Hilton Announcement & Awards Given At Banquet

An announcement for the Hilton Hotel project in Cisco was one of the highlights of the 68th annual Cisco Chamber of Commerce banquet Thursday night in the Cisco Junior College Agriculture Building. Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie made the announcement following the presentation of numerous awards to local citizens and students.

Awards were presented to Tracy Couch and Glenn Starr from Cisco High School for Academic Excellence

and to Becky Chamness Thompson and Scott Anderson of Cisco Junior College.

Other awards were presented to Burl Petree for Municipal Service, Robert "Buster" Pharr for Outstanding Young Farmer, Annie Latch Rendall for Outstanding Senior Citizen, Dr. Hugh "Chief" Brown for Community Service, Neal Moore for Helping Hands and Fred Wheeler for the Over Due Award.

Cisco High School principal Mike Turner presented

awards to Tracy Couch, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Couch, and to Glenn Starr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Travis Starr. Tracy has maintained a grade point average of 98.24, while Glenn has maintained an average of 93.63.

Clois Purvis presented the awards to CJC students Becky Thompson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Archie Chamness and wife of Ernest Thompson, and to Scott Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Freddy Anderson.

Becky has a perfect 4.0 grade point for three semesters while Scott has a 3.84 average.

The special award for Municipal Service was presented to Burl Petree by City Manager Mike Moore. Mr. Petree has worked for the city since April of 1975. He began working in the Street Department and was promoted to the Water Department in 1977. He was raised in Carbon and has lived in Cisco for 28 years.

City Manager Moore said, "Burl is an excellent employee and never hesitates to do what is necessary to get the job done."

This year the CofC awarded an Outstanding Young Farmer, Buster Pharr. The award was presented by Frank Barrett and Willis Parker from the Agriculture Committee of the Chamber. Buster, a graduate of Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College, has been working at farming full-time since his graduation from CJC.

Mayor Ritchie presented Annie Latch Rendall with the Outstanding Senior Citizen Award. Mrs. Rendall moved with her family to Cisco in 1920 and enrolled in public schools here. She and five other Latch brothers and sisters received diplomas from Cisco High School as did all her four children and one of her grandsons.

Mrs. Rendall and her late husband, R.V. Rendall, were in business in Cisco for more than a quarter of a century. After his death, she sold their laundry and channeled her interests in working in the newly opened Senior Center, sponsored by Cisco Junior College. For the past five years she has been in charge of the volunteer workers and served as program coordinator. That

organization has grown to be one of the single largest and most active in the State of Texas. It sponsors a rhythm band, ceramics class, game room, choir and serves three weekly luncheons with an average of more than 150 at each meeting.

The Community Service award was presented to Dr. Brown by Mayor Ritchie who stated, "It has been our privilege to live in Cisco some 25 years. One of the first people to welcome us to Cisco, and to be hospitable to us in every way, was the recipient of our 1984 Community Service Award, Cisco's Citizen of the Year. And I might add that we would be hard pressed to find a more deserving person this year or any other year than the one we are honoring tonight."

Dr. Brown was born in Sweetwater in 1916, later lived in Glen Rose briefly as a child, and then his family moved to Cisco in 1921. He attended Texas Chiropractic College and after graduation joined his father in the operating of Brown's Sanitorium.

He has served as a former mayor of Cisco, a former president of the school band booster's organization, former president of the CJC Board of Regents, current president of the Cisco Historical Society, and a long-time tireless supporter of all aspects of community life.

"During recent years, however, one dominant service rendered by this fine gentleman stand out," said Mayor Ritchie, "and I speak of his contributions to our city's airport. When you think of the airport, you automatically think of Chief. He is on the Airport Advisory Board, he steered and guided us through the fine grant program with the Texas

Aeronautics Commission which got out airport runway and aprons done so magnificently, and for all intents and purposes he is the manager, janitor and groundskeeper for the Cisco Airport."

The Helping Hands Award was presented to Neal Moore who was born and raised in Putnam. Born in 1901, he married in 1936 and moved to Cisco in 1939. He has a greenhouse business and is known for his daily visits to the hospital to give plants and flowers to patients there.

An active member of the Cisco Church of Christ, Mr. Moore has a genuine love for people and flowers.

