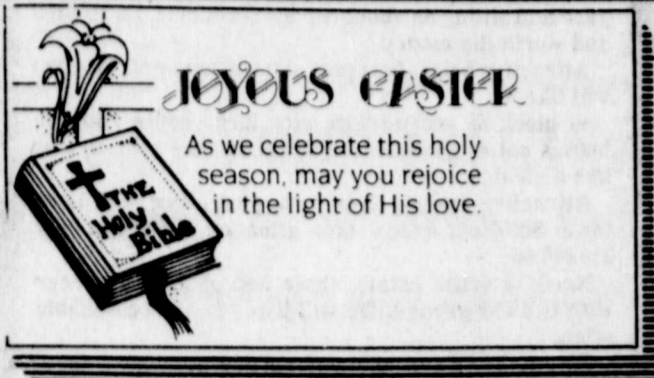

Don Underwood Seeks County Sheriff Position



Don Underwood stated this week that he wants to be your sheriff for the next four years. Don believes that he can show the people of Eastland County a great change in the number of crimes committed, by carrying out the duties of Sheriff of Eastland County as he has been trained. By using qualified help, by good investigation, by presenting accurate and factual cases to the Grand Jury, and by being experienced in court procedure and capable of testi-

fyng of facts in court. Don believes it is unimportant who makes an actual arrest and which department gets the credit as long as the case is solved in a legal manner. Meaning, no loop holes for a guilty person to crawl through and be free on a technicality. Don has proven that he is capable of this by his record as Sheriff of Nolan County. During Don's first year in office there, 13 murders occurred, not from his failure to protect, but because of growth of the county and former convictions. All 13 murders were solved and found guilty in court. The last year Don served as Sheriff of Nolan County they had only 1 murder. Don believes that he can bring this help to your county and his.

Annual Easter Pageant Set Sunday At 3:30 A.M.

The 20th annual Easter Pageant will be held at the Kendrick Amphitheater on U.S. Highway 80 midway between Cisco and Eastland, beginning at 3:30 a.m. Sunday, April 22. A large crowd was expected for the event.

A cast of some 35 persons will present some 60 scenes in depicting the life of Christ. Director of the annual event all of the years has been Phil (Shorty) Kendrick, and he will be on the job again this year, as will Mr. J.H. (Mom) Kendrick at the organ and Pierre Kendrick as the narrator.

The annual spectacle has used the same basic theme and format over the years with occasional changes in scene interpretations. The program will open with scenes of Mary and Joseph and the Wise Men.

Highlights in the life of Christ, including His birth, His baptism, His healing experiences, His preaching, His sermon on the mount, the last supper, the Garden of Gethsemane and the scene of the agony and betrayal of Christ through the crucifixion and the resurrection, will be presented in the program of some two hours duration.



The pageant's ending is timed to be most effective in the new light of Easter morning appears on the eastern horizon. The Religious Diorama, which is part of the amphitheater complex, was to be open all day Saturday and until 1 a.m. Sunday, giving visitors an opportunity to see the numerous biblical scenes there. Tours will be on the hour during the day and evening.

Fingerprints Program Will Resume

Fingerprinting through the "Fingerprints on File" program is scheduled to resume after the Easter holidays on Wednesday, April 25. Junior High and High School students may be fingerprinted with parental consent only.

Any consent forms not yet returned may be returned on Wednesday. Students should take those signed forms to police officers when they go to be fingerprinted. Forms will also be available at the high school on Wednesday.

Pre-schoolers are scheduled for fingerprinting beginning at 9 a.m. on Wednesday. It is important for parents to realize that ideal prints cannot be taken of children of a young age, due to their lack of development, but the service of fingerprinting for youngsters is being offered to pre-schoolers.

Students who have missed fingerprinting are scheduled for make-ups, the time will be announced at their respective schools. Transportation to the high school for make-up fingerprinting will be provided.

The Cisco Service Club is working with the Cisco Kiwanis Club in assisting the local Police Department in fingerprinting all Cisco youths, with parental consent. The sole purpose of the fingerprinting will be for the purpose of identifying youths in the event they are discovered missing.

Of the thousands of children reported missing each year in the United States, approximately ninety percent return home, leaving still thousands unaccounted for. It is with this fact in mind that the fingerprint program, is motivated.

