

On January 22, 1973, the U.S. Supreme Court in a flagrant act of raw judicial power, licensed the medical profession to kill. The resultant legally sanctioned holocaust has to this date claimed upwards of sixteen million lives.

That decision in 1973 declared that unborn human beings are not legal "persons" according to the U.S. Constitution. It is reminiscent of the Dred Scott decision in 1857 that declared that black people were not "persons" and could be used or killed at the discretion of their owners. Now an unborn child can be killed at the discretion of its

mother and her doctor. We were told before 1973 that abortion on demand would drastically reduce child abuse because many abused children were not wanted by their parents in the first place. Child abuse

has in fact risen over 400% since 1973, a predictable result when the ultimate form of child abuse, killing the unwanted child, is sanctioned by the nation's highest court.

That the mother should have the freedom of choice about abortion is the main argument proposed by those in favor of abortion on demand. Choice, however is not the issue. Taking the life of another human being is

The questions of rape, incest and endangering the mother's life are always raised. Those are difficult questions, but the fact of the matter is that those situations account for less than 5% of all abortions performed in this country. Fully 95% of abortions performed in the U.S. are for sake of con-

Abortion on demand has brought about a cheapening of human life which as led to a further curse on our society, infanticide, the killing of newborns. Dr. C. Everett Koop, our current Surgeon General, had predicted just such an effect.

The Infant Doe case in Bloomington, Indiana in April 1982 is the prime example. It is now only one of many. Infant Doe was a Down's Syndrome baby and

Their lawyer coined the phrase--treatment to do nothing-and argued that if the surgery did correct the digestive problem, the baby would still be retarded. Conclusion: Being mentally retarded is sufficient reason to starve a baby.

This cheapening of human life is shown in many ways in Wichita, Kansas in August of 1963 where it was discovered that aborted babies from Wesley Medical Center were placed in bags labeled "biological wastes" and were being burned in the same incinerator used by the city to dispose of dead dog.







PIK payments were included in the tabulation of crop receipts for 1983, but government other payments, such as deficiency payments, were not in-

Cotton continued as the leading crop in Texas, with receipts estimated at \$877 million. Although sales were roughly half the level two years before, the South Plains led the state with a cotton crop totaling \$412 million. South Texas came in second with cotton sales of

cluded.

more than \$96 million. Wheat was the state's second leading cash crop with sales of \$638 million. The Panhandle boasted wheat sales of \$199 million, with North Central Texas a distant second at \$115 million.

Sorghum receipts totaled \$519 million. The Panhandle's crop totaled \$135 million while the Coastal Bend crop came in at almost \$99 million

Receipts from vegetables sales reaching almost \$68 million in the Panhandle and

\$45 million in South Texas. Corn brought in receipts totaling \$351 million, with the South Plains and Panhandle boasting receipts of \$152 million and \$55 million, respectively.

Nursery crops boasted

receipts of \$333 million across Texas, withs sales totaling almost \$106 million along with the Upper Cost and \$71 million in Northeast

A bumper hay harvest also was made in Texas last year. Leading production areas were North Central Texas and Northeast Texas.

Receipts estimated for other leading cash crops included rice, \$191 million; soybeans, \$97 million; peanuts, \$92 million; pecans \$46 million; oranges, \$36

million; grapefruit, \$30 million; sugar beets, \$23 million; peaches, \$20 million; and oatds, \$17 million.

Texas farmers should see some improvement in '84 prices since stockpiles of most commodities have been reduced by the PIK program, says Anderson. Also, increased domestic and export demand as a result of improving economic conditions in the U.s. and abroad should strengthen farm prices.

are questionable, it's often better to use the services of a professional, says Berry.

But labor-intensive repair and improvements are another matter, notes the specialist. Finishing an already framed-in attic area, for example, requires relatively inexpensive gypsum board (sheet-rock) and only a few special tools. It is also simple and inexpensive to correct any mistakes. Generally, sheet-rock accounts foe 20% of the cost of the job, so the do-ityourselfer can save about 80% over what a contractor might charge for drywall installation and finishing.

Even for labor-intensive projects, not all do-ityourselfers jobs will result in saving money, she says, since the cost of the materials is often increased due to over estimating the amount needed and waste.

The value of your time is another cost to be considered, says Berry. It can take the amareur 50-100% longer to do a job than it would take a professional.

As you gain confidence. also be careful about attempting jobs beyond your skill level, which can result in accidents, injuries or "botched" jobs that cost even more to repair, she cau-

With money, time and quality of the finished product at stake, it pays to consider the pros and cons before starting each do-ityourself project.





