The Treaty was signed by David Hartley, representing Great Britian, and by John Jay, John Adams and Benjamin Franklin, ministers for the United States of America.

The ten articles of agreement included American independence, bounary lines, north, west and southwest of the thirteen colonies, fishing rights, restoration of property, hostilities to cease, British forces to evacuateten articles.

Mr. Marshall emphasized that the treaty was a social, economic and intellectual agreement which led to the independence of France and other countries later. Its importance ignited a spark of freedom around the world.

Difficulty intravel delayed the ratification of the treaty. By January 13, 1784, nine delegates had arrived in Annapolis to attend the Congress. On January 14, 1784, Congress voted unanimously

to ratify at once. This confirmed American independence, and gave the United States a place among the nations of the world.

The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution commemorate the Bicentennial of the Treaty of Paris, and wish to inform members and the public of the significance of this historic event.

Deer Permits To Be Announced In October

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials remind hunters and landowners that dates and locations for issuance of antlerless deer hunting permits will not be announced until October.

Department field personnel currently are collecting deer census data to be used in determining permit issuance rates in individual counties and portions thereof.

Landowners may obtain their permits, normally issued at the county courthouse or other public facility, in late October or early

In most counties offering an archery-only deer season Oct. 1-3, bowhunters may take antlerless deer without a permit unless the county is designated as "bucks only" for the archery season.

As a result of passage of

the Wildlife Conservation Act by the Texas Legislature in tis last session, the Parks and Wildlife Dapartment now has authority over wildlife resources in all counties. Some counties may offer antlerless deer harvest where it was not allowed in the past, but permits may

Another result of Wildlife Conservation Act was the removal protection for "spike" bucks in all counties having a deer hunting season. Spike bucks are treated as any other buck under the current system, officials said.

Mary Ann Shirer. A major cause of back pain is improper body mechanics of poor posture when standing, sitting, bending and lifting, and lying down, says shirer, a specialist with Texas A&M University's Agricultural Extension Service.

Improving posture and body alignment in all daily activities-whether sitting at a desk, doing housework, or driving a tractor--will relieve strain, protect the back from injury and slow down "back wear" from the aging process, notes the specialist.

Poor muscle tone, weak muscles and a lack of frlxibility also cause back pain. Faithfully following and exercise program to strengthen abdominal and back muscles and to increase body flexibility can alleviate existing back problems an reduce the risk of developing back problems.

But an exercise program takes a daily commitment to be effective, says Shirer, and should not be started while you have severe back pain. It's also a good idea to get your doctor's approval, especilly if you have back problems, other medical conditions, or are over 35 years of age, cautions the specialist.

Being overweight or obese is another contributing factor to back pain. Excess weight shifts the body's center of gravity and puts an added strain on the back, especially if the excess weight is carried around the abdomen, she explains.

"Even mental stress and anxiety can play a role by causing the back muscles to become tense and aggravate back pain," says Shirer.

For the person who has weak muscles, poor posture, is overweight and has poor stress management skills, even the slightest mechanical stress can cause a back injury of strain, whether the person does heavy lifting or not.



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

Allowable Continues At 100%

Gas Production Allowable Hearing

The Railroad Commission today continued the Texas oil production rate for October 1983 at 100 percent of market demand.

Commissioners Buddy Temple and Jim Nugent directed the continuance of the top production allowable after reviewing oil companies' October nominations to buy a total of 2,425,894 barrels of Texas oil per day. The October nomination total, a decrease of 19,054 barrels daily when compared to September purchases nominations, indicates market demand.

Although next month's state total for the permissible rate of production is calculated to average 2,857,702 barrels per day, actual production is estimated to reach 2.35 million barrels per day. Actual production in October 1982 was 2,373,699 barrels of oil per day. October 1982 nominations totaled 2,462,509 barrels daily.

The Commission first went to the ceiling level for oil production in April 1972, and October marks the 80th month in a row for the maximum allowable. It applies to fields in the state except those that are assigned lower legal rates of production so that reservoir pressures will not be depleted before the maxrecovered.

