# Wallace Resigns CJC Post To Accept Bee County Job

president of Cisco Junior College for some 11 years, has resigned that post to accept the presidency of Bee County College at Beeville, according to an announcement by Dick Woolley, president of the board of regents.

The board accepted the resignation with regrets at a special meeting Monday night, Mr. Woolley said. The faculty of Cisco Junior College was advised of the action by Dr. Wallace at a meeting Monday morning.
"Dr. Wallace has done an

outstanding job for Cisco Junior College and for Cisco," Mr. Woolley said. "He will leave with the very best wishes of us all. Our reluctance to loose him is made easier by the knowledge that the new position means a considerable

advancement for him as an educator and in remunera-

Mr. Woolley said the board named a search committee, including Board Vice President Brad Kimbrough, Secretary Lloyd McGrew and Mr. Woolley, to seek a

replacement. Dr. Wallace will work with the committee. Guidelines for the selection of a replacement were

discussed Monday night and will be completed soon.

Initially, the state's other 45 junior colleges will be advised of the vacancy in Circa Mar Weelley and Cisco, Mr. Woolley said.

College during the 11 years that Dr. Wallace has been here is reflected by comparative figures that show enrollment increasing from 781 in 1974 to 1,650 in August, 1983, Mr. Woolley said. During the same period, operating funds have gone up 325 per cent to an annual total of 2,362,172.

During the period, the physical plant (campus buildings and fixtures) have gone up in value from \$2,623,000 to \$4,4,607,175. The school's endowment fund has increased 45 percent from \$397,761 to \$573,952.

Dr. Wallace said that he would remain on the job here until June 1 or until a replacement is found if one has not been hired by that

"The decision to leave Cisco has not been an easy one," Dr. Wallace said. "Our work and life in this community has been rewarding beyond expression, and we decided to make the change only because of the opportunity of new horizons."



# Dr. Wallace Unanimously Selected By Bee County

Dr. Norman E. Wallace, was unanimously selected by the Bee County College Board of Trustees last Thursday, March 15, to succeed BCC's first chief executive, Dr. Grady C. Hogue, who retires Aug. 31.

Wallace, as did his predecessor, will arrive in Beeville with presidential experience gained at the west-central Texas community college in Cisco. He has been the college presi-dent there since 1974 and before that was dean of technical-vocational education at Amarillo College for four years. Wallace has also been a college and university professor as well as a junior high school principal.

Wallace, 51, earned undergraduate and master's degrees from Sam Houston State University in industrial education and educational administration, and a doctoral degree from Texas A&M University in guidance, couseling and industrial education.

Wallace, present at the board meeting, announced that BCC will also create a new position to be filled by BCC graduate and Beeville native Dr. Leonardo de la Garza, currently academic vice president at Austin Community College.

Wallace said de la Garza "will supervise the occupational and academic instructional divisions as an executive vice president."

Wallace, who will arrive in Beeville in June to work with Hogue until his retirement, also said BCC's executive vice president Roy M. Benton will continue his responsibilities for overseeing coloperations, maintenance, finances, general day to day plant

management, and will addi-

dependent study. These responsibilities are presently shared by Benton, Roger C. Schustereit, Dr. Neal M. McBryde and Dr. H. Streitman. William McBryde, Schustereit and Streitman will continue in their assignments as occupational dean, dean of student services and academic dean, respectively.

In announcing Wallace's appointment, BCC Board Chairman Peter S. Marecek said, "All of us on the board agree that choosing a new college president is one of the toughest assignments we have ever had."

'We had the honor of picking the best of the best," he added, "and we had applications from superbly qualified candidates." The board had interviewed six finalists and had screened 34 applications

"It came down to the fact that we were faced with outstanding applicants and we made the choice based entirely upon who had the most qualifications and experience, and that candidate was Dr. Wallace," Marecek

BCC's newly-appointed chief executive also stressed that "the college is in excellent condition, both financially and academically, and at this point I can see no sweeping changes necessary

at Bee County College." Wallace pointed out that "I have known Dr. Hogue for years, I'm well-acquainted with the fine reputation he and the board have built for Bee County College, and I am looking forward to the personal working liaison we will establish before he

retires late in the summer." "It will be an opportunity for me to carefully examine programs, resources and management, and it offers an ideal time to really get to know the people of Beeville and the employees of Bee County College," Wallace

Hogue, echoing the board's endoresement of his successor, said: "Dr. Wallace is an outstanding choice. I've known him for years, and his name in Texas education has long been associated with effective supervision and sound fiscal management."

