**IRIS, THE OLD STANDBY**  
I can remember my grandmother's flower beds and her referring to the "flag" which were so beautiful. Of course, she was referring to her beautiful Iris. In my reading on the subject of Iris, I have found them referred to as "flags" on many occasions. It seems like this year the Iris (Flags) have been more beautiful than in many years in this area.

The Iris is a large genus of mostly hardy flowering plants, most of which have perennial rootstocks or bulbs. You will find Iris growing wild in the temperate countries of the northern hemisphere. Most Iris are grown from rootstocks which have sword-shaped leaves. The bulbous Irises are hairless. The Spanish Iris have narrow leaves. Most Irises bloom in April, May and June, but in mild climates a representative selection will provide flowers throughout the greater part of the year, commencing with the Unguicularis in January and concluding with Alata in late Autumn.

The Iris belongs to the family of Iridaceae. The name is derived from Iris, the rainbow, and alludes to the beauty and variety of the flowers.

Our Iris differ in structure from most plants. The three outer perianth segments

(petals) hand downwards, and are known as the falls; the other three stand erect and are called standards; in addition, the three styles of the flowers are colored and petal-like in appearance.

Irises are divided into two main sections—those which grow from bulbs and others which have thick rootstocks or rhizomes. We are more familiar with the Iris that have thick rhizomes, and these consist of four different types: Tall Bearded, Intermediate Bearded, Dwarf Bearded and Beardless. The Bearded Iris are so-called because the outer petals or falls, have a thick line of fine hairs stretching down the lower half, whereas the falls of the Beardless Irises are hairless.

In planting Iris the soil should be dug deeply, and a little well-decayed manure worked into the topsoil. The best time for planting is from July to September, but it may be done even as late as March, although the flowers will be inferior the first year.

The rhizomes are planted flat and only half covered. They must now be deeply buried, as it is necessary for them to be sun-baked to produce the maximum number of flowers. They are set 6-8 inches apart, with the tips of the rhizomes pointing toward the outside of the clumps. If the soil is dry you must thoroughly moisten it

first. There is no further cultivation required except that an annual top-dressing of leaf mold or well-decayed compost can be applied annually in Autumn.

The Irises in this area range from all sizes and colors of the rainbow. Of course, when you mention Iris to people naturally thing of the old Blue Flag, but you have selections of colors White, Brown, Yellow, Red, Pink, Purple, Lavendar, Black, Green and Orange.

You do not have to have the proverbial "Green Thumb" to grow Iris. With the wide choices in colors, you should be able to select your favorite colors, and add some beauty to the landscape of your home and your community.

