Cisco Voters Were To Cast **Ballots On Bond Election**

Cisco, Texas 76437

The polls were to be open at the Corral Room of Hotel Laguna from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 19, for citizens of Cisco to ballot on propositions to issue bonds designed to complete financing waste-water treatment facilities and water im-

provements. M.L. Bailey, presiding judge, and Margaret Torres, alternate judge, were in charge of the election. Officials predicted that some 1,200 persons would cast ballots.

The official ballot, a copy of which appears elsewhere, has three propositions for voters to mark with "yes" or

'no" votes, as follows: Proposition 1 - The issuance of \$100,000 Sewer System Combination Tax and Revenue Certificates of Obligation.

Proposition 2 - The issuance of \$475,000 Sewer System Tax Bonds. Proposition 3 - The issuance of \$100,000 Water

System Revenue Bonds The first two propositions were designed to complete financing for a new wastewater facility. Part of the financing was arranged in a 1982 election. Elimination of a government grant pro-

"If the November 19 issue does not pass, the council will be placed in a position of standing in contempt of court," the City Council said in a statement. "If we don't come up with a satisfactory plan for constructing a new sewer plant, the state through the court can step

Predators Remain

Prairie wolves, more commonly known as coyotes, and an occasional member of a larger species continue to prowl the rural areas of Eastland County as they have the last few years and have been seen at the edge of cities and other heavier

populated areas. They have yet to establish themselves as a danger to humans here in Texas as they have in California where there has been cases of coyotes brutally attacking young children.

The wolves here are com-

monly referred to as predators however, since they have mulitplied beyond their natural food supply and often kill and eat livestock and poultry.

The result is that the ranchers and farmers of Texas, who have lost millions of dollars to the animals, show them much less favor than the so called environmentalists, which have lobbied the government for laws which have resulted in the over-population.

For the average American who is not raising livestock or poultry, the most obvious effect is the higher prices he is forced to pay for food and clothes along with the resulting weaker economy and lower standard of living for his family.

As winter approaches, wolves are inclined to hunt in packs and sometimes the packs are surprisintly large and bold even here.

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

The John Blair Report

County Extension Agent

In l'exas, 4-H volunteer leaders "link" young people with programs-and efforts with success.

4-H leaders are asked to do strong things - to volunteer and to lead youth in learning, says John Blair, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Before joining 4-H programs, volunteer leaders must pass two tests: they should like young people and they must be genuinely interested in them.

In Texas today, some 22,000 4-H volunteer leaders have passed those tests. Still, Texas 4-H programs need more volunteer leaders. Choices of programs to lead are limitless, as are leader styles, schedules and situations.

Leaders tailor their own programs to a great extent, notes John Blair. Today's 4-H clubs come in every size and arrangement - with needs to fit any leader's talents, time and skills. Some larger clubs require several leaders and tasks are divided according to leader performances. Other 4-H clubs have specialinterest leaders, while some clubs need resource people who can share expertise in certain subjects.

Generally, leaders start off choosing one of three types of jobs: organization, project work or activity work.

ORGANIZATIONAL LEADER - This leader works with other leaders to coordinate a club's program, enroll members, assist in the overall club program and counsel officers in their jobs.

PROJECT LEADER . This leader works in a project area, guiding members in a project, such as foods, pet care, woodworking or some 50 other 4-H projects. Project leaders help members improve their skills and increase their knowledge and interests.

ACTIVITY LEADER -This leader joins club members in tours, safety talks, games, demonstrations and other activities dictated by members' interests. Also, an activity leader can serve as a liaison person between the club and the community - on safety campaigns, health programs, special-events window displays, fair exhibits and other community projects.

Resource persons are also wanted - and needed. For people who feel their special talents are centered in one area, servine as a resource person can make a great impact in a special way.

Resource persons can share a special interest or a hobbby with one club or many clubs in their county, or they can work on special events such as parades or community-service projects. Anyone interested in serv-

ing as a 4-H volunteer leader should contact the County Extension Office.





Oil Income Report Given To Regents

Cisco Junior College has received a total of \$24,201 in revenue from oil well development on the campus, President Norman Wallace told the board of regents at their monthly meeting Monday night.

The income included \$10.479 from leasing the campus, \$3,500 in surface damages for drilling locations and a tank battery, \$5,739 in royalty for July and August, and \$4,482 in royalty for September. Dr. Wallace said the royalty income was from the first of two wells that have been drilled. Royalty income from the second well is due to start soon, he added.

The board has decided that oil income will go into a special fund for investment in certificates of deposit or security that pay good interest. Ninety per cent of the interest income will be used for improvements with 10 per cent going back into the savings program.

In other action, the board accepted a low bid of \$35,622 to purchase 12 microcomputers for use in the computer science program. These new machines were bought to upgrade the department's facilities, Dr. Wallace explained. He added that within 18 months, the board hopes to purchase additional equipment to replace older machines now

The board approved spending 19,964 to employ an airconditining specialist and buy equipment to add a course in air-conditioning maintenance to the vocational school courses at the Abilene campus, Dr. Wallace said.

The Abilene maintenance educational program has been in operation for several years and the class in airconditioning is being added by popular demand, the president said.







A long time dream was realized Sunday by Eastland resident Bill Hudgins, he got to go to church.

