into the ground. That peg must grow into the ground and not on top of it or it will die. Once the peg is in the ground, water is needed

to help the peg form a pod

from which the peanut emerges. That time frame is when

rain is needed the most. But even if rain falls on the vines there is always another problem and that is disease. Most common is Eastland

County is Leafspot. This disease occurs when there is moisture on the leaves and the weather is warm either, from rain or irrigation. It forms a black dot on the leaf of the vine and then turns the leaf or leaves yellow causing them to fall off and killing the vine.

Fungicides are used to help control the disease either after the needed rain or during irrigation if rain does not fall. Benlate 2 and Bravo are the two most common used fungicides being used in Eastland County.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service reminds farmers that peanut diseases can be controlled by using the proper combination of cultural and chemical methods. Growers are encouraged to accurately diagnose the disease problems occuring on their farm and utilize those practices needed to get positive economic returns. As far as the present

status of the peanuts Gordan said, "In general the crops are in real good condition. Most were late planted due to the prolonged cold soil temperature, but the stands are real good and we're not

> Gordan went on to say, "We are entering that important water stage where our requirement for water will go up every day. Those that can irrigate will be doing that but those that are on dry-land will be needing some moisture by August 1."

seeing any major diseases."

Irrigation in the county has been designed to be a supplemental water form, but once the water supplies get low then those farmers will also be in need of rain.

"At the stage we are in right now our crops could go either way. At this point it looks good, very good but only the next 40-60 days will tell for sure." Gordan said.

So for now, all Eastland County farmers can do is keep looking in the sky and hoping that sometime soon that much needed rain will come before the Texas heat and wind has taken its toll.

#### Recovery team hunts WWII planes buried on frigid Greenland ice cap

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. -Destroying top secret equipment was the mission of the last salvage expedition to the Greenland site where eight U.S. Army Air Corps planes crashed during

More than 40 years later, the Winston Recovery Team's goal is to locate and preserve the six P-38F Lightnings and two B-17 Bombers that crashed while attempting to open an air route for supplies and P-38s to Europe from America.

The unsuccessful effort resulted in the largest crash landing of the Army Air Corps during World War II. All 25 men in the planes survived and were rescued after 10 days on the ice cap. The aircraft, however, had to be

abandoned. "The planes crashed in 1942, and since they've become buried under 40 feet of snow, we hope to find them preserved and in perfect condition," said Russell Rajani, leader of the Winston Recovery Team, a group of 15 adventurers sponsored by Winston cigarettes. "The main equipment we do know is missing from the planes, however, is the Norden bombsights.

Considered one of the most important pieces of equipment used in World War II, the Norden bombsight enabled gunners to target a half-ton bomb on an area as small as a pickle barrel from an altitude of 10,000 feet. The two B-17s that crashed in

Greenland carried the bombsight, which was invented by a machinist, Carl L. Norden. To keep the valuable device out of enemy hands, the sights were destroyed on a subsequent mission to the abandoned planes. Today, finding and preserving

the planes are the objectives of the Winston Recovery Team, which began its salvage expedition in June 1983.

"The first stage will be locating the planes under the snow by radar scan," Rajani said before departing for the desolate Greenland ice cap. "After we have each plane pinpointed, we will dig down to one plane and test its structural integrity.

"Based on those results, we will start excavation procedures to dig out the planes and move them to the shore where they will be put aboard a ship and transported to the United States."

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






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### Homemaking Hints County Extension Agent

Janet Thomas

I've had many telephone calls from homemakers this summer inquiring why their jars of produce don't seal during processing. Today, I'm devoting my column on some of the reasons jars don't seal and some solutions to the problem.

-Small particles of food left on rim of jar.

Remedy: Wipe off top of jar with clean damp cloth before placing lid on jar.

-Rings screwed on "too tight" or "too loose.

Remedy: Rings which are screwed too tightly on the jar do not allow space for venting (escape of air from the jar). This makes pressure build up in the jar, causing the lid-and sometimes even

the top of the ring-to buckle. Rings not screwed on tightly enough will not seal, because the compound is not pressed firmly enough against the top of the jar. It is also important to follow manufacturer's directions in softening the sealing compound before you place the lid on the jar. Each brand of lid is prepared differently for canning.

-Sealing compound or lid doesn't seal.

Remedy: Lids may be old. Usually they last 5 years. Some may have a year date on them, such as 1-80, to indicate the lid was manufactured in the first quarter of 1980 and should be used before the end of the first quarter of 1985. It's a good idea to mark date of purchase on the box of lids.

-Bent or rusty rings: Remedy: Bent or rusty rings can cause the lids not to seal properly. Always remove rings when jars have cooled thoroughly and seals

are tested. Rings are necessary for processing, but are not needed after the seal is made. Rings left on can rust and become difficult to remove so store them in a dry place in a container that prevents them from being bent out of

Examine rings before the start of each canning season and discard rusty or bent ones. Never use lids more than once, because they are designed for a one-time seal.

