Thanksgiving Service Planned Sunday Night

Recently we informed you of a potential pollution problem at Ringland Lake. We have been informed of the following findings. "The excessive salt water pollution was found in the tank battery firewall. Salt water, although dried up at the time of inspection, had flowed ap-

proximately 1/4 mile from the tank battery to approximately 50 yards from the Ringland Lake.

The operator, is directed to clean and cover the pollution at the tank battery. The operator is further advised that draining salt water, if sufficiently documented, could result in fines up to \$10,000 per day.

We would like to thank everyone for their help in preserving our natural resources. Without concerned citizens preservation is difficult.

Sunday morning we shall hold our final tournament of the year. This should prove to be an excellent fishing trip, with most area lakes producing some fine fish. Most lakes in our area are low, so let all, whether pleasure fishing or in competition watch for those boating hazards and bundle up.

The cold front that swept into Eastland County last week reminded us that winter is not far away. It's a time when fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

With the arrival of fall and winter, there's often a tendency to forget our peach and plum trees that served us so well last summer.

Applying a copper fungicide now can stop or reduce three of the six diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is now with a copper containing fungicide such as Kocide 101.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Copper is a metal and may cause defoliation, but leaves are falling anyway at this time.

Spray when about 70 percent of the leaves have fallen from the tree. Spraying too early will cause leaf shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later.

Bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide. But again it's important to spray at the right time to prevent foliage burn.

Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular

spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the trunk and main limbs.

The fall spray in Eastland County is most often applied from November 12 to December 1. Application time will vary with the season so you should check your fruit trees closely. Fall spraying is important to the health and production of fruit trees because there's no other time when 50 percent of peach and plum tree diseases can be controlled with one spray.

Homeowners need to be cautious as to where they get their firewood for the coming winter season.

Firewood infected with oak wilt can spread the disease to oak trees in your yard.

Oak wilt disease is common in many areas of Texas, and the fungus which causes it can be transported in firewood. Wood-boring insects may also be present that later emerge and carry disease-causing spores to nearby trees.

While it's best to get firewood from areas not having oak wilt, it's not always possible to know the source. So we recommend stacking firewood away from oak trees and covering the stack with clear plastic, sealed around the edges. This will prevent the emergence of wood-boring insects which can spread the disease.

It is also best to use firewood during the current winter season. Holding firewood over through a warm season allows the emergence of insects that carry disease-causing spores.

Christmas is right around the corner which means many individuals will be seeking employment for extra money. Preparing oneself for a job interview is the first consideration to be made before getting the job. Hard work, effort and ability are critical factors in success, but a person has to get the job first before he can become successful. Success, then starts when a person applies for a job.

The interview game consists of two major rules: how well you cope with the verbal techniques, and how well you maneuver the non-verbal plays.

STEP I. Grooming, poise, promptness and a resume (neat and correctly filled out) are all door openers to second interviews.

STEP II. The day before an interview call and confirm the time, place and the name of the person conducting the interview.

STEP III. Some knowledge about the company, the product or services provided by the organization your interviewing with sells you. You're letting it be known that you're interested enough to do your homework.

If you're nervous about going to interview, accept the fact that (STEP IV.) you're perfectly normal. Remember, though, your task is still to sell yourself and land the job. Some simple pointers are:

- Dry your sweaty palms before you enter and have to shake hands.
- Don't sit down before you're invited to do so - let the interviewer stay in charge.
- When asked about hobbies or leisure activities mention the active ones first - to show you're a doer.
- For extra plusses don't smoke or chew gum even if you're asked.
- Praise your former co-workers and employer - don't criticize.
- Make your resume fit the job.

Go-getters play power games and take them seriously. Any skilled player will learn his plays with the intention of playing a winning game.

Smokeout Chairman Named

To emphasize another kind of beauty - the beauty of good health - the American Cancer Society (ACS) announced today that Texas businesswoman Mary Kay Ash of Dallas will serve as honorary chairman of the 1983 Great American Smokeout in Texas.

Known throughout the country for the cosmetics which bear her name, Ms. Ash accepted the position because of the event's positive, good-natured theme.

