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tobacco smoking, by stoves, fireplaces, etc. Unfortunately, the "tightening" of buildings in recent years to conserve energy tends to trap and concentrate air pollutants, resulting in substantial increases in the levels of such indoor air pollution. For this reason the Manufactured Housing Institute (MHI) suggests that buyers and residents of mobile/ manufactured homes - which are especially energy-efficient in their design and construction - regularly ventilate their homes. According to MHI Board Chairman Wallace J. Conner, there is no medical evidence to indicate that lingering chemical odors or other everyday indoor air pollutants are injurious to health. "However," Conner said, "because individuals with respiratory ailments or allergies may find them unpleasant and irritating, we also advise that such individuals consult a physician before purchasing any new home."

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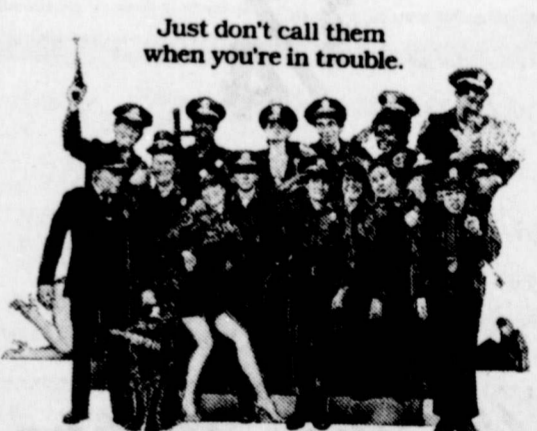

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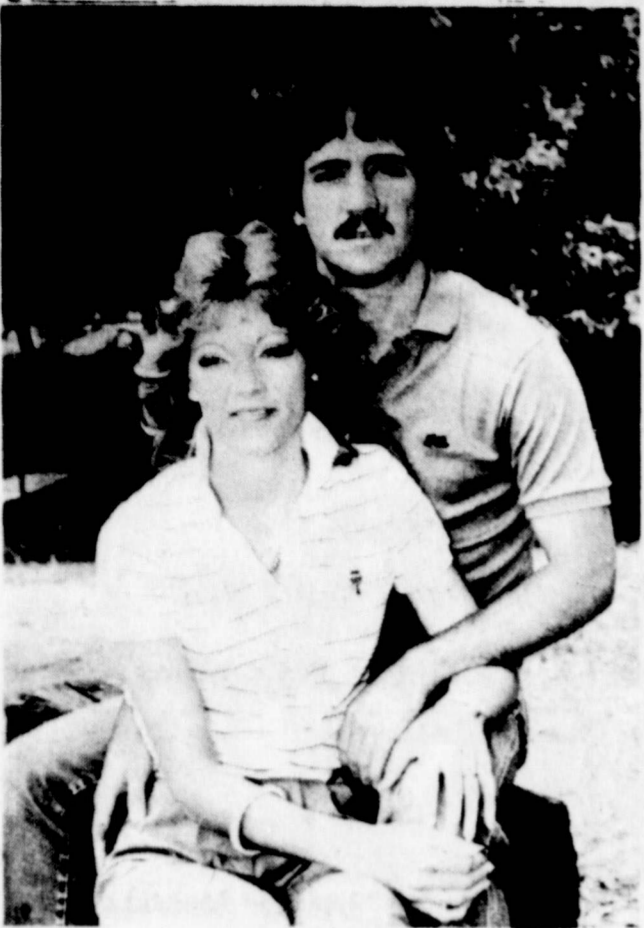

Drilling Bits

Flowing 503,000 CF gas per day on a 375-in. choke, the No. 2 J.C. Carr has been completed in Eastland County as a successful wildcat venture of EnRe Corp. of Abilene.

Location is four miles northeast of Cisco.

EnRe took the well to 3,900-ft. bottom and perforated for production at 3,853 to 3,861 feet into the wellbore. The operation is in a 160-acre lease, SPRS Survey.

The No. 9 Bar-A-Bar Ranch has been completed in Eastland County's Trinity Field, with Trinity Exploration of Fort Worth as the operator.

It pumped 32 barrels of oil and 105,000 CF gas per day on open choke.

Located in an 80-acre unit, H&TC Survey, seven miles north of Cisco, the well bottomed at 4,150 feet. It will produce from a set of Mississippian Formations 3,942 to 3,952 feet into the wellbore.

