


IRIS, THE OLD STANDBY I can remember my grandmother's flower beds and her referring to the "flag" which were so beautiful. Of course, she was referring to her beautiful Iris. In my reading on the subject of Iris, I have found them referred to as "flags" on many occasions. It seems like this year the Iris (Flags) have been more beautiful than in many years in this area.

The Iris is a large genus of mostly hardy flowering plants, most of which have perennial rootstoks or bulbs. You will find Iris growing wild in the temperature countries of the northern hemisphere. Most Iris are grown from rootstocks which have sword-shaped leaves. the bulbous Irises and the Spanish Iris have narrow leaves. Most Irises bloom in April, May and June, but in mild climates a representative selection will provide flowers throughout the greater part of the year, commencing with the Unguicularis in January and concluding with Alata in late Autumn.

The Iris belongs to the family of Iridaceae. The name is derived from Iris, the rainbow, and alludes to the beauty and variety of the flowers.

Our Iris differ in structure from most plants. The three outer perianth segments

# **Beware Of Home Improvement Scams**

COLLEGE STATION--Now that spring is here, it's time to be on the watch for this year's home improvement scams.

While consumer frauds are widespread and pervasive, the elderly are special targets for these abuses, says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

According to recent research conducted by the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging, home repair and improvement frauds were the most frequent type of frauds committed against the elderly, she explains.

Nationwide, 71% of the elderly own their own homes. The majority of these homes were built

before 1940. This combina-

tion of the number of elderly who own homes and the age of the dwellings is especially attractive to phony repairmen, notes the specialist. Some of the common

scams include itinerant repairmen who operate on a "hit-and-run" basis, cautions Granovsky. They may use scare tactics to persuade the elderly person that the chimney will collapse, the roof will leak or some other drastic problem needs immediate attention.

The elderly person winds up paying high costs for poor workmanship, and sometimes for no work at all. Often the con man will aks for money for paint or materials and then simply leave without doing any repairs

The driveway resurfacer promises a first class job at a "bargain price," says the specialist. The resurfacer may claim to have some leftover asphalt from a construction job in the area

which is too much trouble to haul back to the plant. But you will usually get a driveway that is poorly laid or coated with material that will wash off with the next rain. Then when you try to locate the person to complain, you may discover that the name and address on the business card are phony.

Itinerant exterminators may offer a "free" termite inspection that will create a termite infestation, quickly treats it for a fee and then leave town.



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

# FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, EASTLAND Into A New Building With The Same Message YOU ARE INVITED TO JOIN US IN **DEDICATING A NEW FACILITY TO REACH PEOPLE FOR THE SAVIOUR**

During the 1866, Baptists gathered together in an old saw mill located near the przsznt site of Exxon bulk plant for the gift purpose of organizing a Baptist Church.

The church was organi by a Rev. Lingo, a laboror at the mill. Also participating in the organization were trustees J.S. Bedford, A.J. Stuart, and J.E. Yarbrough. Others included Henry Van Geem and Savana Stuart. In February 1880 the group organized under the name "The Missionary Baptist Church of Eastland". This organization was a member of the Red Gap Association.

The first hhl e of the church was erected in 1882, located South of the KEAS Radio building on South Seaman Street, the frame structure was built with the help of a \$250.00 loan from the American Baptist Home Mission Society. The reduction in time has taken place because Social Security is in the process of modernizing its computer systems. This is one of the first results of this effort.

When applying, a person must have evidence of age, identity, and citizenship or legal alien status, Hammons said. In addition, a person 18 or older who is applying for the number the first time must appear in person.

The best evidence of age and citizenship is a public or hospital record of birth or a religious record of birth of baptism established before age of 5. Only if these records do not exist should other evidence be submitted. Evidence of identity can be any document showing identifying data such as

physical description, photograph, or signature. Examples include driver's license, voter's registration, school record, report card, identification card, marriage record, divorce decree, draft card, military ID, building pass, baby's hospital wrist band, adoption record, or organization

memberships. People applying for a duplicate card to replace one lost must provide evidence of identity. Also, a person who wants to change her or his name in Social Security



# Plans under way to restore hotels Hilton once owned

BY PAULA DITTRICK United Press International

Old vacant hotels in the Texas towns of Cisco and Plainview don't look like much now, but they were the start of Conrad Hilton's chain.

Plans are being explored in both communities to revi-talize the buildings. The University of Houston owns the Cisco hotel while a newly formed development group plans to restore the Plainview hotel.

