## CHS Baccalaureate Services Set Sunday

Benny Hagan, ordained minister, will be the speaker for Cisco High School baccalaureate services at 8 p.m., Sunday, May 20, at Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium on Cisco Junior College campus.

The 54 members of the 1984 graduating class will wear caps and gowns for the service.

Mr. Hagan, minister of Tonk Valley Baptist Church in Graham, has been in the ministry since 1953. He has also ministered at Cornith

Born and raised in Cisco, Mr. Hagan is a graduate of Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College. He also attended Howard Payne and the seminary.

Mr. and Mrs. Hagan moved back to the Cisco area in 1975 and their fourth child, a daughter, is a member of the graduating class this year. Two of their previous children were also graduates

of Cisco High School.

The program will open with the processional by Susan Wester. The invocation will be given by Frank Williams, minister of the First United Methodist Church, and the congregation will sing "Battle Hymn of the Republic," led by John Picklesimer, youth director of the First Baptist Church.

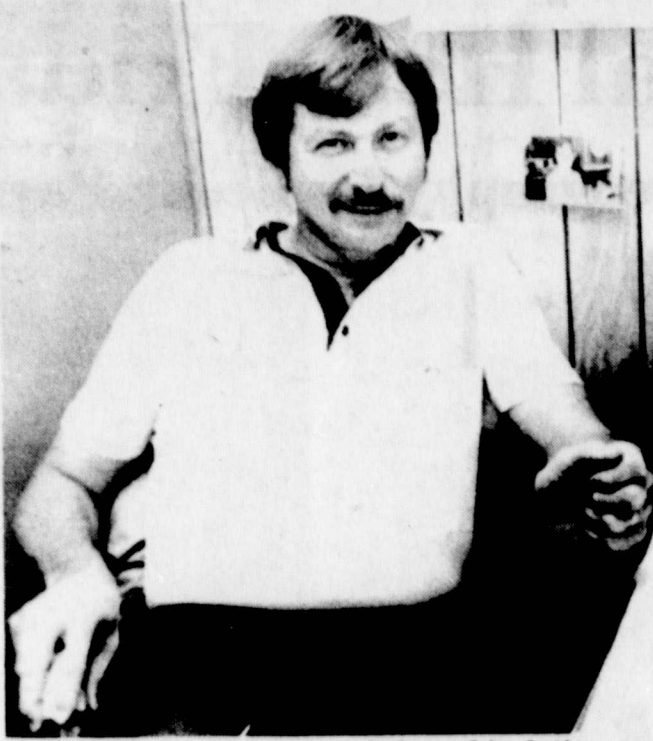

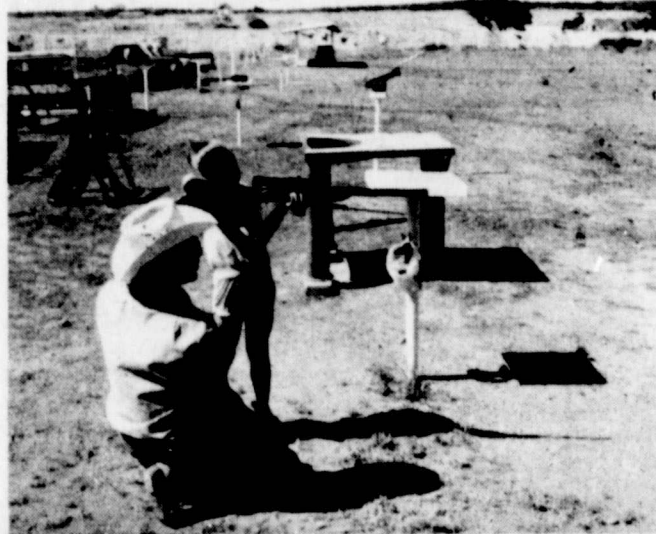
## EMT Training Set At CJC Campus In Abilene

