

Children aren't alone at this Easter time. Anglers are enjoying perhaps the largest egg hunt ever held. The hunt for those spawing black bass. Each year beginning as early as mid February on some impoundments until as late as July on

other lakes anglers are trying to coax those large female bass into taking the bait. There are actually three periods during a spawn. Pre spawn, nesting, and post spawn, probably the most frustrating of the three periods would be the

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actual nesting period, which normally covers 7 days. During this period anglers can actually bump the females on the nest and perhaps not recieve a strike. The females will often simply blow a bait from the next, never inhaling the lure. The single most

recognized as a natural enemy of the eggs which the female will be laying. A direct cast bringing the bait directly into the nest will almost always bring a reaction, even still this may only be to blow the intruder from the nesting area and not actually take the bait. Our area lakes are fortunate in that normally we cannot actually see these nest, but nest cast repeatedly during a days time, thereby reducing the harvest of large female bass, which replenish our supply



President Ronald Reagan has proclaimed April 23-29, 1984 as National Consumers Week. We have emerged from a recession on a wave of consumer optimism that dramatically proves the truth of this year's slogan -"Consumers

Business.' Consumers mean business for stores, companies and services. They also mean business about having their complaints and problems resolved.

Even in today's complex marketplace, consumers should expect quality products and services at fair prices. But when something goes wrong, you need to let the company know about your problem. This is the fastest way to get your complaint resolved. It also gives the company a chance to keep your business and gain new customers by learning from mistakes. Most companies welcome this opportunity

Handling your own complaint is easy if you take the following steps:

\*Identify the problem and what you believe would be a fair settlement. Do you want your money back? Would you like the product repaired? Will an exchange

\*Gather documentation regarding your complaint. Sales receipts, repair orders, warranties, cancelled checks, or contracts will back up your complaint and help the company solve your problem.

\*Go back to where you made the purchase. Contact the person who sold you the item or performed the service. Explain the problem and what action you would like taken. If that person is not helpful, ask for the supervisor or manager and repeat your complaint. A large percentage of consumer problems are resolved at this level. Chances are yours will be too.

\*Don't give up, if you are not satisfied with the response. If the company operates nationally or the product is a national brand, write a letter to the person responsible for consumer complaints at the company's headquarters.

After that, contact an in dustry dispute program; the Better Business Bureau, or a local or state government office. In Texas, contact: State Office, David A. Talbot, Jr., Assistant Attorney General and Chief; Consumer Protection Division, Office of Attorney General, P.O. Box 12548, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711 (telephone: 512/475-3288).

\*Finally, contact a trade association or agency of the Federal government if your complaint has not been satisfactorily resolved. Your last resort is a small claims court or private lawyer.

\*A free consumer hand-book containing information about complaint resolution and names and addresses of public and private organiza-tions may be obtained by writing to: HANDBOOK, Consumer Information Center, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

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

State Rep. Jim Parker told more than 120 Green Thumb older workers attending a meeting in Dublin on March 29 that the Texas Legislature is headed for a special session probably around June 11, and would feature some heated discussions of tax proposals.

Farmers Union Green Thumb employs 1,025 persons aged 55 and over in public service jobs across the state. The program is funded by the U.S. Dept. of Labor through Title V of the Older Americans Act.

Mike Moeller, president of Texas Farmers Union, told the Green Thumbers that Farmers Union was very proud to have worked with the Johnson Administration in the mid-60's to create an older worker program for rural areas.

"A study by Farmers Union showed that younger people were leaving rural areas and taking jobs along with them," Moeller said. "Green Thumb was and is an attempt to provide work for the older people who form

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the backbone of rural America."

The fast approaching storm season was the focus of a presentation by Bob Stalnaker, a meterologist with the National Weather Service, which has continued to provide weather alerts and information in the face of possible budget cuts.

Stalnaker gave some tips for surviving severe storms and tornadoes:

-Keep windows closed and stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls. Find a place in the interior of your home that has as many walls as possible between you and the approaching tornado, which normally comes from the southwest.

-In public buildings seek out designated shelter areas and stay on lower floors. Leave cars and mobile homes, even if anchored, for sturdy shelter as soon as the tornado alert is issued.