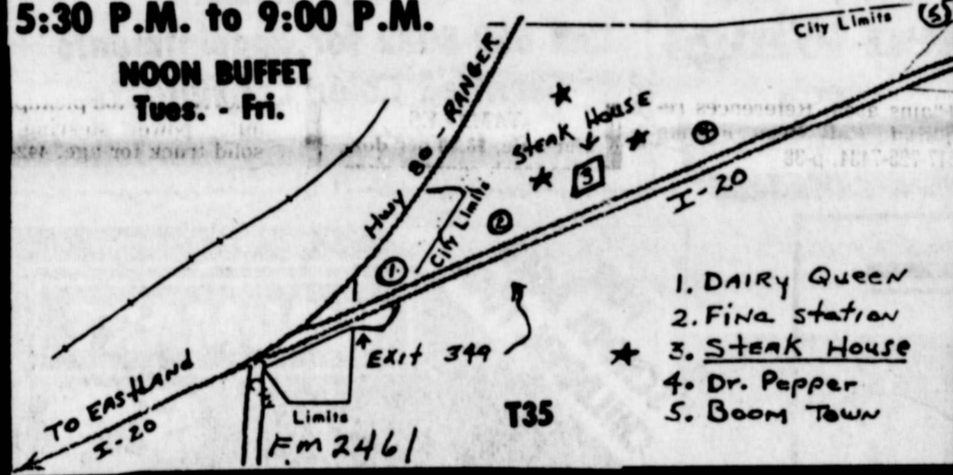

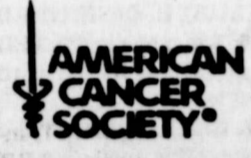

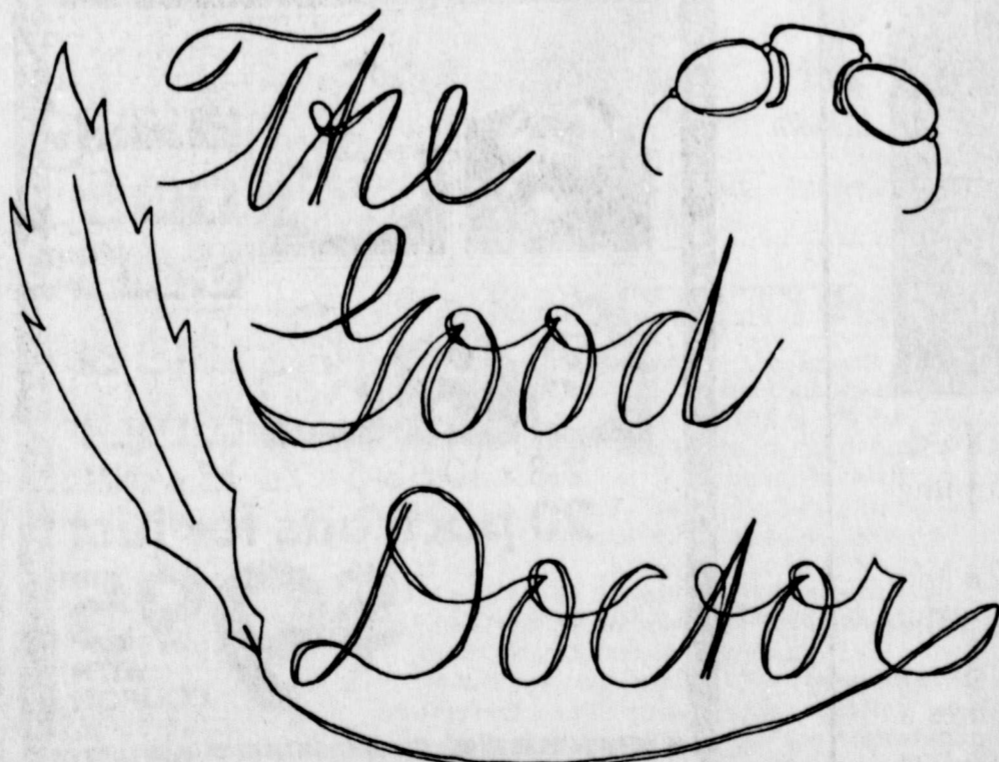

# Beware Of Home Improvement Scams

COLLEGE STATION-- Now that spring is here, it's time to be on the watch for this year's home improvement scams.

While consumer frauds are widespread and pervasive, the elderly are special targets for these abuses, says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

According to recent research conducted by the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging, home repair and improvement frauds were the most frequent type of frauds committed against the elderly, she explains.

Nationwide, 71% of the elderly own their own homes. The majority of these homes were built

before 1940. This combination of the number of elderly who own homes and the age of the dwellings is especially attractive to phony repairmen, notes the specialist.

Some of the common scams include itinerant repairmen who operate on a "hit-and-run" basis, cautions Granovsky. They may use scare tactics to persuade the elderly person that the chimney will collapse, the roof will leak or some other drastic problem needs immediate attention.

The elderly person winds up paying high costs for poor workmanship, and sometimes for no work at all. Often the con man will ask for money for paint or materials and then simply leave without doing any repairs.

The driveway resurfer promises a first class job at a "bargain price," says the specialist. The resurfer may claim to have some leftover asphalt from a construction job in the area which is too much trouble to haul back to the plant.

But you will usually get a driveway that is poorly laid or coated with material that will wash off with the next rain. Then when you try to locate the person to complain, you may discover that the name and address on the business card are phony.

Itinerant exterminators may offer a "free" termite inspection that will create a termite infestation, quickly treats it for a fee and then leave town.

Fake tree surgeons may also prey on elderly homeowners, offering to chop trees and bushes and rid them of any disease, she cautions.