The club sponsors of the "Fingerprints on File" program, would like to stress the fact that no child will be fingerprinted without parental permission. Likewise, no copies of the prints will be kept on file, anywhere

besides with the individual. In the event the child is missing, the fingerprints should be turned over to law enforcement authorities when making the report.

Fingerprints are an efficient tool for identification no matter how much time has lapsed between the child being reported missing and the possibility of the child being found. Fingerprints remain the same all through life.

The program can only be successful through the cooperation of the community, school officials, parents and guardians with the efforts of the Sheriff's officers and local Police Department. For more information, call 442-2655.

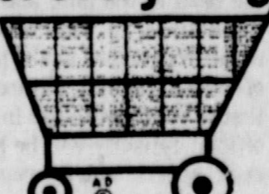

Bass Club Report

Terry L. Wilson

Children aren't alone at this Easter time. Anglers are enjoying perhaps the largest egg hunt ever held. The hunt for those spawning black bass. Each year beginning as early as mid February on some impoundments until as late as July on

other lakes anglers are trying to coax those large female bass into taking the bait. There are actually three periods during a spawn. Pre spawn, nesting, and post spawn, probably the most frustrating of the three periods would be the

actual nesting period, which normally covers 7 days. During this period anglers can actually bump the females on the nest and perhaps not receive a strike. The females will often simply blow a bait from the next, never inhaling the lure. The single most

productive lure at this time would be a lizard, presented within the next area. Lizards, or salamander are recognized as a natural enemy of the eggs which the female will be laying. A direct cast bringing the bait directly into the nest will almost always bring a reaction, even still this may only be to blow the intruder from the nesting area and not actually take the bait. Our area lakes are fortunate in that normally we cannot actually see these nest, but nest cast repeatedly during a days time, thereby reducing the harvest of large female bass, which replenish our supply of America's most popular game fish "The Elusive Bass."

Area lakes are producing quite well with our own backyard Leon, giving up some real nice stringers. Our dedicated might be fishermen during the part full moon have enjoyed some excellent evenings. A number of fish in the three to six pound range have been taken. A few of these fish are heavy with eggs. Lake Daniels still producing nice crappie and bass. Proctor slow for bass, but crappie

and channel cat are picking up. Remember those

youngsters next time out they'll have a ball. Good fishing.

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

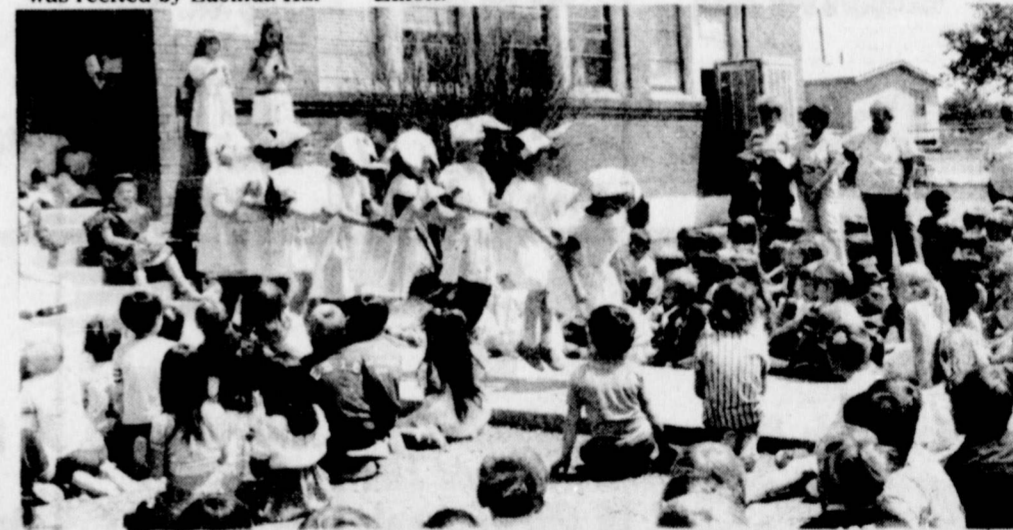

H-SU Cowboy Band Will

Travel Overseas May 8-24

The Hardin-Simmons University Cowboy band will travel overseas for the first time in 21 years, May 8-24, taking both religious and secular music to four countries in Europe with a Baptist evangelistic emphasis.

