Water Pumps Will Be Off Monday

Contractors will be tying new raw water and filter water lines into the existing sedimentation basin at the Lake Cisco dam on Monday, June 18th, according to City Manager Mike Moore. He said this will result in the pumps out at the dam being turned off for several hours.

While the underground tank at College Hill and the tower should be adequate to provide normal water service," emphasized Mr. Moore, "the City is requesting that everyone please be careful and conserve water this Monday and Tuesday until our pumping operations are back to nor-

As these water treatment improvements progress, there will undoubtedly and unfortunately be other interruptions in the City's normal water service, stated Mr. Moore. He said, "The City apologizes for any inconvenience, but will do everything possible to keep interruptions to a minimum and, of course, keep the inconvenience to our water

when any interruption to normal service is to occur. The water treatment improvements at the dam are progressing well overall, with mide to late September still the target date for their completion.

Mr. Moore said the 12-inch water supply line that traverses the City from the underground storage at College Hill to the water tower is almost complete. Final testing was being conducted on the line last week. If no problems occurred during the tests, the new line should be ready and in operation this week. Final clean up on the streets along the course of the new water line will start this week also.

In summary Mr. Moore said, "With this new 12-inch water line being operational and with the installation of new impellars in our highservice pumps at College Hill, the City will be able to maintain better and more constant water pressure throughout the system."

City Council Writes Letter About Suit

The Cisco City Council has written an open letter to the members of the Westbound Water Supply Corporation and the Citizens of Cisco in regards to a lawsuit filed on the City by Westbound Water Supply Corporation on March 19, 1984. The entire letter may be seen on the back page of this edition of The Cisco Press.

The lawsuit was filed in regards to a proposed rate increased by the City of Cisco for Westbound's monthly water rate to go from 50 cents per 1,000 gallons to \$1.27 per 1,000 gallons. The letter states, "This increase also included four years of actual demonstrable increases in the maintenance and operation of the water treatment plant, which has never been passed on to Westbound.

The decision to increase Westbound's rates followed the approval of a bond issue in April, 1982 by the citizens of Cisco for much needed and required water treatment and distribution improvements.

The citizens of Cisco and the customers of Westbound Water Supply Corporation are strongly urged to read the letter from the Council, whose stated purpose is "to inform the members of Westbound and the citizens of Cisco as to the facts in this unfortunate matter.'

Because an average 10 percent of the iron in foods is absorbed for use by the body, the Recommended Dietary Allowance for iron is ten times greater than the body actually needs. For example, women of childbearing age need to absorb 1.8 milligrams of iron, but the RDA is set at 18 milligrams.

Interaction of iron with other chemicals is one factor that affects absorption. The tannins which are naturally present in the iced tea that Texans love to drink, for instance, can combine with iron to decrease absorption.

Yet vitamin C from citrus fruit can combine with iron to increase absorption. Iron naturally present in red meats, poultry and fish can also increase the absorption of iron for plants and plant products such as spinach and other green vegetables, so much people can't get enough iron from eating a well-balanced diet.

If you do buy fortified foods, check the label both for the type of iron added and the percent of RDA.

The chemical form most frequently used to fortify foods is "reduced iron". This pure form of iron is added as a very fine powder which is easily absorbed by the body. "Reduced iron" is typically just by the word "iron" on the ingredient. Iron may also be added in the form of iron salts. Some iron salts, such as ferrous sulfate and ferrous fumarate are similar to "reduced iron" in absorption. But those containing phosphate complexes such as ferric phosphate and ferric pyrophosfate are not as easily absorbed by the body.

Preschool children, women of childbearing age and pregnant women are at greatest risk of developing iron deficiency. Adding iron to some foods can help assure that people get adequate amounts of iron, but can also mean that others may get too much.

The Food and Drug Administration has established some product standards for iron. However, many pro-

ducts such as breakfast cereals do not have standards and may contain amounts of iron ranging from a tract to 100 percent of the RDA.

Consumers are advised to consider their individual needs for added iron, and use the nutrition lable as an important shopping tool when buying fortified foods.



