## County Population Up 6.8 Percent From 1980

Latest U.S. Dept. of Commerce figures show that the population of Eastland County is now 20,700, up 6.8 percent from 1980.

The State of Texas increase was 7.4 per cent for the same period from April 1, 1980 to July 1, 1982 - and

that's a year ago.

In the 1980 census the county count was reported at 19,480 and the 1981, July estimate was 20,200, so the July, 1982 count shows a continued, steady growth.

The Census shows that there were 700 deaths and

600 births during the 1980-82 period in Eastland County.

Harris County led all others in Texas in total population growth between 1980 and 1982 while Lee County had the highest percentage increase over the same period: 25.1.

The first updated county population estimates for Texas published by the Commerce Department's Census Bureau since the 1980 census show Harris County's population was 2,684,100 in 1982 compared with 2,409,547 in 1980. Lee County had a

1982 total of 13,700 compared with 10,952 in 1980.

Statewide, the population grew 7.4 percent from 14,229,288 in 1980 to 15,279,000 in 1982.

Among Texas' metropolitan areas, the Bryan-College Station MSA

grew at the highest rate, 19.7 percent, from 93,588 in 1980 to 112,100 in 1982.

The 1982 population estimates were prepared through the Federal-State Cooperative Program for Local Population Estimates. The estimates were prepared

by the Census Bureau and the Office of the Governor. This agency was designated by the governor to work with the bureau in carrying out the program.

Decisions on statistical methodology used in making the estimates were made

jointly by the state and the bureau. Estimates are based on birth and death statistics reported from April 1, 1980 to Dec. 31, 1981 with extrapolations to June 30, 1982. Migration estimates are based on governmental administrative records.