Vance O'Brien, senior (trombone) of Eastland, son of Mr. and Mrs. H.V. O'Brien, 1201 S. Seaman, Eastland, will be one of 43 members of the band who will be traveling to Europe, directed by Bill Woods, immediate past president of the 5,000 member Texas Music Educators Association. Bandsmen will leave Dallas/Ft. Worth Airport, Tuesday, May 8 at 5:25 p.m. and leave Frankfurt on May 24, arriving back at DFW at 3:25 p.m. on May 24.

Programs will be presented in London on May 10-11; Paris, France, May 12-13; Dijon, May 16; Lucerne, Switzerland, May 18; Strasbourg, France May 20; Cologne, Germany, May 20-21; Rhine Marine Air Force Base and Wiesbaden, Germany, May 22-23.

Sponsors of the trip include the Men's Department of the Baptist World Alliance; the HSU Cowboy Band Foundation; and HSU. Band members will be providing \$250 each to help finance the trip.

A concert featuring Maynard Ferguson, international jazz artist, will be held on May 3, at HSU Behrens

Chapel to help raise funds to finance the trip also.

A man instrumental in the band's last overseas trip in 1963 to Japan as a part of the "New Life Movement" is Dr. W.H. (Dub) Jackson, Jr., Fort Worth, a former Southern Baptist missionary and Cowboy Band ex who is now director of the Men's Department of the BWA.

Director Bill Woods said that intensive rehearsals have been underway for both religious and secular music that will one of the main features of the dedication of the British Rail Inauguration program at Gatwick Airport, London.

"The band is looking forward to giving its music testimony," said Woods.

Dr. Jesse C. Fletcher, HSU president, expressed pleasure that the bandsmen will be making the trip and said, "I am pleased that the Cowboy Band Foundation, the young men who make up the band and their parents, several friends of the University, and individual churches as well as HSU are making it financially possible for the band to make the overseas trip."

Fletcher said that Dr. Rufus Spraberry, director of church relations for HSU, will travel with the bandsmen and speak in several churches. Mrs. Spraberry will also be a part of the traveling party.

Others who will be accom-

panying the the trip in addition to Woods and his wife are: Dr. and Mrs. Wesley Coffman (he's dean of the HSU School of Music), their daughter, Becky; Lawson hager, former director of the Cowboy Band and now a member of the School of Music faculty, who will be a part of the band; and Charles Richardson, director of news for HSU. Coffman will be the administrative officer on the trip, Dr. Fletcher reported.

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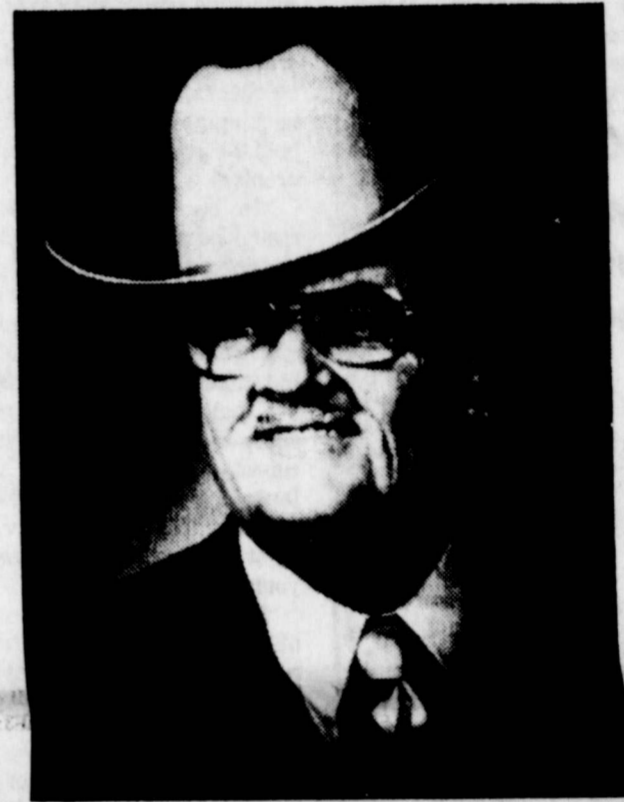