Going to church is something that some people do every Sunday or an occasional Sunday and take for granted while many neglect or refuse to go at all, so why was it a dream for Mr. Hudgings?

A victim of severe circulatory porblems, Mr. Hudgins has lost both of his legs, has had several strokes, and has cancer.

In his early adult life, Mr. Hudgins was a career marine, much of the time a six foot two inch, 230 lb. first sergeant who saw combat



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

LOUIS TINDALL

On Horses, In Air, A Legend In His Time

A recent article in an area newspaper about the late Louis Tindall and his family brought back a lot of memories to Eastland peo-

It told of the famous performances during the 1930's by Tindall, a World Champion trick rider and roper, his wife Velda, daughter Garlene, and niece Gloria.

Louis, born in Baird in 1903, came to Eastland with his family when he was 4 months old. He left the area in his late 'teens, but his father Jack and brother Pete stayed on. They, and a number of Tindalls, including Lewis, are buried in the Eastland cemetary.

Mrs. Alvin (Dee) Woods is the only person now living in Eastland who was closely related to this pioneer family. Dee Woods was married to the late Pete Tindall. She recalls that Pete was the only one of the four of Jack Tindall sons who lived out a normal lifespan.

Of the other three, Charles drowned at age 19, Jack Jr. died as the result of an accident, and Louis was shot in Ft. Worth at age 42.

Louis managed to cram a lot of experiences into his years while they lasted. A handsome, high-spirited individual, he lived with an almost reckless bravado. He seemed defiant of the fact that he had hemophelia - a condition which can induce severe bleeding. The chances he took are legen-

He learned to ride in the Tindall stables in Eastland when quite young, and when he was old enough went out to see what he could do with this skill.

The girl he married, Velda, was an accomplished horsewoman, and they worked up a number of trick riding acts. So by the 1930's Louis Tindall was traveling across the country in a Packard touring car with two ponies, a daughter and she wasn't booked on a performing tour of her own, traveled in a separate car

horse In 1936, Garlene, 4, was named World Champion Juvenile Cowgirl at Madison Square Garden, New York. Garlene and Gloria were billed as "The Tindall Sisters", and their tricks were spectacular.

But no one has ever been able to duplicate what Louis Tindall did in areans from Cheyenne to Ft. Worth, San Francisco to New York. He would stand Roman style atop two horses as they jumped his Packard. He would go off the rear end of a galloping horse and come back to the animal's belly through the rear legs. Then Velda and the girls would come on to rope and trick

"Will Rogers called my dad 'Peck's Bad Boy! 'cause he was doing so many things on a horse nobody else did,' Garlene says.

The exploits of Louis Tindall were not confined to the Rodeo arena. When World War II broke out he wanted to join the Air Force.

When informed he was too old, he reacted in disgust and took flying lessons on his own. Before long he could handle a plane quite easily.

One day he flew to Eastland and parked his plane at the airport, which was little more than a dirt runway in those days.

Soon he persuaded his brother Pete to go for a ride, and they crawled in the plane and began to circle the

Right over the courthouse the plane began to sputter - it was out of gas!

Louis, reacting cooly, refused to impale himself on the top floor of this building. He hung to the controls, and even with his limited experience he managed to glide the craft right back out to the airport. There he coasted down to a gentle landing, then leaped out to find what had gone wrong.

After investigation he decided that his gas had been stolen - siphoned out of the plane. He even learned who had done it, and rounded them up and drug them down to the courthouse.

But-by the time their hearing came up, Louis had cooled down and declined to press charges.

His life took various turns in the next year or so. He and Velda divorced, and the family act split up. Louis remarried in Ft. Worth, and shortly after that was killed by a gunshot wound.

Life went on for Velda Garlene and Gloria, but it was never quite the same. Garlene had polio in 1946 and tubercolosis a few years later, so quit the life of a

traveling performer. She showed horses for the King Ranch for 10 years after

Drilling Bits

Pumping 35 barrels of oil and 200,000 CF gas per day on open choke, a new producer has been completed in Eastland County's R.E.B. Field seven miles northwest of Eastland.

Snow Oil Co. of Fort Worth is the operator.

Designated as the No. 2 Castleberry-West, the well bottomed at 3,910-ft. total depth and will produce from a set of Marble Falls Formation perforations, 3,520 to 3,542 feet into the wellbore.

Location is in a 168-acre lease block in the H&TCRR Survey Sec., 36 blk. 4.

Eastland-based AWS Petroleum Co. has filed initial production data for a newly completed well in Eastland County's East Flatwood Field.

Designated as the NO. 1 lasater, it pumped oil at the rate of 16 barrels per day, with PSI tubing pressure on gauge. The well was drilled to 1,555-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Gardner Formation 1,122 to 1,126 feet.

The operation is in an 80-acre drilling unit in the S.J. Robinson Survey A-419, five miles southeast of Eastland.

Two new gas wells with potential for a combined 1,000,000 CFD have been completed in Stephens County's Billy Bob Field by Bob J. Willimas of Graham three miles south of Wayland.

The wells are designated as the no. 1 and No. 2 Ledbetter. They made 658,000 and 344,000 CF per day, respectively. They were issued a combined open flow rating
