Fishing Report

"DO BASS TOUR NAMENTS HURT?"

As the professional bass fishing boom of the past decade made competitive fishing one of the country's fatest growing sports, many recreational anglers grew concerned about the impact of the sport would have been on the resource. If you are one of the worriers, you can rest easier now

A recently completed study by Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission biologists shows conclusively that bass tournaments have no negative impact on the resource. If anything, according to fisheries biologist Phil Chapman, who directed the study, tournament fishing has enhanced the enjoyment of the sprot at every level.

Based on tournament catch statistics, Chapman concluded that early concerns regarding the negative impact of fishing success for largemouths remains unfounded. In all major tournament areas, catch rates increased during the past five years compared to tournament statistics compiled prior to 1978. Since competitive fishing represents only a small part of total bass fishing pressure, any claims that tournament have been responsible for overfishing appear to be false.

Our area lakes are slipping into summer patterns some what early, with high pressure cell setting north, weather has been extremely warm. Leon's strippers are doing well in the dam region, early morning seems to be the most productive. Black bass have slowed with some 2 and 3 pound fish being taken in the river section. Proctor's crappie are doing well in the river sections and around deep water brush piles in the main lake. Bass fishing has been fair with some 4 and 5 pound fish being taken. Hubbard's small hybirds are being taken almost anywhere on the lake you throw white. Black bass have been slow with catches being scattered, and running

Wether just out to fish for a few hours or all day, make boating safety as natural as setting the hook on those lunkers. Good fishing and safe boating go hand in hand.

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THE DOWNFALL OF THE DANDELION In observing the many

vards lately, it appears that we are going to have a bumper crop of dandelions. Believe it or not, dandelions are as easy to be rid of as walking across the lawn

behind the spreader. They are many tales (Old Wives) as to methods of eradicating the dandelion, and some of them are very humorous. One such tale is to dip a sharpened oak peg tapered very thin into a saturated solution of sulphur of iron. Then stab the dripping peg into the heart of the dandelion and let the sun do the rest. I have always heard that it has to be an oak peg. I wonder if a good East Texas Pine peg would do just as well. Another solution was the use of a dairy goats becuase they can select weeds from the grass. Gasoline and/or kerosene have been favorite cures in many tales

When you see those yellow dandelion blossoms and the puffballs that follow in Spring, it is a sure clue that the time is right for the homeowners to take action against the weeds in their lawns. The dandelions and the lawn is moist so that the acative ingredients will stick to the leaves and then move into the plant, causing its eventual disinteregation.

If you will follow the following steps, you will effectively control these weeds:

1. Mow the lawn before applying the weed control, in order to keep the grass blades and weed leaves from touching the bottom of the spreader.

2. Select a day when rain is not expected for at least 24 hours, since the weed control particles need to stick to the leaves for at least that long to accomplish their mission.

3. Be sure the lawn is wet at the time you put down the weed control. This could be from rain or watering, or probably best of all from early morning dew.

4. Be sure to use a precision lawn spreader to give an even and accurate application without waste.

5. Stay off the lawn for at least a day after, to avoid knocking the particles off the leaves.

Within a few days the weeds will begin to curl and shrivel noticeably, and in approximately one month they

After the weeds have been removed if you will keep a thick and vigorous as well as a healthy stand of grass it will be the best way of keeping the dandelions from reappearing.

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





Fire Marshall Gives AARP Safety Measures For Fires

"Crawl, don't walk," instructed Cisco's Fire Marshall, Bill Webb, in his address to Cisco AARP in their
meeting at the Corrall
Room, May 17.

Mr. Webb stated that smoke rises and the floor or the ground are the most free from smoke of any place in a burning building. "There are probably as many deaths from smoke inhalation as from fire," he explained. "If you are in a burning building, crawl to the nearest exit. Always have two fire exits in your home and be sure that all family members know these two escape routes. Have family fire drills. They are as necessary as fire drills

Mr. Webb pointed out that there have been firefighters for the last 2,000 years. America's first organized fire troopers were in N.Y. (New Amsterdam) in 1638. Boston had the first paid fire fighters in 1700 and Benjamin Franklin organized the first one for Philadelphia in 1736. Webb said, "The two rooms in a home where most fires start are the kitchen and the bathroom. This is usually caused by an excess of plastic bottles. Too many inflammable detergents. All, or most of them have gasoline for a base."