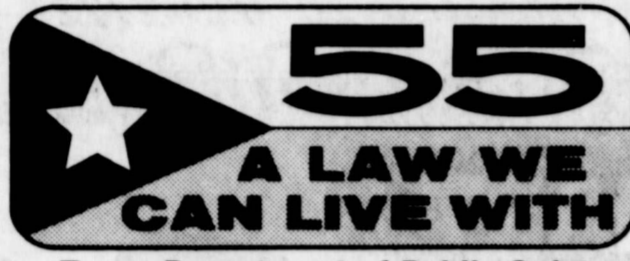

President Ronald Reagan has proclaimed April 23-29, 1984 as National Consumers Week. We have emerged from a recession on a wave of consumer optimism that dramatically proves the truth of this year's slogan - "Consumers Mean Business."

Consumers mean business for stores, companies and services. They also mean business about having their complaints and problems resolved.

Even in today's complex marketplace, consumers should expect quality products and services at fair prices. But when something goes wrong, you need to let the company know about

your problem. This is the fastest way to get your complaint resolved. It also gives the company a chance to keep your business and gain new customers by learning from mistakes. Most companies welcome this opportunity.

Handling your own complaint is easy if you take the following steps:

*Identify the problem and what you believe would be a fair settlement. Do you want your money back? Would you like the product repaired? Will an exchange do?

*Gather documentation regarding your complaint. Sales receipts, repair orders, warranties, cancelled checks, or contracts will back up your complaint and help the company solve your problem.

*Go back to where you made the purchase. Contact the person who sold you the item or performed the service. Explain the problem and what action you would like taken. If that person is not helpful, ask for the supervisor or manager and repeat your complaint. A large percentage of consumer problems are resolved at this level. Chances are yours will be too.

*Don't give up, if you are not satisfied with the response. If the company operates nationally or the product is a national brand, write a letter to the person responsible for consumer complaints at the company's headquarters.

*After that, contact an industry dispute program; the Better Business Bureau, or a local or state government office. In Texas, contact: State Office, David A. Talbot, Jr., Assistant Attorney General and Chief; Consumer Protection Division, Office of Attorney General, P.O. Box 12548, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711 (telephone: 512/475-3288).

*Finally, contact a trade association or agency of the Federal government if your complaint has not been satisfactorily resolved. Your last resort is a small claims court or private lawyer.

*A free consumer handbook containing information about complaint resolution and names and addresses of public and private organizations may be obtained by writing to: HANDBOOK, Consumer Information Center, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

3/4 cup commercial sour cream
3/4 cup mayonnaise
2 tablespoons caraway seeds
1 (0.37-ounce) package buttermilk salad dressing mix.

Wash the cauliflower, and break in to flowerets. Combine cauliflower and next 3 ingredients in a medium mixing bowl; toss gently. Stir together remaining ingredients; pour over vegetables, and stir well. Spoon into serving bowl; cover and chill before serving. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

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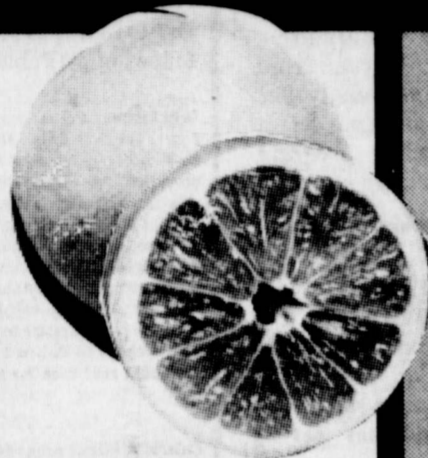
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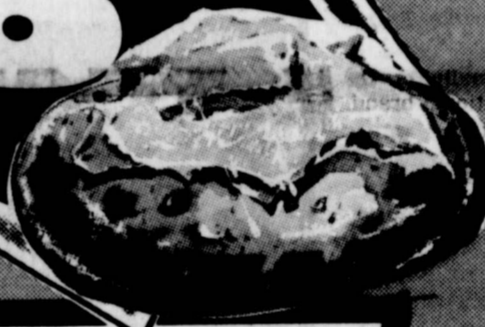

