Bond Election Ordered For New Sewer Plant Financing

Ordinances to call an election of the proposition of ap-Jr. Varsity Loses proving bonds to finance waste water treatment facilities, to authorize issuance of bonds to finace water system provements, and to establish First District Game new water department rates were approved at the semimonthly meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night.

A bond election was ordered for Saturday, Nov. 19, at the Corral Room of the Laguna Hotel on the proposition of issuing \$675,000 in Revenue and General Obilgation Bonds to finance the construction of a new waste water treatment plant. M.L. Bailey was named election judge with Margaret Torres as alter-

nate judge. The Council and engineers presently are seeking the most cost effective plan for a bott, Cisco was forced to new facility to replace the present sewage disposal plant that has been condemned by state water and health authorities. Replacement during 1984 has been mandated by court action. as it remained at the end of

The ordinance was passed as an emergency, which required only one reading. A town hall type meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 1, at the High Schoo. auditorium to permit citizens of the community to study the matter. City officials, engineers and state water and health authorities will be at the meeting. Ginger Johnson, city secretary, and Beth Prickett of the city hall staff were named absentee voting

An ordinance, also passed on emergency first reading, authorized the issuance of Utility System Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$1,300,000 and confirmed the sale of the bonds to the Texas Water Development Board and the Farm Home Administration.

Contracts were awarded last month for construction work in the system improvement program, which will include a filteration plant at Lake Cisco. A preconstruction conference is expected to be held in about 10 days and work is due to begin soon after Nov. 1, City Manager Mike Moore told

the Council. Joe Smith, Abilene, employed by First Southwest Corp. and acting as the city's financial consultant in the improvement program financing, reported that the interest rate that the city will pay the Texas Water Resources Board on bonds has dropped in recent months from a projected 10.95 per cent to 8.2 per cent. City plans call for \$800,000 of the \$1,300,000 to carry the 8.2 interst rate with the balance of \$500,000 to bear interest at the rate of 5.65 per cent. The new rate, Mr. Smith said, would save taxpayers several hundred thousand dollars over the 30-year loan period.

The new water, sewer and sanitation rates, established in the ordinance on first reading, will raise the average minimum bill from \$15.50 to \$24.00 for all services, Mr. Moore told the Council. It calls for a \$12 minimum of 2,000 gallons of water. The minimum for senior citizens will go up from \$12.50 to \$21.00.

Meter deposits under the new ordinance will go up from \$25 to \$50 to \$200, depending on the size of the tap. Customers who pay their water bills after the 16th of the month wil be charged a \$5 penalty. Sewer and sanitation charges remain unchanged.

Water customers living outside the city limits, who presently pay a \$5 surcharge in addition to the minimum, will pay a \$10 surcharge under the new ordinance. The ordinance, which becomes effective Dec. 1 and with billing Jan. 1, will provide extra revenue to meet bond payment for the new improvements, Mr. Moore said.

The ordinance will be published as a legal notice in The Press in the near future. The Council approved amendments to their financial advisory contract in con-

nection with financing the

improvement program to re-

tain a bond attorneys for the loans as required by regulations.

The Council held a public hearing on the proposed revenue sharing program for 1983-84 and them adopted a budget calling for spending some \$54,000. The funds will be used for capital improvements as follows: police department, \$3,000; fire department, \$1,500; street department, \$41,700; and water department, \$7,100.

An agenda item to authorize obtaining a permit for the city to install 12-inch water lines under the railroad right-of-way was tabled for study.

Manager Randy Speegle and Chairman Elaine Dixon of the Chamber of Commerce were present to make a report of revenues and expenditures of the hotel occupancy tax for 1982-83 and to submit a budget for the coming year. Income amonted to \$15,212 and expenses totalled some \$8,100.

Expenditures included renovating signborads on I-20. A budget calling for spending \$17,201 during 1983-84 was approved. This will include \$8,000 for advertising, \$4,000 in salary supplements, \$450 for office supplies, \$1,200 on special events and a sum for a savings account fund for use in a future community center

project. City Court Judge Jasper Cook submitted a report for third quarter activities. The report showed that 98 traffic violation tickets were issued and some \$1,106 was collected in 10 bad check cases. The court's gross income for the year amounted to more than \$20,000 for three quarters, the report showed.

Mayor Eris Ritchie presided at the meeting. Present were Councilmen Bobby Ingram, Bobby Rains, Roy Dennis, Brad Kimbrough and Linton Batteas, City Manager Moore, City Secretary Johnson and City Attorney Billy Wright.

The men were arrested Dec. 10, 1982, at the Best Western Motel in Eastland by Police Chief Bobby Arriola and Sheriff Johnnie Morren.

Daniel Bull's punishment at one year in the county jail and fined him \$150. Because Bull had no prior convictions, he was given two years probation for the sentence.