### Study Done On School Priorities

New priorities for public school education in Texas can be carried out by reallocating existing funds to accomplish many of the recommendations made by the Governor's Select Committee on Public Education, according to a report released by the Texas Research

The Austin-based public policy research organization reported the finding in connection with a study of resources allocation in a representative sample of

from 19 districts. Earlier, the League released a preliminary report based on partial data from only 12 of these districts. League President, Jared Hazelton, observes: "While the data from the 19 districts yields averages which differ somewhat from those obtained from the 12-district sample, the general pattern of salary expenditures and the major findings are not changed significally.

Th study reveals that the core academic curriculum in the sample high schoolsdefined as all courses in English, mathematics. science, social studies, and foreign languages-averages only about 45 percent of the instructional salary dollar. Among these schools, which

range in size from 140 to 2,349 students, the share of the instructional dollar devoted to the core academic curriculum ranges from 32 to 53 cents. Generally, schools with larger enrollments have a relatively higher share of their instructional dollar for the academic core courses.

On the average, the rest of the high school instructional dollar broke down this way: 19 percent for vocational education, 15 percent for

electives, nine percent for competitve sports, six percent for health and physical education, and six percent for special and compensatory (i.e., remedial) education. In general, the larger high schools devoted more of their instructional salary dollar to electives and less to vocational education, than did the smaller high schools.

Based on data from eight school districts, the League study found that instruction accounts for about twothirds of the total district salaries, instructional support for about eight percent, administration for roughly 14 percent, and district support services (i.e., transportation, food service, and maintenance) for nearly 12 percent.

The League noted that administrative salaries do not appear to be related to the enrollment of the district, at least within the size range of the districts studied (492 to 2,791 students).

Among the high/middle schools studied, on the average academic instruction accounts for about 84 percent, vocational education for five percent, compensatroy programs for four percent, and special education for seven percent of the instructional dollar.

As with high schools, the study found that vocational education salary costs in the junior high/middle schools are considerably above the academic course salary costs-\$228 per student as compared with \$153 per student. Again, a major reason for the higher vocational education cost is the lower pupil-teacher ratio-18 to 1 as compared to 24 to 1 for the academic courses.

Among the elementary schools studied, academic courses account for about 82 percent of all instructional salaries, special education for 10 percent, and compensatory programs for seven

### "Dress Up" Your Photos with Creativity

Did you ever notice how children love playing outdoors...until you want them to? Then, it seems, they can't come in through the sliding patio doors often enough. Threatening doesn't work. Most kids know by the time they've turned 10 we parents don't really live up to our threats.

Bribing doesn't work. There's simply not anything a kid wants badly enough to merit staying outdoors for. Tricking doesn't work, either. Even if we trick them

into going outside ("Did you kids see that giant condor flying over the Willobys' back yard?), most kids have such short memory spans, they've forgotten why they've gone outside even before they've gotten there. And then, of course, it's back inside for a re-

I have a solution. It's viable any time of the year. winter through fall, on any type of day-sunny and warm to freezing cold. It's called dress up. Remember? But you can make it even more fun, more challenging, by taking photographs of the kids in costume. Perhaps even have a best-dress-up contest, in which the winner wins a chocolate-chip cookie or an extra ride at the amusement park

Another benefit of having your children play dressup for the camera is giving a self-conscious or overly shy youngster the chance to ham things up with abandon while getting used to the "friendliness" of the family camera.

In order for dress-up to work, you'll need some costumes (which need not be anything more than the most outrageous clothes you can find in your wardrobe plus an umbrella, hat, scarf, costume jewelry, etc.), a plain, uncluttered background, and a mirror so the children can admire their creative handiwork. And, or course, a camera with electronic flash.

While dress-up works with one, it's even more fun with two or more children. They may all be your own, or your child can ask a friend or two over for a few

Depending upon the age of the children, you'll probably want to limit their activities unless you're there to supervise. Remember: lipstick doesn't easily come out of a silky cotton dress...no more so than black shoe polish rubs out of lightweight denim pants.

If you can limit the items the youngsters have to choose from, you'll actually make dress-up easier for them; they'll have fewer major decisions to make. And you can go about your business, peeking in from time to time to see how things are going.

When all are dressed, have them pose individually or in a group. If shooting against a wall, have the subiects stand forward eight or ten feet so the shadow from the flash won't be so pronounced.

If you have an instant-print camera, use it. The kids

will get a kick out of seeing the results immediately.

