County Population Up 6.8 Percent From 1980

Latest U.S. Dept. of Commerce figures show that the population of Eastland County is now 20,700, up 6.8 per

cent from 1980. The State of Texas increase was 7.4 per cent for the same period from April 1, 1980 to July 1, 1982 - and

In the 1980 census the county count was reported at 19,480 and the 1981, July estimate was 20,200, so the July, 1982 count shows a continued, steady growth.

The Census shows that there were 700 deaths and

600 births during the 1980-82 period in Eastland County. Harris County led all others in Texas in total population growth between 1980 and 1982 while Lee

County had the highest

percentage increase over the

same period: 25.1.

The first updated county population estimates for Texas published by the Commerce Department's Census Bureau since the 1980 census show Harris County's population was 2,684,100 in 1982 compared with 2,409,547 in 1980. Lee County had a

1982 total of 13,700 compared with 10,952 in 1980.

Statewide, the population grew 7.4 percent from 14,229,288 in 1980 to 15,279,000 in 1982

Among Texas' metropolitan areas, the Bryan-College Station MSA grew at the highest rate, 19.7 percent, from 93,588 in 1980 to 112,100 in 1982.

The 1982 population estimates were prepared through the Federal-State Cooperative Program for Local Population Estimates. The estimates were prepared by the Census Bureau and the Office of the Governor. This agency was designated by the governor to work with the bureau in carrying out the program.

Decisions on statistical methodology used in making the estimates were made







myrtle, lagerstroemia indica, is a deciduous shrub or small tree that has been cultivated in the Southern United States ar more than 150 years. The plant was introduced to the United States from Asia and has become associated in this country with Southern gardens and ante-bellum grandeur. Sometimes referred to as the "Lilac of the South" crape myrtle derives its common name from its crepe-like, crinkled and ruffled petals and the resemblance of its leaves to the true myrtle.

The flowering season begins in June or July and continues until fall. Each long panicle is comprised of hundreds of one to two-inch red, pink, white, lavender or purple flowers. Leaves are often garnet tinged in spring, glossy dark green in summer and dull to intense yellow, orange of red in autum.

When the leaves fall in the winter, the crape myrtle become a living sculpute. The trunk and branches have an attractively gnarled, twisted character with smooth bark varying in color from light straw to rich deep brown. The bark exfloiates in early summer to reveal new bark ranging in color from light pink to pale green.

Full sun is necessary for good flowering. Crape myrtle is cold hardy throughout the Southern United States. The planting site should be slightly elevated and open to allow free air

movement to avoid mildew problems. For example, planting near a wall is undesirable because of restricted air movement around the plant.

Crape myrtle tolerates a wide range of soil conditions, but grows best in a heavy loam that is slightly acidic (pH 5-0 to 6.5). Nutrient requirements are minimal; high fertility levels produce excessive vegetative growth and fewer flower panicles. Application of 6-6-6 or 8-8-8 fertilizer in early spring at the rate of one to two pounds per 100 square feet of planting bed may be beneficial to established plants, especially those growing in poor soils. Mulches of cedar bark or hardwood chips are beneficial in retaining soil moisture and minimizing soil temperature fluctuations during the summer.

The ideal time for transplanting containergrown crape myrtle is late spring or early summer, when new shoots are emerging. Balled and burlapped or bareroot plants are best transplanted during dormant period.

Deep soil watering is requried periodically during dry periods in summer when the plant is actively growing and producing flowers. Insufficient watering may prevent flower formation and result in premature leaf drop. Crape myrtle requires little pruning to maintain its naturally graceful form. However, tip pruning to remove old flower clusters will promote more abundant flowers and renewal of new wood. Small, twiggy growth should be thinned out from underneath the canopy to keep the trunk clean and allow free air circulation. Crape myrtle can also be trained into single-stemmed, tree-like paints by removing all but the strongest stem

The crape myrtle is virtually insect free and has few disease problems. When planting additions to your landscape include the beautiful crape myrtle for beauty as well as maintance

while the plant is young.







Home Economics Briefs

FOOD POISONING AND PICNICS-July begins the peak picnic - and food poisoning - season. But with a few simple precautions, this unpleasant and sometimes serious illness can be avoided, says a Texas University Agricultural Extension Service food and nutrition specialist. Since bacteria are especially fond of protein, she recommends care when taking high protein foods such as meat, poultry, salads containing egg, custards and some baked foods on picnics. The most likely sources of food poisoning are those dishes that you don't normally heat or reheat before serving on a picnic. "Since refrigeration prevents the bacteria from making their poison, the most effective way to avoid food poisoning is to eat them right away or else keep them cold until they are served," she cautions.

FOOD POISONING--The "poison" in food poisoning is actually produced by a certain bacteria, a type of staphylococcus, which contaminates food, says a Texas University Agricultural Extension Service food and nutrition specialist. The poison is eaten with the food and produces symptoms such as nausea and vomiting. The bacteria often reach food from the hands of the person preparing it. But even when you're careful to wash your hands, bacteria from the skin, hair or throat can be spread to food, she explains. The best way to prevent food poisoning is to keep hot foods hot and cold food cold, so that bacteria don't have a chance to produce their

CANCER PREVENTION-Hours spent working in the sun on farms and ranches, in construction or other outdoor occupations can add up to skin cancer. Since skin cancer appears to be caused by long-term exposure to the sun, people who work mostly outdoors could be considered at risk, says

Effective treatment of drug and alcohol abuse involves the patient's entire and deals simultaneously with all substances being taken, according to an article in Texas Medicine.