Senior citizens - or people of any age - can avoid being taken by these scams, says Granovsky, if they will do one or more of the following:

- Call or write the Better Business Bureau for information about any unknown firms or individuals.
- Ask the salesperson for name of local customers;

then call them to find out about their experience with the company.

•Does your community have a requirement that all door-to-door salespeople register with a local agency such as the police, mayor's

office or chamber of commerce? If so, ask the salespeople to show you their registration cards - tell them that you will think about the offer, call the registration office, and then get in touch with the seller if

you are still interested. •Stay in control. It is your house, your yard, your money and your time. Never sign a contract until you read every word and understand it.

### CONGREGATION HISTORY SCHEDULE

During the summer of 1866, Baptists gathered together in an old saw mill located near the present site of Exxon bulk plant for the purpose of organizing a Baptist Church.

The church was organized by a Rev. Lingo, a laborer at the mill. Also participating in the organization were trustees J.S. Bedford, A.J. Stuart, and J.E. Yarbrough. Others included Henry Van Geem and Savana Stuart.

In February 1880 the group organized under the name "The Missionary Baptist Church of Eastland". This organization was a member of the Red Gap Association. The first home of the church was erected in 1882, located South of the KEAS Radio building on South Seaman Street, the frame structure was built with the help of a \$250.00 loan from the American Baptist Home Mission Society. The second church building to be erected in Eastland was used until 1905. In 1905 a new frame building was erected on the present church ground and was used until 1927.

During the spring and summer months of 1927 plans were underway for a new church building. As the City of Eastland was in the midst of a period of tremendous growth and prosperity, many in the church felt that the new facilities should be quite large as evidence by the first plans submitted by Architect William T. Meador. That particular plan was designed to accommodate a congregation of eight hundred to one thousand and a Sunday School of six hundred. The design of the original plan was finally accepted but on a considerably smaller scale.

With "Faith in God for whose glory the building is being erected," construction was started on December 1, 1928, and was completed at a cost of approximately \$44,000.00.

At the inception of construction "Eastland Missionary Baptist Church" had an average Sunday attendance of 226, up considerably from 160 in 1921.

On April 6, 1949, the name of the church was changed from Eastland Missionary Baptist Church to First Baptist Church of Eastland. It is interesting to note that both names were used in the construction of the building in 1928. Eastland Missionary Baptist Church was placed on the cornerstone and First Baptist Church in the facade high above the entrance of the church. (Both the original cornerstone and facade were used in the new facility.)

In January, 1954, the Prairie Oil and Gas building was purchased for educational and office space. The building has been improved and modernized many times throughout the years.

The Schantz pipe organ was built especially for this building. It has eighteen ranks, or a total of 1,124 pipes located in two chambers. Twenty-four of the larger pipes are visible in front of the grilles. The console may be moved to the center of the platform for recitals.

The cornerstone of the former building (erected, 1928) was removed and placed in the northeast corner of the new auditorium. The engraved church name stones were removed from the gable of the former building and placed in the terrace at the main entrance to the new building.

The auditorium is 6,343 square feet, while the total area of the building is 23,960 square feet. The educational space of 17,617 square feet includes the church offices, choir room, preschool suite, church library, bell choir room, a fellowship hall, kitchen, and adult classrooms. The entire building is on ground level, and it is easily accessible from the parking lot or from the covered drive on the west side.

