Lot of Folks Work For This County

About 50 area leaders involved with community services, health care, education and conservation met for an Agency Awareness Information Day Program at K-Bob's Steak House, Eastland on Nov. 30. A luncheon was served prior to the noon meeting.

The Eastland County Extension Service sponsored the event, stating that the purpose of the Program was for agencies and others who make referrals to become more knowledgeable of each agencies mission and purpose.

Conty agents present were DeMarquis Gordon, Janet Thomas, John Blair and Faith Ballard. County officials Judge Scott Bailey and Commissioner Richard Robinson, Precinct 1 were in attendance and seated at head tables.

A wide range of information was given by various speakers during a two hour progam. Dorothy Underwood of Ranger, Chairman of the Program Builders Committee of the Extension Service, began the program by welcoming the group.

She remarked that the types of services available make a better and more prosperous county for all of us. Sherry Watson of Brownwood, Director of the Texas Employment Commission for this area, spoke

on the Unemployment Insurance, job placement and other services offered by the agency. The Employment Com-

mission meets periodically in the Eastland County Courthouse. The next meeting will be Dec. 8. Watson mentioned that the labor force of

Eastland County is 8,640 with 8,149 presently working. Faye Grant of Abilene, head of the area Social Security office, outlined services available to Eastland County from the agency. She suggested that most of this business could be transacted by phone, by mail, or by meeting with Social Security workers who come into five of the county towns.

The S.O.S. (Special personal services) of the Eastland National Rank Sunday, December 4, 1983

were explained by Inez Bourdeau of Eastland, bank official. These services aid persons with health or personal problems.

The Eastland County Red Cross, explained Roy Cartee of Cisco, Director, also deals in problems, and seeks to prevent them in various ways. He mentioned aid to servicemen and CRP classes as some of the current involvements

Director Ruth Cartee of Cisco, Eastland and Rising Star Senior Centers, and Mary Faircloth, Ranger, Director of the Ranger and Gorman Center, told of the projects and programs which make life easier for the Seniors. Listed were meals, recreation, transportation and other services.

Joe Housson, Eastland Director of the Home Nursing and Medical Services of the Eastland County Department of Human Resources. spoke and introduced other workers present from the Department. They were Alice Pritchard, Eastland, Child Protection Services. and Maria Duncan, Eastland, Services to Aged and Disabled. Housson outlined ways in which persons of all ages may obtain help from this Department. The Texas Department of Health, Region 4, was represented by the Region Director, Arleen Dicranian, R.N. of Abilene. She explained that this agency reaches across 44 counties and has six local Departments, including the one in Eastland. through his office.

The two Home Health Care Services, Girling and Outreach Home Health of Midwest Texas, had spokesmen to explain the various types of help available for homebound people. Daniel B. Dickson, Abilene, Chaplain for Girling, also described how he tries to meet the spiritual needs of the ill or handicapped. Jackie Tucker, R.N., of Carbon, Director of Outreach, told of the unique services offered by this agency. She introduced an assistant, Joyca Speedka of

Breckenridge. Director Dennis Noska of the Eastland MHMR Center spoke on the mental health services available to citizens of all ages. Idella Taylor of Cisco, Director of the Berta Hardin Johnson Workshop, also attended from this agen-CY.

Bruce Leland of Abilene, Director of the Texas Predatory Animal Control Services, spoke of work in the 30 counties his department covers. Continuing with material of special interest to farmers and ranchers, Jack Phillips of the Farmers Home Administration in Eastland outlined the types of loans available

The Green Thumb Inc. program is funded by the

Texas Farmer's Union, but furnishes workers for a large scope of programs. Dianne Parrish, area supervisor of Waco, spoke. John Willingham of Waco was also present.


Central Texas Opportunities Inc. had several department heads in attendance. Laquita Lane of Eastland spoke for the group explaining the varied programs offered for low in-