First grad 'doctors' in Cisco

It was mostly a matter of coincidence, says Dr. Ervin Addy, that he received the first diploma from Southwestern Medical College. He'd decided to stay and finish his senior year at the new medical school instead of following Baylor Medical School to Houston. Roll call was always in alphabetical order, so he was always first on the

All the coincidences came together in March 1944 when he became the first member of Southwestern's first graduating

class to receive his medical degree. The historic document hangs in his office in Cisco, Texas. The certificate is surprisingly unpresumptuous; the ink is light, and the paper has turned gray. It is an unassuming display, at best. But it symbolizes the reason for Southwestern's being: to train physicians.

Addy is admittedly proud to have had such a symbolic part in the history of the school. However, it is his almost 40 years as a family practitioner that leaves the strongest impression of Southwestern's success at training doctors.

Cisco is a quiet little place about 30 minutes from Abilene. Addy and his family settled in the West Texas town after he finished a nine month internship in San Antonio. There were three doctors when he arrived, but this number gradually decreased. He remembers a one-year stretch when he was the only doctor the town had. He and another doctor now practice in Cisco, but he says more doctors are needed.

Addy takes appointments, but walk-ins still make up the majority of his business. Before he could begin this Center Times interview, he was called away to put several stitches in the chin of a 10-year-old who'd slipped and cut herself in the pool. After taking care of that emergency, he settled back for about an hour and reminisced about his early medical experiences. When the interview was over, a front office filled with patients awaited him.

Whether past or present, Addy says medicine, for him, has always been doctoring the aches and injuries of people. "The kinds of things doctors see and treat haven't changed that much," he says. There are still chins to stitch, babies to deliver, infections to treat. The changes have come in new techniques and approaches.

In terms of medical education, he says hardly anything is the same anymore." Medical school was never like it is now. There's a heap of difference in the curriculum. Now students can pick and choose what they want to concentrate on after they finish their basic courses. They can take lecture

service and attend class when they want to this is all very different. We had to attend class, and we all took the same courses."

Addy vividly remembers another part of his training that no longer exists, the outside obstetrics rotation. "We went into homes to deliver babies. Our patients were primarily poor, black women in West and South Dallas. But we also had some in the servants' quarters in Highland Park. It was quite an experience.

America was at war when Addy was in school and just about everyone enrolled was in a military program of some kind. "I don't know that anybody had to be in the military, but they paid our tuition and gave us a subsistence. All we had to do was show up for roll call each morning. There were some that were chronically tardy. I can still see them come running up, screeching to a

'We had to march some, too. You should see doctors march.

Oral quizzes "on everything" were also common. "I can remember one faculty member who asked questions just to get you out on a limb, and then he'd cut off the limb. The quizzes got pretty tough at

When you ask him about the physical changes between the campus in '43 and the campus today, Addy just laughs. "What campus? When Baylor left, we didn't really have one. We were spread out all over. The faculty made arrangements for us to meet at different places. We'd check a bulletin board in the old Parkland building to find out where to go next.'

But Addy says even the confusion over where to meet was better than what he and his classmates had been used to. "The old buildings were terrible. I can remember one lecture hall where the dogs were kept on the second floor. We'd meet for class on the first floor, and the fleas and lice would drop on us during lecture. Things weren't

Addy says if there are any similarities between his medical school years and medical school today, they probably rest in the nature of the students themselves. Having seen the 1983 Senior Film during a campus visit for the Southwestern Alumni reunion, he recalls his class's own theatrical endeavors. "The senior film reminded me of our student plays. They were also takeoffs on whatever was currently popular, our teachers and so on. They were a little raw in spots, but everybody seemed to enjoy them."

Fraternities were popular when he was in school and played a major role in the



students' social life. Although not so active as the fraternities of days gone by, the Phi Beta Pis do have a chapter at Southwestern. Their group is responsible for events like the annual Southwestern Chili Cook-Off.

"I was a Phi Beta; our fraternity probably made up more than half of the school. There were also Phi Chi's. Mostly these were people who'd done their premedical training at Baylor University in Waco. When the medical school moved, most of

their fraternity went too.

Back then we also had fraternity houses. They were essentially boarding houses, but we'd have big parties there on the weekends. Our old fraternity house was where the Baylor School of Nursing now stands.'

Flipping through his yearbook, remembering the faces of classmates and faculty members, Addy's memories made Southwestern's first year come back to life. His memories touched on good times, bad times and confusing times. "We made it through it all; we never doubted our school would be good. Most of us saw the changes as changes for the better. Looking back on it now, it is clear that they were.'

Southwestern Medical College's first diploma is Ervin Addy's personal chunk of history. And the Southwestern symbol daily grows stronger with each patient he treats in Cisco, Texas.



Anterless Deer Permits To Be Issued Oct. 27 At Courthouse

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits for Eastland County on Oct. 27 from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon and 1:00 - 5:00 p.m. in the Eastland Courthouse.

A map with the antlerless

deer permit issuance compartments and issuance rates will be posted in the county courthouse prior to the issuance date. To qualify for permits, a landowner must own or control acreage equal to at least one-half of the permit issuance rate of the compartment where the tract is located.

After opening of the hunting season, permits will only be available through Regional Offices located in Rockport, San Angelo,

Tyler, Waco and the State Office in Austin. Permits will not be issued by local department personnel.






