State Rests Case Friday; Trial Recessed Until Tues.

The murder trial of Loyal L. Lundstrom, 60-year old Ciscoan, was recessed until 8 a.m. Tuesday by Judge Jim Wright in 91st District Court. Eastland, after the state rested its case Friday morn-

Lundstrom is charged with the shotgun death of his 27-year old wife Doris at their Cisco Motel apartment last March 3rd.

After the state rested it case at 10:05 a.m. Judge Wright called a 25-minute recess. At 10:30, the Judge and District Attorney Emory Walton and Defense Attorney Bill Hart went into the jduge's office. At 11 a.m., court reconvened and Judge Wright told the jury that at best it would be late Friday before they could begin deliberation and it seemed best to recess the trial until 8 a.m. Tuesday.

Jurors were reminded that they were not to discuss the case among themselves or with anyone, were not to read newspaper accounts of the trial or listen to radio or television.

Court reconvened at 1 p.m. Friday for the attorneys and the judge to confer on legal points. Mr. Hart had said witness when the trial resumes, but this was not mentioned Friday. He was not expected to put the defendant on the stand.

Linda Lundstrom 20, daughter of the defendant and his first wife, was the first state witness as the trial's fourth day began Friday. A week and a day were used to select the jury of four women and eight men.

Miss Lundstrom told about the activities and work of her stepmother whom she described as "a Christian lady." She said Doris Lundstrom looked after the children and home, cleaned the motel rooms and spent afternoons working in the shop of their momument between Doris and her father. Answering questions, she said that her father often listened to telephone calls to his wife and always wanted to know where she might be going or had been. Lundstrom wiped tears from his eyes as his daughter testified.

Cindy Donahoe, manager of the White Elephant Restaurant, testified that the Lundstroms were frequent patrons. She said Lundstrom always did the ordering for his family and that he told her he always bought Doris'

Jo Nell Maples testified that she had known the family about ten years and had worked with Doris in church for te past five years.

She said tha Lundstrom called her March 3rd and asked her to pick up the Lundstrom children after school and keep them until he or Doris came for them.

Mrs. Maples said she last saw Doris on Sunday before she died. She said that she learned that Lundstrom had told his pastor that they were going to Austin where Doris' brother was in a hospital.

testimony, the state rested its case.

The Lundstrom's marital problems, which were indicated in testimony by H.E. (Gene) Foster, Cisco family friend, continued to surface in questioning of the Rev. John Clinton, Cisco minister who said he had known the

couple for some nine years. Rev. Clinton testified he had talked with Mrs. Lundstrom the morning prior to her death about family problems. Testimony of Mr. Foster showed that she spent the night before her death at the Foster home south of Cisco, and she talked with Mr. Foster and Rev. Clinton at the former's place of business in Cisco on the morning of her death.

Rev. Clinton said he advised her to obtain professional counseling. He also testified that he was with Lundstrom when he purchased a shotgun at a garage sale a year earlier. He was unable. however, to identify the gun that had been entered as

Mrs. Lundstrom's body was discovered by Rev. Clinton, he testified, when a woman who was running the bus station at the Lundstrom's Cisco Motel needed keys that were in the couple's locked bedroom. The minister said he picked the door lock and found her body in a sitting position against a wall. Her hands were crossed and her head was slumped.

On March 8th, three days after the body was discovered and after he had disappeared, Lundstrom telephoned Rev. Clinton, the minister testified. "He wanted to know what was going on in Cisco and I told him the police wanted to talk to him and that his wife's funeral was the next day,' Rev. Clinton said. "He sounded very remorseful. I told him I'd be praying for him, and he said 'please

Dallas crime lab experts testified earlier that a blouse worn by Mrs. Lundstrom had a hold about the size of a silver dollar. Sixty-nine size 71/2 birdshot pellets were found in her body and she had been shot from a distance of about four feet, testimony showed.

Letters written by Lundstrom during his 13-day absence after the shooting were offered in evidence by the state in Wednesday's proceedings. They were read to the jury by Jackie Hobbs of Brownwood, former Cisco police detective.

'It must have been at that time that I unknowingly cocked the gun and pulled the trigger," Hobbs read from the letter. The jury of four women and eight men listened intently, and Lundstom appeared shaken.

