## CofC Directors Given Reports

Members of the steering committee are optimistic that efforts to attract new business and industry will pay dividends, Chairman Dick Woolley told the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce at their monthly meeting last Tuesdy afternoon.

Mr. Wooley reported that the industrial relations teams of both Lone Star Gas Company and West Texas Utilities Company are working with the Cisco committee in their search for potential businesses and payrolls.

"We have had some positive response from some

of the people we have approached," Mr. Woolley said. He added that the Halliburton Corporation has given the Cisco committee the "go ahead" to seek a tenant or purchaser for the Otis Engineering property here. Contacts have already been made on this property,

he added. Dr. Norman Wallace, chairman of the Christmas in May Committee, told the board that 14 applications have been received from individuals for imporvement work at their residences. Vernon Honea and others of the committee were inspecting the project applications and will make a report to the committee. Dr. Wallace said the com-

mittee has received \$2,800 in donations for a 1984 project. He said another \$1,000 would be needed.



## Esme Glenn Art Exhibit Now On Exhibit At CJC

Esme Glenn, well known Abilene artist, will exhibit portraits and landscapes at the library of Cisco Junior College for several weeks. Half the proceeds from the sale of paintings will go to

the CJC Scholarship Fund. A native Abilenian and a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin with a degree in art, Mrs. Glenn has won over one hundred awards in regional and state shows in Texas and New Mexico. Her work hangs in many collections over the country.

She works in acrylics and oils. The oils are all Texas landscapes with the exception of one painting done as the result of a trip to Alaska.

Mrs. Glenn has made an intensive study of the old masters' and other painting methods. Through this study, and by experimenting with watercolor techniques, she has developed a distinctly original style in acrylic painting in which she incorporates the natural fiber of the canvas. In these paintings, transparent and opaque paint is applied alternately in several layers and then finished with an acrylic varnish. This gives a thorough protection for the paintings without having to be framed unde: glass.

In 1979 two of her paintings done in this manner were purchased by the Abilene Chamber of Commerce as gifts to visiting dignitaries that year. A portrait of a West Texas farmer and rancher was given to the then Secretary of Agriculture Bob



## **Drilling Bits**

A Dallas-Based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Wooten-Boggs Unit, a developmental well to be located one mile north of Cisco. With projected total depth of 3,900 feet, the well is in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's Hanvey Field, H&TCRR Survey, A-257. The operator is Don H. Hanvey Oil Interests, Inc.



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

SMALL HOUSEHOLDS SAVE ON FOOD BUYING COSTS

Janet Thomas

People living alone pay more than twice the per capita food costs of fourmember households. The reason for this is that most singles - and couples - buy small quantities at a time. Typically, the bigger the package, the lower the unit cost. So small households pay more per serving.

Also, according to the Food Marketing institute, 40 percent of all shoppers are men. Some of these men are smart buyers, but many could save by shopping more carefully. Employed women may also tend to buy food impulsively and expensively when they could save more.

Many people resent the time it takes to shop. But if you organize yourself, it can be done quickly and pay off in smaller grocery bills.

Just shopping for groceries instead of eating out saves money. The average home-prepared meal costs one-third less than equal restaurant meal. Even frozen gourment entress and dinners from the supermarket will cost less than similar choices in a resturant.

That doesn't mean you have to give up resturant dining. But you can keep the resturant choice for when you need it most and not when you're simply unprepared to eat at home.

Couples and singles don't have to choose between time and money. Instead, try some of these strategies:

·Invest in a microwave oven so you can cook and reheat food rapidly.

•Or think about each evening's dinner before you leave for work in the morning. Move the food you will need from the freezer to the refrigerator to thaw for wick cooking when you ge home. Just be sure to use the

thawed food right away. ·Avoid the small-costmore trap. Buy larger sizes, then cut or divide and freeze or store in meal-size portions. You save on shopping time, as well as money.

•Don't feel like you have too cook everything. Vegetables, for example are delicious and nutritious served raw or barely cooked.

·Use quick cooking foods, like fish, or quick-cooking methods such as stir-frying. ·Save money by buying a small roast and slicing it into steaks.

•Prepare enough of a main dish to make two or three meals. Freeze extra portions in freezer-to-oven containers for future meals. That way you'll spend less on convenince foods.

·Cook potatoes, rice, dried beans, carrots and other foods in double amounts. Store servings for a second meal in the refrigerator.

Without pruning, plants will choke and strangle trees, rip down trellises, down-spouts and arbors and also get under shingles on the roofs of houses. The vines are so vigerous that they will take over anywhere, undermining porch and balcony railings, climbing several stories to embrace chimneys. Yet, if it is pruned regularly, wisteria can be kept under control.