SAVORING SUMMER FRUITS

For the weight conscious, perhaps the nicest thing about summer is the wide variety of luscious summer fruits available at every supermarket counter or roadside stand — or perhaps even in your own backyard! Juicy, cool, and refreshing, summer fruits are just the thing for a hot summer afternoon. Best of all, they satisfy your sweet tooth for very few calories! Below are some examples of treats you should be enjoying right now, with hints for buying and storing:
PLUMS — Plums fall into

two categories: Japanese plums, which are medium to large and red or yellow, and the more familiar European plums, which are smaller, and blue or purple. When buying plums, pick ones that are plump and firm, but not hard. (A slight softening at the tip end indicates maturity.) Plums may be ripened at room temperature, then refrigerated, for up to five days. On the Weight Watchers plan, two medium plums equals one fruit

PEACHES - Early season peaches are usually the smaller clingstone or semifreestone varieties, whose flesh clings to the stone, or pit. Later season peaches are the larger freestone, with flesh that separates more easily

from the pit. Peaches are one of the oldest known fruits, and are also among the most fragrant, so use your nose when buying! Select peaches which have a rosy blush and a bright golden background color, with well-defined creases. Avoid fruit which is too hard, as it will not ripen properly. Avoid, too, fruit with soft spots or bruises. Peaches may be allowed to soften for 3-4 days, then transferred to the refrigerator for up to 5 days. To peel a peach easily, place in boiling water for 30 seconds, then plunge im-mediately into cold water. The skin will slip right off. To preserve color, dip cut peaches into lemon or lime juice.

NECTARINES are similar to peaches, but they are smooth, while peaches are fuzzy. The same buying and storing procedures apply to both types of fruit. 1 medium peach or 1 small nectarine = 1 serving. CHERRIES do not keep well,

so eat soon after buying. Select brightly colored, firm berries and avoid those that are sticky, soft, or that smell fermented. Store unwashed cherries in well-ventilated container for up to 2 days. 10 large cherries make up one diet serving.

Q. I have had allergies for years and have spent a lot of time and money trying to spot just what I'm allergic to. So far I have failed. Now I read in the paper that there's a new test being done which mixes white blood cells with different substances and by the cell reactions, identifies the cause of the allergy. It this a legitimate test?

A. I believe you're talking about "cytotoxic testing" which has been advertised to reveal the cause of a great many health problems including arthritis, obesity. headaches, etc. Some of the clinics which are doing this testing charge patients from \$300 to \$500 for a listing of reactive (allergy causing) substances as well as recommendations for a proper diet. The American Academy of Allergy and Immunology has criticized the lack of controlled tests proving cytotoxic testing to be effective, and suggest that the results are not reliable. Some investigational work is being done which should eventually reveal if the test has value. For the time being, my advice would be to save your

Q. The doctor told my mother she has "auricular fribillation" which he described as a disturbance in the rhythm of the heart. He told her not to worry

wouldn't bother her. Isn't fribrillation of the heart responsible for death in patient with heart attacks?

A. Fibrillation is a rhythm disturbance marked by loss of regular beats of the heart. Auricular fribrillation, as your mother has, ordinarily doesn't cause death because the heart continues to pump blood albeit with irregular pulse beats. In some older people, the condi-tion can only be treated with medications and they do quite well. Recent onset auricular fibrillation may sometimes be

converted to a regular rhythm. Ventricular fibrillation is another story. Since the ventricles are responsible for pumping blood, all the muscle fibers in the ventricular wall must contract together. If they contract independently, no blood is pumped and death occurs within a few minutes. Giving these fibrillating ventricular muscles an electrical shock will sometimes cause them to start contracting together again.

The difference between the two types of fibrillation is in which heart chambers are involved in the disorganized beats - if it is the auricles (upper chambers), the pulse continues irregularly and near normal activities are possible if in the ventricles (lower chambers), death may occur within several minutes.



PERSPECTIVES By CHARLES A. SALTER, PH.D.

CHILDREN: Q. Some of our son's friends are going away to camp this summer for the first time. We want him to go, too, but he's dead force him to go or not? Wouldn't it help him over-come some of his shyness?

A. A good summer camp can provide children with marvelous social, athletic, and artistic activities. It can expand their horizons, broaden their self-images, and help them mature. But forcing a child to go against his will is usually not the answer. And if he's genuinely not emotionally ready to go, the experience could be traumatic. In that case, it might even increase his shyness.

Instead of forcing him, discuss the issue with him and see if you can work out a mutual agreement as to whether or not he should go. Make this a pressure-free talk where you really listen as well as explain your view. First, ask him why he doesn't want to go. Is it just a normal hesitancy about trying out new, unknown things? Or does he have specific objections to the camp itself or to the children who would accompany him there? For example, maybe he's heard tales about this particular camp or has been teased by the companions who plan to go.

Then explain to him the reasons why you think he would like, and would benefit from, a summer at camp. As you do this, don't just reminisce about your own golden memories of camp. And don't gloss over his objections. Instead, deal specifical-For example, if there's something about this particular camp that bothers him, then perhaps he could select another one to attend instead. But if he just has vague anxieties about camps in general, then arrange for him to have an advance tour of the place. Or perhaps you could arrange for him to talk with older children who have already


been there. If he's not quite ready for a full summer program away from home, then perhaps you could compromise on some more limited option. For example, maybe he would agree to go to a camp nearer your town or one with weekends at home. Perhaps he would be more willing to go to a day camp program run by your community center, church, or civic group. Maybe occasional camp-outs with scout groups or even with the family would interest him. Such intermediate activities could help prepare him for a more extended departure from home during some future summer. Do you have questions
