

The city's wastewater plant problems were compounded when in August of this year the Texas Attorney General's office advised the city of their intentions to file a lawsuit in 91st District Court against the city for violations of their wastewater discharge permit. The suit charged the city with "Numerous and repeated" violations of its permit, citing 120 specific violations dating back to 1976, but with documents on

ment plant, beginning in 1984, and completing by 1985. The city's engineers have estimated the cost of a new sewer plant to be \$875,000. Since \$300,000 has already been approved by the voters in 1982, the city is seeking approval in the November 19 election for obligating the city to the additional \$575,000 needed for the project, in view of the hoped-for grant no longer being a realistic possibility. The city still does plan to apply for a grant that would provide approximately one-half of the needed funds for the plant, but prospects for the grant have been described to the city as "slim to none". City officials pointed out that if the grant were by some means approved, then only approx-imately one-half of the \$575,000 would actually have

Actually, according to city officials, the low bids received were almost exactly the amount of the alreadyapproved funds, but the state requires a \$60,000 "contingency fund" on projects of this magnitude, which hopefully will never have to be used.

Another \$37,500 is needed for work on the old valves in the Lake Cisco dam, which had been unforseen in 1982. 'These additional funds will be necessary for us to have available in order to complete our new water sytem into one that will give Cisco a state-approved water supply," city spokesmen said.

The city council members have issued an "Open Letter" to the citizens of Cisco, urging them to attend the Town Hall Meeting, and also expressing complete unanimity in their collective belief that approval of the bond package is the only responsible action the city can take, in view of the court order. The letter appears elsewhere in this publica-

As most of you are aware, the City of Cisco is now under a court order to construct a new wastewater (sewerage) treatment plant. This court order, handed down in 91st District Court, is the result of a negotiated out-of-court settlement of a lawsuit which had been imminent. The lawsuit, originating with the Texas Department of Water Resources, was being prosecuted by the Attorney General's Office of the State of Texas. We were charged with numerous and repeated violations of our wastewater discharge permit, causing a hazard to the environment, with such violations being documented back to 1963. And repeated warnings had been given the city during the course of the past several years. The timing of the suit was very regrettable, as the city was finally in the process of seriously attempting to remedy the situation. Had the suit gone to court, it could have resulted in civil penalties (fines) against the city as high as \$120,000, as well as a court order to construct the new wastewater treatment plant.

Your mayor, city attorney, city manager, and two council members negotiated the out-of-court settlement. Please believe us when we state that the settlement reached was the best we could have possibly hoped to obtain. The fine we are having to pay, \$7000 plus \$318 interest, is very small compared to what it could well have been had it gone to court, not to mention legal costs. An additional \$7000 was probated, and we will not have to pay it if we construct the new wastewater treatment plant as stipulated in the court order.

In the April, 1982 bond election, voters of Cisco approved three issues--complete costs of a new 10" sewer outfall line to alleviate the overload on our sewer lines, complete costs of a new water filtration plant and substantial improvements to our water distribution system, and \$300,000 (approximately one-third of the estimated cost) towards a new wastewater treatment facility. At the time of the '82 election it was pointed out that this project would be dependent upon approval of an Environmental Protection Agency grant for the remainder of the cost of the wastewater project. Unfortunately, not long after the election, the grant program we planned to apply for was discontinued. At this time a smaller-scale grant program is in effect, but we have been advised that our chances of actually receiving a grant are "slim-to-none." Nevertheless, we are going ahead and applying, and if we are fortunate enough to be approved, we will not need to obligate the city for but approximately one-half of the funds proposed in the upcoming bond election. Again we must realistically emphasize, however, that our chances for the grant funds do not look good at this point.

The first project approved in 1982, the sewer outfall line, has been completed and is in use. Contracts have been awarded for the second project, the water filtration plant and water distribution system improvements. The approved funds were adequate for the first project. The approved funds were adequate for the water filtration/distribution projects except for a \$60,000 contingency fund required by the state plus some additional work needed on the old water valves in the dam. These two items are the reason for the \$100,000 water improvements issue on the November 19 election ballot. The other two issues on the ballot are for dividing the remaining cost of the wastewater treatment plant between ad valorem taxes and revenue from users of the sewer system, requiring a tax increase of approximately 10¢ per \$100 and \$2.00 increase in monthly sewer rates. The system of wastewater treatment to be funded by this bond issue is by far the most cost-effective to the city of any available system, not only in capital cost but in future operating costs.