The basic assumption is that the entire family is affected by the chronic drug abuse of one or more of its members," wrote Dr. Stuart S. Nemir, a phychiatrist, and Dr. Charles McDonald, a psychologist, both of Austin.

Family members can learn how they may be contributing to the patient's problem and how they can change this, the doctors said.

They also noted that treatment programs no longer focus on alcohol as the primary drug of abuse. A wide range of abused drugs-both prescription and illegal, often combined with alcohol--are now dealt with in the same program, the doctors said

Their article appeared in the June issue of Texas Medicine, the journal of the Texas Medical Association.

Nemir and McDonald said the primary goal of chemical-abuse treatment is to get the person off drugs without triggering withdraw symptoms. "The process is complete when the patient is mentally clear, is off all medications used for detoxification, and has been restored to physical health."

Resotring physical health involves an exercise program, balanced meals, vitamin supplemental, and







The Who's Zoo of Better Photos

"A zoo" English writer and illustrator Oliver Herford once wrote,"is a place devised for animals to study the habits of human beings.

There are a few of us who would disagree with that. There are a few more who would wonder why on earth any animal in its right mind would want to study us humans.

Turn the coin around, though, give us something we think makes sense--like our studying the habits of animals--and everybody's happy

One of the most effective ways to study the habits of animals is through the use of photography. Whether still or cinematic, there's no better way to get to know how something functions in day-to-day life than by studying pictures of it. How convenient that most modern-day zoos are ideally suited for picturetakers to bag their game.

What does it take to produce good quality zoo shots? Well, a bit of deception, for openers. Unless you're deliberately attempting to document the workings of the zoo, you'll be much better off to separate the animals from their environment, zoo personnel, and candy wrappers (as well as other signs of man) and to allow the photographs to speak for themselves...a simple, yet effective, pictorial study of animals engaged in the process of life

Now, if you've never attempted to photograph zoo animals, you might think it's a bit like shooting fish in a barrel. Not quite. Oh, sure, the animals are all there, all captive, and-one might expect--all sitting around waiting for the photographer to arrive. At first sight of camera, they spring into action, mugging seductively, frolicking, and generally doing all those things it is that we, the photographers, think they should be do-

In reality, we're more likely to find our quarry snoozing in the shade of a simulated rock outcropping or curled up head-to-tail in a communal ball of fur Neither situation lends itself to first-class photos.

There are a few things you can do to improve your success rate, however. First, try hitting the zoo early in the morning when most animals are awake and active. This is especially useful on a cool, bright day. As the day moves on and the temperature climbs, many species tend to grow tired and hot. That spells trouble for photo-takers.

If you can't get to the zoo early, find out when the feeding schedules are so that you can bag your limit then. Animals, being creatures of habit, instinctively know when chow time is near, and you'll likely find them awake and anxiously prowling around, awaiting lunch or dinner.

If the zoo features performances (especially in the children's zoo or the marine animals exhibit), prepare for some good shots. Pick a location with an unmarred view of the performance. If there's just one thin pole or rail between you and the animals, you can bet 90 percent of the action is going to unfold behind

Use a fast film--ASA 400 to 1,000--in anticipation of having to shoot in the shade or capture moving subjects. That will also help to counterbalance a slow lens--one with a maximum aperture of f/3.5 or f/4, like most telephotos and zooms on the market.

And, speaking of lenses, you'll probably find a telephoto in the 100 - 200 mm range or a zoom in the 85 - 210 mm range your best bet. For those few closeup shots in the children's zoo or behind glassenclosed cages, a wide-angle or normal lens should

And, should you find yourself photographing your subjects through glass, remember that you can avoid reflections and minimize the effects of dirty glass by pressing the lens right up against the glass surface. You should be able to get pretty good flash shots by doing the same thing--holding lens and flash unit head right up against the glass while shooting.

As an alternative for shooting flash, you can step back several feet and shoot at an angle--never straight on--to insure that the reflection from the flash is well out of the camera's field of view

So getting quality photos of animals at the zoo may not be as simple as you thought. But, with a bit of planning and a little legwork (not to mention luck!), I'm betting you come back with a cageful of classy im-



With just a little care, your next zoo photos can look as naturally appealing as this.



The Cisco Historic District will be considered by the State Board of Review for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places at its meeting on Saturday, July 28, 1984 at 9:00 a.m. at Palmer Memorial Episcopal Church, 6221 Main Street in Houston. The proposed district is roughly bounded by 3rd St., Conrad Hilton,

Ave. K., and 9th St. The verbal boundary description is as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of W. 8th St. and Ave. K. proceed eastward along the center of W. 8th St. to the centerline intersection of Ave. H. At Ave. H. turn southward 90 degrees and proceed along its center to W. 9th St. At the centerline intersection of W. 9th St. turn eastward 90 degrees and proceed along its centerline to the centerline intersection of Conrad Hilton Ave. At Conrad Hilton Ave. turn northward and proceed down its center. Continue to the centerline intersection of W. 7th St. and turn eastward 90

Proceed along the center of W. 7th St. 1 block. Turn northward 90 degrees and follow the east boundary of Lots 10-6, Block 31. Thence east along the northern boundary of Lot 6, crossing the alley and continuing down the center of the eastwest alley to the intersection of the centerline of Conrad

Box 12276, Austin, Texas 78711 by July 27, 1984. Each owner or partial owner has one vote, regardless of how many of whole or partial properties in a district are owned by that party. If a majority of private property owners ob-

ject to the nomination, it will

not be listed; however the State Historic Preservation Officer shall submit the nomination to the Keeper of the National Register for a determination of eligibility for inclusion in the National Register. If the property is determined eligible but not formally listed, the Advisory Council must still be given an opportunity to comment on Federal projects which may affect the district.