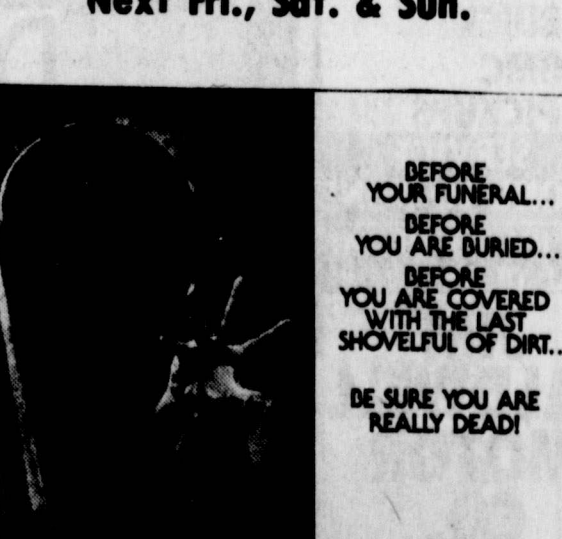

## Gordon Spot County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon

The towns of Eastland County are asking residents to cut back on their water usage, especially outside watering. Because of the extended drought, water supplies are declining and the pumps can not pump enough water to build pressure suffi-

cient to fight fires. Homeowners and others should be interested in landscape development to conserve water. Concern over impending water shortages has stimulated interest in reducing water use for turf and garden areas.

Water conservation can be practiced in all areas of landscape development and maintenance, including plant selection, irrigation practices and equipment, and soil preparations. These practices can be aesthetic as well as practical.

Homeowners can lower their landscape water usage in several ways:

-Using native and adapted plants. Native plants often thrive on existing growth conditions and reduce the need for extra irrigation. Many plants have been introduced that show adaptability to soil, rainfall and temperature conditions.

-Taking advantage of innovations in irrigation practices and equipment. The landscape irrigation business is experiencing a revolution, with new timing devices, low pressure systems, drip irrigation and other highly specialized water devices, low pressure systems, drip irrigation and other highly specialized water devices focusing on more efficient water usage. Irrigation systems and small ponds and fountains also can effectively use water as an aesthetic addition to a landscape.

-Using mulches for insulation. By providing an insulating layer between the sun and soil, mulches prevent rapid drying and lower soil temperature in hot weather, which keeps the top soil from crusting or hardening. Low-cost materials such as hay, grass clippings, bark and pine needles are excellent for mulching and can add appeal with texture and color.

-Properly preparing the soil. When soil has been loosened and improved with plenty of organic material, such as peat, pine bark or compost, it will hold significantly more moisture and release it over a longer period of time. However, organic materials break down over time and need to be supplemented. A compost pile can be a good source of these materials, allowing the homeowner to recycle leaves, grass clippings and other waste to improve the soil.

These are just a few practices that homeowners can use to significantly reduce water usage in their outdoor environment.

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# Sen. Glasgow Addresses Farm Bureau

A group of Eastland County Farm Bureau members joined with other Farm Bureau members from

Erath, Stephens and Palo Pinto counties to hear Senator Bob Glasgow speak at a dinner meeting in Stephenville on Tuesday night, May 15th.

Senator Glasgow addressed issues relevant to a possible special legislative session in June: teachers' pay raise, funding for road and bridge repairs on Texas roads, and the removal of the exemption of farm and ranch employees from worker compensation.

Ed McKay of Waco, Director of National affairs for Farm Bureau and also pre-

sent at the meeting, pointed out that Judge Harley Clark of Austin has ruled that exemption of farm and ranch laborers from workers' compensation is unconstitutional, but that the Texas attorney general has indicated he will appeal the ruling.

Senator Glasgow indicated that an exemption of \$100,000 would protect most farmers and ranchers from being obligated to carry workers'

compensation on their employees, an aim which he pledged to support in forthcoming legislative proceedings.

Questions from the group were answered by Senator Glasgow following his talk.

