IT'S YOUR MONEY

UNEMPLOYMENT IN-COME MAY BE TAXABLE. THE IRS SAYS

Taxpayers who received unemployment compensation in 1983 may be required to include some or all of that money as income on their federal income tax return. the Internal Revenue Ser-

vice says. Generally, this applies if the total adjusted gross income, including enemployment compensation, exceeds \$12,000 for single taxpayers or \$18,000 for married taxpayers filing a joint return. Married taxpayers filing

separate returns must report all unemployment compensation regardless of their adjusted gross income

Unemployment benefits totaling \$10 or more during the calendar year are reported to the IRS by the agency making the payments. The agency should also furnish a record of payments made to the taxpayer on Form 1099-UC by the end of January 1984.

Detailed information regarding the computation of the tax on unemployment compensation is contained in IRS Publication 905, Tax Information on Unemployment Compensation, which is available free by using the order blank in the tax package or by calling the





On production, Victor Corneluis believes in paying employees well, and giving generous bounses and retirement benefits. The result is little turnover in the Shops, with a number of employees staying until retirement.

Cornelius strolls through the rooms easily, calling employees by their first name. They reply by calling him "Victor" or "Mr. C".

Another feature of the plant is the Cornelius desire to own the most modern printing equipment and computers available. This is in harmony with his wish to keep current, to relate to the

Occasionally he will say: "My history? I've had more failures than successes!"

And then points out some failures, all of which are buried under the more visible things which succeeded. Some of the landmarks in his life have included sign painting, theatrical advertising and the Nap Ad, the White Elephant Resturant, the Hotel Victor, the invention of the Redi-Clip, the purchase of Osment Menus printing Co. in 1958. This venture into the printing business led to the printing of resturant

Victor Cornelius and his wife, the former Inez Pettit of Mississippi, were married in 1923. They have two daughters, Catherine (Mrs. Jack Germany) and Laverne (Mrs. Charles Meeks). Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius also have five grandchildren and one greatgrandchild.

Besides his devotion to his family, Victor Corneilus has contributed time, effort and money to projects in Eastland and the surrounding area. He has presented such varied gifts as street signs, lamination for old newspapers in the Eastland Memorial Library Archives. and numerous other things. He has been recognized with local citations and awards, noting his citizenship and public spirit.

All this has left him basically unruffled and modest, always ready to turn a joke on himself.





We also have other types of planters such as the window box which is not as predominent as in years

Then we have the hanging basket which is increasing in popularity each year.

Here again we have two types, the plastic and the wire basket. There are some other types of baskets but these are the two most predominent. Within the hanging basket type of containers, you have a range of five inches to twenty inches in diameter. The wire basket will keep your plants much

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cooler but will have to be watered more often than the plastic basket.

In addition to these planters, we have the barrel and half barrel planters. The full barrel planter is more associated with a strawberry barrel or a potato barrel. The half barrel is mostly associated with tropicals or dry weather plants. When using a barrel either half or full barrel you must be careful to keep the

barrel's staves saturated with water in order not to dry out and fall apart.

Now we have a new type of planter "The Totem Planter", this is a verticle type of planter made out of a durable plastic with planting cups protruding from the sides to hold the plants. You will fill the center of this planter with your planting meduim making sure the cups are full of the medium. Then you add your plants to

Until I crossed the line myself, I thought the foregoing paragraph was just an elitest phrase used to separate the published from the unpublished...and sort of snobby, too.

On the whole, I now beleive it is an accurate statement. The people who "want to write" usually have good ideas, can turn neat phrases and are meticulous grammarians. As a onceupon-a-time English teacher, I incline toward mayhem myself when those typelice mess up spelling and punctuation.

However, the want-to writers seldom find the perfect time to produce the perfect paper, so they can't write. I know. I've been there. In retrospect, I know I've been guilty of taking on jobs I could have refused just to put off tackling the typewriter.

Perfection is not the name of the game. Communication is. Until you produce, you are not communicating. Determination comes in a close second to communica-

The writer has to be a shade selfish, too, or he will find himself in the same shape as the man who kept so busy making a living that he didn't have time to get

This is not a short course in authorship, but I can't resist a short test for you who have writing ambitions. If you "know" you can write but you don't know what to write about, you fail. Give away your typewriter and burn your notebooks. There is no way a writer ever can cover all the material available.

Viewpoints: What **About Humanism?**

Solomon, known for his wisdom, wrote, "Train up the child in the way he should go-." He did not say, the way you think he should go. Solomon was saying there is a criteria to base your method of training other than your own judgment. The words of wisdom Solomon spoke of was not portraying him merely as a man with a high degree of intelligent but his wisdom dealt with moral instructions - right and wrong. He used synonynous terms for wisdom such as understanding, integrity, and knowledge of good and evil as based on Biblical precepts. He likened folly or evil to a foolish son- a fool who is simple, a scorner, vain and wayward.

What are we now witnessing as a result of the training our children and young adults are receiving? Our system of public education has been evaluated. Public schools are turning out millions who can't read or figure above the elementary level. In spite of the remedial reading, remedial math, the special education classes, and the funding of millions to improve learning, the Armed forces had to change instruction manuals to a 6th grade level for them

to be understood. Not only is it evident that children lack the basic skill of reading, writing and arithmetic, but there is now the free-sex movement, abortion on demand, teenage pregancies, homosexual rights movement, and the total exclusion of individuals to pray in public schools and public life.

If our children are not being taught what was once the expected norm, what are they being taught which has contributed to the downward slide so evident in our socie-

The concept of secular humanism which contradicts and undermines our most sacred Christian beliefs has crept cunningly and subtiley into our consciousness and has almost dulled Americans to sleep. Many in our society are now a champion of its philosophy.

The "Humanist Manifesto I" written in 1933 by a group of 34 humanist liberals and the "Humanist Manifesto II" written in 1973 clearly defines the basic concepts of humanism.

"Religious humanists regard the universe as selfexisting and not created." Manifesto I

"Humanist believes that man is a part of nature and that he has emerged as the result of a continuous process." Manifesto I

They say, "We find insufficient evident of a supernatural; it is either meaningless or irrelevant to the question of survival and the fulfillment of the human-No diety will save us; we must save ourselves." Manifesto II

"Humanists look for their moral values from human experiences --- Ethics is situational, needing no theological sanction." Manifesto II

They assert that the nature of the universe depicted by modern science makes unacceptable any supernatural guarantees of human values- just do what

comes naturally.

To put it more plainly, humanists are telling, 'There is no right or wrong about anything. There are no old-fashioned restraints. We can do what is right in our own eyes."

Do you consider this law based on their philosophy straight thinking? "Teen-agers can have an abortion without parental consent but must have parental consent before having their ears pierced?

Who would deny that humanists are doing what they set out to do? Their method is to train up the child- get to their minds early with their philosophy. Children are very much aware that modern educational concepts permits them to feel there are no rules, no right or wrong about anything.

It is obvious, the idea, "I gotta be me" is not proving to be good enough. We see it in our rapidly decaying society.

The Bible teaches we are to fight the enemy; to capture his strongholds. We need to fight on all fronts. We can take heart, too, that we aren't fighting this cancerous philosophy alone. We can declare with Paul that "We are sure that the judgment of God is according to truth against them which commit such things." Romans 2:2