Otherwise, you'll have to explain that it will take a day or two to get the film processed. Then it's simply a

matter of finding an impartial judge to mediate the

contest (or, to prevent hurt feelings, the competition just might end in a tie).

Here are a couple tips to help you take the best photos possible. 1) Hold the camera steady to eliminate any motion

blur. If possible, mount the camera on a tripod. 2.) While the children should stand reasonably still for the shooting, electronic flash has a short enough duration to "freeze" minor movements, resulting in

sharp photos. 3.) For a more interesting shot, do all your shooting from children's-eye level...approximately the height

of the children's faces. 4.) Take several shots of each pose. In that way, you'll have plenty of prints to go around ... some for the family album, some for the kids, and a few left over for very appreciative grandparents.

5.) For even more interesting shots, take a few candids of the children in the act of getting dressed. You can even capture their reflections in the mirror as long as you stand at an angle so that the flash doesn't bounce back at the lens:

Give it a try. It's a fun, easy, sure-fire way to get some top-quality, endearing kid shots. And don't be surprised if it ends up being one of your children's most favorite activities.





## Oil Belt News

### **Drilling Bits**

A new wildcat has been brought on line in Eastland County, with Farmers Oil & Gas Exploration of Abilene as the operator.

Located five miles west of Cisco, the well is in a 327-acre lease in the TE&L Survey, Sec. 3165. It is designated as the No. 1 Childress.

On a 14/64 choke, it flowed 288 barrels of oil and 518,000 CF gas per day.

The well bottomed at 3,198 feet and will produce from perforations 3,114 to 3,140 feet into the hole.

Snow Oil Co. of Ft. Worth has filed first production figures on two new oil wells in the REB Field. The Nos. 1 & 2 Pearson-Poteet showed combined potential to pump 123 barrels of oil per day on an open choke.

The operator has 160 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 9, Blk. 4, four miles northeast of Eastland.

The wells will produce from perforations ranging from 3,424 to 3, 494 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depths were 3,860 and 3,890 feet, respectively.

The Eastland Regular Field gained a new producer when Clyde Petroleum, Inc. of Breckenridge completed the No. 1612 North Pionner Unit two miles northeast of Pioneer.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 28 barrels of oil per day. It was taken to a 2,722-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 2,482 to 2,512 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 1,731-acre lease in the C.L. Lewis Survey.

Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge has filed first production figures on two new wells in Eastland Coun-

The No. 1 Reynolds Unit indicated ability to flow 269,000 CF gas per day on a 114-in. choke. It was rated at 3,250,000 CFD on absolute open flow. The well will produce from an interval 3,482 to 3,488 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 3,750 feet.

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### Census Report Shows Texas Gain In Farm Numbers

Texas farms gained in numbers and decreased in size between 1978 and 1982, according to the Commerce Department's Census

Preliminary reports just released for the 1982 Census of Agriculture show 185,026 farms, compared with 175,395 in 1978. Land in farms totaled 130.8 million acres, an average per farm of 707 acres, compared with 773 in 1978. Total sales of agricultural products amounted to \$8.9 billion in

The average value of land and buildings per farm was \$388,198, with a per acre value of \$549.

Land from which crops were harvested was reported at 20.8 million acres, and acres irrigated fell from 6.9 million to 5.6 million in 1982.

The Bureau defines a farm as any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were, or normally would have been, sold in the census year.

The preliminary data indicate expenditures for livestock and poultry feed were \$1.5 billion; total costs for farm energy, \$730 million; for fertilizer, \$368.1 million; and for hired labor, \$477.9 million.

The sales of livestock, poultry, and their products were \$5.9 billion, 66 percent of total agricultural sales. Dairy products amounting to \$472.9 million were sold from 3,118 farms. The number of milk cows was up from 307,297 in the previous census to 322,198 in 1982.

The total cattle and calves inventory of 12.5 million head on 143,473 farms was down from 12.7 million in 19.3. The 10.5 million sold were down from 12.1 million four years earlier.

Some 8,125 farms reported 2.3 million head of sheep and lambs, with 2.2 million shorn yielding 15.2 million pounds of wool; 1.8 million head were sold.

An inventory of 559,590 hogs and pigs including 76,195 for breeding purposes was reported on 9,484 farms of which 194 farms had inventories of 500 or more and accounted for 56 percent of the State's total inventory. A total of 925,303 hogs and pigs were reported sold, of which 118,076 were feeder pigs.