The meeting, held at the Red Bandana, was arranged and chaired by Chester Martin, Erath County Farm Bureau President. Others on the program besides Senator Glasgow and Ed McKay in-

cluded Farm Bureau Area Field Representative David Bohac of Waco and Herb Alfrey, spokesman for Legislator Bruce Gibson, who could not be present.

Those attending from Eastland county were County Farm Bureau President Ernest and Mrs. Reich of Cisco; National Chairman Bob Shults and Mrs. Shults of Rising Star; and Secretary-treasurer Cecil Shelf of Carbon.

## Fishing Report

"DO BASS TOURNAMENTS HURT?"

As the professional bass fishing boom of the past decade made competitive fishing one of the country's fastest growing sports, many recreational anglers grew concerned about the impact of the sport would have been on the resource. If you are one of the worriers, you can rest easier now.

A recently completed study by Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission biologists shows conclusively that bass tournaments have no negative impact on the resource. If anything, according to fisheries biologist Phil Chapman, who directed the study, tournament fishing has enhanced the enjoyment of the sport at every level.

Based on tournament catch statistics, Chapman concluded that early concerns regarding the negative impact of fishing success for largemouths remains unfounded. In all major tournament areas, catch rates increased during the past five years compared to tournament statistics compiled prior to 1978. Since com-

petitive fishing represents only a small part of total bass fishing pressure, any claims that tournament have been responsible for over-fishing appear to be false.

Our area lakes are slipping into summer patterns some what early, with high pressure cell setting north, weather has been extremely warm. Leon's strippers are doing well in the dam region, early morning seems to be the most productive. Black bass have slowed with some 2 and 3 pound fish being taken in the river section. Proctor's crappie are doing well in the river sections and around deep water brush piles in the main lake. Bass fishing has been fair with some 4 and 5 pound fish being taken. Hubbard's small hybrids are being taken almost anywhere on the lake you throw white. Black bass have been slow with catches being scattered, and running small.

Whether just out to fish for a few hours or all day, make boating safety as natural as setting the hook on those lunkers. Good fishing and safe boating go hand in hand.

## THE DOWNFALL OF THE DANDELION

In observing the many yards lately, it appears that we are going to have a bumper crop of dandelions. Believe it or not, dandelions are as easy to be rid of as walking across the lawn behind the spreader.

They are many tales (Old Wives) as to methods of eradicating the dandelion, and some of them are very humorous. One such tale is to dip a sharpened oak peg tapered very thin into a saturated solution of sulphur of iron. Then stab the dripping peg into the heart of the dandelion and let the sun do the rest. I have always heard that it has to be an oak peg. I wonder if a good East Texas Pine peg would do just as well. Another solution was the use of a dairy goats because they can select weeds from the grass. Gasoline and/or kerosene have been favorite cures in many tales.

When you see those yellow dandelion blossoms and the puffballs that follow in Spring, it is a sure clue that the time is right for the homeowners to take action against the weeds in their lawns. The dandelions and

the lawn is moist so that the acative ingredients will stick to the leaves and then move into the plant, causing its eventual disintegration.

If you will follow the following steps, you will effectively control these weeds:

1. Mow the lawn before applying the weed control, in order to keep the grass blades and weed leaves from touching the bottom of the spreader.

2. Select a day when rain is not expected for at least 24 hours, since the weed control particles need to stick to the leaves for at least that long to accomplish their mission.

3. Be sure the lawn is wet at the time you put down the weed control. This could be from rain or watering, or probably best of all from early morning dew.

4. Be sure to use a precision lawn spreader to give an even and accurate application without waste.

5. Stay off the lawn for at least a day after, to avoid knocking the particles off the leaves.

Within a few days the weeds will begin to curl and shrivel noticeably, and in approximately one month they

many other broadleaf weeds absorb the chemical control best when the plants are actively growing.

Dandelions are perennials and are different from crabgrass, which reproduces itself from seed left over from the previous year. The same dandelion can

return year after year. Digging them up is impractical for as long as part of their taproot remains in the ground, the plant will grow back.

