to the defense. Opening the trial, Judge vited to attend the event. Wright told the audience (court room was about three-fourths full) that no show of agreement or disagreement testimony would be permitted and that everyone was to

remain quiet. Judge Wright then told the jury that it was important that they not discuss the case with each other or with anyone and that they should not read newspaper reports or listen to radio and televi-

sion reports about the trial. Lundstrom, free under a \$200,000 property bond, was neatly dressed and followed action closely. He stood as his attorney said "not guilty" when the judge asked "how does the defendant plead?"

Two men from the Dallas Forensic Laboratory testified early Tuesday afternoon.

Allen Jones, Dallas firearms expert, examined objects submitted to him by the Cisco Police Department, including a single shot 20 gauge shotgun, a spent shell from it, the red shirt that was taken from Mrs. Lundstrom's body and a patch cut from the shirt. He said that 69 shots were recovered from her body and they were from a 20 guage shotgun shell and that the empty shell was of the type fired by the gun submitted to him. He estimated that the victim was shot from a distance of about four feet.

Roger Smith of Irving, a fingerprint and document examining expert, also identified the gun and empty shell and said he found no finger prints on it. There were friction ridges but no prints and, he said in answer to a question, prints could have been wiped away. He identified fingerprints found on letters mailed by Lundstrom to Mr. Reneau.

## Land Use Plans Are Important

Most cities in Texas and other parts of the country conduct land-use planning. Although these cities usually attempt to involve citizens in the process, n any do not understand what land-use planning means.

Cities generally prepare a land-use map which depicts in a simplified manner the pattern of land use, such as residential and commercial. There also may be a future land-use plan which describes how the city should develop to achieve the objectives of its residents.

This plan shows areas for residential, commercial and industrial expansion, as well as areas intended for open space and low-density housing development. The plan serves as an aid for deciding on rezoning applications and expansion of city services. All maps and plans are public documents which you may examine by request.

## Green Thumb Receives Grant Money for '83-'84

Farmers Union Green Thumb, an employment program for low-income senior citizens in Texas and 44 other states, has received a new grant of \$88,500, 918 from the U.S. Department of Labor.

The grant is effective from July 1, 1983 through June 30, 1984. It provides \$4,113,951 for Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb, which has 952 of the 17,317 part-time job slots allocated to Green Thumb nationwide.

TFU Green Thumb currently operates in 108 counties, mostly in north, central and west Texas. The program's workers must be at least 55 years of age and meet income guidelines. They are placed with public and private non-profit organizations such as schools, senior centers, libraries and museums and furnish services that would not otherwise be available.

The sponsoring organizations are responsible for day to day supervision of the workers and TFU Green Thumb administers wages

Federal Officials Applaud RR

## Pipeline Safety

The federal Department of Transportation has commended the Railroad Commission's pipeline safety section for its operations in the state during the past

"The Texas pipeline safety program continues to be a very stromg, ongoing program with thorough documentation and noncompliance procedures," wrote Robert L. Paullin, associate directr for operations and enforcement with DOT's Materials Transportation Bureau, in a letter to RRC Chairman Mack Wallace.

The federal review of the Commission's pipeline safety program was conducted June 8-10 and June 29-30.

Paullin noted that the Commission program has been strengthened through the assignment of two area chiefs for the state. Each chief has direct control over four of the eight reginoal pipeline safety offices the RRC's Gas Utilities Division has established in Texas.

Increased funding from the Texas Legislature has allowed the Commission to increase the number of inspectors employed by the pipeline safety section.

They have performed more than 2,200 safety evaluations during the current fiscal year, a substantial increase over the 915 evaluations in fiscal 1982. Milt Fegenbush, director of the section, said that the

amount of natural gas lost in distribution systems has dropped by more than 35 percent, largely because of the wider scope of investigation by the inspectors. Another new project begun

by the section is a series of safety seminars for gas company operators. So far in fiscal 1983, the program has reached more than 300 operators through 11 seminars.

CANVAS FOR MID-SUMMER COLOR

The Canna comes to us from Central and South America. Their home is the tropic region, but they do

good here each year with

outstanding mass of color.

The canna is often mistaken for a bulb. It actually is a rhizome, which is a member of the tuber family. Their range of size is from one and half feet to six feet tall. The taller cultivars make an attractive tall background against fences. While the smaller cultivars add the tropical look to pool

areas. The canna is best planted with all one color to an area or bed. Cannas are best suited in a flowing landscape design instead of a formal bed setting.

