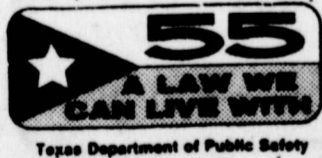

Oil Belt News

At a location six miles west of Graford, Rife Oil Properties, Inc. of Ft. Worth has finished a new gas producer in Palo Pinto County's French Field.

The well is designated as the No. 7-D Laura E. Hinkson, flowing at the rate of 840,000 CF per day on a 3/4 choke. The absolute open flow rating came in at 980,000 CFD.

Location is in a 1,255-acre lease in the Peter Miller Survey. Bottomed at 4,230 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,130 to 4,135 feet into the hole.

A 4,700-ft. wildcat well is planned by Thomas Hydrocarbons, Inc. of Weatherford at a drillsite five miles west-southwest of Palo Pinto. The location is in a 420-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. Well's designation is the No. 2 Million.

International Oil & Gas Consultant of Graham has filed first production figures on a wildcat gas well. The No. 2 Chestnut indicated ability to flow 4,89,000 CF

gas per day on a 7/8 choke. It was rated at 950,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The operator has 320 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's T&PRR Survey, three miles west of Brazos.

The well will produce from an interval 4,130 to 4,107 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,250 feet.

The Palo Pinto Regular Field gained a new producer when Ray Herring of Graham completed the No. 1 Baum-Best, seven miles east of Graford.

The well indicated ability to flow 219,000 CF gas per day on a 2-in. choke. It was rated at 600,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well was taken to a 4,890-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 2,298 to 2,308 feet into the wellbore. The operation is in a 255-acre lease in the Moreav Forest Survey.

Edwin S. Nichols Explorations, Inc. of Meridian has filed for permit to drill the No. 129 McClure, a 550-ft. wildcat well three miles

south of Palo Pinto. Location is in a 320-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T&PRR Survey.

A new gas producer has been brought on line in Palo Pinto County's Mineral Wells Field, with Sunbelt Exploration Inc. of Ft. Worth as the operator.

Located four miles southwest of Mineral Wells, the well is in a 160-acre lease in the Robert Evans Survey. It is designated as the No. 1 Benie A. Peak Unit.

On a 7/8 choke, it flowed 261,000 CF per day. It was rated at 360,000 CFD on absolute open flow. It bottomed at 4,475 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Strawn Formation, 2,498 to 2,502 feet into the hole.

The Stephens Regular Field gained a new producer when Sun Exploration & Production Co. of Abilene completed the No. 32 Black-Stoker Caddo Unit, one mile southeast of Breckenridge.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 27 barrels per day. It was taken to a 3,268-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 3,146 to 3,170 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 486-acre lease in the Lunatic Asylum Land Survey.

At a location five miles southeast of Breckenridge, McNallen Oil Inc. of Breckenridge has finished a new oil producer in Stephens Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 4 C.M. Caldwell, pumping at the rate of 25 barrels per day.

A Graham-based operator has staked location for the No. 2 Forbes, a developmental well to be located five miles southwest of Ivan. With projected total depth of 4,500 feet, the well is in a 280-acre lease in the Stephens Regular Field, TE&L Survey. The operator is International Oil & Gas Consultant.

Shilleagh Corp. of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill a 4,200-ft. developmental well in the Stephens Regular Field. The operator has 160-acres leased, with drillsite in the T&PRR Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 1 Caldwell Lease. Drillsite is five miles east of Frankel.

A 4,600-ft. developmental well is planned by Hoty F. Casteel of Graham at a drillsite five miles northwest of Crystal Falls, Stephens County. The location is in a 475-acre lease in the Albert Sidney Johnson Survey.



Jean Graham, Ph.D. has studied non-verbal communication for over 13 years. Since 1978, Dr. Graham has focused her studies on cosmetic therapy. She is presently specializing in the psychology of cosmetics as a post doctoral research fellow at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Graham played a vital role in the first International Symposium on The Psychology of Cosmetic Treatments sponsored by the University of Pennsylvania in September of 1983. (See The Psychology Of Cosmetic Treatments in SALON TODAY, Volume 1, Issue 2.)

nificantly higher on tidiness, femininity, cleanliness, pleasantness, attractiveness and maturity. In terms of personality, they were rated higher on security, sociability, making an effort, poise, confidence, organization and popularity.