When using a broadleaf weed control, you should apply the granule material when

will disappear completely.

Since late Spring is the time when most lawns can use a second fertilization to replace the much-needed nutrients and to strengthen them against the stresses of Summer, the use of a combination product that weeds and feeds at the same time will be very beneficial. The fertilizing of the lawn will

not reduce the effectiveness of the weed control, but will encourage the grass to fill in the spaces the weeds leave as they fade away.

After the weeds have been removed if you will keep a thick and vigorous as well as a healthy stand of grass it will be the best way of keeping the dandelions from reappearing.

quicentennial Commission passed a new milestone in its efforts to organize the state for Texas' 150th birthday yesterday, with the sanction of 61 community and county master plans by the Commission at its quarterly meeting here. The newly-sanctioned committees effectively double the size of state's network of local planning committees, and represent the largest number of master plans ever acted upon by the committees, and represent the largest number of master plans ever acted by the Commission at one meeting.

The 61 master plans represent 35 cities and 28 counties, and bring the total number of sanctioned local planning organizations under the Commission's banner to 222 cities and 51 counties — indicating that now more than 60 percent of Texas' population is part of the official Sesquicentennial program.

"This tremendous increase reflects heightened levels of excitement and awareness all across the state," said Randy M. Lee, Sesquicentennial Commission executive director. "This has taken hundreds of dedicated people working together with one common goal, and will involve thousands of committed Texans by the time the celebration closes in December of 1986."

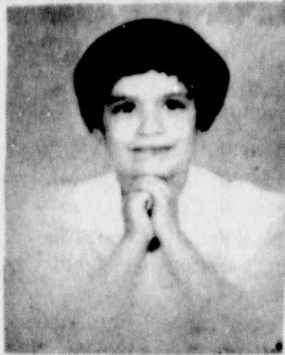
Texas has 1,126 incorporated cities and 254 coun-

ties. The Commission has a stated objective of developing local planning organizations to represent all 1,360 cities and counties by January, 1986. Lee noted that the deadline for the communities and associations to submit dated events for the Official Guide to Sesquicentennial Events and Activities is December 31, 1984.

A community master plan is the document submitted by each local Sesquicentennial committee which details its membership, plans for use of the Sesquicentennial logo, and the itemized list of activities it will plan to celebrate and commemorate the Sesquicentennial. The committees may represent individual cities or counties or may be a joint city/county effort. Once its master plan is officially sanctioned by the Sesquicentennial Commission, the city or county has earned the official title of Texas Independence Community or County.

The master plans submitted at the May meeting contain many exciting events and programs. Historical site renovations with live costumed re-enactments are planned, and parks are to be established. Rodeos, fairs and fiestas will abound. Many communities are sponsoring a family day to encourage all past residents to visit their hometowns. Most cities and counties plan a special day to feature the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train as it passes through. Educational projects will involve everyone from pre-schoolers to grandchildren.

The 61 newly-sanctioned Texas Independence Communities and Counties do not include any from Eastland County.

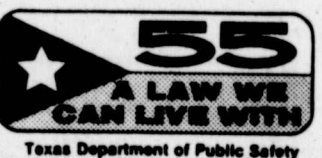

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# Fire Marshall Gives AARP Safety Measures For Fires

"Crawl, don't walk," instructed Cisco's Fire Marshall, Bill Webb, in his address to Cisco AARP in their meeting at the Corral Room, May 17.

Mr. Webb stated that smoke rises and the floor or the ground are the most free from smoke of any place in a burning building. "There are probably as many deaths from smoke inhalation as from fire," he explained. "If you are in a burning building, crawl to the nearest exit. Always have two fire exits in your home and be sure that all family members know these two escape routes. Have family fire drills. They are as

necessary as fire drills at school."