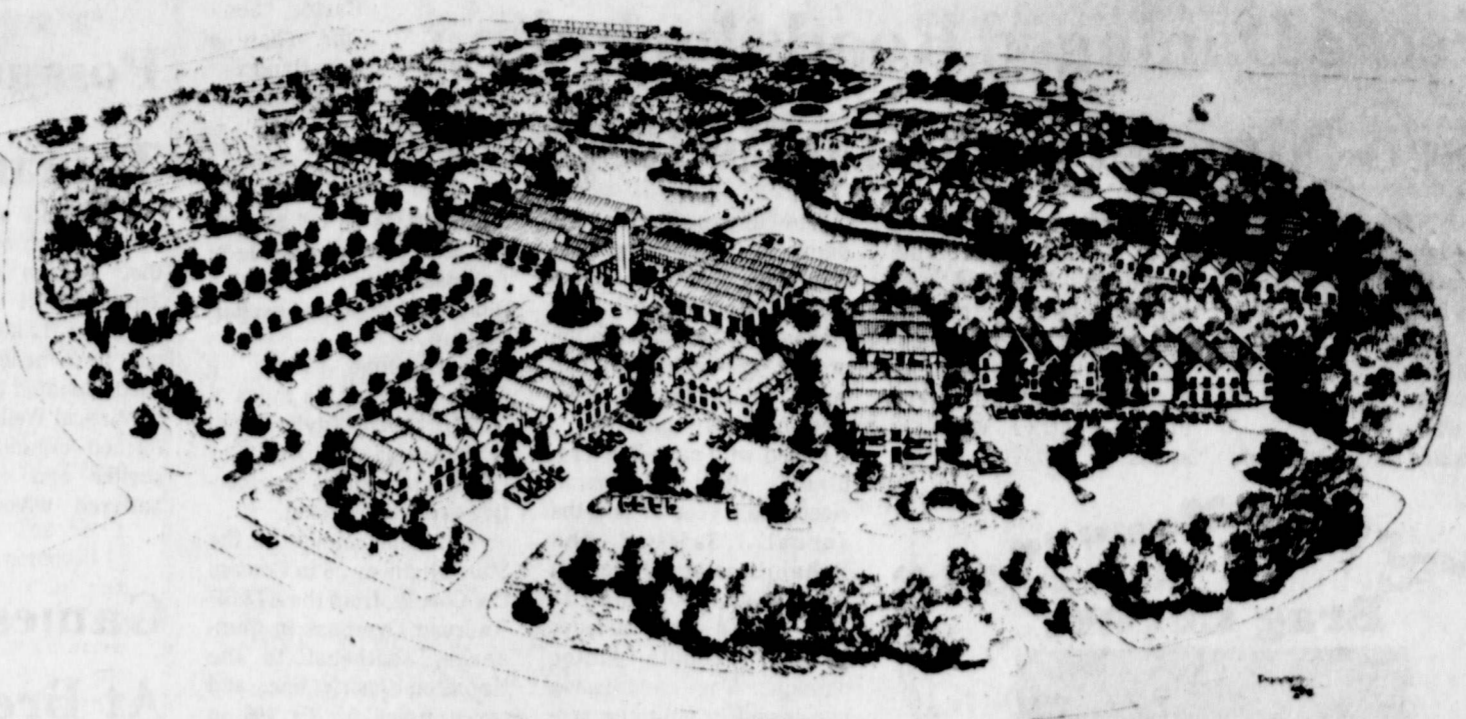

Freeze Damaged Roads Including Cisco-Nimrod Hwy. To Be Repaired

BROWNWOOD, - The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission on April 11 allocated \$45 million to repair more than 2,300 miles of roadways badly damaged by the severe Texas winter.

In issuing orders to repair freeze-damaged highways in all 24 highway districts, the commission directed that the money be used to provide protective coatings for roadways almost certain to disintegrate completely under another winter's stress.

The unusually severe damage wrought by last winter's storms forced the commission to allocate money for the preservation project, an action it had hoped to forego this year, since funds are spare.

Faced with cash-flow problems, the commission elected last year to skip the annual Safety and Rehabilitation Program which costs \$100 million to \$150 million and includes funds to repair winter damage. The commission had hoped to omit the program again this year but those hopes were dashed by one of the most severe Texas winters on record.