The Parks Department in Dallas have done wonders with a flowing landscape design using cannas. Samuell Grand Park has some very magnificent beds of canna as well as several parks along northwest highway and many parks on the Oak Cliff area.

spring of the year. The rhizomes remain in the bed year round here. In the colder climates they have to be dug and dried and stored the same way we do tulips. The cannas will bloom from Midsummer until frost. Our average frost is November 18, after the cannas have been bitten by Jack Frost, they turn brown and wilt. This is the time you need to cut the top off even with the ground and burn the removed material. Here we recommend very highly that a two inch layer of botanical cedar mulch be added completely covering the area where the cannas had grown. Then next spring the cannas will push through the mulch with more vigor and new stalks than the year before.

There is no other member of the tuber or bulb family that is so easy to grow and they multiply very rapidly. Cannas do best in rich moist soil especially enriched by compost and well-rotted cow manure. They have to have full sun and hot weather. Space the rhizomes 15 to 18 inches apart and cover with one to two inches of soil. You must feed every two to four weeks with a water soluable well-balanced fertilizer such as 10-10-5 or a 20-20-20.

Grasshoppers and cutworms are your biggest problem in the insect field. They can be contolled by a regular spraying of diazinon or sevin every two weeks.

Every three to four years you have to dig and divide your cannas. When dividing your cannas cut each rhizome into leaving approximately three to four inches per rhizome and at least one eye per rhizome. Be sure to use a clean, sharp knife. If there is any rotten or decayed section or the rhizome, dispose of it by bur-

There are many dwarf varieties that make good tub plants.

Some of the varieties found here are Mr. President which is a red five to six foot tall canna and then Pfitzer Dwarfs such as Chinese Coral, Primrose Yellow, Stadt Fellbach - orange, shell pink, cherry red, porcelain rose and City of portland orange



## 41 Killed In District Last Year D.P.S. Reports

Last year 41 persons were killed in the 9-county area of District 23, according to Lawrence Schulz, District Engineer for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

"Alcohol and speeding continue to be our greatest problems," said Schulz, "Here in the Brownwood district, which includes the counties of Brown, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Lampasas, McCulloch, Mills, San Saba and Stephens, we had 3010 traffic accidents."

The number of accidents and fatalities in this area is cited as the reason the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT) will be working more closely with local traffic officials, police departments, and the schools.

To help combat the DWI problems, DHT has provided funding for increased enforcement programs, intoxilvzer instruments which measure alcoholic level content of drivers, rehabilitation programs, and workshops for prosecutors, judges, and probation officers. (The local Selective Traffic enforcement program recently received a grant from the department. These funds will be used to enforce the DWI law.)

'We also firmly believe in education as a way to relieve future problems," Schulz said. the Department recently previewed a new alcohol education kit, called "NO, Power," which will be made available to schools free of charge, while quantities last. "NO, Power" is designed to help young students resisit the peer pressure to drink and to educate them on the dangers of the drinking/driving combination.

The department will also be supporting programs to increase the use of safety belts and child safety seats. Workshops and loan programs will be generated throughout the state, according to Schulz, with special emphasis on making child safety seats accessible to those who might have difficulty in purchasing them





'Wal-Mart: The Model Discounter"

In the mid-1970's, Founder and Chairman Sam M. Walton of Bentonville, Arkansas' Wal-Mart Stores, Inc., a chain of bare-bones discount stores, saw some disturbing pattern in the company's monthly sales charts. Not only were new units failing to achieve expected sales volume, Wal-Mart's profit margins, once the envy of the industry, were edging downward. To make matters worse, a few aggressive competitors were starting to underprice Wal-Mart, raising the specter of a serious decline in market

In a bold bid to head off that possiblility, Walton initiated a fundamental revision of Wal-Mart's marketing strategy Retting that the chain could broaden its appeal without alienating its existing customer base, he launched a major captital improvement programrepainting the garish blue store interiors in warm earth tones and discarding oldpipe-rack displays-and replaced cheap private-label merchandise with higher quality namebrand goods.

The gamble paid off, Customers flocked to the "new" Wal-Mart, triggering one of the most ambitious expansion programs in retailing history. From 78 outlets at the end of 1973, Wal-Mart has mushroomed into the

chain of more than 500 mainly small-town stores located in twelve states, from Texas to South Carolina and Louisiana to Illinois. With no slowdown in sight, some experts predict that Wal-Mart will surpass K Mart before the end of the decade as the

nation's largest discounter.

Along the way, Wal-Mart has put on the most impressive financial performance in the retailing industry. Over the past five years, it has increased revenues and earnings per share at an annual compounded rate of 37.8 percent and 37 percent respectively. This year, a lackluster one for retailers, analysts expect Wal-Mart's earnings to climb 41.6 percent to \$117 million, or \$1.77 a share, on a 41.7 percent increase in revenues to \$3.4 billion.