-In open areas, find a depression or ditch, lie down, and cover your head. Most tornado fatalities are



## CJC, Community Provide

## **Local Nursing Training**

Cisco Junior College's vocational nursing program in Abilene is a prime example of how a school and community can work together to provide education and skilled training.

The LVN program, located in CJC's facilities in Westgate Shopping Center, draws on health care institutions throughout the city to allow students to gain valuable clinical experience.

After gaining classroom experience, the students put their knowledge to work at West Texas Medical Center, Dyess AFB Hospital, the Abilene State School, Abilene Emergency Medical Service, home health agencies, the regional dialysis center, the Rehab Center and "various other agencies," said director Donna Burleson.

The vocational nursing program was one of the first programs offered at CJC's Abilene campus when it opened in 1972 and it has proved to be one of the most enduring.

The program began with 22 students in one class and has grown to 55 students in two full-time courses. Fulltime courses begin at the end of February and the end of August.

The school also offers a part-time program. Registration for the next part-time session begins April 30. Classes also start on that date.

Classes in the full-time program are held Monday through Friday each week for the equivalent of 12 months. Part-time classes are held in the evening for 19 months.

After completing the program, students are awarded a certificate of completion, Mrs. Burleson said. Then they must pass the state licensing exam in order to become a licensed voca-

tional nurse. To enroll in the LVN course, a student must have a high school diploma or equivalent. Prospective students must also pass a pre-entrance exam at CJC.

Ms. Burleson, who has been director since the pro gram began, said most of the students are female but 'sometimes we have a fairly large number of males." Students range in age from

those a few years out of high school to older persons. One woman who recently finished the course was 65 years of age, Mrs. Burleson said. Mrs. Burleson said that

she believes "there will always be a need" for LVNs, although some health care professionals predict vocational nursing will someday be phased out.

Vocational nursing provides one of the "most economical" means of health care.

Currently six instructors including Ms. Burleson teach courses at CJC. Ms. Burleson, who is from Iowa originally, received a bachelor's degree from Angelo State University. She also is a graduate of a diploma nursing program and is a registered nurse.

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





freeze-damaged highways in all 24 highway districts, the commission directed that the money be used to provide protective coatings for roadways almost certain to disintegrate completely under another winter's

damage wrought by last winter's storms forced the commission to allocate money for the preservation project, an action it had hoped to forego this year, since funds are spare.

The unusually severe

Faced with cash-flow problems, the commission elected last year to skip the annual Safety and Rehabilitation Program which costs \$100 million to \$150 million and includes funds to repair winter damage. The commission had hoped to omit the program again this year but those hopes were dashed by one of the most severe Texas winters on record.

With freeze-damaged roadways in all 24 highway districts, the commission felt it would be more costeffective to repair badly damaged highways, rather than later face more costly programs requiring complete rebuilding.

Approximately 260 sections and U.S. highways, totaling 2,328 miles, are included in the freeze-damage program.

The highways that sustained the most freeze damage in the Brownwood District, according to District Engineer Lawrence Schulz, are in Lampassas, Mc-Culloch, San Saba, and Mills Counties, but repairs are also needed in Comanche, Coleman, Eastland, and Stephens Counties.

Schulz said that plans are complete for repair of approximately 100 miles of freeze damaged highways in District 23 at an estimated cost of \$1,750,000. He hopes to let contracts in May for all

the repairs in district. In Lampasas County, fabric underseal, seal coat, and partial asphalt overlay will strengthen approximately ten mile of US 190 east of lampasas, from Loop 257, east ot near Lampasas River. A seal coat will provide a moisture barrier on approximately six miles of US 281, from the Coryell County line, south to Freeman Branch, while the

intersections os US 281 and US 183 on the north side of Lampasas will receive a fabric underseal and asphalt overlay.

In Coleman County, a freeze-damaged six miles of US 84 from the Taylor County line into the Jim Ned Creek will require a protective asphalt seal coat.

A 22-mile section of the State Highway 36 in Comanche County, from the AT&SF Railroad Overpass in Comanche, southeast to the Hamilton County line, and seven miles of SH 206 in Eastland County, from IH-20 west of Cisco, south to FM 2526 near Nimrod, will both receive seal coats.

US 87, from its intersection with US 238, west of Brady, to the Concho county line, a total of approximately 14 miles, will be reinforced with a fabric underseal and seal coat.