With freeze-damaged roadways in all 24 highway districts, the commission felt it would be more cost-effective to repair badly damaged highways, rather than later face more costly programs requiring complete rebuilding.

Approximately 260 sections and U.S. highways, totaling 2,328 miles, are included in the freeze-damage program.

The highways that sustained the most freeze damage in the Brownwood District, according to District Engineer Lawrence Schulz, are in Lampassas, McCulloch, San Saba, and Mills Counties, but repairs are also needed in Comanche, Coleman, Eastland, and Stephens Counties.

Schulz said that plans are complete for repair of approximately 100 miles of freeze damaged highways in District 23 at an estimated cost of \$1,750,000. He hopes to let contracts in May for all the repairs in district.

In Lampassas County, fabric underseal, seal coat, and partial asphalt overlay will strengthen approximately ten miles of US 190 east of lampassas, from Loop 257, east of near Lampassas River. A seal coat will provide a moisture barrier on approximately six miles of US 281, from the Coryell County line, south to Freeman Branch, while the

intersections on US 281 and US 183 on the north side of Lampassas will receive a fabric underseal and asphalt overlay.

In Coleman County, a freeze-damaged six miles of US 84 from the Taylor County line into the Jim Ned Creek will require a protective asphalt seal coat.

A 22-mile section of the State Highway 36 in Comanche County, from the AT&SF Railroad Overpass in Comanche, southeast to the Hamilton County line, and seven miles of SH 206 in Eastland County, from IH-20 west of Cisco, south to FM 2526 near Nimrod, will both receive seal coats.

US 87, from its intersection with US 238, west of Brady, to the Concho county line, a total of approximately 14 miles, will be reinforced with a fabric underseal and seal coat.

Approximately nine miles of US 84 in Mills County, from 0.4 miles north of Mullin, east to intersection of US 183, near the city limits of Goldthwaite, and eleven miles of US 190 in San Saba County, from 25 miles west of San Saba, west to FM 45, will receive seal coats.

In Stephens County, a seal coat will also be added to protect 12 miles of US 180 east of Breckenridge, from SH 67 to Loop 252, east of Caddo.