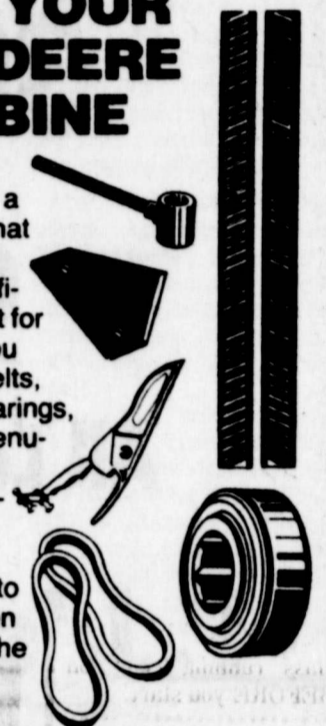

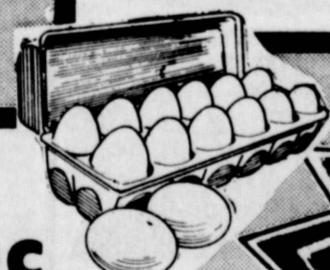

Evaluating Long Distance Services

College Station—Selecting a long-distance telephone service may not be the biggest consumer decision you have to make this year, but it could be the most confusing.

More than 17 long-distance companies provide service in Texas and that number is growing, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist Nancy Granovsky. Some Texas communities are served by several long-distance companies and others by their regular telephone carrier only.

"Even where long-distance services are available, not everyone needs to subscribe, says Granovsky, who specializes in family financial management. If your present long-distance bills don't exceed \$5-10 each month, you probably will not benefit by a special service, she explains.

When and where you make most of your long-distance calls are key indicators of whether you need a service, says the specialist. If you make many calls during business hours, or between 5 and 11 p.m., the service can save you money. If you often call home from out of town or receive collect calls, rates from the alternate companies will also be cheaper, she adds.

But many variables will affect how much you actually pay. Granovsky suggests using the following questions to compare costs and

features of long-distance services:

•What is the range of costs for calls of 100-3000 miles in cents per minute? What are the rates for day, evening and night calls? Make sure you get these figures in cents per minute so you can make comparisons between services.

•What are the basic fees? Is there a monthly subscription fee? What is the monthly minimum charge regardless of the number of calls made? Is there an initial set-up charge?

•What billing unit is used? In general, the smaller the unit the better. For example, a company that bills in 6 second increments might charge 4 cents for a call that lasted one second into a new minute, but a company that bills in 60 second increments might charge 42-50 cents for that extra second.

•May calls be made to any interstate phone in the United States? To any phone in Texas?

•What about "special" calls? May collect calls be made? Can operator-assisted calls be made? Are there extra charges for calls made away from home?

Are there any differences in rates (except those differences resulting from calls made at different times of the day) for calls made from home, calls made away from home, collect calls, calls made out of state and calls made in state?

•Are there any times during the day when calls are

not permitted for the service option you are considering? •How will billing and billing errors be handled? Some

companies will bill directly to a major credit card and others will send a separate bill. With some services, a

very short call may go unbilled while an unanswered call may be billed to you if the phone rings for a long

**Good and Poor Reasons
For Saying 'Charge It'**

Two of the most popular words in the American vocabulary are "Charge It." About two-thirds of American families now use credit for day-to-day expenses, and even more buy furniture, automobiles or appliances on installment contracts, says a family financial expert with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

According to home economist Nancy Granovsky, buying on credit is so common that some consumers don't realize there are both good and poor reasons to do it.

Certain circumstances make borrowing financially sound, she says. Some

of the best reasons to use credit include:

Anticipated price increases. Even though inflation has slowed down, some cost increases are inevitable and can justify the interest expense that comes with borrowing.

Major events in life, such as beginning a new job, establishing a household or family, take a lot of money which it can make sense to borrow.

A genuine emergency, if you have not accumulated a sufficient emergency cash fund.

Making essential, big-ticket purchases that you could not pay for with cash on hand. Cars, furniture, major appliances and a

home are traditionally purchased on credit.

Taking advantage of attractive seasonal sales or specials on which you can save money, assuming you want or need the items.

Borrowing for educational purposes.