A New Mexico native, Hilton came to Texas looking for his fortune in banking, but instead bought the two-story Mobley Hotel in Cisco in 1919. The structure never was called a Hilton, but it was the start of his enterprise.

"It is a cross between a flophouse and a gold mine." the late Hilton says of the Mobley in his book *Be My Guest* — found in the hotel chain's suites.

"Just be glad the people around town have so much oil in their eyes that they can't see it," Hilton quotes him-self as saying right after he bought the hotel.

Frustrated by a price hike that prevented him from buying a Cisco bank, Hilton had gone to the Mobley only to discover a filled hotel and a disgruntled owner ready to sell the establishment.

Hilton continued the Mobley tradition of selling sleeping space in shifts during the oil boom in nearby Ranger. He often slept in the hotel's office himself.

The first Hilton was built in Dallas and the second Hilton to open was the Plainview Hilton on July 3, 1929. Set back a while by a stock market crash, the Plainview hotel went into bankruptcy during the 1930s until Hilton resumed its control in 1944.

A month later he decided it was too small for his chain and he sold it as a franchise to hotel manager Porter Morgan who operated it as a Hilton until 1975.

An unnamed development group headed by Robert Holmes of Dallas and Warren Mathis. a Providence farmer, recently bought the eight-story Plainview struc-

Holmes is a New Deal native and major owner of both Plainview's City National Bank and a garbage equip-ment company named EMCO. Harley Redin, bank senior vice president, has been appointed development group spokesman.

"It was the place between Lubbock and Amarillo." Redin said of the Hilton, adding many older Panhandle residents remember dancing in its ballroom. The building, which still has the Hilton sign lying on

its roof, was used as rental rooms for farm workers six months ago. hr said. It needs repair, he said.

"We're investigating to see what it's going to take," to restore the building, Redin said.

He said tentative plans were to restore the ground floor and mezzanine to house shops, a meeting room and maybe a rest: urant.

A computer center to be used by the bank and Plainview's other businesses probably will be built on the third floor with EMCO offices to be put on the fourth floor. Redin said.

"We'll leave the rest of it just vacant or use as needed for office space," Redin said. "Since they (Mathis and Holmes) made this purchase, people have really got pepped up about it."

The plans for the Cisco building are not as well devel-oped. Cisco Chamber of Commerce manager Randy Speegle said the Hilton Foundation had contributed \$1.2 million for its restoration as a museum and community center




Hilton sold the Mobley in 1929, task force member and banker Dick Wolley said, The building later was used as a nursing home. An Alaska gold prospector bought the building in 1970 to convert into apartments. The building has been empty for six years, Wolley said. The committee in late March polled Cisco citizens to determine whether they wanted the building restored

to determine whether they wanted the building restored or wanted it torn down and a community center built in

COLLEGE STATION --- American diet, that popular beef?" has a simple answer When it comes to the question "Where's the - it's on the dinner plate.

Beef is clearly a staple of the American diet, says Marilyn Haggard, a Texas University A&M Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

The American Meat Institute estimates that the average American consumes a little under 19 pounds of hamburger per year. Other studies have shown that ground beef is served in 96% of all U.S. households and fresh beef other than ground beef is eaten in 97% of households, explains Haggard.

Families do, of course, vary in the amount of beef they eat, but total beef consumption has stayed about the same since 1981, says the nutritionist.

Heavy users serve beef twice a week or more. moderate to light users serve beef one to three times during a two-week period, and others serve beef only occasionally.

From a nutritional standpoint, beef makes an important contribution to the American diet, says Haggard. For example, a person who has a daily diet of 2,000 calories, gets only 8% of his calories from a 3-ounce serving of beef, but gets 57% of his protein need, 34% of his vitamin B-12, 32% of his zinc, and 21% of his phosphorus. Many consumers have

become concerned about the amount of animal fat and cholesterol in their diets, notes Haggard. However, beef - especially as eaten rather than as purchased at the store- contains less fat. unless saturated fat and less cholesterol than many people assume, says the nutri-

United State Department of Agriculture studis show that once you trim the fat from your meat, beef is not high in fat when compared to many main dish items in Americans' dites. USDA research also show that less than half the fat in beef is saturated fat. While animal sources still

contribute the greatest amount of fat to the American diets, vegetable sources like oils and margarine account for the 'increase in fat in the food supply, says Haggard.

Well-trimmed beef is part of a good balanced diet which includes other meats, fish and poultry, fruits and vegetables, cereals and grains, and dairy products, she adds.