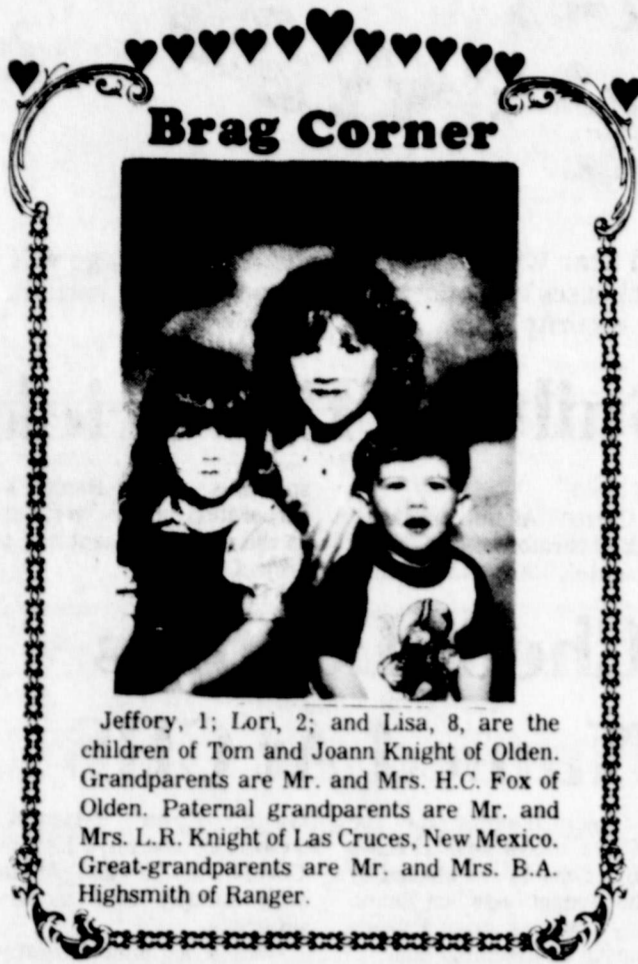

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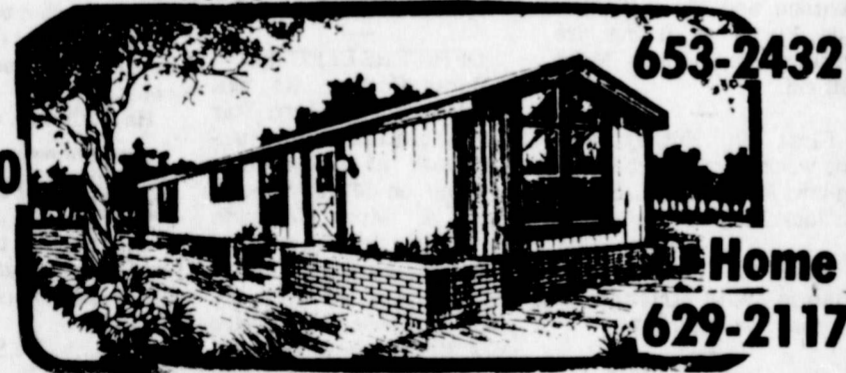

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Trade Hurles Hurting Texas Agriculture

Texas agriculture depends heavily on export markets, but prospects currently are dim.

"A good portion of all the major crops grown in Texas—cotton, grain sorghum, wheat, rice and soybeans—goes into overseas markets," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "That's why the climate for exports has such a big impact on this state's agricultural as well as total economy."

Unfortunately, says Anderson, export prospects are rather bleak for a number of reasons: the strong dollar abroad which makes U.S. farm commodities cost more to foreign buyers, protectionist

trade policies of foreign countries.

The strong dollar discourages U.S. exports and encourages imports, explains the economist. The dollar's value has increased largely because of high interest rates, low inflation rates and a record budget deficit.

Protectionist trade policies practiced by major trading countries have a marked effect on U.S. exports, adds Anderson. For example, the European Economic Community has a system of import levies and export subsidies to protect their farmers.

Foreign producers, with considerable support from their governments, are pushing to export more agricultural products. For instance, China has stepped

up cotton production substantially to increase exports of cotton textiles, notes the economist.

The developing countries of Asia and South America boast the most potential customers for American farm commodities, Anderson points out. But they lack money and credit to make major purchases.

Many of these international trade hurdles can be resolved, says Anderson, but it will take a cooperative effort by farm organizations and agribusinesses and positive government action.

"Meanwhile, with exports decreasing, farmers must cut back on production to keep commodity supplies at reasonable levels," he contends. "This means taking acres out of production either by low prices or by mandatory production controls."

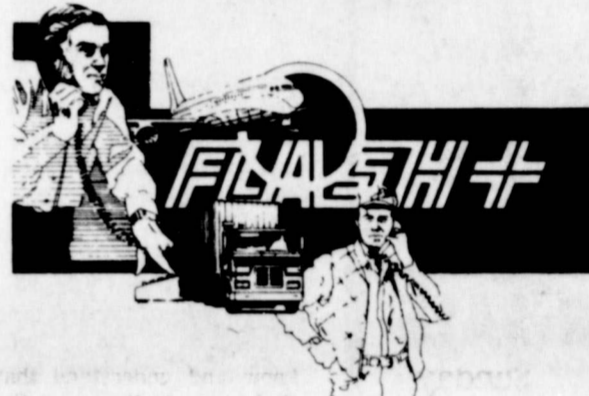

CLEAN FURNACE FILTERS

The efficiency of your warm air heating system depends on whether or not air can flow through the system. The more the air flow is restricted, the less efficient the heating system is. With less warm air flowing into the system, the house doesn't get as warm as it should, so you turn up the thermostat — thereby using more fuel without getting more heat.

The air filters in your furnace are 1-in. thick fiber mats through which the cold air must flow as it moves into the furnace. Any dust in the air is deposited on the filters before the air passes into the furnace. As dust builds up after a few weeks, the amount of air flowing through the filter is cut down. The only remedy is to clean or replace the filters regularly. The frequency of change depends on your home. Some, especially those with a number of small children or with pets, tend to be dustier than others.

