OPEN LETTER
TO THE
CITIZENS OF CISCO

As everyone knows the drought that has plagued West Texas the past two years is still with us and Lake Cisco has not caught any significant water since October, 1981. Since that time, Lake Cisco has continued to only go down, resulting in the level of water in the lake being the lowest it has been in twenty years. Water is without a doubt one of our most precious commodities, and with the hot and dry summer season beginning, we strongly encourage all of the City's water customers to practice conservation and to restrict the unnecessary use of water.

Our water is definitely a limited commodity. However, if everyone will voluntarily cooperate in the conservation of our water and use common sense in their use of water, we may be able to avoid mandatory water restrictions. To help in this effort the City will be sending out with the June water bills a brochure from the Texas Department of Water Resources regarding suggestions on how we can better utilize our water. It is an excellent brochure with many worthwhile ideas; so please read the brochure and put those ideas to work. Limiting outside water usage and restricting it to only the early morning hours is strongly recommended.

The City Council has water as its main priority and we are instigating studies into long-range alternatives to our water supply, but cooperation from all our citizens in conserving water and holding down unnecessary and wasteful water usage will help to insure an adequate volume of water from Lake Cisco for not only this year, but for the future. Conservation will also help minimize the inconvenience and eliminate the hazards of inadequate water pressure.

the Altus Air Base were on display there, along with some earlier model planes belong to the Confederate Air Force (CAF).


The CAF pilots performed some aerial maneuvers for those watching their performances. Counting the military planes on display, there were approximately 40-50 planes participating in the air show.

Protective Services Goal Is To Prevent

The goal of Adult Protective Services is to prevent or remedy abuse, neglect, or exploitation of adults unable to protect their own interests. Chapter 48, Title 2 of the Human Resources Code, authorizes the department to investigate reports of abuse, neglect, or exploitation, and to provide protective services to elderly or disabled persons. The law requires any person believing that an elderly or disabled person is being abused, neglected, or exploited report the circumstances to the department. A person making a report, participating in an investigation, testifying, or otherwise participating in any judicial proceeding arising from a petition, report, or investigation is from civil or criminal liability, unless the person acted in bad faith or with malicious purpose. Any aged or disabled

person who is alleged to be in a state of abuse, neglect, or exploitation is eligible to receive adult protective

The department maintains a toll-free hotline, 1-800-252-5400, to receive reports of abuse, neglect, or exploitation of elderly or disabled adults. Reports are taken 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The identity of callers is confidential. The law requires the department to initiate a prompt and thorough investigation of suspected need for protective services within 24 hours of the report. The department may seek a court order authorizing emergency entry to implement an investigation. If the elderly or disabled person is found to be suffering abuse or neglect which poses an immediate threat to life and the person is incapable of consenting to services, the department may petition the court for an emergency order authorizing involuntary protective services, or removal of the person to safer surroundings.

According to figures from the Texas Secretary of State's office, the 17th District voters showed a "very good turnout" for the Senate, Congressional and local county races.

"The 17th District had a voter turnout of 32.9 percent or 92,179 voters," Stenholm said. "District 2. in east Texas had the best record with 111,785 people casting ballots in the primary. In northeast Texas, District 1 had 92,220 voters at the booths for the second best Mangum Baptist

Only 25.2 percent of the registered voters state-wide participated in the May primary, Stenholm said. The Republican party had a 4.7 percent turnout and the Democrats showed 20.4 percent at the polls.

"I'm very proud of the voters in the 17th District," the congressman said. "It's good to see so many people taking an active part in the selection and election of their governmental officials.

The votes in the June 2 runoff could be even higher, officials estiamte. "In the 17th District," Stenholm said, "there are 287,012 registered voters. I hope that those who didn't vote before realize that they are still eligible to vote in the run-

Members of the Ladies Hospital Auxiliary acted as








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Bass Club Report

Agency Calls On Citizens To Report Suspected Abuse

The state's human resources commissioner has called on Texans to get involved in the prevention of widespread and growing abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly and disabled

A 24-hour, toll free hotline (1-800-252-5400) has been established to receive reports of abuse to deter these acts and protect the victims, reported Marlin Johnston, commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

"The people of Texas need to be aware that adult abuse exists, but more importantly, they need to be involved in its prevention," Johnston said. Department estimates indicate that more than 10,000 were victims of elder abuse last year.

The 1981 state legislature recognized the problem by making it mandatory for citizens to report suspected abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly persons. The department was given authority to investigage the ed in 1983 to include disabled Abilene campus, Wed-

Johnston said the department handles almost 2,000 cases each month, but many other cases may go unreported.