The Smokeout is sponsored by the ACS nationwide to encourage smokers to give up their cigarettes for just one day - November 17 - if only to prove to themselves they can.

"I can think of few things that would be more beautiful than for a smoker to give up cigarettes...or for a friend to help someone give them up - whether it's for one day or a lifetime," said Ms. Ash. "Texas has volunteers all over the state promoting this as a day for the smoker and I like that."

A survey conducted by the Gallup organization last year (the Smokeout is now in its seventh year) indicated more than 19 million Americans tried to quit for the day. Almost five million made it the whole day and 2.3 million were still not smoking one to 11 days later.

According to Texas ACS volunteers planning the Smokeout, Ms. Ash's involvement is particularly timely.

"She is certainly one of the best-known, most admired women in this state and frankly, women smokers are a target audience for us," said Penny Reeves of Austin, who is the volunteer spearheading the campaign in Texas.

The ACS predicts by the end of the decade lung cancer will surpass breast cancer as the number one cancer killer among women. If a woman smokes, her chances of developing lung cancer are five times greater than that of a nonsmoking woman.

"With Mary Kay Ash as our honorary chairman, we hope to draw attention to the unfortunate truth that lung cancer is not just a male disease," said Reeves.

Another feature of this year's Smokeout is an "Adopt-A-Smoker" theme whereby nonsmokers adopt their smoker friends and family members for the day offering them support and encouragement. To help promote this concept, which originated in Society's Maryland Division, "adoption" papers are available.

Most Texas communities are participating in the event in various ways - from programs for smokers termed "FreshStart", and led by volunteer ex-smokers, are also being sponsored by the ACS in communities statewide.

All Texas smokers are encouraged to join in the fun. They may contact their local ACS volunteers office for tips on quitting, support materials or information on locally planned Smokeout events.

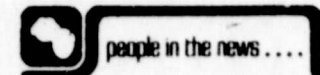
Intermediate Choirs Plan Musical Tues.

About 35 mm Cameras...

Q: I'm an amateur picture-taker looking around for a new camera. The last camera I purchased was a Yashica, and I bought it nearly 20 years ago. The camera is a rangefinder type, 35 mm, and it's developed some shutter problems which would be too costly to have repaired. I thought I would go out and purchase another rangefinder, thinking they were smaller and less expensive than a 35 mm single-lens reflex camera, but I was surprised when I went out shopping to find many SLRs to be nearly as small and cheap as many rangefinders. In fact, some rangefinders with a lot of automated features actually cost more than a few SLRs. Now I'm confused. What, besides cost and size, are the differences between rangefinder and SLR cameras? What other considerations should I make before deciding on a camera to buy?

A: The 35 mm rangefinder camera was made to accept 35 mm motion picture film in order to check out lighting on movie sets in the early days of filmmaking. It was far less expensive back then to develop a few frames from a small still camera than to process the entire day's rushes only to find the lighting was all wrong and the entire day had to be re-shot. In time, still photographers began purchasing these compact cameras, and that encouraged manufacturers to market them. The advantages of early rangefinder cameras were that they were comparatively small and light, easy to use, and quiet in operation...many of the same advantages which keep photographers purchasing them to this day.

Not too long after the appearance of rangefinders, single-lens reflex cameras came into use. These were much larger, bulkier, and noisier than their rangefinder cousins, but they had the advantage of being ideally suited to accept interchangeable lenses, since the photographer views through the same lens used to make the exposure. The rangefinder camera, on the other hand, features two lenses—a taking lens for making the exposure on film and a viewing lens, or viewfinder window, for framing and focusing. Since changing the camera's perspective of the subject by changing the taking lens requires a similar change in the viewfinder, interchangeability of lenses on rangefinder cameras is a costly and awkward proposition at best.

Another problem with rangefinder cameras has to do with parallax. That's the difference between the image seen through the viewfinder and that which is recorded on film due to the different posi-

tions of the viewfinder cameras which can focus closer than three feet nearly impossible. Since single-lens reflex cameras aren't troubled by parallax, focusing down to eight or nine inches with a normal lens—and right on down to the front element of a closeup lens or lens with bellows—is no problem. This makes the SLR an ideal camera for nature, macro, and micro photographers.

