Economist Explains Sales Tax Exemptions

COLLEGE STATION --Although Texas farmers and ranchers do not have to pay sales taxes on certain inputs or supplies used in agricultural production, they often do so anyway because of some misunderstandings.

Agricultural producers do not need an "exemption number," says Dr. Ashley Lovell. The only requirement is that they must file an exemption certificate with each firm or business from which purchases are made, notes Lovell, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

He suggests that producers have several Texas Sales Tax Exemption Certificates on hand and to file a copy with new suppliers. Questions and requests for exemption certificates can be directed to the Comptroller's Office by calling 1-800-252-5555 toll free or by writing the Comptroller of

Then we have the French Marigolds which are usually a low growing variety ranging from six to 18 inches tall with one to two inch single and double blooms. 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

Although 1982 was a relatively slow year for home sales in Texas, the last three months of the year were encouraging for home sellers.

Based on sales transacted through local Multiple Listing Services, the total number of homes sold in 1982 was 4 percent lower than 1981. Sales volume during the fourth quarter of 1982, however, exceeded the 1981 fourth quarter volume by 15 percent.

Undoubtedly, a factor in the turnaround is greater ease of financing. After years of rising mortgage interest rates, a downward trend began in late 1982. At the same time, savings and loan associations introduced new types of savings accounts which attracted a large amount of new deposits.

Many experts predict mortgage rates will remain at current levels or perhaps decline slightly. If there is pent-up demand for homes, these rates could encourage a much better year for housing sales in 1983.

Texas agricultural land. This represents six-tenths of 1 percent of all privately owned agricultural land in Texas.

As a comparison, two million acres of Maine's forest land are owned by corporations in which foreigners own more than 5 percent of the stock, and foreigners own nearly one million acres each in Georgia and California.

In August 1982, the Governor's Task Force on Foreign Investments in Texas found the amount of Texas farmland acquired by foreign interests to be minimal. The task force concluded that there is nothing sinister or wrong with the acquisition of some Texas farmland by foreigners. It did recommend that the Texas Department of


Agriculture continue to monitor, analyze, and distribute information about foreign investment in Texas agricultural land.

JOINT TENANCY NOT PERMITTED IN TEXAS Joint tenancy is a former of ownership available in most states. Under this arrangement a surviving spouse automatically inherits property that is owned in joint tenancy.

Texas laws, however, will not permit joint tenancy to be used with community property-that is, property which is owned equally by a husband and wife. Newcomers to Texas who have property in joint tenancy might wish to change the arrangement because it is inconsistent with Texas' community property

system, and it may produce undesirable estate tax consequences.

Savings Bonds Sales Show

Upward Trend

Sales of United States Savings Bonds were 33 percent higher in June 1983 than a year ago, continuing their upward trend since the variable, market-based rate was introduced in November 1982. Sales were reported at \$332 million, compared to \$250 million in June 1982.

Redemptions for the month totalled \$495 million. down 24 percent from the \$648 million reported last June

Sales for the first six months of 1983 amounted to \$2.11 billion, up 37 percent from year-ago sales. Redemptions for the same period were at \$3.3 billion, a decrease of 31 percent from 1982.

As of June 30, \$69.7 billion worth of Savings Bonds were held by the public, an increase of \$218 million for the month.


Mrs. Sunny Rogers of Baker, Nevada. She is a widow who runs a small general store and the only service station in Baker. Her adult son helps with the various chores there

Baker has a population of 85 people - men, women and children. The town is located on the eastern edge of the state and the nearest town with a railroad and supplies in Ely, which is some 80 miles away. They have to go after most of their supplies. A bread truck stops at Baker every two weeks to stock their bread shelf.

Mrs. Rogers was wearing ear pieces that were pretty unusual. They were small sets of rattles from real rattlesnakes. Her ears are pierced and the identical rattlesnake pieces hang from each ear - distinctive and unique. She has a daughter and family in College Station, Texas.

Mrs. Rogers' Baker complex includes a warehouse full of antique cars, including a half dozen Model T Fords. Some are in running condition. There are others cars, including an ancient Cadillac and flat bed truck

Baker is near the Lehman Caves and Mount Wheeler where peaks tower over 13,000 feet. And a feature of the 13,000 foot country is the Bristle cone Pine Trees, reputed to be the world's oldest living things. We once drove up Mount Wheeler to have a look at the Bristlecones. The road ended at about 12,000 feet, and a sign gave directions for continuing the trip on foot - in the snow. Since it was three miles and a thousand feet higher to the trees and the snow was deep, we dien't