Mr. Hobbs, who helped with the police investigation of the case after the body was discovered March 5th, said that Lundstrom had told Rev. Clinton by telephone that he had written to his pastor, Rev. C.L. Reneau of Cisco's Church of the Nazarene. When the letter arrived,

Rev. Reneau took it unopened to police on March 9th, the day of Mrs. Lundstrom's funeral. At the pastor's request, Mr. Hobbs read the letter after it was opened by Mr. Reneau and he agreed

The eight-page letter said, in part, "To say I'm sorry for all I know you've been

through is small but, please, don't hate me." Lundstrom wrote that he returned home after taking the couple's five children to breakfast on March 3rd and was pleased to find his wife back home, after she had spent the night with the Fosters. Lundstrom quoted his wife in the letter: "Don't expect

any more kisses; our marriage wouldn't be like that any more." He said that when they returned from taking the children to school, his wife informed him "our marriage is over" and that she wanted the business, car, equipment "and the children without you around.'

"You have guessed - I want a divorce. I want to be free from you... I want you out of this house and place before the kids get home," the letter read. Lundstrom's letter said he

picked up the shotgun, which was kept as protection against intruders, and demanded the truth from his wife. "She told me she had had little affairs with guys that didn't mean anything. If it's the truth you want, you're too old to be my husband. The children need a younger daddy, not an old grandpa. It must have been with these words I cocked

the trigger and pulled.' Lundstrom's letter said he was sorry he lied to R.V. Reneau about the couple going to Austin but "in my shock, it was the first thing I thought of." He wrote that "I tried so hard to give her the very best in life and felt she was happy. I wanted to scare her...not hurt her."

The letter noted that the pastor could show the letter to anyone he wished, and this was a factor in Judge Wright's allowing its use. The defense sought in a pretrial hearing and again Wednesday to suppress use of the letter, contending that it was confidential under law as a pastor-parishoner communication.

Mr. Hobbs testified that police had a second letter, described as a "scratch copy" of the one received by Rev. Reneau. He said it was given him by Lundstrom after he was taken into custody at the DFW airport when he surrendered.

The Dallas crime lab handwriting expert had previously testified that the letters were written by the same person. Photos of the body and murder scene were offered in evidence while Mr. Hobbs was on the stand. Randy Whittle, former

Cisco police chief, took the stand and told of finding the shotgun in a closet behind the bus station counter. The lawman said it was possible that police overlooked the gun in their first search of the premises. They found it four days after the body was discovered.

Rev. Reneau testified that he received a telephone call from Lundstrom March 15th, asking him to meet him at DFW airport. The minister agreed but said he wouldn't be alone. He agreed to invite Mr. Clinton to accompany him along with police. Lund-strom flew to DFW and surrendered the next day.

Contrary to previous witnesses, Rev. Reneau told the jury that he had not heard of marital problems between the Lundstroms. "I always thought he pampered and petted her," he said.

Dr. M.G.F. Gilliland,

medical examiner with the Southwest Forensics Institute, Dallas, testified that Doris Lundstrom died between 10 and 10:30 a.m. on March 3rd from a shotgun blast fired from about four feet into the right side of her abdomen during the trial Thursday.

Dr. Gilliland said she examined the body in an autopsy performed one day after the body was found on March 5th. The body was normally developed, five feet and seven and a half inches tall, and weighed 98 pounds. She said the large wound killed Mrs. Lundstrom instantly, shattering the liver and a main artery

Questioned by the defense, Dr. Gilliland said she could not tell the exact minute of death. Answering the district attorney, she said that "at four feet from the end of the gun barrel, it could not have been a suicide.

Dr. Gilliland identified several autopsy photographs depicting the size and location of the wound, and Judge Wright admitted them as evidence.

Detective Jackie Hobbs. who gave testimony Wednesday, was back on the stand Thursday to answer questions about searching the Lundstrom home and discovering the body. said he found neither the shotgun nor the empty shell on March 5th in searching the home. He said he did not check in the bus office closet where the gun was found a few days later by Randy

Whittle. Mr. Whittle said he found the shotgun on March 9th in the bus office closet after an earlier search had missed it. Cisco Policeman Lonnie Knight testified that he saw the spent shotgun shell on the bedroom floor where the slaying occurred on March

Fred and Gordon Oehlke of San Antonio, father and brother of Doris Lundstrom, were called as witnesses by the state Thursday, and they detailed experiences and meetings that they had with the couple before the shooting.

Fred Oehlke, who has temporary custody of the five Lundstrom children, testified that the couple's relationship "seemed to be very fine up until last year." He said he noticed that his daughter had lost a lot of weight and could wear her 10-year old daughter's clothes. He agreed with earlier testimony that Mrs. Lundstrom had become nervous and was unable to eat.