Times have changed since you bought your Yashica rangefinder camera. Although many journalists still prefer the quick, quiet operation of a rangefinder, the wide availability of camera systems available to SLR users—bellows, motor winders and drivers, lenses, intervalometers, filters, etc.—has made the single-lens reflex the best selling camera type in the world today. Undoubtedly, some modern 35 mm SLRs are as easy to operate as the simplest rangefinders. A few are nearly as compact and light, and several are less expensive than the average rangefinder.

In the end, it all boils down to what you want in a camera and with what you feel most comfortable. Check out your options carefully before making a decision, and then enjoy, enjoy!

Q: I was recently given a Rapid Omega camera which I believe is the Model 100, as this number is in large figures immediately below the viewfinder window. My son, who gave me the camera, lost all the literature for it. The camera needs cleaning and some repair. Do you know the address of an authorized repair station or dealer in my area? When I had work done on my Pentax, I sent it to such a station in Illinois, so sending it away is no problem. I want to be sure of the capability of the people doing the work.

A: Although nearly any qualified independent repair technician should be able to give your Rapid Omega the care it needs, if you'd rather go to an authorized repair center with your camera, write for information about the center nearest you to Rapid Omega Division, Berkey Marketing Companies, Inc., 25-20 Brooklyn-Queens Expressway West, Woodside, New York 11377. Then, if you do send the camera out for repairs, package it carefully in a sturdy carton cushioned with packing material or wadded newspaper. Enclose a note with your name and return address, and explain briefly what the problem is. Also, don't hesitate to ask for a written estimate of repair costs before authorizing work to be done. In that way, you won't be shocked at an overly high repair bill. Be sure to seal the package with nylon packing tape and ship it, insured, to the repair center.

Hay Ammoniation Will Be Discussed

Hay ammoniation will be demonstrated and discussed by County Extension Agent De Gordon Tuesday night, November 15, at Cisco Junior College agriculture building.
 Herman Glueck, instructor of agriculture, says the department is sponsoring the program to show livestock producers how to ammoniate hay. The program begins at 7:00 p.m.
 There is currently a lot of interest in hay ammoniation, a process of treating hay with anhydrous ammonia. Research studies have shown that the treatment will increase hay protein level, digestibility and intake and thereby boost animal performance.

The agent will demonstrate the process using hay owned by a local producer and will discuss the precautions to take while applying the anhydrous ammonia.
 Treating hay with ammonia at the rate of 3 percent of the weight of the hay has increased crude protein values from 4 to 14 percent, improved digestibility by 10 to 15 percent, and increased forage intake 15 to 20 percent. All this has boosted livestock performance at a cost of about \$6.50 to \$7 per ton of hay.
 Everyone interested in learning more about hay ammoniation is invited to the program.

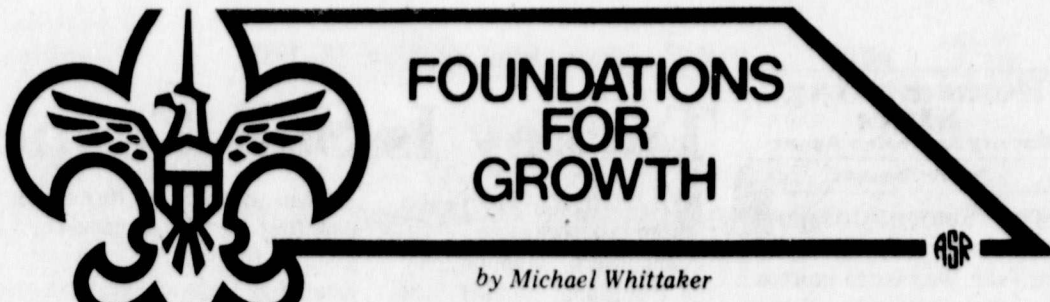

It's a truth in today's society that parents don't get to spend as much time with their children as both would want.