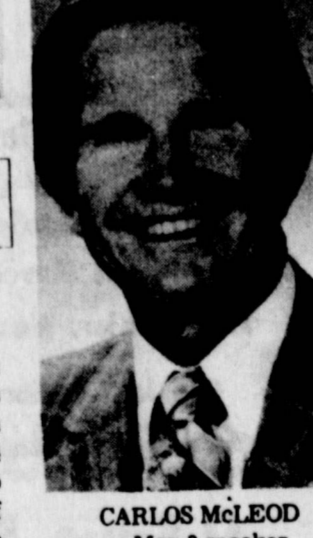

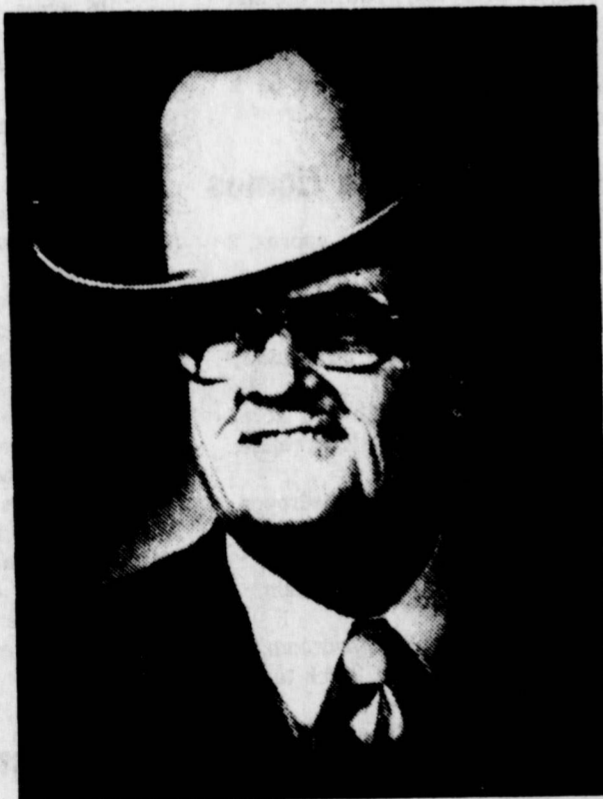

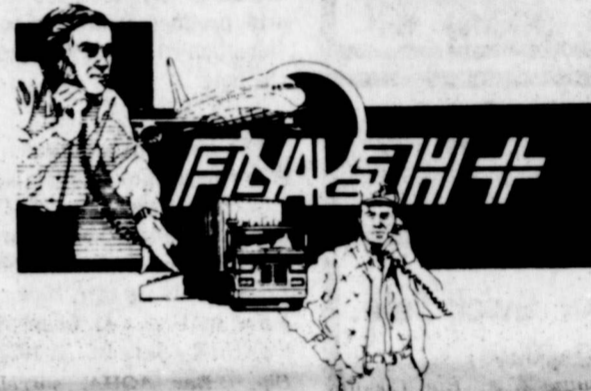

#### UPHOLSTERY TOOLS AND MATERIALS

You'll need a few special tools to upholster furniture, including a webbing stretcher, a magnetic tack hammer, and some sailmaker's needles. You can buy a kit containing all of these for less than \$10 at most good fabric stores.

In addition, you'll need some materials:

**Tacks:** Upholstery tacks are bought by the box. You'll use a lot of tacks, so buy large boxes. Tacks are numbered according to size:

- No. 1 Tacking the dust cover.
- No. 3 All purpose; muslin cover, lightweight final cover.
- No. 4 All purpose; installing burlap; medium-weight final covers.
- No. 6 For heavy final covers and where tacking through several layers of material.
- No. 12 Tacking down twine in tying springs; installing webbing. (No. 12 webbing tacks are best, but No. 12 standards work.)

**Webbing:** Comes in long rolls. Standard is 3 1/2 in. wide, made of jute, available by the yard in good fabric shops. A chair takes about 12 yards, a sofa about 35.

**Thread and twine:** Use heavy flax or linen thread, commonly called carpet thread, for sewing fabric. For tying springs use 6-ply hemp which you can buy in large balls. Don't use cotton twine as it deteriorates too quickly.

**Burlap:** Best weight for upholstery work is the 10 oz. It comes in 36- and 40-in. widths.

**Padding:** Replace cotton padding with the polyester which you can buy in most fabric stores. Comes in 36-in. width, in long rolls, can be torn or cut to fit the work area.

**Foam:** You can substitute polyurethane foam padding, which comes in a variety of thicknesses, for hair and moss stuffing. Cut the foam to shape, rounding the corners and edges as needed, then tack in place.

**Rubberized hair:** If you decide to use hair as a padding, you can buy pads of rubberized hair. It comes in rolls 36 in wide, in several thicknesses.

**Final cover:** The choice of fabrics and patterns is wide. Just be sure the fabric is upholstery grade, not drapery. "Fix-It-Fast" Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc., 425 N. Michigan, Chicago, IL 60611

# Oil Belt News

## Drilling Bits

A new gas producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Carla Field, with Carla Petroleum Inc. of Dallas as the operator.