Mr. Webb pointed out that there have been firefighters for the last 2,000 years. America's first organized fire troopers were in N.Y. (New Amsterdam) in 1638. Boston had the first paid fire fighters in 1700 and Benjamin Franklin organized the first one for Philadelphia in 1736. Webb said, "The two rooms in a home where most fires start are the kitchen and the bathroom. This is usually caused by an excess of plastic bottles. Too many inflammable detergents. All, or most of them have gasoline for a base."

A question period followed the Marshall's speech.

Louise Allison, program chairman, gave high lights of the history of the purple heart citing that George Washington was the first to award that medal for being wounded on military duty. "Memorial Day comes the last week end in May. At that time, all people, men and women, who have lost their lives while serving in the armed forces will be remembered. Many of those we honor never received the purple heart for they died almost instantly. But they were all eligible for that decoration."

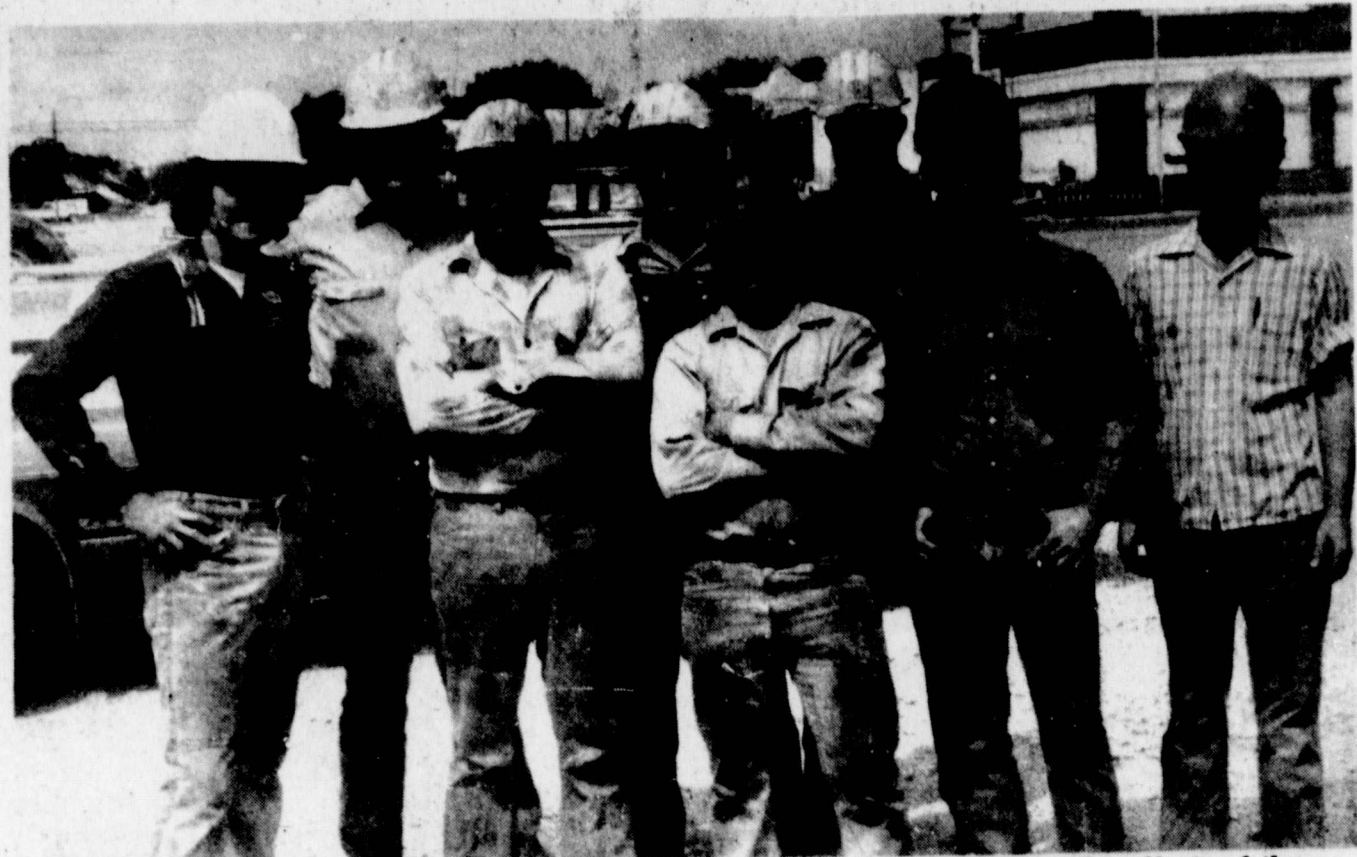

## Southwestern Bell Seeks Assistance of Customers

During 1983, thousands of damaged cables were reported in Texas, amounting to \$6 million in damage. Bob Cox, Southwestern Bell Manager, said the damage is caused by a wide variety of sources, ranging from contractors and excavators, to homeowners setting mailboxes and fence posts.

"A cut cable has a devastating effect on our company and our customers alike," Cox explained. "Long distance or local service may be interrupted over a widespread area. Increased labor costs and replacement cable expenses have to be incurred. All these things affect the company and, ultimately, the consumer."

Cox said many potential cable cuts were avoided due to conscientious contractors and residence customers who sought telephone company assistance in identifying cable locations before digging.