The Boy Scouts of America has looked at the problem and thinks it has come up with at least a partial solution — the Tiger Cub program.

It's for seven-year old boys and an adult. It can be one of the child's parents, an aunt, uncle or perhaps just a family friend.

The idea is simple: to get an adult and child to interact with others in the same situation. About eight to 12 pairs join together for the year-long program.

The key to the whole thing is the boy, his adult partner and other similar groups to do "fun" activities. They can run the gamut from visiting a zoo as a group or perhaps taking a tour of the local fire house.

"We supply a list of possible activities," W. Boyd Giles said. He is in charge of the national Tiger Cub program, operating out of the Boy Scout national headquarters in Irving, Texas.

"We started on a low scale last fall," Giles said "and the program has really

taken off. We have close to 90,000 boys in the program. You can double the number with the adults."

Although similar to the Cub Scout program in some

standing adult and other kids of their own age," Giles said.

How did the program come about?

The Boy Scouts of America did a series of research projects into the needs of the nation's youth and found that with the number of single parent homes and homes where both parents have to work that young children felt they were being "ignored" by adults.

"It can be traumatic being a seven-year-old in today's society," Giles the father of six, said. "We devised Tiger Cubs to work on this problem."

"Interaction is the key to its success. Getting the boy and the adult out into a friendly society such as a zoo can be a learning experience for both the young and the grownup."

Giles suggests that if you are interested in finding out more about the Tiger Cub program call the local council of the Boy Scouts of America. The number and address is located in the telephone white pages.

"The Tiger Cub program started off with a meow but it is turning out to be a roaring success," Giles laughed.

ways, Giles said the two groups usually only meet twice. "In a way," he said, "it is an introduction, but a boy has to wait until he is eight years-old before getting into Cub Scouts."

"Tiger Cubs is much more unstructured." Unlike Cub Scouts, for instance, the only uniform is a tee-shirt, with an iron-on decal showing a tiger cub.

Both the boy and the adult partner wear the shirt. "It's an identity thing. Kids of that age have a crying need to belong with an under-

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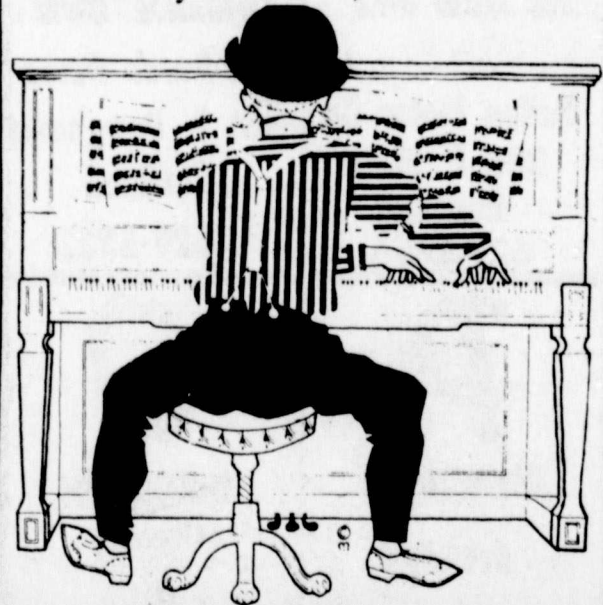

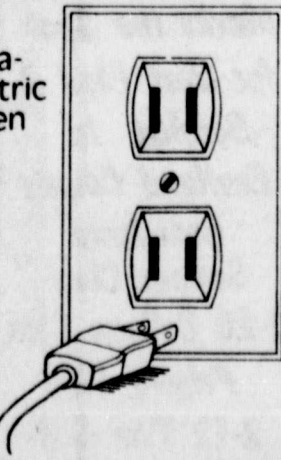

Turkey Is Still Economical

COLLEGE STATION—It's time to talk turkey. Consumers shopping for the traditional holiday bird will be pleased to find that it's just as economical as last year, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service poultry specialist.

Retail prices will be about the same, or only slightly higher than last year, says Dr. David Mellor.