"Dr. Wallace's proven leadership," Hogue emphasized, "couple with Dr. de la Garza's reputation and experience in instructional planning and supervision, will strongly and positively influence the continued growth and development of Bee County College.'

"In my opinion," Hogue stressed, "both of the new BCC administrators are absolutely the finest and most qualified leaders in Texas community colleges today."
Wallace added that "I also

feel very positive about the congeniality of the trustees at the colleagues, and I'm appreciative that the board agreed to hire Dr. de la Garza to help absorb and delegate the managerial responsibilities."

'Dr. de la Garza has distinguished himself at Austin Community College, and he has a wealth of experience gained when he was associate director in charge

of community college programs for the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System,' Wallace explained.

Wallace said, "Dr. Hogue had advised the board and candidates that some BCC administrators had too many areas of responsibility and we needed to restructure administrative staff duties. Clearly, Dr. de la Garza has one of the most esteemed reputations in Texas in those areas of responsibility he will assume at BCC."

De la Garza graduated from A.C. Jones High School in Beeville in 1956, was an honor graduate at BCC in 1970, and an honor graduate of St. Edward's University in 1971. He was awarded a doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Texas in higher educational administration in 1977. He also was awarded a fellowship for study and certification in management of higher education at Harvard University which was completed in 1982.

Wallace has been a University of Houston assistant professor, an associate professor in the college of education for Mississippi State University, and has been both associate dean and dean of technical-vocational education at Amarillo Col-

Wallace has also served on the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education and with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the chief accreditation agency for colleges in the South and Southwest.

He has been a lay leader, youth superintendent and a Sunday school teacher, and has been on the boards of the **American Heart Association** and the Cisco Industrial De la Garza, also promi-Wallace and his wife,

nent in educational and community circles, has served as chairman of the board of equalization for the city of Austin and the Austin Independent School District. He is also a member of the Seton Medical Center Advisory Council and has memberships in six state and national educational associations. De la Garza is member of the South

Austin Rotary Club. BCC's new chief administrative officer has also been active in curriculum development and audiovisual tutorial instruction. and has authored several magazine publications in

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

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

Q: I have been looking at handmade quilts and thinking about buying one, but I don't know how to tell which is more valuable. Is there a way?

A: There are several criteria for determining the value of a quilt.

1) Is it totally handmade? That is, has it been set together by hand and quilted by hand?

2) Are the stitches small and uniformly made, and are the pieces joined carefully so that the pattern corners are exact and smooth?

3) How pleasing are the overall color combinations? There are two types of quilts: yardage quilts that are made from material bought specifically for that purpose, and scrap bag quilts that are made with any number of small pieces of different material. A scrap quilt that has good overall design, if all other things are equal, is more valuable than a yardage

4) Are the prints used in the quilt of similar style? Mixing large polka dots with a tiny cottage print, for example, is not ideal.

7) How much distance is there between the rows of quilting? The closer the quilting, the better the quilt.

These seven guidelines are fairly comprehensive rules for choosing a quilt that will maintain its value. Of course, your taste is the final criterion for selecting anything, so trust your judgement!

Wind erosion has damaged more than a million acres of Texas cropland and rangeland the past few months, and it is still early in the "blow season." Conditions undoubtedly will become

worse this spring. "Current cropping systems in many areas just do not provide the needed protection to prevent soil erosion by wind," says Dr. B.L. Harris, soils specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Wind erosion is a problem primarily in western, central and southwestern sections of Texas and does its worst damage to croplands, Harris says.

"The most serious lasting damage from erosion is the separation and removal of silt, clay and organic matter from the surface, leaving only infertile and blowing sand. Harris explains. "The blowing sand piles up in dunes, causing loss of productive land, covering fences, equipment and buildings, and damaging crops."

To control wind erosion, a

combination of practices is most effective, with conservation tillage systems offering good potential for many erosion-prone soils, says the specialist.

A rough surface--the ridges and depressions formed by tillage-goes a long way in battling wind erosion, notes Harris. Roughness, at an optimum height of 2 to 5 inches, reduces wind surface velocity and traps sand particles.

"Cloddiness," the relative abundance of firm and stable aggregates of soil material resistant to erosion, also serves as a barrier to wind erosion. More than half of the soil surface should be protected by large clods.