Credit can be a valuable resource that helps families reach goals. But overuse of credit can also result in financial disaster, says Granovsky.

An early warning sign of problem credit use is borrowing for poor reasons, she adds.

For an example, borrowing up to the limit of your capacity to repay simply because you want something is not a good idea, she says, since even a minor miscalculation can force you to default.

Living beyond your income and using credit for day-to-day living expenses is also a poor reason to borrow because any unexpected expenses can result in financial disaster.

It's also unwise to use credit just because you anticipate a pay raise. If the money doesn't materialize, it can create a financial hardship, warns the home economist.

Buying because the terms seem easy is a form of self-deception that can lead to financial problems. This is especially true if you are buying items impulsively without considering their quality and price.

Buying on credit to boost morale is at best a temporary solution, since you may find yourself even more depressed when the bills arrive.

If you buy on credit to raise your standard of living or status, without raising your income, you can also wind up with an unreasonable debt load.

"The overuse of credit can creep up on anyone," says Granovsky. "All it takes is a bit of financial carelessness, a false sense of security and a few concessions to the temptations of easy payments."

An unexpected cut in income or an unforeseen expense might bring the problem to a crisis. But more often the problem develops slowly and gives off many warning signals, she notes. That's why examining your reasons for buying on credit can help avoid a serious financial trap.

Did you get your pecan trees sprayed? The pecan nut casebearer, which is a small worm in its larvae stage, eats its way into the small pecan. If left uncontrolled they may destroy 30%, 50% or even 100% of a pecan crop.
We saw the first damage on May 23. Based on this and other pecan growers' reports we determined that May 26-30 was the best time to spray. We tried to get this information out by May 27. We regret that it did not make the Sunday paper, but it was in the mid-week paper. If you have not yet sprayed your pecans, you should examine the crop to see if you have a large number of un-

damaged nuts, and if so, spray them.
You should always consider the cost of controlling the pecan insects. In some cases it is cheaper to buy your pecans this fall than it is to spray yard and trees, especially if the pecan crop appears to be light.
The pecan nut casebearer has 3 generations per year. It is approximately 42 days between the occurrence of each subsequent generation. Some years the second and third generations of this pest cause considerable nut damage. Total nut loss is usually greater during the spring generation because an individual larvae may destroy a complete nut

cluster. Later generations usually damage one or two in the cluster.
You have seen other articles in this paper concerning Soil Stewardship Week which is May 27-June 3. I would like to commend the Soil and Water Conservation Districts for their efforts in celebration of this week. The theme for the week is "Conservation - A Common Commitment."
All too frequently we observe the reluctance of the human race to fully accept its primary role as caretaker of God's earth. We are prepared to eat the fruit but the task of dressing the garden is left to the few who sincerely care about the perpetuation of the forests, the preservation of the rivers that water the garden and the renewing of the topsoil from which plants gather their nutrients.
In our country, the decision to set aside a week each year to acknowledge before

Agency Calls Citizens To Report Suspected Abuse

The state's human resources commissioner has called on Texans to get involved in the prevention of widespread and growing abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly and disabled persons.

A 24-hour, toll free hotline (1-800-252-5400) has been established to receive reports of

abuse to deter these acts and protect the victims, reported Marlin Johnston, commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

"The people of Texas need to be aware that adult abuse exists, but more importantly, they need to be involved in its prevention,"

Johnston said. Department estimates indicate that more than 10,000 were victims of elder abuse last year.

The 1981 state legislature recognized the problem by making it mandatory for citizens to report suspected abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly persons. The department was given authority to investigate the reports.

The law was amended in 1983 to include disabled adults.

Johnston said the department handles almost 2,000 cases each month, but many other cases may go unreported.

"Like child abuse,

these acts occur privately and within the confines of the home," Johnston said. "The acts tend not to be isolated incidents. They tend to follow a pattern of increased frequency and severity."

An example of the cases encountered by department workers is the 72-year-old woman who was regularly beaten by her alcoholic son-in-law. Another 85-year-old was found living with 15 cats in a

dilapidated shack without water or a toilet. And a 93-year-old man's family frequently chained him in the bathroom because of his incontinence.

Broiling or baking chicken takes far less time than deep frying, and fixing a salad with fresh vegetables and tuna takes about three hours less than preparing and simmering a pot of beef stew.
