Cited as an "instant superstar" by Texas Business magazine, Senator Glasgow's legislative record included the passage of forty bills that he sponsored during his first session. This ranked him first among freshmen legislators and seventh among the 181 senators and representatives. His second session reflects his sponsorship and passage of some 61 bills, ranking him third in the 68th Legislature.

Senator Glasgow, a former District Attorney, has carried many measures providing penalties for the manufacture and delivery of imitation controlled substances, a bill creating the offense of tampering

He was a cosponsor of legislation restoring the lateral road fund to counties and increasing the counties' share of license tag receipts and a proposed constitutional amendment creating the Veterans Housing Assistance Program. Senator Glasgow serves on the Senate Economic Development (Vice Chairman), Finance and Jurisprudence Committees and has been appointed by the Lt. Governor as Chairman of the Subcommittee on Criminal Matters. He has also been appointed as a member of the Select Com-

mittee on the Judiciary. The Senator was born on February 28, 1942, in Eastland County, Texas. He grew up in Stephenville and graduated from the local high school. He then served three years in the United States Army.

After his discharge, the Senator attended Tarleton State University in Stephenville where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1967. While in Tarleton State he served as class president, student body president and was named to "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities."

While attending Tarleton State he met a young lady named Deanna Carr of nearby Huckabay. They were married in 1965 and have three children: Delaina,

Holli, and Jody.

Upon graduating from
Tarleton State, Senator Glasgow entered the University of Texas School of Law and received his Juris Doc-torate in 1970. While atten-ding law school, the Senator worked as an administrative aide to Governor Preston Smith and after graduation he served as Governor Smith's administrative assistant.

In January, 1971, Senator Glasgow retured to Stephenville to enter private law practice with former Stephenville High and Tarleton State classmate, Don Jones.

In October, 1972, the Senator was appointed District Attorney for the 29th Judicial District which serves Erath, Hood and Palo Pinto Counties. He was

elected to the post in November, 1972, and was reelected in 1976. He served in that capacity until January, 1980.

While living in Stephenville, the Senator has long been active in the community. He is a past chairman of the Pecan Valley Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center that serves several counties in the north central Texas area. He is a past member of the Board of Directors of the Tarleton State University Ex-Students Association and a former member of the Texas

District and County Attorneys Association. The Senator is presently an active member of the Stephenville Chamber of Commerce and the Stephenville Optimist Club.

The Wranglers and Lady Wranglers of Cisco Junior College will be traveling to Waco Thursday night where they will play Texas State Technical Institute.

In Monday night's game, the Lady Wranglers led only 16-10 with six minutes left in the first half, then ran away for the win over SWCC. CJC outscored SWCC 20-8 in the final minutes to build a 36-18 half-time lead and coasted to

the win. In the men's games, the Saturday night game against Ranger was closer than the score. With 1:50 left, Cisco led 65-64, but Ranger's Johnny Tolbert pulled down

an offensive rebound and scored to give RJC a 66-65 lead. Cisco was forced to foul and Ranger eventually pushed the lead to six.

The difference in the Monday night's men's game came at the free throw line. CJC was only two of eleven on the free shots while SWCC was 14 of 19.

LET'S FEED THE BIRDS There are many, many things, such as the gifts of Mother Nature that we are blessed with that we take for granted that will be with us day after day, and year after

Two of these blessings are our plants and our birds. We have learned throughout the year we must feed (fertilize) our plants and to provide them with the best environments and in turn we will be rewarded with increased blooms and frangrance. When it comes to the birds

it is not the year round, month to month feeding that we have with our plants. Feeding the birds is more critical during the winter months than any other time of the year. You may remember when our Grandmothers threw the brunt toast or bread out in the yard for the birds to eat. While still throwing our discarded bread scraps out to feed the birds is of great benefit to our feathered friend, feeding the birds has become a much more scientific operation as we have learned through the various studies of birds.

One must remember our feathered friends depend on Mother Nature to provide food if we do not help in some way when the birds can not find food in a given area they will move (fly) on to a new area where food is available. Mother Nature feeds her

birds with seed, grains as well as insects. If this food is not available the birds will leave the area.

With the unusual record breaking cold weather we have had this year it has been extremely hard on the birds to find food. The plant material has been killed or has virtually eliminated the insects. Therefore it is left up to us to take care of our feathered friends. The gardening public must remember that we need the birds to help with our growing of different plants in many ways including insect eradication and pollination

to mention only a few. There are many different types and styles of bird feeders available at a variety of prices. Recently I visited with Mr. Lilly of the Atlas Manufacturing Company in Tulsa, Oklahoma. This company has built bird houses and birdfeeders for many years and has devoted a lot of man hours to the study of bird feeding. They have a covered bridge bird feeder that would enhance any landscape and be a welcome addition by the birds.