SALON TODAY In what ways does appearance influence the way we evaluate people?

DR. JEAN GRAHAM Overall appearance is usually a good indication of a person's self image. People tend to think that what is well cared for must be worthy of that care and attention. Therefore, attractive people are evaluated more positively, receive more work, make more money, get higher grades and marry spouses with higher status.

SALON TODAY How can cosmetics change the way people are evaluated by others?

DR. JEAN GRAHAM In one of our studies, a group of professional women in their twenties were photographed both before and after make-up application. We used very basic kinds of cosmetic treatments which anyone could apply at home. A group of men and women then rated their before and after photographs on the basis of appearance and personality.

In terms of appearance, the same women with make-up were rated sig-

SALON TODAY Which aspect of appearance is most important in forming a first impression: hair, cosmetics or mode of dress?

DR. JEAN GRAHAM I have to say that they are really all important. Each one can have very beneficial effects on how you look and feel. What's most important is to achieve a balanced look.

Untidy hair could probably let you down more than make-up or clothing, because hair frames the face. Psychiatrists view untidy hair as an index of the onset of depression. The state of a person's hair often indicates how well he or she is coping with life.

SALON TODAY What are the particular advantages of attractiveness to women in business?

DR. JEAN GRAHAM In the work situation, there's some evidence that personnel managers and employers are more likely to hire good looking men and women. Studies also show that employers are more likely to pay attractive people better wages and to promote them more readily.

In another make-over study employing basic cosmetics and hair care plus hair coloring, personnel managers were asked to rate the chance of each person receiving a good job and to estimate the salary they could expect. The personnel managers estimated that the very same people would receive an average of 12% higher salary based on their 'after' photos than they would based on their 'before' photos.

Research also indicates that the more attractive you are, the more

SALON TODAY How does hair styling affect the way people evaluate each other's personalities?

DR. JEAN GRAHAM In the study I just mentioned, the group of professional women were also photographed before and after hair care treatments. Again, these treatments didn't involve anything complicated like coloring or perming. The treatments consisted of basic cutting and styling plus applying shampoos and conditioners.

After hair care, the women's appearance was rated significantly higher on tidiness, cleanliness, pleasantness, and maturity. In terms of personality, the women who had received hair care were rated significantly higher in terms of caring, warmth, making an effort, sincerity, reliability, poise, kindness, sensitivity, organization and popularity.

highly you think of yourself. This improved self-image would surely increase your self-confidence. And self-confidence is an obvious advantage in the business world.

SALON TODAY Are there stereotyped characteristics of how business women should look?

DR. JEAN GRAHAM Yes. People assume that your appearance reflects certain qualities in your personality, lifestyle and general attitudes. Although these stereotypes may or may not be true, people do make inferences about you based on your appearance.

For example, if you went to work with an extremely elaborate hair style, excessive jewelry, etc., this might suggest that you spend too much time maintaining your appearance and not enough time on your work.

SALON TODAY Are certain hairstyles or cosmetics perceived to be more authoritative?

DR. JEAN GRAHAM Yes. We know that you can convey very different messages depending on the length of your hair and how elaborately it is styled. People tend to associate curly hair with frivolity, straight hair with seriousness, and long hair with romance.

By today's standards, a happy medium is ideal for a professional image - nothing excessively long or short, curly or straight, or elaborate. Very long hair might be considered feminine, sexy and appealing to the opposite sex, which could be helpful to you in a social situation. But it won't help you project an authoritative and professional image.

May 31, Final Date For County Insured Cotton

MAY 31, is the final planting date for insured COTTON in EASTLAND County, TEXAS, according to ROSS SMITH, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

"Acres of COTTON planted by MAY 31, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by JUNE 15 to receive full crop insurance coverage," says SMITH.

Acres planted after May 31 should also be reported on the JUNE 15 acreage report (in the "remarks" section) as being planted too late for insurance coverage.

"The final planting date of MAY 31 is the latest established by FCIC to plant and expect a normal crop to be produced. Crops initially planted after this date are not insurable unless a late planting agreement is signed by MAY 31," SMITH said.

Farmers wishing to discuss local conditions, such as excessive moisture, that may affect planting should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent as soon as possible.