"Both colddiness and surface roughness can be affecte by the type of tillage equipment used," Harris says. "Equipment which inverts the soil covers surface residue. Disk-type plows cover more residue and destroy soil clods more than sweep-type plows. Disks also create greater compaction pans than sweep plows.

"Vegetative cover is the best and most effective technique to control wind erosion," contends Harris. "The protection affored by cover, either living or dead, depends on the size and

quanity of residue. For example, wheat stubble is more effective than sorghum or corn stubble."

Erosion increases as field length increases, so the length should be reduced along the prevailing wind direction with barriers or windbreaks, or by planting perpendicular to the prevailing wind. A windbreak will protect an area equal to 10 times the height of the barrier, the sepcialist points


Research is being conducted on the use of terbars to reduce wind erosion. Terbars are small terrace barriers planted with perennial plant-such as lovegrass, kleingrass and Alamo switchgrass--on the top ridge. This technique has proven to be very effective in reducing erosion and maintaining yields, and its use is expected to expand.

"Other factors affecting erosion include wind speed and soil moisture," Harris says. "Erosion increases rapidly as winds exceed 20 mph, and erosion decreases as soil moisture increases. Therefore, irrigation practices and benching or leveling land on slopes can provide effective temporary controls of wind erosion."

Information is available from several agencies to assist farmers and ranchers in dealing with wind erosion problems. Among these agencies are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Research Service. SCS is the agency with primary responsibility for providing information and technical assistance for erosion control.

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
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# Prairie Houses on S. Seaman



#### The O'Brien House

OIL BOOM HOUSING -1201 S. Seaman Eastland, Texas

Office building and residential construction of the 1919 Eastland County Oil Boom helped mold to a great extent, the appearance of Eastland even now into the 1980s.

This is true in still-beingused public buildings as well as individual homes which were built during that period. They built well.

Prime examples of the type of residential construction from that period can be seen on South Seaman St. in Eastland

Two of the three oil company officials' homes are still in place. The front of the one at 1201 has been kept true to its original design.

The S. Seaman area has long been a residential area for Eastland. Some 320 acres were originally patented from the State of Texas April 11, 1859 to Jackson Rust, who later sold land to J.B. Ammerman, J.S. Daugherty and C.U. Connellee, Eastland early developers.

The area was incorporated for school purposes Sept. 28, 1882, and incorporated into a city on June 8, 1897. The raw land on the west side of S. Seaman, before it turns South as Highway 6, changed ownership several times before 1919 when Prairie Pipe Line Co. began buying land to be used for company official housing which was built that year.

It wasn't until March, 1922, that the city got around to a paving program, and for \$19,630.92 the city paved Seaman St. from Conner St. to Burkett St., the oak grove area. Prairie Pipe Line paid \$408 each for each of its 100-foot lots as its assess-

The Oil Boom ended and in 1935 Sinclair Prairie Pipe Line Co. sold the property at 1201 S. Seaman St. to W.I. Clark, who has been an employee of the company.

That same year Mr. Clark executed a note to Frank Crowell (Lumber Co.) for \$250. to do "painting, papering, floor refinishing, etc." A vear later (1936) Mr. and Mrs. Clark were divorced and Mrs. Clark married William H. Taylor, and she gave Mr. Clark a quit claim deed to the property.

In 1941 Mr. Clark sold 1201 to the late Bess Mae Owen (first wife of the late Attorney W.D.R. Owen). At his death in August, 1961, it pased to his widow, Venner H. Owen.

The present owner/occupant bought the property in 1961 from Mrs. Owen and moved in Labor Day weekend. A son, now in college, and a daughter in high school, first knew 1201 as

The third Prairie Oil and Gas Co. house was originally built on a lot between these two. It was sold and moved to Morton Valley in the early

The three houses were built with the same basic design, except that the O'Brien and Conner houses have mirror opposite plans. All are two-story structures.

The front of the 1201 loca-

tion remains of the original period style. Four large brick columns support a porch enclosed with bannisters on three sides on the front (east) side. A staircase landing is at the entry, into the living room-dining room, which has a large fireplace. There are two other brick chimneys used originally for heating and cooking. The kitchen separates the dining room and at that time, a screened-in back porch across the west side of the house. A pantry adjoined the kitchen to the north and also opened into one of the two bedrooms which were separated by a hall and a bath.

Virtually all the materials for the houses were shipped here from the northeast.

Upstairs three bedrooms and a bath adjoin the central top landing hall on three sides and a walkway around the top of the stairs connects the two east bedrooms.