Temple also reported that October 1983 nominations for the purchase of Texas gas totaled 19,260,594 Mcf/d (thousand cubic feet per

September amounted to 19,428,237 Mcf/d. October 1982 gas nominations totaled 20,713,241 Mcf/d.





About That Old Camera...

Q: Recently I dug out my brother's old hands, and it did rely on a mask to enable the user marked "A" and "B", apparently has provisions for taking 16 pictures on a roll, instead of 8. I remember this from the Ansco camera I had when in high school. It took 16 pictures on a roll. I carried that camera to New Guinea and back, taking pictures to remember my life in the service.

Back to the Voigtlander, shouldn't there be some kind of mask to put in the camera to block out the other half of the film that normally is part of the bigger picture when only the "A" window is used for 8 exposures per roll? If so, do you have any idea of where one of these could be obtained? I realize that the camera is over 40 years old, but I would like to use it.

A: Yes, you do, indeed, have a split-format Voigtlander-Bessa with optical finder on your

Voigtlander folding camera with intentions of using it once in a while. It takes 120-size roll film full-frame or 21/4 x 15/8 half-frame. With the smalland, since it has two red windows on the back picture mask in place, each numerical figure is set once in the lower and once in the upper window. In other words, the first exposure is made with the number "1" in the lower window; the second with the number "1" in the upper window; the third with the number "2" in the lower window; the fourth with the number "2" in the upper window, and so forth, resulting in 16 half-frame exposures.

As for where to obtain a mask for the Voigtlander, check with Peter J. Sheldon, dealer in antique, classic, and rare photo equipment and materials in Mequon, WI (414) 241-8399. He may be able to find one for you. Otherwise, you might try placing an ad in the newspaper or in Shutterbug Ads, the photographic classified newspaper, Box F, Titusville, FL (sample copy is \$2). If you can't turn up a mask, you'll have to content yourself with taking 8 full-frame exposures on a





IRS News And Information For October

October 31 is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 social security and withheld federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1983 and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service says.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approve commercial banks. They are allowed until November 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can order one through the Forms/Tax Information number listed in the phone book under U.S. Govrnment. IRS Publication 15, Circular

Hay Show Oct. 4, 10:30

The eleventh annual Eastland County hayshow will be on October 4 in the Moylan show barn at the county livestock show grounds near Eastland. A program will begin at 10:30 a.m.

Dr. George Alston, Extension Service Agronomist, will discuss the hay show results and production of quality hay

Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon reports that there are 32 entries in the hay show. Ribbons and plaques will be presented to exhibitors during the program.

Prior to the program Dr. Alsotn will judge the hay entries. The chemical score (crude protein) will be averaged with the physical score to determine the final classification score. The physical factors will include maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from foreign material, and color. Ribbons will be awarded based on final score. Plaques will be given to exhibitors with the highest scoring entry in each of the following classes: Coastal Bermudagrass, Sudan-Sorghum Hybirds, other perennials, and oats and other annuals.

The hay show and program will help hay producers do a better job of producing high quality forage for livestock says Gordon. He also states that the program will help livestock men to understand the feed requirements and how to better manage feed supplies for this winter.

Many people who have spent time with the President have noticed his hearing has deteriorated in the last year or so. Reporters have been told to speak loudly when they interview him, particularly from the right

Dr. House said of the President' hearing, "It's not really deteriorated much from last year." He said he had recommended that Mr. Reagan use a heaing aid not so much because the hearing had worsened but because there had been many recent technological advances.

"There have been many improvements in hearing aids recently, particularly in the area of quality of sound they can produce," the doctor said. "There have also been improvements in miniaturization. That's the reason we felt we could make the recommendation that he use one.

He said Mr. Reagan suffered a deterioration in the auditory nerve, which picks up sound vibrations in the inner ear and converts them to electrical impulses to the brain. He said the nerve was