This year's Overdue Award was presented to Fred Wheeler who moved to Cisco eleven years ago from McCamey. He and his wife, Jo, own and operate Philpott Florist and Fred has become very active in the Chamber. He has served on the Board of Directors of the CofC and has been very active in the Lions Club in Cisco.

Mr. Wheeler has devoted much time to the work of the Chamber and has been instrumental in increasing membership. He was cited for his dedication and perseverance in making the Chamber a success in Cisco.

Along with Mayor Ritchie's announcement concerning the Hilton Hotel project, which may be found elsewhere in this edition, he also made the announcement that CJC's Band and Belles have been invited to the 1984 Macy's Thanksgiving Parade. He said this will be the fifth time the group has participated in the event and 300 seats have been reserved for the flight to New York. More will be published on this event in next week's paper.

The Band and Belles have also been invited to go to Houston on two different occasions for the opening of Macy's stores in Texas.

Banquet speaker, Senator Bob Glasgow, said all Texans feel they are living in the greatest state in the Union because of the low, or non-existent, state taxes. However, he said Texans may have outsmarted themselves, because the government is now having to operate on a budget from 1969 and even it has had some cuts made. He stated that if taxes had been raised one percent during each of the past 13 years, the state would have all the money it needs.

He said the State Highway Department needs more money and he also said teacher's salaries need to be raised in order to provide professional instructors for students, who are "our most valuable commodity."

Senator Glasgow also scolded Texas voters for not turning out to vote in last year's election since he said only ten percent of registered voters cast their ballots. He stated it is a state disgrace when the voters show such concern and he said, "Apathy will get us into trouble."

He stated, "If you are not active in your Chamber of Commerce you should be. If you are not active in your city, you should be. If you are not active in your education system, you should be."

He stressed that he is each voter's employee and if anyone should have any questions, get in touch with his offices. He stated, "Call us, we will help you."

Outgoing Chamber president Robert Dudley was unable to attend the banquet, since he has already moved to Fort Morgan, Colorado, where he is managing a J.C.

Penney Store. Mayor Ritchie, master of ceremonies, said Mr. Dudley had asked him to thank last year's board members who had helped him through his term as president. During 1983, the Chamber welcomed 34 businesses into the CofC, participated in nine ribbon cuttings for new businesses, and welcomed 25 new individual members.

A plaque of appreciation for Mr. Dudley was presented to his brother-in-law, Buster Pharr.

Incoming president Gene Gwinn stated that Cisco is a friendly and diplomatic town. He stated that activities for 1984, besides the usual annual events, include the appointment of a steering committee to study what can be done for economic growth in the city of Cisco. Members of that committee are Dick Woolley, Dr. Norman Wallace, Helen Orr and Ronnie Ledbetter.

There were approximately 38 out-of-town guests at the banquet, with 18 of those from Eastland. Honored guests and distinguished visitors were introduced.

A CJC country and western band played several selections for the banquet crowd as they enjoyed their meal, which was catered by Oscar's Barbeque.

Chamber officers and directors for 1984 are: President Gene Gwinn, 1st vice president Jerry Morgan, 2nd vice president Bill Austin, Jr., 3rd vice president Ivan Webb, Joe Cooper, Dan Dixon, Elaine Dixon, Jerry Jeffcoat, Brad Kimbrough, Ronnie Ledbetter, Helen Orr, Bobby Smith, Dr. Norman Wallace, L.D. Woolley and Billy Wright. Robert Dudley is the immediate past president and Eris Ritchie is ex-officio, while Randy Speegle is the chamber manager.

Care Center Seeks Funds For Piano

In a drive to secure a re-conditioned piano for Cisco Care Center, Jerry McBeth will be at the First National Bank in Cisco on Friday, March 2, during banking hours to receive \$1 (one dollar) donations for this purpose. Any and all interested citizens are invited to participate in this drive. Since music is a favorite form of entertainment of the residents and facilitates worship, this piano is a priority item for the Care Center.

The people of Cisco have been awarded a grant of 1.2 million dollars by the Hilton Foundation for the establishment of an appropriate memorial to Conrad Hilton, according to a public announcement made by Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie Thursday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Mayor Ritchie stated the grant was awarded in May of 1983, but "we were asked specifically not to make the grant publicly known, until such time as we could better define, clarify, and formulate plans for use of the grant funds. I received full permission just last week to make this announcement."