Located two miles south of Carbon, the well is in a 3,300-acre lease in the IG&NRR Survey, A-680. It is designated as the No. 2 Jackson.

On a 1 1/4-in. choke, it flowed 565,000 CF per day. It was rated at 2,000,000 CF on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 3,426 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the

Duffer Formation, 3,161 to 3,165 feet into the hole.

North Ridge Corp. of Duncanville has filed first production figures on three new oil wells in the REB Field. Drillsite is four and six miles north of Eastland in the H&TCRR Survey, A-299 & A-303.

The No. 3 R.O. Morton showed potential to pump 33 barrels of oil daily. Location is in a 160-acre lease. Bottomed at 3,572 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,434 to 3,458 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 1 J.B. Harbin is located in an 80-acre lease and indicated ability to pump 31 barrels per day. It was taken to a 3,885-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 3,441 to 3,499 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 1 Andrew Beck showed potential to pump 28 barrels daily. Location is in a 160-acre lease. Bottomed at 3,915 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,461 to 3,520 feet into the wellbore.

Eastland County's Ranger Field gained a new producer when Sun Exploration & Production Co. of Abilene completed the No. 1 M.E. Daniel, within the city limits of Ranger.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 34 barrels of oil per day. It was taken to a 3,730-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 3,273 to 3,267 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 107-acre lease in the Mark Haley Survey, A-156.

At a location six miles north of Eastland, Snow Oil Co. of Ft. Worth has finalized a new oil producer in Eastland County's REB Field.

The well is designated as the No. 4 Castleberry West, pumping at the rate of 29 barrels per day.

Location is in a 127-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 36, Blk. 4. Bottomed at 3,980 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,574 to 3,596 feet into the hole.

The same operator has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Durham-Ferrell, a 4,000-ft. developmental well two miles northwest of Eastland. Location is in an 80-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey, A-1022. The well is in the Cameron Field.

Richey & Co. of Ft. Worth has filed first production figures on two new wells in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey.

The No. 1 Texfel-Beck indicated ability to flow 478,000 CF gas per day on a 3/4 choke. It is located five miles north of Eastland in the Snow Field, Sec. 21, Blk. 4.

The well will produce from an interval 3,638 to 3,642 feet into the hole. Total drilling depth was 3,951 feet.

The No. 1 Texfel-West showed potential to pump 20 barrels of oil daily. Location is four miles north of

Eastland in the RED Field, A-302.

Bottomed at 3,940 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,468 to 3,488 feet into the hole.

Teaco of Snyder has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular field. The operator has 110 acres leased, with drillsite in the H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 7, Blk. 2, and has designated the venture as the No. 3 McDaniel. Drillsite is four miles east of Carbon.

People in the Big Country area who expect to need a Social Security number should remember to apply for it before they must have the number, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

People should apply for a number at least 3 weeks before the number is needed.

This length of time is down from the 4 to 6 weeks it used to take, Hammons said. The reduction in time has taken place because Social Security is in the process of modernizing its computer systems. This is one of the first results of this effort.

When applying, a person must have evidence of age, identity, and citizenship or legal alien status, Hammons said. In addition, a person 18 or older who is applying for the number the first time must appear in person.

The best evidence of age and citizenship is a public or hospital record of birth or a religious record of birth of baptism established before age of 5. Only if these records do not exist should other evidence be submitted.

Evidence of identity can be any document showing identifying data such as

physical description, photograph, or signature. Examples include driver's license, voter's registration, school record, report card, identification card, marriage record, divorce decree, draft card, military ID, building pass, baby's hospital wristband, adoption record, or organization memberships.

People applying for a duplicate card to replace one lost must provide evidence of identity. Also, a person who wants to change her or his name in Social Security

records must prove evidence of identity under both old and new names. A person born outside the U.S. must submit evidence of current U.S. citizenship of legal alien status.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency are acceptable.

# Plans under way to restore hotels Hilton once owned

Old vacant hotels in the Texas towns of Cisco and Plainview don't look like much now, but they were the start of Conrad Hilton's chain.