"We welcome calls to the Enterprise 9800 number," Cox said. "If we can avoid just one damaged cable with this procedure, it will result in better service for our customers."

The French students, who have studied English for 3-8 years, provide their own airfare, insurance, and spending money; and the American families provide the welcome and include them in their daily lives for the month of July.

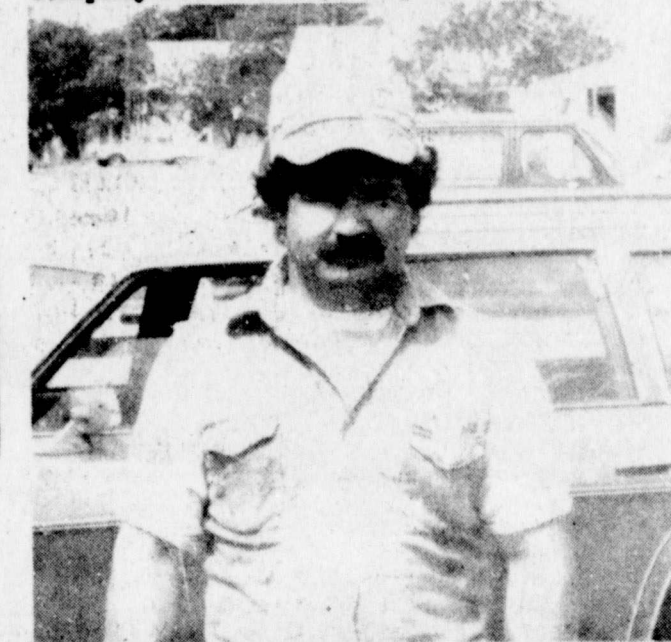

### Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Too often, he states, food is used as a tranquilizer when intense physical activity would serve the same purpose of alleviating tension.

In Dr. Columbu's book he goes into detail in regard to allergies and the foods that might cause them, so we will tell you about those next week.

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## public notices

Dear Customer,  
 The City of Cisco during the month of March, 1984, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act", Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.

The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.

At a location five miles southwest of Mineral Wells, Dallas Production Inc., has finaled a new gas producer in Palo Pinto County's Lisa B. Field.

The well is designated as the No. 3 Bowman, flowing at the rate of 350,000 CF gas per day on a one-inch choke. The absolute open flow rating came in at 625,000 CFD.

559,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 1,999,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

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# Spotlights & Sidelights

When I began reading science fiction, the two men, who are now classified as tops in that field and I were far from the senior citizens we are now.

What was recreation for me was creation for them. I thought. The thought should be classified under "Mistaken."