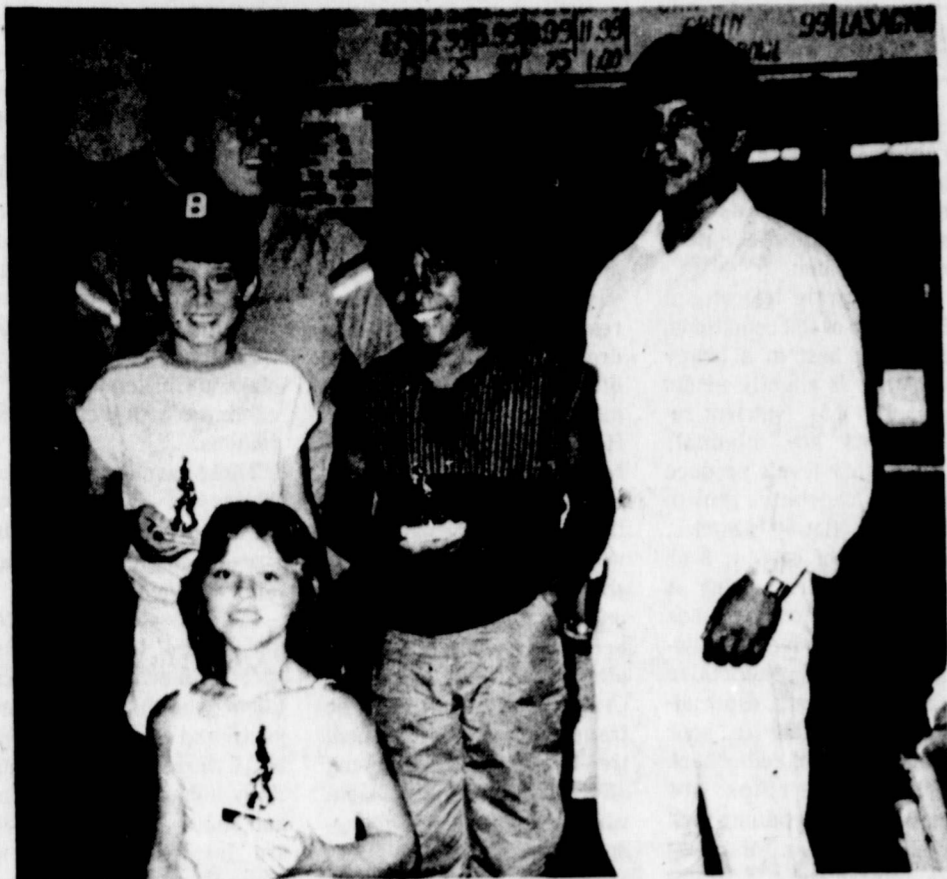

## Exxon Annuitants Club Holds Meet

At noon, June 12, 1984, the North Central Texas Exxon Annuitants Club held its regular luncheon meeting at the P.A.R. Country Club, Proctor, Texas. After the club was called to order by President James R. Dublin, Mullin, the invocation was led by R.W. Blake, Santa Anna.

Following the meal, Mr. Dublin introduced Marj Head, a professional country and western vocalist from Star, who favored the membership with several enthusiastically received songs. During her presentation, Mrs. Head briefly reviewed her progress and future aspirations in the country and western music field.

**Crape myrtle**, *lagerstroemia indica*, is a deciduous shrub or small tree that has been cultivated in the Southern United States for more than 150 years. The plant was introduced to the United States from Asia and has become associated in this country with Southern gardens and ante-bellum grandeur. Sometimes referred to as the "Lilac of the South" crape myrtle derives its common name from its crepe-like, crinkled and ruffled petals and the resemblance of its leaves to the true myrtle.

The flowering season begins in June or July and continues until fall. Each long panicle is comprised of hundreds of one to two-inch red, pink, white, lavender or purple flowers. Leaves are often garnet tinged in spring, glossy dark green in summer and dull to intense yellow, orange or red in autumn.

When the leaves fall in the winter, the crape myrtle becomes a living sculpture. The trunk and branches have an attractively gnarled, twisted character with smooth bark varying in color from light straw to rich deep brown. The bark exfoliates in early summer to reveal new bark ranging in color from light pink to pale green.

Full sun is necessary for good flowering. Crape myrtle is cold hardy throughout the Southern United States. The planting site should be slightly elevated and open to allow free air movement to avoid mildew problems. For example, planting near a wall is undesirable because of restricted air movement around the plant.

Crape myrtle tolerates a wide range of soil conditions, but grows best in a heavy loam that is slightly acidic (pH 5.0 to 6.5). Nutrient requirements are minimal; high fertility levels produce excessive vegetative growth and fewer flower panicles. Application of 6-6-6 or 8-8-8 fertilizer in early spring at the rate of one to two pounds per 100 square feet of planting bed may be beneficial to established plants, especially those growing in poor soils. Mulches of cedar bark or hardwood chips are beneficial in retaining soil moisture and minimizing soil temperature fluctuations during the summer.

The ideal time for transplanting container-grown crape myrtle is late spring or early summer, when new shoots are emerging. Balled and burlapped or bare-rooted plants are best transplanted during dormant period.

Deep soil watering is required periodically during dry periods in summer when the plant is actively growing and producing flowers. Insufficient watering may prevent flower formation and result in premature leaf drop. Crape myrtle requires little pruning to maintain its naturally graceful form. However, tip pruning to remove old flower clusters will promote more abundant flowers and renewal of new wood. Small, twiggy growth should be thinned out from underneath the canopy to keep the trunk clean and allow free air circulation. Crape myrtle can also be trained into single-stemmed, tree-like plants by removing all but the strongest stem while the plant is young. Spanish moss may be found growing on crape myrtle. It should be removed to allow better circulation.

The crape myrtle is virtually insect free and has few disease problems. When planting additions to your landscape include the beautiful crape myrtle for beauty as well as maintenance free.

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## Eastland County Gets More Software

Eastland County Commissioners Monday approved the request of Nancy Trout, tax assessor/collector, to purchase software necessary to enable her office to be connected to the computer in the office of Emma Morris, county auditor.

Commissioners decided that buying the software was the most efficient cost-saving plan outlined by Mrs. Trout to enable the compiling of delinquent tax rolls.