Plans are being explored in both communities to revitalize the buildings. The University of Houston owns the Cisco hotel while a newly formed development group plans to restore the Plainview hotel.

A New Mexico native, Hilton came to Texas looking for his fortune in banking, but instead bought the two-story Mobley Hotel in Cisco in 1919. The structure never was called a Hilton, but it was the start of his enterprise.

"It is a cross between a flophouse and a gold mine," the late Hilton says in his book *Be My Guest* — found in the hotel chain's suites.

"Just be glad the people around town have so much oil in their eyes that they can't see it," Hilton quotes himself as saying right after he bought the hotel.

Frustrated by a price hike that prevented him from buying a Cisco bank, Hilton had gone to the Mobley only to discover a filled hotel and a disgruntled owner ready to sell the establishment.

Hilton continued the Mobley tradition of selling sleeping space in shifts during the oil boom in nearby Ranger. He often slept in the hotel's office himself.

The first Hilton was built in Dallas and the second Hilton to open was the Plainview Hilton on July 3, 1929. Set back a while by a stock market crash, the Plainview hotel went into bankruptcy during the 1930s until Hilton resumed its control in 1944.

A month later he decided it was too small for his chain and he sold it as a franchise to hotel manager Porter Morgan who operated it as a Hilton until 1975.

An unnamed development group headed by Robert Holmes of Dallas and Warren Mathis, a Providence farmer, recently bought the eight-story Plainview structure.

Holmes is a New Deal native and major owner of both Plainview's City National Bank and a garbage equipment company named EMCO. Harley Redin, bank senior vice president, has been appointed development group spokesman.

"It was the place between Lubbock and Amarillo," Redin said of the Hilton, adding many older Panhandle residents remember dancing in its ballroom.

The building, which still has the Hilton sign lying on its roof, was used as rental rooms for farm workers six months ago, he said. It needs repair, he said.

"We're investigating to see what it's going to take," to restore the building, Redin said.

He said tentative plans were to restore the ground floor and mezzanine to house shops, a meeting room and maybe a restaurant.

A computer center to be used by the bank and Plainview's other businesses probably will be built on the third floor with EMCO offices to be put on the fourth floor, Redin said.

"We'll leave the rest of it just vacant or use as needed for office space," Redin said. "Since they (Mathis and Holmes) made this purchase, people have really got pepped up about it."

The plans for the Cisco building are not as well developed. Cisco Chamber of Commerce manager Randy Speegle said the Hilton Foundation had contributed \$1.2 million for its restoration as a museum and community center.

The hotel, which is now boarded up, stands on Cisco's main street, renamed Conrad Hilton Avenue about three years ago. A community task force has retained a Fort Worth architect to determine costs of restoration.

Hilton sold the Mobley in 1929, task force member and banker Dick Wolley said. The building later was used as a nursing home. An Alaska gold prospector bought the building in 1970 to convert into apartments.

The building has been empty for six years, Wolley said. The committee in late March polled Cisco citizens to determine whether they wanted the building restored or wanted it torn down and a community center built in its place.

If the Mobley is torn down, the new community center will be a memorial to Hilton, who died in 1979 at age 91. Either way the \$1.2 million remains a gift to Cisco.

"The main problem (with restoration) is that we can't do all we want to do with the funds we have," Wolley said.

He said citizens also were being asked if they would be willing to participate in a fund-raising effort. Wolley predicted the original building will be restored. If that decision is made, he said construction probably will start by 1985.

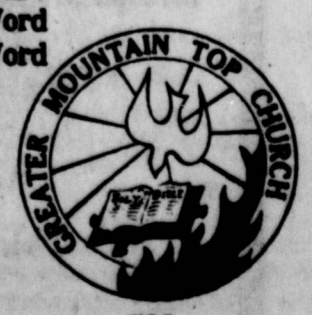

After gaining classroom experience, the students put their knowledge to work at West Texas Medical Center, Dyess AFB Hospital, the Abilene State School, Abilene Emergency Medical Service, home health agencies, the regional dialysis center, the Rehab Center and "various other agencies," said director Donna Burleson.

The vocational nursing program was one of the first programs offered at CJC's Abilene campus when it opened in 1972 and it has proved to be one of the most enduring.