Don't Write Hot Checks in This County

Around 25 Eastland County business people attended a Hot Check Seminar conducted by District Attorney Emory Walton in the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Meeting Room on May 8. The District Attorney was introduced by Al Novak, Co-Chairman of the Retail Trades Commission. Walton gave an informative talk about Hot Checks and the current laws dealing with them. His discussion also included clues for detecting bad checks. The D.A. stated that the giving of worthless checks is increasing in Eastland County, with definitely more reported than five years ago. All citizens, particularly

business people, need to be aware of this situation, and alert to the danger of bad checks. Most hot check offenders are repeat performers, with some real "con" artists coming through now and then. There are also cases where checkbooks are stolen, and false identification used in the cashing of checks. Walton says that over the years he has heard every sort of excuse for giving worthless checks. And the offenders vary from women with crying children to very assured people involved in big business deals. When a person considers the volume of these checks, and that a single \$20,000, the size of the problem become

apparent. Some things District Attorney Walton cautioned about was what his office could not do. A check now has to be \$750 or more to be considered a felony; anything less and it becomes a misdemeanor. And checks given on monthly bills, even if worthless, cannot be prosecuted for. They are considered as payments on extended debts, and in this county a person cannot be sent to jail for debts. If a hot check is to be considered in a court case, it must have been given by an individual or company in payment for goods or services immediately rendered.

And checks sent by mail, surprisingly enough, are not prosecutable. There are technicalities involved, including proof in an indictment that the person named actually gave the check. Bad checks from out of the county cannot be prosecuted in Eastland County. Even if all other evidence is acceptable, legal action must begin in the county of origin. If a person takes a partial payment on a hot check, it then becomes a Civil credit situation, and not subject to prosecution. Therefore the District Attorney's office discourages the acceptance of partial payment in most cases. Walton stressed that a

merchant can not be too careful when taking a check. Cashiers in stores need a list of rules which they can readily see. Customers who act nervous or belligerent about these precautions just might have something to hide. Points to remember are: Is the check dated today, is the signature legible, is the address complete, can you confirm identity, do written amounts and numbers correspond, and is the I.D. used rechecked? Other types of checks to avoid are post-dated checks, a stop-payment check, a check on an out-of-state bank, a two-party check, a check more than a year old, a check given for a returned check, or a check marked "drawn against uncollected funds." Most of these, like checks received through the mail, cannot be prosecuted as "hot" checks. And any check not presented to a bank within 30 days of issuance probably will not be prosecuted either. Anyone involved in the prosecution of bad checks knows there are definite clues for detecting them, Walton said. Be careful of low series numbers on personal checks - about 85% of uncollected "hot checks" are new account numbers. Look at the finish of the black magnetic numbers on the bottom of the check. Magnetic ink is very dull - not shiny. The first four of these numbers should correspond with the bank routing number of the area. The check should also have at least one perforated edge - all checks except government or computer-produced checks will be perforated. Beware, too, of photocopied checks or those in red, dark blue, or dark

green colors. These cannot be microfilmed, making the checks unlawful. Merchants or individuals who have accepted worthless checks must move quickly to have any hope of recovering their funds, Walton says. The check must be presented to the bank for payment, and stamed as to the reason for dishonorment. Then a certified letter must be sent to the check writer, informing him or her of the reason the check was not honored. The check writer is given 10 days to bring payment in cash, cashier's check or money order for the amount of the check. If the check is not paid, a copy of the certified letter, a signed return receipt (or the letter unopened), the original check, specific identification of the maker of the check, and the name, address and phone number of the person who received the check must be furnished to the prosecutor's office. The District Attorney's office, upon receipt of a worthless check, makes a search to see if the maker has any other hot check offense pen-

ding. If not, the office notifies check writers that a case is about to be filed against them. If they do not make restitution, prosecution procedures will be started. The new "Hot Check" laws have very stiff penalties for this type of offense, which is classified according to the amount of the bad check. **PENALTIES**

years in State Pen. Any check issued before Sept. 1st, 1983 would come under the old punishment range. Mr. Walton said that the D.A.'s office has had very good success with collections on checks after his office notifies check writers that cases are about to be filed against them. Many people will attempt to pay up rather than face a court trial and possibly prison term. Fortunately the majority of people have no desire to defraud by check, but those who do cause a vast amount of trouble and take an increasing amount of money. The questions asked by the audience after the talk by District Attorney Walton indicated the public interest in this situation. All who attended the Seminar agreed that they learned new things from Walton's presentation.