Both British-born Aurth C. Clark and Russian-born

American Isaac Asimov move as does the man on the flying trapeze—"With the greatest of ease"—between the worlds of science fiction. That the fiction is based on the fact and the reverse is sometimes true is more grist for the mill of the mind.

The satisfaction Clarke and Asimov found in writing science fiction often became high tech business as well as

publishing business.

Clarke has out an autobiography that probably is as fascinating as any of his wild-blue-yonder thrillers. It is titled "Ascent To Orbit: A Scientific Autobiography," published by John Wiley and Sons. The hardback edition costs \$19.95...which makes me wonder whether it is better to write books or to publish them.

Martin Gardner reviewed Clarke's work in "Science Digest", and his teasing tidbits almost make me want to call in an order right away. Almost. My checkbook says, "Wait for the paperback."

This volume is made up of the articles which were to

technical for the popular books (more than 50) which Clarke wrote for the general public. It is a collection of the stuff from which came those books. Clarke's qualifications for technology whereof he writes are well-founded. He was an RAF radar instructor in World War II, and he was a post-war enrollee in King's College, London. He graduated with honors in mathematics and physics.

The technical papers in "Orbit" hit on all Clarke's major concerns. He considers himself an optimist because he figures about 51% chance of humanity surviving a nuclear holocaust. He is definitely exciting by the possibility of space travel and finds the thought of communication with alien life forms awesome—but also a possibility.

Lavish, traditional weddings are today's fashion trend. Sewing bridal garments is a specialized area of sewing that is gain-

ing in popularity.

Sewing authorities say that the 26% of today's brides who wear custom made garments, half make their own and half hire professional seamstresses. With an estimated 2½ million marriages expected that means 640,000 weddings will have custom sewn garments in 1984.

What do you make of this aphorism: "Any sufficiently advanced technology is indistinguishable from magic?"

My approach to life never could be called scientifically oriented. "Imperfect" classifies my grasp of the function of the gasoline engine, and as for snatching a jumble of words and colors out of the atmosphere to focus on a television set! Well, what else is so satisfactory an explanation as "Magic?"

Clarke's prophecies in "Wireless World" (1945) included artificial satellites for worldwide communications. "Interplanetary Travel," a 1949 book about modern spaceflight theory, "swarms with astonishingly accurate guesses."

More timely than when Clarke wrote it 30 years ago, "The Rocket and the Future of Warfare" says our only hope is to function as a world community and it may take an atomic disaster to shock us into action.

Is it later than we think?

Twenty percent sew for a unique look or to obtain an heirloom garment. Others sew to save money, for a custom fit, or because they can't find the desired style in ready to wear. Copying expensive garments is also popular.

Current trends in fabric include organza, taffeta, satin, tulle, crepe de chine, voile, crepe and velvet.

Popular trims are lace, seed pearls, embroidery, appliques and covered or pearlized buttons.

Colors used are the traditional white or ivory for the bride and pale or dusty pink, violet or cranberry for the wedding party.

Designs are the traditional with dropped shoulders and a fitted bodice, often ending in a V at the waist. Victorian and Edwardian detailing are also seen.

Hemlines vary from floor length to waltz or tea gown length (just above the ankles), to intermission length (short in front and long in back).

The popularity of home sewing is increasing. Sewing your own garments provide quality clothing for less money.

The trend in fibers and fabrics for the future are of special interest. New fibers are not likely to be developed in the near future, but ex-

isting FIBERS will continue to be modified and blended in such a way as to produce fabrics which possess the most desirable features of each fiber. Blending man-made with natural fibers can improve durability and washability, and can lower production costs. Fiber producers also try to create yarns which cannot be readily duplicated in other countries. Example of fabric blends which are being manufactured in 1984 include:

Rayon---with polyester, silk or wool  
Cotton & wool---with silk, linen, mohair, nylon or acrylic  
Triacetate---with nylon, polyester, or linen

Cashmere—with wool or silk

Cashmere will be used in combination with other fibers in an effort to contain costs and because China is not exporting its finer cashmere. Fibers that may replace cashmere in blends include camel hair, angora, llama, alpaca, mink, yak, musk ox, and buffalo.