In the rear is a double garage with living quarters above, consisting of a sitting room, kitchen, bedroom, hall closets and bath.

The front porch of the main house opens to the East and to the South onto a driveway which was part of extensive, original cement drives and walks, which origianlly connected the three houses on all sides.

Each lot is covered with upwards of 20 post oak trees, as well as other trees as possible in the grove and present owners have maintained this approach, adding other trees and shrubs, planter boxes and a looselaid brick patio to permit continued drainage.

Original interior walls were beaver board with wood strips. Beaded ceilings used on the porches is still exposed.

Originally built as singlefamily residences, the one at 1201 remained so until after 1945 when the first Mrs. Owen died. Mr. Owen bought the house next door to the south. A partition was installed in the living room at 1201 which provided a separate entrance for the upstairs, where a bedroom

was converted to a kitchen thus creating a three-family residence: one upstairs, one downstairs and one in the garage apartment.

In September of 1962, after having lived in the lower floor without any improvements, the O'Briens began to refurbish, retaining the upper floor and garage apartment as rental units.

The kitchen was remodeled with new cabinets; the pantry was turned into a closet and a half bath for a bedroom; the orginial screened-in back porch was sealed in with windows to make a large combination kitchen, breakfast room, TV area. Downstairs interior walls were sheetrocked. Wiring and plumbing were improved and carpeting was installed over the old oak floors as well as central air conditioning and heating installed.


In 1970 the upstairs was restored at which time vast amounts of previously unused space under the eaves was found and turned into additional closet and storage space. The wall was removed putting the stairway back into the living room. The walls and ceilings were redone; walls paneled; the ceilings textured; the woodwork antiqued to match; and the floors covered. The complete upstairs was used for bedrooms including the room around the stairs. The west downstairs bedroom was made into a den with an extra wide entry from the porch area and the east nursery bedroom was turned into a guest room.

In 1977 the west backporch area, was opened and enlarged to enclose a 12 by 20 foot step-down office/sunroom and familydining area.

Some of the furnishings are original including a large oak buffet, hutch, and large dining table, seating eight to ten in the formal dining area. Two large original tapestry paintings of the period decorate the fireplace and stairway. Decor is traditional. An original bedroom suite furnishes one upstairs bedroom.

The office area houses an antique roll-top desk which was used by an editor of the Ranger Times during the Oil Boom era, and has unrepaired bullet holes in it. An operating ceiling fan from the Cisco Press printing shop of the same era is used here.

The lighted, privacy-fence enclosed, landscaped backyard of today is not that far removed from when only 'mesquite shinnery' spearated it from the Connellee Race Track, and tennis courts just to the west.



#### The Tankersley House

to move out of Eastland. But when J.C. Tankersley bought it from Earl Conner in the early 1950's he called in the Honea movers from Cisco. They managed to dislodge the large, solid structure.

As they traveled out of Eastland an assistant named Voy Kimbrough was almost electrocuted when the top of the house hit some electric lines. He managed to get loose without falling from the top.

The house was carried seven miles north of Eastland to Morton Valley. then north of the store up a dirt road two more miles. There it still stands, a landmark for the community.

J.C. Tankersley and his family lived in the house about four years, then decided to move away. So the house sat vacant for awhile, and was rented periodically. In the 1960's Tankersley

decided to sell the house. His father and mother, C.H. and Ada Tankersley were so impressed by the beautiful old home that they decided to buy it for themselves. So they disposed of the house they were living in and purchased this home from their

Mrs. Tankersley has lived

The house which stood at in the residence since, although her husband died several years ago. C.H. Tankersley completed some remodeling projects before his death, mostly dealing with the exterior of the building.

> The windows have been replaced, there are storm doors on the house, and steel siding painted white. The big back proch has been glassed

The basic structure and character of the place has remained the same, with three upstairs bedrooms, a large living and dining room, and the various porches.

Mrs. Tankersley states that she and her children and grandchildren have enjoyed the house very much, and use it for family gatherings and special occasions such as weddings. "Every now and then

some of the family will mention how much it means, especially since it was a home their father and I lived in. This place gives a person a comfortable, relaxed feeling. Even visitors have remarked on how much they love the old place, and feel at home here."

Mrs. Tankersley has used some antique pieces in furnishing the place, and plans to do more restoration of the inside of the house in the future.