The program began with 22 students in one class and has grown to 55 students in two full-time courses. Full-time courses begin at the end of February and the end of August.

The school also offers a part-time program. Registration for the next

part-time session begins April 30. Classes also begin on that date.

Classes in the full-time program are held Monday through Friday each week for the equivalent of 12 months. Part-time classes are held in the evening for 18 months.

After completing the program, students are awarded a certificate of completion. Mrs. Burleson said they must pass the licensing examination to become a licensed vocational nurse.

To enroll in the LVN course, a student must have a high school diploma or equivalent. Prospective students must also pass a pre-entrance exam at CJC.

Ms. Burleson, who has been director since the program began, said most of the students are female. "Sometimes we have a large number of males," she said.

Students range in age from those a few years out of school to older persons. One woman who recently completed the course was 65 years of age, Mrs. Burleson said.

Mrs. Burleson said she believes "there will always be a need" for nurses, although some health care professionals predict vocational nursing will someday be phased out.

## In The American Diet, The Beef Is On The Dinner Plate

COLLEGE STATION-- American diet, that popular When it comes to the question "Where's the

beef?" has a simple answer - it's on the dinner plate.

Beef is clearly a staple of the American diet, says Marilyn Haggard, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

The American Meat Institute estimates that the average American consumes a little under 19 pounds of hamburger per year. Other studies have shown that ground beef is served in 96% of all U.S. households and fresh beef other than ground beef is eaten in 97% of households, explains Haggard.

Families do, of course, vary in the amount of beef they eat, but total beef consumption has stayed about the same since 1981, says the nutritionist.

Heavy users serve beef twice a week or more,

moderate to light users serve beef one to three times during a two-week period, and others serve beef only occasionally.

From a nutritional standpoint, beef makes an important contribution to the American diet, says Haggard. For example, a person who has a daily diet of 2,000 calories, gets only 8% of his calories from a 3-ounce serving of beef, but gets 57% of his protein need, 34% of his vitamin B-12, 32% of his zinc, and 21% of his phosphorus.

Many consumers have become concerned about the amount of animal fat and cholesterol in their diets, notes Haggard. However, beef - especially as eaten rather than as purchased at the store - contains less fat, unless saturated fat and less cholesterol than many people assume, says the nutri-

tionist. United State Department of Agriculture studies show that once you trim the fat from your meat, beef is not high in fat when compared to many main dish items in Americans' diets. USDA research also show that less than half the fat in beef is saturated fat.

While animal sources still contribute the greatest amount of fat to the American diets, vegetable sources like oils and margarine account for the increase in fat in the food supply, says Haggard.

Well-trimmed beef is part of a good balanced diet which includes other meats, fish and poultry, fruits and vegetables, cereals and grains, and dairy products, she adds.

## Drilling Bits

An Abilene-based operator has staked location for the No. 1-B Pearson "B", a developmental well to be located one mile east of Morton Valley. With projected total depth of 4,000 feet, the well is in an 80-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 9, Blk. 4, REB Field. The operator is Pearson & Adams Inc.

No. 3 M.K. Courtney "C". On an open choke, it pumped 30 barrels of oil daily. It bottomed at 3,800 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Caddo Formation, 3,148 to 3,158 feet into the hole.

Two 3,900-ft. developmental wells are planned by Raw Energy Corp. of Weatherford at a drillsite eight miles south of Ranger, Eastland County. The location is in a 955-acre lease in the McClellan County School Land Survey, A-369. Wells' designations are the Nos. 1 & 4 Blackwell "B". They are in the Fair Field.

That writer has lots of company. This includes the church people who are breaking the law with aid and transportation of illegal aliens within the United States.

Oh, yes, my sympathy goes to the refugees. My sympathy also goes to the other people who should be benefiting from the millions of tax dollars we pour into foreign aid. But not much of my sympathy.

I cannot believe that our tax dollars should be spent abroad nor on importing aliens when we already have people in need here. There are plenty of our own citizens who need help every bit as much as the refugees

do.

"Charity begins at home" is a motto all of us would do well to adopt, I believe. Certainly, our government might have a shot at reducing our national debt before spending monies owed here on Third World governments that won't last long enough to pay even the interest on their "loans"—and that's a laugh!