Sales of poultry and their products were \$451.7 million. Some 16,873 farms reported an inventory of 15.1 million chickens three months old or older: 16,653 farms reported 12.8 million hens and pellets; and 1,024 farms, 176.6 million broilers sold. In addition 347 farms sold 5 million turkeys compared with 7.2 million in

The sale of crops amounted to \$3 billion. By harvested acreage, among the leading crops were wheat, with 123 million bushels from 5.1 million acres; sorghum, with 256 million bushels from 4.8 million acres; and cotton, with 2.7 million bales from 4.5 million acres. Other crops included corn, 1.1 million acres; soybeans, 718,668 acres; and rice, 520,227 acres.

Agriculture census data for Texas also revealed these facts:

· Of the total farms in the State, 13,787 had gross sales of \$100,000 or more; 121,183 reported sales of less than \$10,000.

· The average age of farm operators were 52.9 years; 22,035 were under 35, and 88,677 were 55 or older.

· Women operated 12,427 farms or 7 percent of the State total.

· Forty-three percent of the operators reported farming as their principal occupation, but 52 percent of all operators worked 100

days or more off the farm. · Eighty-nine percent of the farms were operated by individuals or families as sole proprietorships; 16,265 by partnerships; and 3,254

by corporations of which 84 percent were family held · Eighty-seven percent of the farms owned all or part of the farms they operated; 111,271 were fully owned; 50,536 partly owned; and 23,219 were operated by

tenants. Data in the report for 1978 and 1982 are directly comparable for acreages and inventories.

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

It doesn't matter much whether the fathering is by instinct or by birth. The hallmarks of a good father are evident. A checklist does not follow. Do your own checking of your heart to find out how you rate as a father; keep your rating to yourself; and give some thought to improving. Yep. Improving. Your neighbors may rank you at the top of the list, but you will know your shortcomings. Cheer up! You don't have to tell all you know.

It may be as well to understand that your image as a father (by biology or by instinct) does not reflect the same in an adult's eyes as in

Walking tall in the matter of providing food and

her fellow teachers who were old enough to remember "The Great Depression." "Great" refers to size and duration - not quality.

The Depression did hurt many people, and I gave that time of my life some in-depth thinking before I answered questions about it. My father, aided by my mother, rates a high score on anybody's check list. We never were hungry. Meals were not T-bone steaks and pie a la mode by any means, but we had plenty of food. Our school clothes were usually homemade or inherited, but we were clothed adequately if sometimes less than stylishly.

It is asking too much of

your youngster to take a long-term view of your fatherhood, so take one yourself. Compare with your father--even with your grandfather. Remember to weigh your score on the side of the abstractions. When he's your age, your youngster will be more apt to recall the twinkle in your eye at a good report card than the clink of coins in your hand when you buy bubblegum...though he may talk about the bubblegum rather than risk sounding sentimen-

Whether you are a father by instinct or biology, a young, old, or middle-aged father. remember fatherhood is largely a state of mind, so live in state!

## City Council Approves Sewer Rate Increase Of 50°

The Cisco City Council approved an amendment to the city utility rate ordinance revising the monthly sewer raes at the regular meeting of the council on Tuesday night. The amendment was established as an emergency allowing it to take effect upon its passage and approval.

The new rate will raise the sewer rate portion of city water customer bills by 50 cents a month. Only those whose homes connect into the sewer system, will be affected. The new rates are effective on June 1, 1984.

The council also approved an ordinance providing that **Hichory Street between East** 13th and East 14th streets be vacated, abandoned and closed. Tuesday night was the first reading of the ordinance, which will become effective upon the passage of its second and final reading, at a future date.

Also approved was an ordinance authorizing the issuance of sewer system combination tax and revenue certificates of obligation in the amount of \$100,000. The ordinance also established an emergency, allowing the issuance of the certificates immediately.

Frank Wilcoxen addressed the council regarding the site for the proposed wastewater treatment facility site, which Mr. Wilcoxen has an option to sell the land to the City. He said his original option was to expire on Wednesay and he wanted to know what the City planned to do about the situation, and whether he would be compensated for the longer

# AN OPEN LETTER TO THE MEMBERS OF WESTBOUND WATER SUPPLY CORPORATION AND THE CITIZENS OF CISCO

After years of neglect and under the serious and very real threat of being sued by the Texas Department of Health, the Cisco City Council has responsibly addressed the issue of Cisco's untreated, unfiltered municipal water supply. The citizens of Cisco strongly supported these efforts and by a substantial margin approved a bond issue in April, 1982 for the much needed and required water treatment and distribution improvements.