Cucumbers are very abundant in some gardens. This week I am featuring a very easy and quick pickle recipe for you busy ladies.

EASY PICKLE CHUNKS 2 pounds (4 to 5 inch cucumbers)

1 2/3 cups white vinegar

1 cup water

1 cup sugar 2 tablespoons salt

2 tablespoons mustard seed 2 teaspoons celery seed 1 teaspoon curry powder

Wash cucumbers; cut 1/8 inch slice off each end; cut into 34 inch chunks. Combine vinegar, water, sugar, salt, mustard seed, celery seed and curry powder. Bring to a boil. Add cucumbers; heat again just to boiling. Immediately ladle into 4 hot sterilized pint jars, filling to within 14 inch from the top. Close. Process in boiling water bath for 10 minutes. Start to count processing time when water returns to



boiling. Remove jars. Cool overnight. Check jars for air tight seal. Makes 4 pints.

The price of housing in Texas is likely to continue upward. At the end of last year, the average price of a home sold through the Multiple Listing Service of the major cities was \$63,000. That is more than 15 percent above the 1979 price.

Housing in Houston had the highest average price at little more than \$82,000. Midland and Dallas had average prices of more than \$75,000, while at just less than \$26,000, San Angelo had the lowest. Port Arthur had the next lowest at slightly more than \$39,000.

As population, employment and income levels continue to grow, the appreciation trend in Texas real estate probably will last throughout the year, especially if interest rates decline.

#### ASSUMPTIONS MORE DESIRABLE

High interest rates have made the assumption of a low-interest-rate mortgage more desirable.

When a loan is assumed, the new purchaser takes on the existing debt. Most of the loans, however, that have been originated in recent years have a due-on-sale clause which allows the lender to clal the loan due upon the sale of the property. The lender can then collect the money and loan it out at today's higher rates.

HOMES

Many lenders will still agree to a loan assumption provided they can escalate the interest rate to the prevailing rate. Other lenders allow loan assumptions upon the payment of a fee. FHA and VA loans are not subject to escalation.

When purchasing property using a loan assumption, first check with the lender to find out the terms of the assumption. Your real estate broker will be happy to research the matter upon re-



#### Is August 1

Aug. 1 is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 social security and withheld federal income taxes for the second quarter of 1983 and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service says. If the quarterly liability (less any deposit during the quarter) is \$500 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until Aug. 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax

with Along temperatures, mid-summer in Eastland County may bring special lawn problems drought, weeds, insects and disease

These lawn problems can cause concerns for homeowners unless accurate diagnosis and proper treatment takes place before they become severe

Dry spots, thin turf and weeds can result from improper watering, fertilizing and mowing practices. Follow recommended cultural practices before applying a chemical to correct lawn problems.

Drought stress most often occurs in mid-summer and shows up as wilted, discolored turf. Adjust watering schedules to wet the soil to a depth of four to six inches, and water only when grass shows symptoms of moisture stress.

Also, raise mowing heights one-half inch to improve drought tolerance in mid-

Lack of nitrogen or iron often creates a lawn problem. Grass with a nitrogen deficiency may have a pale color and be heavily infested with weeds. A light application of a nitrogen fertilizer will improve the lawn's ap-

Grass leaves that have yellow stripes parallel to the leaf margins may be deficient in iron. A foliar application of iron sulfate at six ounces per 1,000 square feet will usually solve this pro-

generally a problem when lawns are under stress and increase with high temperatures, drought, heavy shade and close mowing. While proper mowing and water will reduce these problems, fungicides may be required to prevent serious damage.

Chinch bugs and white grubs feed heavily on lawns during mid-summer, and their damage resembles drought injury. If turf does not respond to applications


of water, suspect these insects. Both pests damage St. Augustine grass, but only the white grub damages bermuda grass lawns.

Chinch bugs and white grubs can be controlled with insecticides. Water the lawn thoroughly prior to applying an insecticide for chinch bug control, and follow with a light watering.

Drench the lawn after an insecticide is applied for grub control, since grubs feed in the soil.





### Oklaunion Power Station Cost Is Down

The estimated cost of West Texas Utilities Co.'s Oklaunion Power Station, now under construction in North Texas, has been reduced by 127 million.

The announcement was made Friday by Durwood Chalker of Dallas, chairman and chief executive officer of Central and South West Corp., WTU's parent company, at a presentation before the Utility and Telecommunications Securities Club of Chicago.

The reduced cost estimate results primarily from being ble to negotiate better contracts in today's market with manufacturers and suppliers for practically all of equipment needed for

Oklaunion, Chalker said. The cost had been estimated at \$525 million a year ago, but now is estimated at \$398

The Oklaunion Power Station will have a net generating capacity of 640 megawatts and will be the first power plant in WTU's system to burn coal as a boiler fuel. The plant is scheduled for completion in December 1986 and will be in full operation before the summer of 1987.

It will be owned jointly by WTU and two other CSW subsidiaries, Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co. WTU will own 55 per cent of the

plant and will be the operating partner.