TEXAS PHARMACIES TO FIGHT DRUG ABUSE IN COMMUNITIES

The program also focuses on cocaine, the fastest growing drug of abuse in America.

PADA is sponsored by the Pharmacist Against Drug Abuse Foundation, a foundation created by McNeil Pharmaceutical and the Johnson & Johnson Family of Companies specifically for the program. In addition to endorsements from First Lady Nancy Reagan, PADA has

the ongoing support of the White House Drug Abuse Policy Office, ACTION - the Federal Volunteer Agency, The National Parent's Resource Institute for Drug Education (PRIDE) and the National Federation of Parents for Drug Free Youth.

Speaking before media conferences in New York and Los Angeles to launch the program nationwide, Dr. Turner emphasized that over one third of all youth in America use illegal drugs and one out of every 18 high school seniors use marijuana every day. Dr. Turner added, "Parents and children need to know that using these drugs is harmful. For example, marijuana can have a marked impact on a child's ability to learn and to remember things. What we're really talking about is an epidemic of drug abuse which is a threat, a real danger to a generation of young people."

- Michael Landon, national spokesperson for PADA.
- Margaret Heckler, Secretary of Health & Human Services.
- Thomas W. Pauken, Director, ACTION.
- Jack E. O'Brien, President, McNeil Pharmaceutical and The Pharmacist Against Drug Abuse Foundation.

According to Jack E. O'Brien, the program was developed using pharmacists because "local pharmacists, by academic training and professional expertise and experts in drugs and an excellent source of information on drug abuse." He added, "to make the program successful we must do more than distribute 25 million brochures on drug abuse throughout the United States. Additionally, parents must educate themselves about drug abuse, talk to their kids, get involved in their communities, and form and work with existing parents groups that can turn around the drug abuse problem in America."

Pauken, who represents the federal government agency that supports volunteer programs, said the ACTION was enthusiastic in cooperating in the PADA program as it represents one of the single largest joint endeavors of private/public sector programs in the country.

In addition to the free brochures available at participating pharmacies, the PADA program also includes a public service television and radio campaign featuring Michael Landon. This campaign encourages people to seek out their local pharmacist for in-

WHAT DEATH BENEFITS AM I ENTITLED TO?
Survivors of a deceased veteran or a person covered by Social Security are entitled to substantial cash benefits, such as:

1. Lump Sum Death Payment from Social Security of about \$255, but only to spouse and dependent children of the worker.
 2. To veterans getting V. A. compensation or pension a \$300 death allowance.
 3. To all honorably discharged veterans a \$150 plot allowance if not to be buried in a national cemetery plus about \$59 for a grave marker plus an American flag. There is also an allowance of up to \$1100 when a veteran dies of a service-connected disability.
 4. Monthly income benefits from Social Security, depending on eligibilities (length of time covered, number of dependent children, etc.).

Dear Customer,

The City of Cisco during the month of March, 1984, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act, Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date. The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.

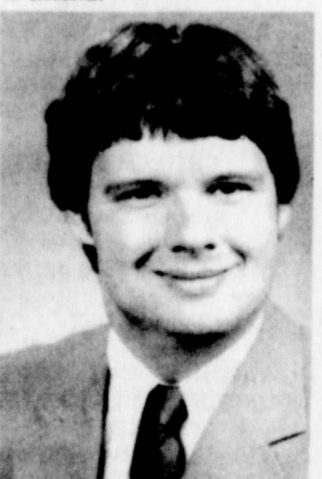

Dr. Franco Columbu, an outstanding nutritionist, maintains that the meals we eat are more than a "Fill-Up" for the body when he analyzes what Americans eat, what we should and how we can improve our eating habits.

The body must be nourished by a wide variety of foods to ensure the harmonious working of its many parts.

You should pay the same attention to the nutritional value of food as to its caloric content. For example, many people know that a medium-sized baked potato has about 100 calories, but very few are aware of its richness in minerals such as calcium, magnesium, sulphur and potassium or that it has about half as much vitamin C as an average tomato and as much Thiamin as two slices of whole-grain bread.

Next week we will discuss more about how the body uses food in a nutritional manner.