In his announcement, Mayor Ritchie said Eric Hilton and a host of dignitaries came to Cisco in the spring of 1979 with the original announcement of the Hilton being restored. Since that time, the expectations of the restoration have bogged down and "after the passage of a couple of years, it became apparent that the project was stalled if not abandoned."

"Some of us visited Eric Hilton," said Mayor Ritchie, "we wrote letters to Barron Hilton, chairman of the Board of Hilton Corporation, talked to people at Houston and Los Angeles, including the chairman of the Hilton Foundation. We wrote letters, made phone calls, and desperately tried to keep reminding the people of their announcement and public commitment to us."

He stressed that the situation was somewhat complicated by the Hilton estate

not being settled, as it still remains today, many years after Conrad Hilton's death.

Mayor Ritchie continued, "However, it became obvious that the original enthusiasm for the project had faded. But we persisted with letters and inquiries. The Mobby was visited many times by people from the Hilton foundation and the University of Houston Foundation and architect Rinaldo Petrini. They saw a very, very dilapidated, weed-grown, about-to-fall-in old building, and there seemed some question as to what could or should be done, or if in fact anything would be done."

Mayor Ritchie said he was advised the proposed project would be on the agenda of the Hilton Foundation's meeting in February of 1983. However, after the meeting he learned the foundation did not have time to get to the Mobby project, so it would be taken up at their next quarterly meeting in May of 1983, when the decision was made to award the 1.2 million dollars.

Thursday night Mayor Ritchie made the following statement: "A committee consisting of Dick Woolley, Elaine Dixon, Norman Wallace and myself, in consultation with and having the support of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the Cisco Historical Society, have held numerous meetings both ourselves and with foundation and professional personnel, and are pleased to announce this evening the establishment of The Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Com-

munity Center. It is our purpose to utilize the grant and facilities developed for a beautifully appointed park, community center, Chamber of Commerce headquarters, and very possibly a Senior Citizens Center.

"A feasibility study was completed just this week, and we are confident that within the amount of the grant we can meet most, if not all, of our objectives.

"We envision construction work beginning within a year, and are hoping very much for the facilities and park to be completed and in use by the end of 1985.

"The Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Com-

munity Center will into perpetuity preserve an important part of Cisco's heritage, and we dream of it being seen and visited by many people from everywhere, including our own great-grandchildren, and utilized by the community to the greatest advantages possible. Many details are yet to work out, and we invite your input as to what you would like to see become a part of this facility.

"We are greatly indebted to the Conrad N. Hilton Foundation and its president, Mr. Donald Hubbs, to the University of Houston Foundation, to Mr. Eric Hilton, Mr. Barron Hilton, and all those who made this

gift to our city possible, and our citizens throughout the history of this community, will owe them a debt of gratitude.

"We had invited Mr. Hubbs, Mr. Hilton, and personnel from the two foundations to be present this evening, but none were able to be here. We wanted to show them our appreciation in a demonstrative way.

However, even though they are not here, I would invite this gathering to stand and give these people a standing ovation in appreciation for what they have done for us, and I will see to it that they know of this showing of our tremendous gratitude!"

Home lawn weed control can be very frustrating. Following a good maintenance program will help a lot in building a dense turf that will allow weed seed germination and establishment.

We may have a lot of grass winter kill in Eastland County, and if so, weeds will be even a greater problem.

When considering chemical weed control, it might be well to remember that you are trying to remove an undesirable plant that is growing among desirable plants and many times it is not an easy task.

Now is the time that you can use chemicals to kill those winter weeds and grasses in your lawn. This must be done before your lawn grasses begin to green up. The winter clover, weeds and grasses may be removed by spot treating the plants with glyphosate (trade name - Roundup of Kleenup). This chemical kills most green plants when sprayed directly on the leaves, but breaks down in the soil and does not affect roots.

You may prevent summer annual weeds and grasses from germinating if you apply a preemergence between now and March 15. The preemergence herbicide that may be used is Balan 25% granulars. If you plan to aeriate or verticut your lawn do not apply preemergence until after you do this job. The preemergence herbicide may be applied with a cyclone spreader at the rate of about two pounds per 1000 square feet.