Wall Street is equally impressed by Wal-Mart's 3.4 percent profit margin, one of the highest in the discount field, and its 25 percent return on equity, about twoand-one-half times the retailing average. "Wal-Mart leads all other companies of its type in every quantitative measure I know," says analyst Arthur D. Charpentier of Goldman, Sachs & Co.

Sam Walton attributes Wal-Mart's success partly to the "grass roots" management style he developed early on - a technique that emphasizes individual initative and autonomy over close supervision. philosophy is that management's role is simply to get the right people in the right places to do a job and then to encourage them to use their own inventiveness to accomplish the task at hand," That philosophy, retailing

analysts say, has paid off in top-flight management that would be the evny of any industry. Enthuses Margaret A. Gilliam of First Boston Corp.: "I have never come across a company with a bettion, where every individual in a key slot in the management of the company is such an absolutely outstanding person in his field of exper-

Wal-Mart managers are required to meet with store personnel outside the workplace at least once a year to discuss the health and direction of the company and to gather suggestions on everything from merchandise selection to vacation policy; these are passed along to senior management. To reinforce the idea of self-motivation, all

'associates''-the term 'employee' has been banished from the Wal-Mart vocabulary-are eligible to share in corporate profits after a brief time with the company.

Although morale and productivity are key objectives of such a policy, the primary purpose is to encourage associates to keep their eyes on the bottom line. And as all company executives are quick to point out, Wal-Mart's tireless dedication to cost control is one of its greatest strengths. "Quite simply, our philosophy from the beginning has been to price as low as we can; and the lower our costs, the less we have to charge," says Jack Shewmaker, Wal-Mart's president and chief operating officer.

The heart of Wal-Mart's cost-control effort is a monthly financial statement prepared for each store that lists every expenditure charted against the store's account, from rent and taxes to paper clips and telephone tolls. District managers review these statements line by line with store managers. discussing ways to reduce controllable expenses. "These may be minor individually, but collectively they become major," Shewmaker explains, "this is a business of attending to details."

Another important cost advantage that separates Wal-Mart from the competition is in the purchase and distribution of merchandise. Instead of using outside jobbers and contract distributors, as do most discounters, Wal-Mart orders in bulk directly from supppliers and uses its own warehouses and fleet of delivery trucks. Store managers telephone their

orders into a central computer once a week; the merchandise is shipped to the warehouse, where it is sorted by automated equipment onto the trucks and delivered to the stores. By ordering bulk, Wal-Mart is able to negotiate lower prices than its competitors, and it is able to deliver it to stores at a much lower cost.

Not even senior executives are exempt from the costcutting pressures. Corporate offices are spartan and cramped. Such frugality allows Wal-Mart to spend only 2 percent of sales for general administrative expenses, less than most retailers can manage.

Wal-Mart gets the payoff from these low costs where it counts: low prices, which in turn generate customer loyalty. "Believe me," Shewmaker "customers know price and value. The housewives in our territory can tell you within pennies what a bottle of dishwashing liquid sells for, and if we can keep our prices lower than anyone else, the customer will spend less time worrying about shopping elsewhere." Customer loyalty, Walton

and Shewmaker believe, reduces the peaks and valleys in volume, that drive labor costs through the roof. So to make sure that Wal-Mart maintains a consistent low-price image, they eschew the kind of rapid-fire promotional techniques common to the industry. While most discounters feature sales on selected merchandise once or twice a week to generate traffic. promotions are restricted to thirteen a year at Wal-Mart

Instead, Wal-Mart tries to generate traffic through special events, such as the time the manager of the Jackson, Tennessee, store arranged for U.S. Army paratroopers to land in the Wal-Mart parking lot. People want to go where they feel there's something

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happening," Shewmaker notes. "So we do a lot of in store promotions that some people would refer to as being very hokey. We'll have dress-up Western days, when all of our associates will dress up with Western hats and blue jeans and cowboy belts. They have fun doing it, which contributes to their attitude and morale. and it rubs off on the customers."

Wal-Mart is now opening about 100 new stores a year and plans to continue that blistering pace. It is likely, however, that the company will face more competition in the future. Until recently, its small-town orientation insulated it from some of the more cut-throat types of competition in the business. But lately it has gone into larger cities, such as Springfield, Missouri, with a metropolitan population in excess of 200,000.

Sam Walton isn't the least bit worried about the competition. "We have found that we can do business quite profitably in larger areas," he says. "We plan to continue testing at both extremes-large as well as small markets. One shouldn't be too surprised where we go."

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
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