"Like child abuse, these acts occur privately and within the confines of the home," Johnston said. "The acts tend not to be isolated incidents. They tend to follow a pattern of increased frequency and severity." An example of the cases

encountered by department workers is the 72-year-old woman who was regularly . beaten by her alcoholic sonin-law. Another 85-year-old was found living with 15 cats in a dilapidated shack without water or a toilet. And a 93-year-old man's family frequently chained him in the bathroom becuase of his incontinence.





MARIGOLD The Marigold is among the most popular flowers in the United States. They are exceedingly easy to grow and require little attention. Their colors range from white, bronze, yellow, maroon and orange.

All marigolds decendants of the wild Mexican species. They have been hybirdized to produce four separate types. inches. These flowers are usually double two to three inches in diameter born on very sturdy stems.

We also have the Dwarf Marigolds which usually run about 12 inches tall and are topped with masses of single yellow or orange flowers measuring about one inche in diameter. In this variety we find the foliage to be fern like and much finer than the other varieites. Many marigolds have a brusing scent which is strong to some poeple and unpleasant while being attractive to others. There are some marigolds that are odorless.

There are many ways to use the marigold in the garden. Their vivid color mass planted in beds produce a color spectacular from summer to frost. They can be used as borders, baskets, and window boxes as well as pot plants. The taller ones can make good hedges. In Central America the m marigold is grown for chicken feed. When the blooms of the yellow marigold are fed to the chickens the hens will lay eggs with a darker yellow voke.

Scientists have proved that the parasitic worm (nematode) vanishes where Marigolds are planted.

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
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Holiday Delays County Business



Texas Drought Conditions Have Many Farmers

Drought conditions over parts of Texas have many farmers thinking about irrigation, but it's a major step that calls for careful planning.

"An irrigation system is a major investment and operational costs are high," says Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

So, developing a water supply and purchasing an irrigation system calls for a lot of planning and forethought, contends the engineer.

"Select an appropriate system for the particular crop, type of soil and lay of the land," adv' Keese. "Plan the igation development carefully to system must be used to recover the investment."

Farmers with irrigation systems that have not been used in a while may find them in need of repairs. However, the time to check out and repair an irrigation system is before it's needed, says Keese, so now may be a

difficult time to obtain repair parts or to get a system serviced since dealers are in their busiest time of the

For farmers already using irrigation systems or getting ready to start them up, the season, watchword should be "efficiency," emphasizes the engineer.

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City Council Adopts Street Paving Policy-Procedures

May 22, 1984, adopting a street paving policy and procedures for the City of Cisco, Texas. The last edition o of this newspaper told about the council meeting where the resolution was adopted, but since local citizens s seem especially interested in street paving policies of the city, the resolution is being printed here for public information.

The stated intention and goal of the City Council is "to apply the highest priority to the paving of unimproved streets and the maintenance of paved streets in the most appropriate and expeditious manner as available resources allow."

The street paving policies and procedures as adopted by the Council follow: A. GENERAL

1. The City Council shall by its own determination in public meetings and upon specific indication of "public need" designate the streets and blocks to be paved within the city limits with

2. The addition of curb and gutter to a paving project construction within a project. Each exception shall be reviewed and approved individually.

3. The City shall notify all property owners abutting the designated paving project advising them of this opportunity to provide curb and gutter along their property through an assessment program and their estimated cost for the curb and gutter.

4. The property owners will be allowed thirty (30) calendar days to respond to the curb and gutter assessment program by depositing their estimated

It was December 19, 1918, at the New York Globe, a day not unlike any other at the city's busiest newspaper. As usual, the sports editor was calling for the daily cartoon, and sports artist Robert L. Ripley was in quest of an idea. Since the day was dull for sports and there was nothing much in the way of current news, Ripley would have to use his keen imagination to come up with something he could sub-

Staring at his blank drawing paper for some time, Ripley finally decided to turn to his files of newsclippings that he had been collecting on sports oddities and records. There was, for example, an article on a man

who walked across the continent backwards, using a mirror for better vision. There was another one about a Frenchman who stayed under water six minutes and

The Cisco Press

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Finally completing his cartoon, which he had entitled "Champs or Chumps," Ripley was his way across the street for a cup of coffee. Taking one last look at the cartoon, he impulsively scratched out the title and replaced it with the words "Believe It Or Not!" and put it on the sports editor's desk. Dismissing the drawing from his mind, he left, little realizing that an idea had

been conceived, an idea that would eventually capture the imagination of millions of readers and make the words 'Believe It Or Not!" a household phrase.