#### The Conner House

Prairie Oil and Gas Co. evolved into Sinclair Oil and Gas Co. and as the Boom played out, the company sold

the three houses on S. Seaman St. to Walter Clark in 1935. He sold the one at 1109 (Judge Earl Conner Jr. home) to Tom Lott, an Eastland pipeliner; the one in the center to Curtis and Margaret Hurtig; and lived in the one at 1201 until he sold

tained a great deal and had built a brick barbecue pit which stands on the alley on that lot to this day.

then new district attorney Earl, Jr. remembers of 1938 but he and Edna scraped together \$1,800 to buy 1109 from Walter Clark (who had taken it back). (Mrs. Conner first taught at South Ward,

across Seaman St., in 1926 for \$52 a month.)

The Hurtigs and the Conners shared a common driveway and a double garage. Curtis Hertig died and his

widow Margaret married Joe Weaver (Virginia Russell's father). After he tied she moved to Fort Worth where she later died and Earl Jr. negotiated with Don Russell (the executor of her estate) to buy the property in the middle. Judge Conner sold the

house on the middle lot to the Tankersley boys who had Housemover Jake Honea of Cisco move it to Morton Valley where it stands today. Mr. Conner got W.D.R. Owen's permission to cut down an oak tree on his property at 1201 to get the house moved off the lot.

Judge Conner acquired the lot, a cellar, another garage and exclusive use of his driveway. In a way Judge Conner ac-

tually helped build S. Seaman St. Between his Junior and Senior year at Eastland High School, he was foreman for the paving of the street from downtown

to S. Conner St., in 1922. He worked for Guy Sherrill and David Carter Construction

Co., before making a trip to Yellowstone Park and coming back to finish high school He recalls that the Con-

nellee Race Track and the Oil Boom Tennis Courts were behind the Seaman St. property.


The Prairie Co. had houses in other parts of town - one being the old Davenport

Prairie headquartered in the building at Plummer and S. Seaman St., now the First **Baptist Church Educational** Building. The county bought that building for \$14,000 and housed government offices there including the old Triple A (later A.S.C.S.), County Agent, Soil Conservation Service, etc., until moving most of them to the new courthouse. W.D.R. Owen helped arrange for the church to acquire the property from the county.

The Conner's sons, Clark and Earl III (Topper), were born and raised in the house



WE ARE INDEBTED to Mr. E.D. Anderson of 1011 West 14th Street for a look at a national newspaper directory for the year 1900. And the book reports that Texas had 794 publications that year, including 640 weekly newspapers. There were 68 dailies and 11 semi-weeklies. The state had 64 monthly publications in 1900.

The book reports: "Cisco, Eastland County, 1,063 population; local estimate 2,500; on Texas Central and T&P railroads, 115 miles W by SW of Fort Worth. Shipping point for cotton and cattle. Agriculture and stock raising. Coal mines, compress, gin, oil and flour mills.

Cisco newspapers were listed thusly:

Apert - Thursday, four pages, subscriptions \$1, established 1892, W.L. Wilson & Co., editors and publishers.

New West - Thursday, people's party, eight pages, subscription \$1, established 1893, J.J. Eager, editor.

Round-Up - Saturdays, democratic, eight pages, established 1881, Frank Vernon, editor and publisher.

The book says "Eastland, county seat, 468 population, on T&P railway, 10 miles E. of Cisco. Agriculture and stock raising. Silver in vicinity. The Chronicle, Fridays, published democratic, four pages, subscription \$1.50, established 1887, June Kimble, editor. Putnam had a newspaper

published Fridays, subscriptions \$1.50, established 1887, Harry Koch, editor. Ranger, with 700 population, had a newspaper called The Success, published on Fridays, by C.C. Mann.

highway widening job were opened a story said... The First National Bank of Cisco had a three column ad on the front page to say "this is the bank that service is building"... On the back page, The Man's Store of Cisco advertised straw hats for men for \$1, ladies batiste pajamas 79 cents, and men's and boys white suits with two

pairs of pants for \$6.95. The Palace Theater was "Rose showing Washington Square," featuring Tyrone Power, Alice Faye and Al Jolson... Lee's Super Service, "The Home of Champion Studebakers," advertised used cars as follows: 1929 Chevy, \$29.50; 1929 Dodge, \$19.50; and 1929 Chevy truck, \$24.50 ... Altman's had an ad saying "Rack of Dresses - choice 29 cents... And Odom's Grocery advertised 10 pounds of sugar, 48 cents; 4 pounds of shortening, 39 cents; Post Toasties, 3 boxes 25 cents; and round, loin or T-bone steak, 25 cents per pound.