You as citizens have been tremendously supportive of us as your city council. We want you to know that we have given hours and hours of careful study to these matters, over a considerable period of time. We feel that the only responsible action we can take is to urgently recommend to you the approval of the three issues in the November 19 election. We have no doubt but that the state means business in seeing to it that we have a safe, approved wastewater treatment facility. And we know that we need it. All seven of us on the council are completely in agreement in recommending your approval of the three issues to come before us on November 19.

We cordially invite you to attend the Town Hall Meeting at the Cisco High Auditorium on Tuesday evening, November 1, at which time these matters will be discussed in more detail, and your questions will be welcomed.





LUBBOCK-Farmers and ranchers in 96 West Texas counties can now purchase low-cost conifer seedlings, for use in planting windbreaks around their fields and farmsteads, thanks to stepped-up production by the Texas Forest Service's West Texas Nursery here.

In its fifth year of operation, the West Texas Nursery has increased its production to the point where it can offer seedlings to 27 additional counties for the first time, making a total of 96 Panhandle and other West Texas counties served.

According to Robert Fewin, TFS silviculturist at Lubbock, there are five species of conifers available for most of these counties for the 1983-84 planting season which ends in late March.

Now is the time to write for applications and make arrangements to pick up the 6 to 12 inch seedlings. They will be distributed at pick-up points in eight differecnt cities during February and ealry March.

Fewin said the seedlings are grown in individual cells, 30 cells to the Styrofoam container. A minimum order is 30 seedlings or one container, priced at \$30 per container (plus 4 percent state sales tax). They are sold by the container, or in multiples of 30. The containers are 12 inches wide by 14 inches long, by 8 inches deep, and several containers can be easily transported in the back seat of a car or pick-up cab.

The species available this year include: Austrian pine, ponderosa pine, Arizona cypress, Redcedar and Afghanistan pine.

Fewin said that two of these species would not be offered to the northernmost 20 counties in the Panhandle because of the cold

"Arizona cypress and Afganistan pine can't stand the cold weather as well as the other species," Fewin said, "and we have found that they don't survive well, especially in the first year or two after bing planted in the northermost counties."

West Texans interested in planting trees for homestead, field, feedlot or wildlife windbreak, should write for seedling applications: West Texas Nursery, Texas Forest Service, Rt. 3, Box 216, Lubbock, Texas 79401, or call (806)746-5801.

Seedlings produced by Texas Forest Service nurseries may not be used for landscaping ofr ornamental purposes. Seedlings will be sold to applicants on a first-come basis until the end of the 83-84 planting season, or until the supply is exhausted.

Because the containers are not designed for shipping, it will be necessary for the windbreak planters to drive to pickup points.

Deer hunting season is soon approaching. The leaves are gold and the early morning air is crisp. Clusters of men dressed in camouflage hats and jackets piled into pickup trucks and campers to celebrate an ageold ritual. It's hunting season again!

Delicious meals can be prepared from venison. Venison can be substituted in many dishes that call for beef. Venison is very nutritious and provides protein, iron, thiamin, riboflavin and niacin. Venison is generally low in fat and is lean meat. Most prople who say they

don't like the taste of venison have never had it prepared properly. Proper preparation is the whole secret of making wild game appealing. The quality of the meat is affected by the age, sex, manner in which the animal is killed and the way it is dresed, temperature and aging process after being killed. The male animal may have a more "gamey" flavor than female animals. Animals killed cleanly will be more tender than those killed after being wounded, excited or chased by hunter or dog.

Careful attention should be given to completely removing all muscles and fatty tissues because they can add a wild taste.