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

A number of people met with the Eastland County Commissioners at Monday's meeting of the court to ask for help with the county roads north of Eastland. They stated that due to a lack of rain the roads had become almost impassable, and that they would provide clay to put on the roads and a

wider right-of-way if needed. Commissioner Richard Robinson agreed with them and stated that his crew of two men had finished the project they had been working on and were that very morning working on the roads mentioned.

A request that a locked gate that blocks a county road be removed along with a statement that a cattle guard would not be objected to was determined to be a matter for legal council.

Also referred to legal

council was a dispute concerning abandoned road land, as they ownership could depend on where the land came from.

A request for review of the tax evaluation of personal business property which was said to be excessive was

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Born July 9, 1984, in Shaw Bend in San Saba County, she married John D. Walton April 18, 1917, in Nabors Creek community. She was a Baptist.


Her husband and a son, Larry, preceded her in death.




Viola Knight - Enduring Faith

A smile reaches across her carefully sculptured face, touching her gray eyes. She notes that one of her sons is Dr. Bruce Goleman of Ranger, Dean (Ret.) of

Ranger Jr. College. Dr. Goleman also taught music at Cisco Junior College, and was Chior Director at First Methodist Church of Cisco. He and his wife Catherine and their children are all mucially talented. A son, Thomas, is a Medical Doctor.

Mrs. Knight mentions these and other relatives with pleasure, then lifts the cover of her Bible. She has taped letters inside which she wrote to various newspapers in past years.

"I've been writing 'Letters To The Editor' for a long time," she explains. "I started when I was first married, to the Rusk Cherokean.

"I've written on a lot of topics, but my greatest interest is on religion."

"You can call me a 'Double Baptist',' she chuckles. "When I was a child near Texarkana in the early 1900's I was first baptised. Then when my family moved over to Louisana, I didn't understand about such things as church letters, so I was baptised into another church there.

When I had children of my own I always took them to church - and kept on attending as long as I was able. I always enjoyed singing - I love the old songs.

Mrs. Knight explains that her great-grandfather Heaberlin, on her father's side, came to America before the Civil War. He and a brother landed at Richmond. Virgina.

Thursday, February 16, 1984 brother settled in Pleasantville, Iowa. I hear there are a lot of Hearberlins around Pleasantville even now."

She remembers that her father, Samuel George Heaberlin, was a farmer in the Texarkana area. Her mother's maiden name was Laura Jeanette Byrd, and she was part German and part Scotch-Irish. Viola was born Aug. 26, 1894 at Maude,

"I had two brothers, none of whom are now living. My brothers helped my father, and I stayed at the house and helped mother. You can be sure she was a good cook and neat housekeeper. There was nothing out of place at our home! The Germans are still like that.

"When I way young we moved to Coushatta, La. I was married when I was 21 years old to Jesse Goleman, who was part Cherokee Indian."

"During the next 22 years I had 10 children. The oldest, Wallace, died when he was two years old, during the flu epidemic in World War 1. Three otheres died later. The ones still living are Bruce Goleman of Ranger, Floyd Goleman of Houston, J.V. Goleman of Austin, Merle (Goleman) Hohensee of Virginia Houston, (Goleman) Morris of

were busy ones, under the circumstances some would have called hard. She worked outside her home, as well as at the many tasks around the house. Her children were well-

trained, and assumed responsibility at early ages. They worked, and took advantage of all the educational opportunities they could. After they grew up

During the depression Mrs. Knight worked in a County Clerk's office under a government program. She also did extra housework, nursing, or cooking. Eventually she moved to Houston, where she lived for about 21 years.

Her good cooking made it no problem for her to keep work in the city. She cooked in restaurants, since the salary for a Chef was higher than for some other skills. She bought her own home, and lived there comfortably. After her first marriage ended she remarried.

Mrs. Knight saw Eastland County for the first time in 1971, and liked it from the start. "It's beautiful country," she says.

She hasn't been able to get around to see as much of it as she would like to. For a few years ago, as the widow suffering from arthritis and several other ailments, she entered the nursing home.

Life may be more confining, but it is far from over for Mrs. Knight. She looks remarkably well, is alert, gets around in her wheel chair, and keeps a sense of humor. And she enjoys joining in the singing at all the religious programs.

As she goes about her affairs, Viola Knight sums up all the good things she has to look forward to. And most important of these is a symbolic article of clothing she calls "My New Dress".

She sat down just before her 88th birthday, in 1982, and wrote about the 'New Dress'. These are part of her remarks, which were later printed in an area newspaper. she has saved this insider her Bible.

"Jesus has bought me a new dress...he bought it and they entered various profes- paid cash for it. No one has



"I used to write some for the papers about Bird Watching," chuckles John. "But then I got so interested in this shop that I don't take time to go out and even look for them!"




