Dear Citizens of Cisco:

Ambulance service for a community is something we rarely think about seriously until such time as we need it desperately. Then, in many cases, no dollar value could be placed on our being able to pick up a telephone, and in a short time have an emergency vehicle manned by trained personnel at our doorstep.

Some two years, when your present council took office, Cisco was faced with the prospect of having to dig into city tax funds in order to subsidize emergency ambulance service for our community. We listened to several proposals from various companies wishing to serve us, and frankly none of the possibilities that were open to us seemed palatable. Then the company which is presently serving us came forward with an innovative subscription membership plan, which the city council elected to go with. From then to now we have had ambulance service, and have not had to pay one cent of subsidy. We hope very much that the situation can continue.

Patterson Ambulance Service has not reached its needed number f subscribers -- 850 -- at this time, and they have indicated to us

The new budget provides for expenditures as follows: insturctional expense, \$981,944; instructional resource, media and administration, \$159,627; guidance, health, transportation and co-curricular student services, \$287,426; general administration, tax office and debt service, \$292,210; and plant maintenance and operation, \$399,460.

LIBERTY! By Thomas Fleming

She has stood at America's gateway holding aloft the torch of freedom, for almost 97 years. Seventeen million immigrants have streamed past her to seek new lives in

our land. Poets have hailed her as the "Mother of Exiles." She has survived hurricanes, floods and explosions to become the symbol that says "America" to the people of every continent.

Now, for the first time since her dedication in 1886, the Statue of Liberty needs our help. Last year, National Park Service engineers informed President Reagan that Miss Liberty was in alarming condition. Beneath her hand-hammered copper skin is an intricate web of 2000 iron armature bars, designed by famous French engineer Alexandre Gustave Eiffel. Over the decades, many of these bars have deteriorated to less than half their original thickness. A decision is being made

whether to coat the bars with a material that can stand abrasion or to replace them with a more durable metal such as stainless steel. The statue's copper skin, which weighs 200,000 pounds, has also been thinned by air pollutants and acid rain.

Pieces of the torch have fallen into the waters of New York Harbor; the torch and portions of the right arm may have to be completely replaced.

Grass Clippings **Can Be Used** In Compost Pile

COLLEGE STATION ---Instead of throwing away grass clippings when you mow your lawn, put them to use in a compost pile, suggests a landscape horticulturist.

Dr. William C. Welch, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says compost is a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds. Furthermore, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material.

Make the compost pile 4 to 6 feet wide and any length, depending on material and space available.

The simplest composting method is to alternate 4 to 6 layers of plant matter, such as leaves or grass, with 2 to 4 inches of good garden soil, says Welch. Add manure to the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant matter to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ra-

These conditions might be taking part in a drug or alcohol counseling program, doing community service, working at a job, going to school or other requirements the judge orders before granting probation. With a lower case load a probation officer should have more time to actually spend supervising and counseling each of his probationers. Hopefully, this will set them on a "straight and narrow path" and after completing the probationary period, they will not "run afoul" of

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and the surface should form a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer, advises the horticulturist.

Water the pile thoroughly when completed. add water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy. Leaves decompose slowly if too dry, Welch points out.

Turn the compost every three to four months to aerate the material and speed decomposition. Within six months to a year, your compost will be ready to use.

Crape Myrtle, lagerstroemia indica, is a deciduous shrub or small tree that has been cultivated in the Southern United States for more than 150 years. The plant was introduced to the United States from Asia and has become associated in this country with Southern gardens and ante-bellum derives its common name from its crepe-like, crinkled and ruffled petals and the resemblance of its leaves to the true myrtle.

The flowering seasonb egins in June or July and continues until fall. Each long panicle is comprised of hundreds of one- to two-inch red, pink, white, lavender or purple flowers. Leaves are often garnet tinged in spring, glossy dark green in summer and dull to intense yellow, orange or red in autumn.

When the leaves fall in the winter, the crape myrtle becomes a living sculpture. The trunk and branches have an attractively gnarled, twisted character with smooth bark varying in color from light straw to rich deep brown. The bark exfoliates in early summer to reveal new bark ranging in color from light pink to pale green.

Full sun is necessary for good flowering. Crape myrtle is cold hardy throughout the Southern United States. The planting site should be sightly elevated and open to allow free air movement to avoid mildew problems. For example: planting near a

established plants, especially those growing in poor soils. Mulches of cedar bark or hardwood chips are beneficial in retaining soil moisture and minimizing soil temperature fluctuations during the summer.

The ideal time for transplanting containergrown crape myrtle is late spring or early summer, when new shoots are emerging. Balled and burlapped or bareroot plants are best transplanted during dormant period.

> Deep soil watering is required periodically during dry periods in summer when the plant is actively growing and producing flowers. Insufficient watering may prevent flower formation and result in premature leaf drop. Crape Myrtle requires little pruning to maintain its naturally graceful form. However, tip pruning to remove old flower clusters will promote more abundant flowers and renewal of new wood. Small, twiggy growth should be thinned out from underneath the canopy to keep the trunk clean and allow free air circulation. Crape myrtle can also be trained into single-stemmed, tree-like plants by removing all but the strongest stem while the plant is young. Spanish moss may be found growing on Crape Myrtle. It should be removed to allow better circulation.