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# Congressman Stenholm Writes on Social Security

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** As a high school civics project an Eastland County student wrote Cong. Charles Stenholm asking specific questions about the Social Security program. His answer to the student provides some rock-hard answers to questions that a lot of people are now asking. We offer this from Cong. Stenholm.)

**Dear Student:**  
Thank you for your recent letter in which you requested my views regarding the outlook for the social security and medicare programs. In your letter you indicated that you are a high school senior and that you and your parents are skeptical about the long-term future of these programs and your ability to benefit from them. I appreciated hearing from you and I certainly understand your concerns.

Many changes have been made with regard to the Social Security Law over the years, and there are a good many misconceptions which exist with regard to this program. I have reviewed records, hearings, and transcripts of testimony which have been given through the years concerning the social security program. While changes have been made, one idea continues to remain consistent; the social security program was never intended to be a complete retirement program. The practical objective of the social security program is and always has been to pay benefits that provide a minimum degree of social security as a basis upon the worker, through his or her own efforts, will provide for their own security. Unfortunately, too many individuals have not made any other provision for their retirement, and they find out too late that social security benefits are not sufficient enough to cover all of their living expenses in retirement.

The automatic indexing of social security benefits (cost-of-living-adjustments, or COLAs) was never a part of the original Social Security Law. This provision has cost the social security system more than \$212 billion since 1975 alone! Some people talk about the mismanagement of the social security system; the principal reason the monthly social security payments are so much out of line with actuarial calculations is Congress' generosity in legislating COLAs, when there is insufficient income to cover these enlarged payouts.

When the social security system first began, workers paid 1% of their income in withholding tax. Today, workers are paying 7%, and this figure is scheduled to continue rising in future years. Social security is a pay-as-you-go program, with today's workers providing the benefits to today's beneficiaries. Today's beneficiaries receive back in benefits in a relatively short period of time all they paid into the program; this will not hold true for future beneficiaries, however, because they will continue to pay a higher proportion of their incomes into the social security program and the return on their investment will decline. As a matter of fact, if changes are not made in the social security and medicare programs, workers in the next century will be paying 42% of their salary just to keep these two programs in operation!

In 1983, the Congress passed a \$165 billion plan for strengthening the social security system. During consideration of that legislation, I had hoped the Congress would take into consideration the needs of both today's recipients, and the needs of future generations. Unfortunately, the package which was passed by the Congress came down heavy on the in-

creased revenue side, and failed to make those structural changes which are necessary to insure the future solvency of this important program. The tax increases resulting from that legislation will be a further burden on future workers, and I am afraid that the Congress postponed making important and necessary structural changes to the social security program.

No one is more concerned with the well-being and future of the social security program than I am. 22% of my constituents are elderly (a higher percentage than most Congressional Districts) and draw social security benefits. I have every reason to support a strong and equitable social security program, and I do. By the same token, I want to support those actions which will insure that there will be social security benefits to both current and future beneficiaries.

Contrary to information circulated by certain organizations and individuals, the Congress has not intention of allowing the social security and medicare programs to be weakened or go under; these programs are far too important to our society to allow that to happen. The resolution of the social security crisis in 1983, while it should have been more comprehensive in the scope of its reforms, demonstrates that serious problems can be resolved through bi-partisan cooperation. The Congress recogniz-

ed the critical need for reform and took steps to implement some much-needed changes. I sincerely believe that the same approach will be taken to address the further needs of social security and medicare reform.

On the subject of social security reform and the federal budget, I am enclosing a copy of a recent statement I made on the floor of the House. I think this will help you to better understand just how I feel on the related subjects of entitlements spending and the federal deficit. In closing, let

me tell you how much I appreciated your kind comments regarding my work here in the U.S. House of Representatives; I found your words very encourag-

ing. Thank you for writing as you have, and with best wishes, I remain.