A larger than usual red meat supply is helping to keep prices stable, says Mellor, in spite of increased feed costs for producers and a reduction in the excessive storage stocks of turkey from last year.

Shoppers will find plenty of turkey in the stores, but prices will vary significantly between different types of turkey products -- plain whole turkey, self-basted store brands and self-basted national brands, says the poultry specialist.

Economy and tradition aren't the only reason that the average American consumes about 11 pounds of turkey per year. "Turkey is one of the best high-nutrition, low-calorie foods around," says Dr. Dymphy Cooksey, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Extension Service.

Roasted dark turkey meat contains 30 percent protein, 8.3 percent fat and 203 calories for a 100-gram serving, which is just under a quarter-pound. Roasted light meat contains 32.9 percent fat and only 176 calories per serving.

When shopping for turkey, look first for white, circular USDA inspection mark located on the package, says Cooksey. This mark assures that the processing was done under sanitary conditions.

The designation of a grade on turkeys is not mandatory, but a high percentage do have a USDA grade mark, she says.

Most turkeys sold at retail are Grade A turkeys. Some stores also have grade B turkeys and a few may package grade C turkeys. "Don't hesitate to buy a grade B or C turkey when they are available," advises Cooksey. "The price will be lower, and the factor that caused the lower grade, such as a skin tear, has nothing to do with the wholesomeness of the bird."

Since tenderness of the meat is determined by the age of the bird, and not the grade, size or sex, look for the words "young" or "fryer-roaster," to get a

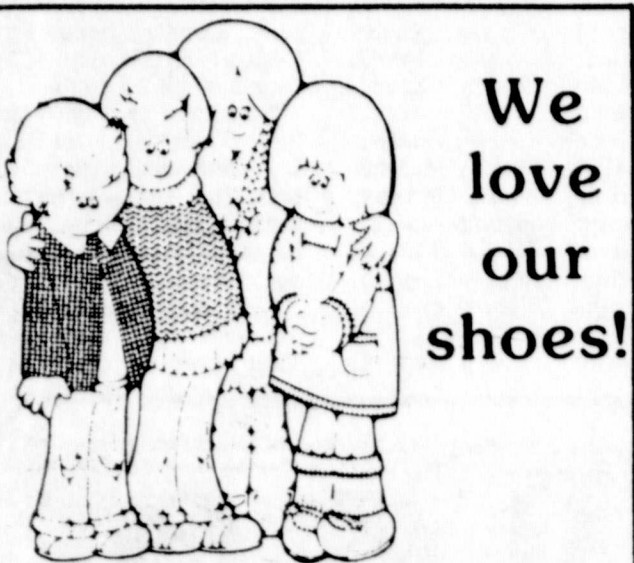
tender bird, says Cooksey.

Plan on buying a turkey big enough to supply three-fourths pound per person, or one pound if you want leftovers.

Smaller families and singles can enjoy holiday turkey without having to purchase more than they can eat, says Cooksey, by shopping for a turkey half.

Since turkey leftovers can be frozen in any high-quality moisture and vapor-proof material for up to a year without losing quality, planned leftovers make good food management for large or small families, says the home economist.

Dieters should select fresh-dressed or frozen plain turkey. Pre-basted frozen turkeys have more calories and usually cost more. Those on salt-restricted diets should also avoid pre-basted or processed turkey, since salt is added to preserve the meat and enhance flavor, cautions the specialist.

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City Sales Tax Received Early

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent city sales tax rebate checks a full week early because many taxpayers paid by the 20th of last month—all taxpayers will be required to do this month.

"We're sending these checks early because 134,000 Texas taxpayers paid before the deadline," Bullock said. "This kind of cooperation among taxpayers is helping us avoid new and higher

taxes. It's obvious this change will help local governments put these tax revenues to work faster in their cities."

Starting in November, all taxpayers will be required to file by the 20th of the month instead of by the last day of the month.

The earlier deadline set by the Legislature will bring in \$500 million more for the current state budget without a tax increase.

Bullock said this month's early payments "show that Texas merchants have accepted this change in the same spirit it was suggested—to save us from a tax increase." Bullock's office has been working with trade and professional organizations to inform taxpayers of the change.