For abundant bloom, wisteria should be in a sunny location. Vines will prosper even in a quite deep shade, but blooms will be sparse.

The kind of soil is not important, but wisterias will



## State Rep. Jim Parker Speaks With Green Thumb Workers

State Rep. Jim Parker told more than 120 Green Thumb older workers attending a meeting in Dublin on March 29 that the Texas Legislature is headed for a special session probably around June 11, and would feature some heated discussions of tax proposals.

Farmers Union Green Thumb employs 1,025 persons aged 55 and over in public service jobs across the state. The program is funded by the U.S. Dept. of Labor through Title V of the Older Americans Act.

Mike Moeller, president of Texas Farmers Union, told the Green Thumbers that Farmers Union was very proud to have worked with the Johnson Administration in the mid-60's to create an older worker program for rural areas.

"A study by Farmers Union showed that younger people were leaving rural areas and taking jobs along with them," Moeller said. "Green Thumb was and is an attempt to provide work for the older people who form the backbone of rural America.'

The fast approaching storm season was the focus of a presentation by Bob Stalnaker, a meterologist with the National Weather Service, which has continued to provide weather alerts and information in the face of possible budget cuts.

Stalnaker gave some tips for surviving severe storms and tornadoes:

-Keep windows closed and stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls. Find a place in the interior of your home that has as many

walls as possible between you and the approaching tornado, which normally comes

from the southwest. -In public buildings seek out designated shelter areas and stay on lower floors. Leave cars and mobile homes, even if anchored, for sturdy shelter as soon as the tornado alert is issued.

-In open areas, find a depression or ditch, lie down, and cover your head. Most tornado fatalities are

caused by flying debris. Early April is the time for ranchers in Eastland County to beware of oak bud poisoning in livestock.

Oak bud poisoning is a problem each spring because winter weather reduces range forage quality. Also, these conditions will slow spring growth of forage plants.

Oak buds are high in protein and begin growth before most desirable forage plants. They are readily eaten by livestock, especially cattle

Tannins which are thought to be the toxic substances involved are most poisonous when oaks are budding and leafting. When more than 50 percent of an animals's diet is oak, the animal becomes sick. A diet of 75 percent or more usually causes death.

Sings of poisoning are a guant, tucked up appearance; constipation, frequently followed by profuse diarrhea; weakness; tendency to remain near water: reluctance to follow the emancipation

(wasting away); mucus in droppings; dark-colored urine; and collapse.

Move animals showing symptoms to an oak-free pasture and put them on adequate feed and water. A supplemental feed containing 10 percent calcium hydroxide may help reduce losses.

However, prevention is a better cure for oak bud poisoning. Control oak in a pasture and save that pasture as a reserve grazing program to improve range and forage production.

Consult a veterinarian if you are unsure of the cause of livestock poisoning and

Weeds cost ranchers many dollars in lost production each year because they rob desirable forages of moisture and nutrients.

But herbicides can reduce those losses.

Range weeds could be a serious problem in Eastland County this spring because of the poor condition of our range grasses. Each rancher

needs to check his rangeland now to see if he has a weed infestation.

Ranchers that find heavy weed infestations on their ranges should consider control measures. Broadleaf plants such as distaff thistle. annual broomweed, camphorweed, ragweed and others should be the target for herbicide control.

Use of the herbicide 2, 4-D

in early spring provides excellent control of most annual weeds. Weeds should be growing rapidly and the herbicide should be applied before they flower. Ranchers may use 2,4-D amine in areas that receive more than 25 inches of annual rainfall, while 2,4-D low-volatile ester should be used in areas

of less rainfall.

To control harder-to-kill weeds, a dicamba-2,4-D mixture or a picloram-2,4-D mixture is effective. Dicamba (Banvel) and 2,4-D may be tank mixed, or a dicamba-2,4-D mixture (1.3 ratio) is commercially available under the trade name Weedmaster. Likewise, picloram (Grazon PC) and 2,4-D may



Weed control on rangeland is a practice that can produce significant returens. Weed control result demonstrations have shown a siginificant increase in grass production by controlling unwanted weeds. In many cases, a poud of grass has been produced for every pound of weeds controlled.

For maximum benefits from herbicide weed control, ranchers should practice good grazing management. Deferred grazing during the growing season will allow drought-damaged grasses to regain vigor and become better established. Proper grazing management can help keep a good cover of grass while reducing weeds.