"There were arguments and signs of discord the last few times we visited," he

Douglas A. Weiss of Cross Plains appeared briefly on the stand to tell about visiting the bus station at 11:35 a.m. on March 3. He said he went in for a package and "Lundstrom came in, looked at the book and said it wasn't there, and I left." He said Lundstrom appeared normal.

Chris Conger of Cisco was the last witness of the day Thursday. She said that she helped the Lundstroms occasionally at the motel and bus station. She also testified that she believed there was marital troubles, noting that Mrs. Lundstrom didn't smile and talk as much and ap-peared quiet and despondent during the last months of her life. She opened the motel and bus station the morning the body was found at the re-

State Files Suit In Sewage Matter

A suit seeking injunctive relief and civil penalties for alleged Texas Water Code violations was filed by the Attorney General of Texas against the City of Cisco in 91st District Court, Eastland, last Wednesday. The city had been notified earlier that litigation was

forthcoming. City Attorney Wm. B. Wright, Jr., reported that the city had waived notice of process to facilitate handling of the matter. The city's answer will be filed by the city attorney in the near

future, Mr. Wright said. The suit alleges that waste material from the city sewage plant has been disposed of in violation of the state water code on over 100 occasions between January, 1977, and April, 1983. The water code calls for penalty liability of between \$50 and \$1,000 per day. Civil penalties could run as high as \$120,000, according to City

Manager Mike Moore. Mr. Moore said that city officals would seek to negotiate a settlement in the matter. A conference between city officials, including Mayor Eris Ritchie and the city manager and Nancy N. Lynch, assistant attorney general for environmental protection matters, was held

The suit asks the court to: 1. That citation be issued and that defendant be served with process and required to appear and answer herein; 2. Temporary injunctive

waste water disposal system was built in east Cisco in the 1920s. The plant consists of 12 septic tanks followed by an aeration basin, a final clarified, and sludge lagoons. The suit alleges that the plant has on occasions processed more than the 650,000 gallons per day allowed by their 1972 state

permit. The city built a \$175,000 outfall sewage line after a bond election last year to relieve the demands on the sewage disposal system. Plans call for opening bids Sept. 12th to award contracts for considerable improvements to the city's

water system. The city has taken option on a 40-acre tract for a new waste water disposal system and has asked the Texas Water Resources Board to approve the site so work can proceed on a new plant. State officials have been advised of this action, the city

manager said "We are aware of the seriousness of our sewage problems and are working toward improving our facilities so we can comply with all regulations," the city manager said.

Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Carbohydrate foods like pasta, potatoes, corn and bread are often portrayed as the fattening "villans" in American diets

But they are actually full of energy nutrients, fiber and protein, and not all that fattening, says Markey K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M.

According to specialist, the chemical composition of carbohydrates is indicated by the name - carbo for carbon and hydrate for water. Simple carbohydrates are

the sugars and sweeteners found in fruits, vegetables, dairy products and processed sugar. Complex carbohydrates are many simple carbohydrates joined together in growing plants. They form the starches and fiber of vegetables, fruits and grains. Carbohydrate foods pro-

vide an efficient source of energy essential for functioning of the muscles, brain and nerves and for good use of other nutrients in the body, explains Sweeten.





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Triple-Amputee Vietnam Vet Elected To Lead DAV

"Just let me die!" whispered the young soldier to his platoon sergeant seconds after a Viet Cong "booby trap" land mine mangled his body.

Unwilling to listen to such talk, the sergeant ordered Dennis A. Joyner to stop wishing for death, telling him he had much to live for. "Right then," the Vietnam combat vet says today, "my whole attitude turned around. I wanted to be a winner - to overcome any obstacle life put in my way."

obstacle life put in my way."

After losing both legs and an arm, the Apollo, Pa., man found life's obstacles steep, but he came out a winner. Today, his fellow members of the tree-quarter-million-member Disabled American Veterans (DAV) chose him to lead their organization through the coming year. The election took place at the DAV's national convention

in Los Angeles. Joyner fears his year at the DAV's helm will be one of the most difficult years in the history of veterans' affairs. "A full decade has passed since the signing of the Paris Peace Accords ended the Vietnam War," he commented. "And so many have forgotten that veterans' benefits are part of the cost of war, that our country has a moral obligation to those who spilled their blood or lost their health while defending us.

while defending us.

"Combine that forgetfulness with the demand for
reduced government spending," he continued, "and
you've got a real problem for
veterans, particularly
disabled vets."

In response, Joyner said, he'll work to increase membership in the DAV, a nonprofit association to which more than a third of all service-connected disabled veterans already belong. He's shooting for a million DAV members by 1985. And, Joyner stated, "The DAV needs to further increase its effectiveness in our nation's capital."