At that time the City notified Westbound Water Supply Corporation, as we did all citizens and water customers, that water rates were going to increase significantly due to the required improvements. Westbound was further notified, through special mailings and in public meetings, THAT ONLY WESTBOUND'S PROPORTIONATE SHARE OF THE COST OF THE TREATMENT FACILITIES WERE TO BE PASSED ON TO WESTBOUND. NO COSTS FOR THE CITY'S DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM OR HIGH-SERVICE PUMPING IMPROVEMENTS AT THE COLLEGE HILL PUMP STATION WERE TO BE PASSED ON TO WESTBOUND.

After the actual costs of the projects were determined through contract awards, Westbound's monthly rate to pay for their pro-rata share of the cost was calculated to increase from 50 cents per 1,000 gallons of water to 1.27 per 1,000 gallons. This increase also included four years of actual demonstrable increases in the maintenance and operation of the water treatment plant, which has never been passed on to Westbound.

The Board of Directors of Westbound believe that their contract with the City precluded Westbound from having to pay their fair, proportionate share of the water treatment improvements from which they will most assuredly benefit. As a result, ON MARCH 19, 1984 WESTBOUND WATER SUPPLY CORPORATION FILED SUIT AGAINST THE CITY OF CISCO TO PREVENT THE CITY FROM PASSING ON THE RATE INCEREASE TO WESTBOUND. Apparently, and regretably, there is a considerable amount of misunderstanding regarding the lawsuit that Westbound has filed against the City of Cisco. We, as your elected representatives, wish to clarify the situation insofar as we can to our citizens, and also to our friends in the rural area who are members of Westbound.

In 1975, the Cisco City Council entered into a contract with Westbound to sell up to a maximum of 3,000,000 gallons of water per month from the City's water supply at a rate of 50° per 1,000 gallons. Until recent months, this rate was never increased. In hindsight, considering the limited watershed and extended drought we are experiencing, some would undoubtedly question the wisdom of our selling from an already short water supply at any price, much less at an extremely cheap rate. The contract agreed to by both parties was a standard one required by the Farmers Home Administration, the financing agency for Westbound. Through this lawsuit, Westbound is asking the court to rule that, in spite of very, very costly state-mandated water treatment improvements currently being constructed by the City of Cisco, that they should still be required to pay only the 50° per 1,000 gallon rate.

The City of Cisco is only asking that Westbound pay its fair share of the cost for safe, treated, state-approved, filtered water. The citizens of Cisco are bearing a tremendous financial burden in paying for these water improvements, with city utility bills almost doubling already. We, the City Council, believe it would be grossly unfair to make an exception of Westbound by charging less than what would be equitable.

We would ask Westbound members these questions: Do you think it is fair and equitable to expect the citizens of Cisco to provide you with all the benefits of the water treatment improvements we are paying for, at no additional cost to you? And do you not think that it is only fair that your rates be increased to include your proportionate share of the cost of providing safe, filtered, adequately treated water to you?

We would ask the citizens of Cisco this question: Do you want us, as your elected representatives, to agree to charging Westbound less than their demonstrated fair share for treated water, thereby causing you to have to pay an even higher water rate?

The purpose of this letter is to inform the members of Westbound and the citizens of Cisco as to the facts in this unfortunate matter. It is the firm and unanimous belief of the City Council that the Westbound Board of Directors has acted irresponsibly in the filing of this suit. We urge the members of Westbound to advise your Board of Directors that you want to act fairly, reasonably and responsibly in this matter. And we would suggest that the extremely costly, and unnecessary, legal fees and litigation that lie before both of us could and should be avoided.

We value a cordial relationship with our good friends in the rural areas of Eastland County, and you are of course quite important to the ecomomy of Cisco itself. We do not wish to have a long and drawn-out "town vs. country" court battle. Westbound members, why not demand that your leadership seek to settle this matter in an equitable manner? Then we can all work together cooperatively for the betterment of Cisco and our entire area of Eastland County.