Cisco received the largest check in Eastland County,

followed closely by Eastland.

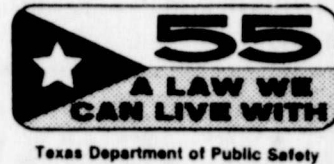
Cisco's check totaled \$30,560.76, bringing the year's total to \$186,340.01. Eastland's check was for \$30,043.41 for a total of \$200,877.01 for 1983.

Ranger's check was for \$16,352.71 for a 1983 total of \$105,791.48. Gorman received a check for \$4,876.10, bringing a total of \$26,564.16 this year; and Rising Star's check was for \$3,989.77 for a year's total of \$19,495.26.

For these reasons I urge all citizens to go to the polls on November 19 and vote for all three issues on the ballot.

They must have voters' approval in order to get financing, and the interest rate that is currently available through state-supported financing is just over 8 percent, a very attractive rate in today's market.

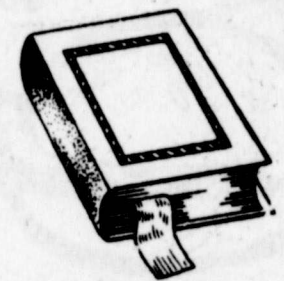

THE ITEM IN this column the other day about paying \$1.84 to Lone Star Gas Co. for "federally mandated conservation program expense recovery" was really sort of a pot shot at the government's Department of Energy - not at Lone Star Gas. The DOE's assorted rules and regulations has probably caused LSG to add a whole department of employees to try to comply with same.

What is more, the \$1.84 on our bill was for the past couple of years, and the next time your bill has an "expense recovery" charge it will probably be between 50 and 60 cents, reports Mr. Wayne West, local LSG manager. 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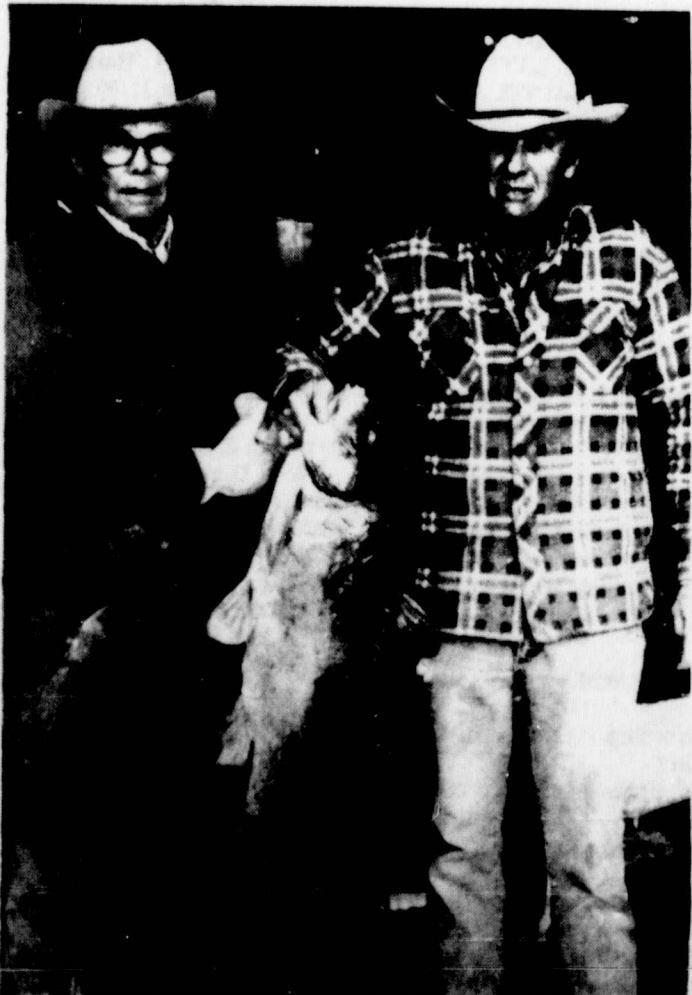