Joyner has served the DAV well at the national, state, and local levels. He was elected to several DAV national vice command offices prior to attaining the office of national commander. At the state level, he served as the DAV Department of Pennsylvania second and third junior vice commanders, and he was commander and chapter service officer of DAV Chapter 36 in his hometown Vandergrift, Pa. In 1977, the

Vandergrift, Pa. In 1977, the triple amputee was selected as the DAV's national Outstanding Disabled Veteran of the Year.

Joyner, the fourth Viet-

nam veteran to hold a oneyear term as DAV national commander, was woundedin June 1969 while patrolling the Mekong Delta in Vietnam as a member of the U.S. Army's 9th Infantry Division. His acts of bravery and devotion to duty earned him many citations, including the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart, Army Commendation Medal, Vietnam Service Badge, and Combat Infantry Badge.

Joyner lives in Apollo, Pa., with his wife, Donna. He is the father of two young sons, Dennis, Jr., and Paul.

Hunting - Fishing Licenses Expire

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials have announced that 1983-84 hunting and fishing licenses should be available at department offices and at mkost retail outlets across the state.

All Texas hunting asnd fishing licenses expire on Aug. 31 eacg year.

Resident hunting and resident fishing licenses are priced at \$8 each, and the resident combination hunting-fishing license is \$12.

Officials said the new hunting and fishing regulations guides also will be available at that time, including a map of the state's mew three-zone alignment for dove hunting.

Texas dobe hunters who may be unsure about the new three-zone hunting alignment in the state are urged by the Texas Parks and Wildliffe Department to obtain a map showing the dove hunting zones when they purchase their 1983-84 hunting licenses.

The licenses, zone maps and hunting regulation guides are now available at department offices and most hunting licens outlets across the state.

The Central Zone, south of I-20, will be Sept. 1-Oct. 30 and Jan. 7-16. Bah limit will be 12 per day, not to include more than two whitewings. Shooting hours will be 30 minutes befokre sunrise to sunset. The Panhandle Zone, north of I-20, season is Sept. 1-Nov.9, With the same daily limit and shooting hours as ther Central Zone.

Officials remind hunters the law requires that anyone hunting white-winged doves in any zone must have a \$6 white-winged dove stamp.

Septembert is the mkonth when thousands of hunters take to the field after doves. SIt also is the mnost dangerous month for hunting accidents.







Students who want to take the ACT or the SAT on the first 1983-84 national test date must have their registration materials completed and mailed before the September 23rd (SAT) or September 30th (ACT) deadline. The full 1983-84 schedules of test dates and deadlines are as follows:

The basic student fee for using the ACT Assessment is \$9.50, the SAT \$11.00. Students can obtain ACT Assessment and SAT registration packets, as well as other college and career planning materials, from the counseling office at Cisco High School.

At area test centers on national test dates it will take about three to four hours to complete the ACT or the SAT. In order that students may be familiar with the character and format of test items and responses, a copy of a full-length test booklet is available in the counseling office. Students who wish copies of additional tests quest from ACT or the College Board at cost.

Information reports resulting from the tests and the questionnaire are sent to the students and their high school counselors, as well as to those colleges and other institutions specifically designated by the students.

It is recommended that students take these tests during their junior year or early in the senior year so that resulting information will be available in time to be of maximum assistance to students and their counselors in education and career planning. Students who are uncertain if they need to use the ACT or the SAT, or are concerned about the location of the nearest test center, are urged to contact Mrs. Mouser in the counseling office at C.H.S.

Rule Deregulate Transportation

The Railroad Commission has adopted on an emergency basis a new rule that will deregulate the transportation of certain agricultural commodities in Texas.

The rule exempts from RRC-approved rates the transportion of certain agricultural commodities for farmers, ranchers or cooperative organizations between points of production, processing or storage or to any point of first manufacture.

However, agricultural commodity carriers will still be required to have a Commission pemit and comply with the Commission's safety, vehicle registration, and unsurance requirements. Such a permit will be valid for one year troughout the state.

The new rule also requires that an agricultural carrier kepp record for each shipment showing the origin and destination, identity of the shipper and receiver, and shipment weights.

Each agricultural shipment must also be accompanied by a consignor bill of lading and a agricultral permit holder's waybill. The bill of lading must contain a

certificate signed by the condsignor (shipper). The waybill must contain a certificate signed by the agricultural permit holder. These documents must be presented to RRC officials of officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety on re-

To apply for an agricultural permit, a carrier must meet the Commision's cargo, liability, and workmen's compensation insurance requirements, file a report detailing the equipment the carrier plans to use, and file a \$25 filing fee. For more than five vehicles, a carrier must file and additional \$5 per vehicle.