Cook big game as same al lean beef. The tender cuts such as the loin and rib can be pan fried or rotated. Round steak, meat from the

leg and the less tender cuts are best when cooked by moist heat - braising, stewing, or pot roast. Do not overcook big game

meat. Overcooked or too high a temperature will toughen venison. Use acid to tenderize. Vinegar, tomato sauce and French salad dressing are

good for tenderizing big game. Marinate the meat for 24 hours. The Eastland County Extension Service has two excellent publications that are free to the public. The bulletins are B-1388 Big Game Cooking Care and L-634 Field Dressing Big

Game. **RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:** With cooler weather, chili is simply delicious. Try our recipe for venison chili.

VENISON CHILI 2 pounds venison, cut into 1/2 inch cubes 1 pound ground beef 2 large red onions, chopped

2 (15 1/2 once) cans kidney beans, undrained 3 (8-ounce) cans tomato

sauce 1 (6-ounce) can tomato paste 1 cup water

3 to 4 tablespoons chili powder

Combine venison, ground beef, and onion in dutch oven: cook until meat is browned, stirring to crumble beef. Drain off pan drippings. Stir in remaining ingredients: cover and simmer 1 1/2 hours or until venison is tender; adding more water as needed.

Yeild: about 7 cups.

The Eastland County Pecan show is coming up soon. The show is scheduled for December 9 and 10. Now is the time to start saving pecans from the new crop and putting them back for the pecan show.

Anyone producing peacans in 1983 may enter the pecan show. An entry consists of 43 pecans of one variety and native pecans from any single native tree. All entries shoud be sacked and labled with the grower's name, address and variety of pecans. These should be selected from the best pecans, usually among the first to fall. Entries may be left at the County Extension Agent's office anytime the courthouse is open from now until 4:00 p.m. December 8. This will be the 31st An-

nual Eastland County Pecan Show. It is sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

While selecting pecans for the show keep in mind that they should represent the variety or induvidual seeling tree and be unifrom in size and shell color. Mixed samples - more than one

variety in an entry - are disqualified. You may wish to select the heaviest pecans by weighing individual nuts. This will eliminate poorly filled pecans, but certainly isn't an entry requirement.


A varietal entry may be composed of nuts from more than one tree. For example, if the grower has 10 Choctaw trees, each tree could contribute nuts to the grower's one Choctaw entry. However, an entry of natives of seedling should all come from the same tree on two natives or seedling trees are exactly alike. Nuts should be free of dust,

dirt, and shuck remnants. They should not be buffed or polished to alter the shape or color of the shell. Discolored shells and kernals may result from peeling pecans from the shucks too early. Pecans must be from the 1983 crop and are judged on

the basis of size (number per pound), appearance, and shell color. Kernel quality is also important and is based on the percent kernel (as relative to shell), color, general appearance, texture, and taste.



Wray Gibson's Book



By Viola Payne Some Eastland County residents will remember Wray Gison, EHS Class of 1930, as a tall young man

who used the by-line youngster, they say. "Edwin" with his columns The son of a local builder, for the school newspaper. He Horace Gibson, Edwin Wray Gibson became "the boy who an imaginative, high-spirited made good" in such places



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as a Kentucky college, and New York.

Although he spent many years in other lines of work, he did not lose his interest in creative writing. So people who didn't have a chance to meet him during his youth will enjoy getting to know him now - through his book "Collected Stories and Essays", published by Van-

tage Press, 1983. After retiring from a successful business career in New York City, Wray Gibson moved to Fredericksburg, Texas a few years ago. Then he took time to collect and arrange his varied stories, articles, and poems into book form. There is humorous

material in his book. metaphysical writing, light verse, political parables, stories dealing with space exploration, and factual articles and stories dealing with the author's boyhood in San Antonio and Eastland County. There is also a historical article on Ft. Griffin.

The boyhood memories -The San Antonio as well as the Eastland ones - are written with time-distilled clarity. Edwin Wray was born in Lubbock before that location became a town. Then his father moved the family to San Anotonio, where they lived for several years.

In 1916, the author remembers, his father ac-

down. The yard was full of half-wild cattle, coming in to spend the night. Dad told us to chase them, so we did. Bud (a brother) and I spooked them and chased the herd across the field and up into the woods. It was getting dark and I was lost in the woods, but Bud very confidently led the way out.