In very dusty homes, the filters should be cleaned or changed every 60 days to maintain the heating efficiency and to keep fuel costs low. In moderately dusty homes, the filters should be changed or cleaned every 90 days.

In homes with a mild dust problem, filters probably need to be changed only once, in the middle of the season.

If you have an electrostatic or electronic filtering system, clean it more often than you would standard filters — every 30 days. Follow the instructions on the unit, since each type is cleaned in a different manner.

TO REPLACE STANDARD FILTERS

1. Purchase filters (as many as required for your unit) of the correct size. To be sure of the size, remove an old filter and measure it.
2. Remove the access panel in the side of the furnace, usually by turning a locking screw 1/4 turn. Reach in and lift filters out of the frames in which they rest. The blower should be turned off as you do this.
3. Fit the new filters into the frames. If you have washable filters, you can hose them clean, allowing the water to run through the mesh and carry the dirt out. They can be reinserted immediately.
4. Close the access door and turn the blower on.

Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Each day we read articles that indicate the type of foods we eat are involved in preventing various kinds of diseases, and considerable information is being gathered showing that this certainly might be true in prevention of cancer.

The Illinois Division of the American Cancer Society became the first state division to announce that cancer prevention through dietary changes would be a major part of its educational campaign. This question is: Specifically what foods should we eat?

Research shows that foods rich in vitamin A tend to fight the development of tumors in many parts of the body. This includes, of course, fruits and vegetables which are deep green, orange and yellow. Also vitamin C seems to help with stomach cancer conditions. Once again, fruits, citrus fruits, are helpful, while broccoli, brussel sprouts, asparagus, cauliflower, green peppers, peas, raspberries and strawberries are selected foods. Remember, whole grain foods that are high in fiber are cancer-inhibitors, however, the researchers cannot explain the reason why this is true.

The theme that we are becoming more and more involved in diet control is true, and that is the reason at the Senior Center carefully selected foods are properly prepared to have proper nutrition.

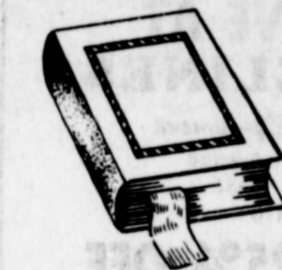

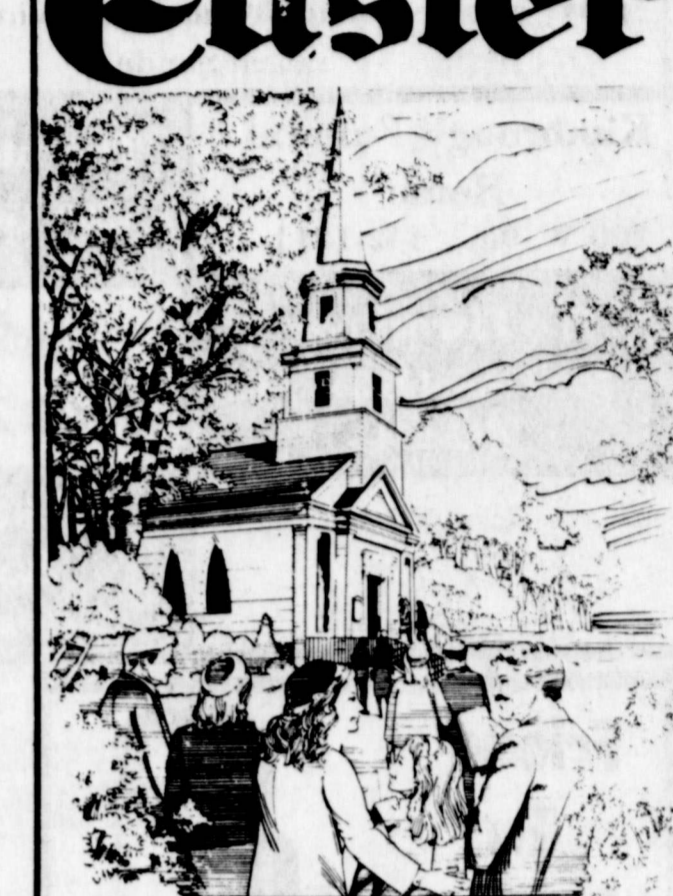