Once a weed is established, it can either be removed physically by digging or it can be removed chemically. Physical digging is fine if the weeds are few and if they do not have underground reproduction organs. The dallisgrass plant is a good example of just such a plant. You can dig it up but the chances are it will just regrow from the underground parts that you don't get.

Grassy type weeds may be controlled in bermuda lawns with either MSMA (monosodium methanearsonate) or DSMA (disodium methanearsonate). Several applications may be necessary and the bermuda may turn yellow, but it should recover. Grassy type weeds cannot be selectively controlled in a St. Augustine lawn.

Broad leaf weeds are usually controlled with products containing 2, 4-D MCPP and dicamba. These chemicals are not safe for every lawn or for every situation. The only way to be sure is to check the label on the container. Be sure the chemical will control the weed you are after, is safe to use on the type of lawn you have and will not injure nearby ornamental plants.

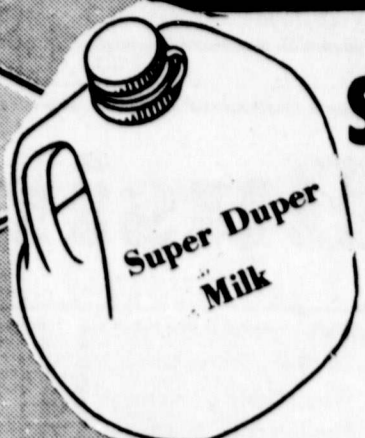
For best results, apply the herbicide only when the weeds are actively growing. The hardest time to kill a weed is when it is hot and dry and the weed is under moisture stress. Try to pick a cooler day with little wind movement and when soil moisture levels are fairly high.

Always follow the directions on the label.

Oil & Gas Assoc. Pushes For Decontrol

The President of West Central Oil and Gas Association today urged President Reagan and the Congress to decontrol natural gas prices and to remove end-use restraints on natural gas as soon as possible.

Russell N. Taylor, head of the 1,000-member Abilene-based organization, said decontrolling natural gas prices at the wellhead would encourage the exploration for new reserves and, therefore, lower wellhead prices.

"Since the Arab oil embargo, we have had rising energy prices," Taylor said. "But for the first time since the embargo we recently have had declining natural gas prices at the wellhead brought on by competition

with decontrolled crude oil prices."

From January to August, 1983 the average wellhead price has declined 4 cents per thousand cubic feet (Mcf)," he said. "During that same period of time the average residential price rose 44 cents per Mcf."

"Many natural gas producers have had to voluntarily take a price cut even though their contract may call for a higher price," he said.

"Consumers and Congress should realize that price increases at the wellhead are not the reason for the price increases at the burner tip," Taylor said.

Taylor also noted that end-use restraints on natural gas must be removed quickly.

"The Fuel Use Act and incremental pricing need to be terminated as soon as possible," he said. "They were passed under the misconception that we were running out of natural gas."

"But if we continue our economic recovery, our natural gas usage will grow and we will have to step up our exploration for new natural gas reserves," he said.

"We have seen that federal price controls have not worked to increase natural gas reserves. They did not work for oil, and they are not working for natural gas in this respect," Taylor said.

"The market place is working. The price of oil and natural gas will fluctuate with demand just like anything else. Let's let the free market system work."

Taylor pointed out that natural gas is still an excellent fuel compared to other fuels. Using the average wellhead price of \$2.59 per Mcf, natural gas equates to a \$15.36 barrel of oil. The average price for crude oil in August was \$26.03.

Taylor also noted that natural gas is the cleanest burning of all the fossil fuels.

"There are many reasons why natural gas should be the fuel of the future. The only reason why it would not be, is if Congress continues to play political football with natural gas. The time has come to deregulate natural gas and let industry get on with the task of finding the

new reserves that we will be using in the future," Taylor said.

- (9) Judges decision will be final.
- (10) The Junior Division will be limited to FFA and 4-H Club members enrolled in the Cisco Public Schools.

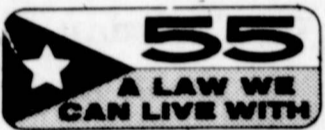