"Some farm woman who dreamed of a better life must have lived in the house at one time. The walls were papered with newspapers showing the latest women's fashions, including bustles and high-topped button shoes. I used to study the pic-

tures of beautiful women in beautiful clothes and wish I could read. The newspapers were very practical. They cut out cold drafts in winter.' This was only the beginn-

ing of the Eastland County adventures of the Gibson family. Besides managing the farms, Horace Gibson constructed buildings in Eastland - some of which are still standing and in good condition.

When the 1918 oil boom hit, he built the Dixie Hotel at 115 North Dixie. Tha family managed the establishment, furnishing meals with rooms. It was a very busy place.

When only a child Wray Gibson explored the cuntryside, finding some interesting things. Once he robbed a Ft. Griffin payroll. Wray Gibson did not stay in Eastian! County long after his High School graduation. He did attend Warner Memorial College for a year or two. Like many young men of the 1920's, he went out to explore a growing and industrially expanding country.

He spent some time in California, but soon enrolled in Berea College in Kentucky, where he graduated with a Degree in History. He had hoped this would prepare him for studies in law.

Instead, he went to New York City, where he began

work as a die-maker. He married a young lady from the city, and brought up his family in that vicinity. He did not leave the northeast until after the death of his wife.

"The choice of Fredericksburg as a place to live was a good one," Gibson said during a recent visit in Eastland. "It's a friendly town - historic and interesting and a nice place.

It's good to be back in Texas. 'But I like to come back to Eastland too, back to see friends, and go down streets I used to know."

"My book? It's a personal thing, really. it covers a lot of things I have thought about, and things I enjoy remembering. I hope others will enjoy it too." Readers of the book will be

glad they joined him on these mental journeys.



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ORDINANCE NO. 0-83-18 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS ESTABLISHING WATER. SEWER, AND SANITA-TION RATES: ESTABLISHING A SUR-CHARGE FOR OUT OF USERS: TOWN ESTABLISHING WATER AND SEWER TAP FEES: PROHIBITING METER TAMPERING AND PRO-VIDING A PENALTY:. **PROHIBITING DUAL CON-**NECTIONS ESTABLISHING A DELIN-QUENT AND DISCONTI-NUANCE OF SERVICE CHARGE: REPEALING ALL CONFLICTING OR-DINANCES: AND ESTABLISHING AN EF-

WHEREAS, It is deemed necessary to promulgate rules and regulations to provide water, sewer and sanitation services to all citizens of the City of Cisco; and,

FECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, it is necessary to prescribe adequate rates for the provision of these utility services and establish rules for the timely and proper collection of revenues for said services; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS: SECTION I: Water Ser-



b. All other water customers having a meter size larger than the standard residential meter (5/8 to 3/4 inch) shall require a deposit based on meter size to be paid in advance to the City as follows:





Lions Hear About Leader Dog Center

The Leader Dog program that has provided more than 6,000 blind persons with help in attaining self-sufficiency was explained by Vincent Syracuse of Rochester, Michigan, in a talk at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday noon at the Colony Restaurant.

Mr. Syracuse and his German Shepherd Leader Dog Friday were guests of Archie Chamness, District 2-El Governor, who was making his official visit to the Local Club. The Leader Dog program has been presented throughout the district to Lions Clubs, Mr. Chamness reported.

In the program, Lions were told that the Rochester non-profit organization carries on a continuing training program to make dogs ready for a life-long association with a blind person. They use Sheperds. German Labradors and Golden Retrievers, starting them when they are puppies.

When a blind person is accepted for a dog, he or she dog and the blind person leave for the latter's home. Prior to "meeting his master," the dog goes through an extensive fivemonth training period.

"Leader dogs for the blind is supported by contributions from the public, Lions Clubs, sororities and various agencies," Mr. Chamness said. "There is no charge for a Leader Dog or any part of the four week training program, and it costs the school about \$6,000 for each team." Mr. Chamness said he

In his report to the Council, City Manager Moore said that Cisco's application for street paving under a federal block grant program was assigned a priority too low for consideration this year. Of 21 applications submitted in this region, Cisco was given a No. 17 priority and only three were approved for funds, Mr. Moore said.