Before the adoption of the new rule, a carrier could get a seasonal agricultural permit from the Commissin that would exempt certain commodities from Commissionapproved rates. A seasonal permit was valid for 120 days and a 75-mile radius.

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

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

Hints

During the month of August, the United States Dapartment of Agriculture launched a "Food for Fitness' campaign. The "Food for Fitness" campaign will last one year with the purpose being to provide the public with information about the american food system, nutrition and exercise, and their effects on health and well being of all segments of the population. The Extension Service and other U.S.D.A. agencies will play a major role in this unformation effort. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will endorse and give leadership to this campaign in the State of Texas.

With the beginning of school, many high-school athletes-and their parentsare increasingly concerned about nutrition, For better athletic performance and better health, athletes ned sound nutrition information. THe following questions that athletes regularly ask of the Texas Agriculturasl Extension foods and nutrition specialists. Let me share with you their answers to these important questions.

Q: "I run track and I feel like I need more energy. Should I go on a high protien

A: Athletes need small increases in their protein intake during vigorous training because additional muscle may be produced. Just eating a well-balanced diet should be sufficient, however, eating more protein than provided by the average diet will not increase muscle size and strength. In fact, research shows that once protein fulfills ifs primary role of body building, the excess is either used for energy or converted to fat and stored

or passed ort of the body. Q:"What should I eat before a football game?"

A: Pregame meals for football players often include a large portion of meat, such as beef steak. This can result in an excessive intake of protein and fat. It's better to eat a small, lean hamburger pattie.

Ground meat is digested faster than a bite size piece of beef. Fat leaves the stomach in about five hours, protein in about three hours, and carbohydrate foods, like those from the bread-cereal group in about two hours. That's why a light meal with higher amounts of carbohydrates rather than large amounts of protein, fat and

cellulose is recommended. Q: "My coach says I hould take B-vitamins for xtra energy.

A:Daily requirments for vitamins do not depend upon physical activity. Taking in more vitamins than you need does not help and could harm the body. It's true that some members of the B-vitamin complex help chemical reactions to occur which produce energy when carbohydrate, protein, and fat are burned. But you can get all the B-vitamins you need from a nutritious diet. Taking vitamin supplements without a doctor's prescription is not advisable.

Q:"I want to take diuretics so I can qualify for a lower weight class in wresting, but my parents won't let me. What's wrong with diuretics?"

A: Diuretics can cause water loss and dehydration which directly inhibits the production of energy. Also, along with the water, your body loses potassium. Scince potassium is needed for muscle function, doing anyting to decrease your potassium level is not a very good idea for an athlete.

Q:"What is 'carbohydrate loading' and can it really make me perform better as as athlete?'

A: "Carbohydrate loading" is a short period of fasting followed by a high level of carbohydrate consumption. Carbohydrate loads see to be of benefit only for athletes involved in er durance events such as marathon runners or distance swimmers. This is a controversial procedure, and it does have side effect.

Sponsors of the field day are the Texas Agricultural Expermint Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The center is located at the junction of U.S. Highway 281 and FM 8, two miles north of the downtown area.

Guests on the riding tour will pass by major research and demonstration areas and will hear research scientist discuss a host of topics. developed early will help your child throughout his schooling. The following is the second in an eight part series to assist parents in helping children learn. The first series continues on "reading.

Developing Good Readers, Part II

Introduce your child to the wonders of the public library at an early age. Stop at the library and browse, answering questions about various books and other printed materials.

As soon as possible, a child should be allowed to apply for a library card and choose books. Encourage frequent use of the school library. Read and discuss books brought home for possible school projects or during family sharing periods.

Subscribe to a chilren's magazine. Children love the idea of having their very own

periodical. Make certain the reading area is comfortable and well-lighted.

Take spcial note of any signs of reading difficulty that may be caused by poor eyesight. If such problems are noted, take prompt action either through your own physician or through the

school nurse's office. Search out the better television programs for children. Watch some of the productions along with your child. Discuss the programs. Note comments and try to answer questions. When words are shown, ask that they be read to you or you read them to the child.

Encourage the writing and addressing of personal greeting cards, invitations and thank-you notes, writing your grocery lists, putting names in your address book. Suggest a backyard "mailbox" for exchanging regular letters with the child next door.

If at any age your child seems "turned off" by reading, don't make an issue of it. Casually leave "irresistible" books around-books on whatever the child's current interests are.