Approximately nine miles of US 84 in Mills County, from 0.4 miles north of Mullin, east to intersection of US 183, near the city limits of Goldthwaite, and eleven miles of US 190 in San Saba County, from 25. miles west of San Saba, west to FM 45, will receive seal coats.

In Stephens County, a seal coat will also be added to protect 12 miles of US 180 east of Breckenridge, from SH 67 to Loop 252, east of



## **Trade Hurtles Hurting Texas Agriculture**

Texas agriculture depends heavily on export markets, but prospects currently are

"A good portion of all the major crops grown in Texas--cotton, grain sorghum, wheat, rice and soybeansgoes into overseas markets," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "That's why the climate for exports has such a big impact on this state's agricultural as well as total

Unfortunately, Anderson, export prospects are rather bleak for a number of reasons: the strong dollar abroad which makes U.S. farm commodities cost more to foreign buyers, protectionist trade policies of foreign countries.

The strong dollar discourages U.S. exports and encourages imports, explains the economist. The dollar's value has increased largely because of high interest rates, low inflation rates and a record budget deficit.

Protectionist trade policies practiced by major trading countries have a marked effect on U.S. exports, adds Anderson. For example, the European Economic Community has a system of import levies and export subsidies to protect their farmers.

Foreign producers, with considerable support from their governments, are pushing to export more agricultural products. For instance, China has stepped

The developing countries of Asia and South America boast the most potential customers for American farm commodities, Anderson points out. But they lack money and credit to make major purchases.

Many of these international trade hurdles can be resolved, says Anderson, but it will take a cooperative effort by farm organizations and agribusinesses and positive government action.

Meanwhile, with exports decreasing, farmers must cut back on production to keep commodity supplies at reasonable levels," he contends. "This means taking acres out of production either by low prices or by mandatory production con-



With less warm air flowing into the system, the house doesn't get as warm as it should, so you turn up the thermostat - thereby using more fuel without getting more heat.

The air filters in your furnace are 1-in, thick fiber mats through which the cold air must flow as it moves into the furnace. Any dust in the air is deposited on the filters before the air passes into the furnace. As dust builds up after a few weeks, the amount of air flowing through the filter is cut down. The only remedy is to clean or replace the filters regularly. The frequency of change depends on your home. Some, especially those with a number of small children or with pets, tend to be dustier than others.

In very dusty homes, the filters should be cleaned or changed every 60 days to maintain the heating efficiency and to keep fuel costs low. In moderately dusty homes, the filters should be changed or cleaned every 90 days.

In homes with a mild dust problem, filters probably need to be changed only once, in the middle of the season.

If you have an electrostatic or electronic filtering system clean it more often than you would standard filters - every 30 days. Follow the instructions on the unit, since each type is cleaned in a different

manner. TO REPLACE STANDARD **FILTERS** 

1. Purchase filters (as many as required for your unit) of the correct size. To be sure of the size, remove an old filter and measure

Remove the access panel in the side of the furnace. usually by turning a locking screw ¼ turn. Reach in and lift filters out of the frames in which they rest. The blower should be turned off as you do this.

Fit the new filters into the frames. If you have washable filters, you can hose them clean, allowing the water to run through the mesh and carry the dirt out. They can be reinserted immediately. Close the access door and





#### **Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu**

Each day we read articles that indicate the type of foods we eat are involved in preventing various kinds of diseases, and considerable information is being gathered showing that this certainly might be true in prevention of cancer.

The Illinois Division of the American Cancer Society became the first state division to announce that cancer prevention through dietary changes would be a major part of its educational campaign. This question is: Specifically what foods should we eat? Research shows that foods

rich in vitamin A tend to fight the development of tumors in many parts of the body. This includes, of course, fruits and vegetables which are deep green, orange and yellow. Also vitamin C seems to help with stomach cancer conditions. Once again, fruits, citrus fruits, are helpful, while broccoli, brussel sprouts, asparagus, cauliflower, green peppers, peas, raspberries and strawberries are selected foods. Remember, whole grain foods that are high in fiber are cancer-inhibitors, however, the researchers cannot explain the reason why this is true.

The theme that we are becoming more and more involved in diet control is true, and that is the reason at the Senior Center carefully selected foods are properly prepared to have proper