Next time you write your congressman, ask for a report on the repayment of foreign loans. Seems like I recall reading somewhere that Finland paid up after World War I.

If you are among those who think welfare grants, aid to dependent children and Social Security payments address the problems of the really needy, we are not in agreement nor are we likely to be.

Social Security is supposed to be return on insurance paid during working years. For an interesting diversion, check out how many people who never paid a dime into Social Security draw regular checks.

Welfare and ADC should be stop-gap measures and temporary in nature. Another interesting study would be compilation of figures on how many third and fourth generations are on the rolls.

When these and similar programs teach people how to help themselves, I'll support them wholeheartedly. As of now, I am skeptical of their worth.

If school prayers are an infringement of the government's rules, aren't charitable functions encroaching on church duties and privileges?

The flack about school prayer is just some more wasted time in the face of the Constitution. We support it or we don't. Is that too simple?

I would never vote for oral prayer in the public school system because I think we have students of many religious beliefs and public prayer for all philosophies represented is not practical. I'm not sure I even approve of official prayers in Congress. This is not to say I think Congress doesn't need all the prayers it can get, but neither do congressional chaplains indicate sticking faithfully to separation of church and state.

"Freedom of worship" amuses me. The Puritans came here for freedom to worship their way. True enough. But where is there any record that they approved of any worship that differed from theirs?

I'm inclined to believe that prayer, in school or out, is here to stay. I am more inclined to believe in private prayer than in public. I am not sure the oral prayer from another person is going to fit what I consider a private matter between an individual and God.

That's my opinion.

Mrs. Allen has 14 grandchildren, 26 great grandchildren and 16 great-great grandchildren.

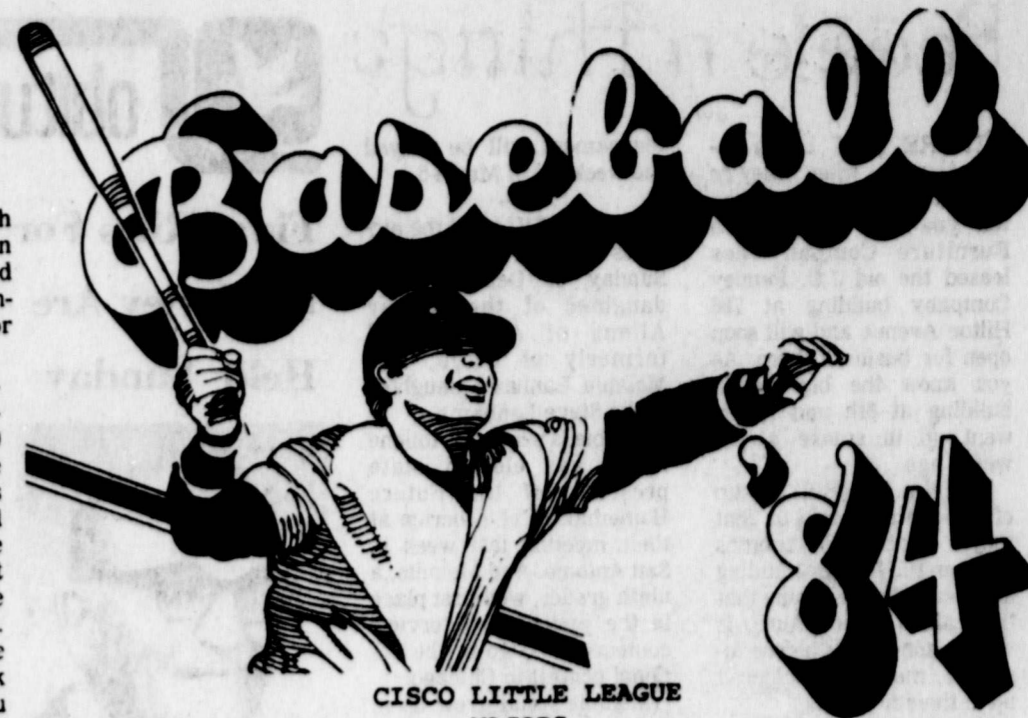