Other papers soon requested permission to use the material and the feature become a worldwide institution, appearing in more than 300 newspapers in 38 coun-

Today his works are the basis for a new ABC television series seen every Sunday night at 6 p.m., entitled "Ripley's Believe It Or

In his quest for odd an unusual material to illustrate his cartoons, Ripley eventually visited 198 countries, which made him the most traveled man in the world. One day he could be found posing with a 9-yearold-mother of Java; at other times he would be interviewing a Papuan cannibal chief, a "Monkey Man" of India, or a fierce Zulu tribesman. He was, in fact, in China more often than in his New York office. It is understandable, therefore, why the Duke of Windsor gave him the title of

"The Modern Marco Polo." Ripley lived alone and his 29 room home on his private island estate on Long Island Sound, New York, and the 20 rooms of his New York City stuido, were filled with some of the most unique objects in the world, including an amazing collection of Oriental art, African carvings, Aztec masks, and what was claimed as the world's largest collection of steins and goblets.

While Ripley was alive, his collection was valued at \$2,000,000. "But the most unusual thing in either of his homes," housekeeper always said,

'was Mr. Ripley himself."

He was unusual indeed His job was his passion and working at his drawing board between 7 and 11 in the morning, he never failed to produce a cartoon a day, for over 30 years. He traveled a million miles or more, but never took a proper vacation. He was not a smoker, he rarely ate lunch, and he never gambled or played cards. He was the owner of several cars, but he never learned to drive. An avid collector of beer steins who drank only gin, he was a poor

dresser whose favorite

garments were bathrobes

and bow ties. An en-

trepreneur, a flamboyant

showman, and yet, in private

life he was a basically shy person who liked animals better than people.

Ripley was born in Santa Rosa, California, in 1893. nen only 14, he sold his first cartoon to the old Life Magazine for \$8. At 16, he joined the art staff of the San Francisco Bulletin and from there went to the San Francisco Chronicle, where his salary was \$10 a week. Two years later he was fired for asking for a \$2.50 raise. This prompted him to seek new opportunities, so he set off for New York where he landed a job with the New York

In 1929, Ripley joined the King Feature Syndicate, the organization which still handles worldwide distribution of the "Believe It Or Not!" feature. At Chicago's Century of Progress Exposition in 1933, Ripley introduced the first of his many famous museums which are now in various locations around the world.

At the time of his death in 1949, Ripley had 66 employees, including linguists, research experts and numerous secretaries to

in the run off election. Get Farm Ponds-Lakes

Ready For Swimming COLLEGE STATION-With hot summer weather looming ahead, now's the time to get that farm pond or

lake ready for swimmers. A few simple safety tips and practices may prevent swimming accidents or even deaths, says Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A. M University System.

More than 450 people in Texas drown each year in lakes, rivers, pools and farm

Farm lakes and ponds are especially dangerous, notes Nelson, because of junk, rocks, stumps, and snakes. Also, too few ponds have rescue equipment--ropes, poles or buoys. And many times children play in ponds without proper supervision.

Nelson suggests observing these practices to prevent accidents in farm ponds or

-- Remove underwater trash, bottles and can that might cause injury. -Fence the pond and keep the gate locked when not in use to protect liability in

case of an accident. -Provide shallow areas, no deeper than 4 feet, and designate only deep areas, at lease 8 feet deep, for diving.

Farmers should provide safety equipment and signs near a swimming pond, advises the engineer. Mark off safe swimming areas with buoyed lines. Accidents can be prevented and lives saved by using signs to warn

off specific dangers, such as shallow water, deep water, sudden drop-off and caving banks.

Nelson suggests signs 6 inches to 18 inches posted 4 feet above the ground. Use dark lettering on white background, with letters 1 inch high. Be sure to post emergency phone numbers and the location of the nearest phone.

Equip ponds that are used for water recreation with rescue equipment such as rope, flotation device or pole.

Have an adequate first-aid kit available and learn how to give basic first-aid treatment, especially mouthto-mouth resuscitation and CPR. notes Nelson.

Discourage swimming in areas in front of steep, sloping banks. If supervising swimmers, these simple rules will help avoid many accidents that occur at farm ponds every year:

-- Every swimmer should know how to swim or float well enough to survive in

-- Allow only good swimmers in deep water.

-Do not allow someone to swim alone or after dark.

-Do not let small children swim without adult supervision.

When entertaining large groups, supervise swimmers closely and use a "buddy" system with a buddy check 15 minutes. Discourage dunking and rough play. Do not allow people to swim after large meals, when overheated, or during electrical storms.

If someone is in trouble in the water, throw him a life buoy, reach them with a long pole, or toss something to them that floats, such as a spare tire, picnic cooler, jug of piece of wood.

Farm pond recreation can be fun and fulfilling if it is free of mishaps, says Nelson. It can be if people are aware of the dangers that may exist and take the proper precautions.

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