The French students, who have studied English for 3-8 years, proide their own airfare, insurance, and spending money; and the American families provide the welcome and include them in their daily lives for the month of July.



Cox said many potential cable cuts were avoided due to conscientious contractors and residence customers who sought telephone company assistance in identifying cable locations before disging

Over the past several years, most telephone cable has been placed underground. The decision to use buried cable is based on its ecological, service and financial benefits, Cox said. Buried cable solves the problem of sight pollution, caused by the appearance of poles and overhead wires.

According to Cox, placing cable underground protects it from falling trees, traffic, weather changes, and squirrels.

"Although the belowground cable offers these advantages, it remains susceptible to damagbe by digging





Dear Customer, The City of Cisco during the month of March, 1984, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water act", Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1)the monthly average exceeded 1

turbidity unit (TU). The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high

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Congressman Stenholm Writes on Social Security

high school civics project an Eastland County student wrote Cong. Charles Stenholm asking specific questions about the Social Security program. His answer to the student provides some rock-hard answers to questions that a lot of people are now asking. We offer this from Cong. Stenholm.)

Dear Student:

Thank you for your recent letter in which you requested my views regarding the outlook for the social security and medicare programs. In your letter you indicated that you are a high school senior and that you and your parents are skeptical about the long-term future of these programs and your ability to benefit from them. I appreciated hearing from you and I certainly understand your concerns. Many changes have been

made with regard to the Social Security Law over the many misconceptions which exist with regard to this program. I have reviewed records, hearings, and transcripts of testimony which have been given through the years concerning the social security program. While changes have been made, one idea continues to remain consistent; the social security program was never intended to be a complete retirement pro- & gram. The practical objective of the social security 5 program is and always has been to pay benefits that provide a minimum degree of social security as a basis upon the worker, through his or her own efforts, will provide for their own security. Unfortunately, too many in-Unfortunately, too many individuals have not made any other provision for their retirement, and they find out too late that social security benefits are not sufficient

ment. The automatic indexing of social security benefits (cost-of-living-adjustments, or COLAs) was never a part of the original Social Security law. This provision has cost the social security system more than \$212 billion since 1975 alone! Some people talk about the mismanagement of the o social security system; the principal reason the monthly social security payments are so much out of line with actuarial calculations is Congress' generosity in legislating COALs, when there is insufficient income to cover these enlarged opayouts.

When the social security system first began, workers paid 1% of their income in withholding tax. Today, workers are paying 7%, and this figure is scheduled to continue rising in future years. Social security is a pay-as-you-go program, with today's workers providing the benefits to today's beneficiaries. Today's ₹ beneficiaries receive back in benefits in a relatively short period of time all they paid into the program; this will not hold true for future 5 beneficiaries, however, because they will continue to pay a higher proportion of their incomes into the social security program and the return on their investment will decline. As a matter of fact, if changes are not made in the social security and medicare programs, workers in the next century will be paying 42% of their salary just to keep these two programs in operation!

In 1983, the Congress passed a \$165 billion plan for strengthening the social security system. During consideration of that legislation, I had hoped the Congress would take into consideration the needs of both today's recipients, and the needs of future generations. Unfortunately, the package which was passed by the Congress came down heavy on the in-

EDITOR'S NOTE: As a creased revenue side, and failed to make those structural changes which are necessary to insure the future solvency of this important program. The tax increases resulting from that legislation will be a further burden on future workers, and I am afraid that the Congess postponed making important and necessary structural changes to the social security program. No one is more concerned

> with the well-being and future of the social security program than I am. 22% of my constituents are elderly (a higher percentage than Congressional most Districts) and draw social security benefits. I have every reason to support a strong and equitable social security program, and I do. By the same token, I want to support those actions which will insure that there will be social security benefits to both current and future beneficiaries.

Contrary to information circulated by certain organizations and individuals, the Congress has not intention of allowing the social security and medicare programs to be weakened or go under; these programs are far too important to our society to allow that to happen. The resolution of the social security crisis in 1983, while it should have been more comprehensive in the scope of its reforms, demonstrates that serious problems can be resolved through bi-partisan cooperation. The Congress recogniz-

ed the critical need for reform and took steps to implement some much-needed changes. I sincerely believe that the same approach will be taken to address the further needs of social security and medicare reform.

On the subject of social security reform and the federal budget, I am enclosing a copy of a recent statement I made on the floor of the House. I think this will help you to better understand just how I feel on the related subjects of entitlements spending and the federal deficit. In closing, let