Initial cost of connection is \$5,000 plus a monthly cost of \$200. The computer programs also will prepare a voter list and perform other functions thereby saving tax money, commissioners believe.

B.C. Construction Company was successful bidder for the paving in Oak Hollow addition, southeast of Eastland. Asphalt mix will be applied two inches deep at a cost of \$1,350.

Richard Robinson, com-

missioner of Precinct 1, was authorized to examine and purchase a used truck with a covered bed to enable commodities to be delivered and distribution points faster without interrupting the work of country trucks.

Robinson will also seek retired-but-still-active people to drive the truck for a limited number of days per month.

Gilbert Merideth, with Ensearch Exploration, was given approval to cross

County Road 352 with a gas pipeline. The crossing will be northwest of Eastland in Precinct 1.

A public hearing on the planned use of revenue sharing funds was held. Money will continue to be distributed between road and bridge needs and capital improvement such as law enforcement and county libraries.

Commissioners discussed

implementing an outside auditor's suggestion that cash registers be placed in the offices that handle money. The projected cost of \$6,000 is too expensive at this time, say commissioners.

Budgets of various offices were discussed briefly, with figures to be finalized at a later date.

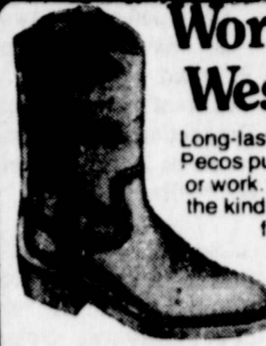

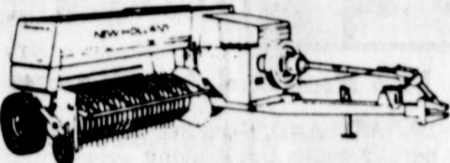

# Oil Belt News

## Drilling Bits

Snow Oil Co. of Ft. Worth has filed first production figures on three new oil wells in the REB Field. The operator has 160 and 80 acres leased, with drillsites in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 17 & 20 Blk. 4, five and six miles north of Eastland.

The wells are designated as the No. 1 Durham-South, No. 1 Durham-East and No. 1 Durham-West. They will produce from perforations in the Marble Falls Formation ranging from 3,556 to 3,600 feet into the hole. Total depths range from 4,000 to 4,053 feet.

The South well showed potential for 41 barrels of oil and 100,000 CF gas, the East well-29 barrels of oil and 80,000 CF gas, and the West well-54 barrels of oil and 120,000 CF gas per day on an open choke.

At a location two miles north-northwest of Rising Star, Jane Petroleum Co. of Rising Star has finished a new oil producer in the Eastland Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 10 Dunn, pumping at the rate of 80 barrels per day.

Location is in a 120-acre lease in the ETRR Survey, A-108. Bottomed at 1,139 feet, the well will produce from perforations 1,080 to 1,100 feet into the hole.

A gas producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Kleiner Field, with Kelly-Barnett Petroleum Inc. of Wichita Falls as the operator.

Located one mile north of Cisco, the well is in a 91-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, A-859. It is designated as the No. 1 Rhodes-South.

On a 1 1/4-in. choke, it flowed 345,600 CF per day. It was rated at 590,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 4,135 feet and will produce from perforations 3,397 to 3,427 feet into the hole.

# Home Economics Briefs

**FOOD POISONING AND PICNICS**—July begins the peak picnic — and food poisoning — season. But with a few simple precautions, this unpleasant and sometimes serious illness can be avoided, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service food and nutrition specialist. Since bacteria are especially fond of protein, she recommends care when taking high protein foods such as meat, poultry, salads containing egg, custards and some baked foods on picnics. The most likely sources of food poisoning are those dishes that you don't normally heat or reheat before serving on a picnic. "Since refrigeration prevents the bacteria from making their poison, the most effective way to avoid food poisoning is to eat them right away or else keep them cold until they are served," she cautions.

**FOOD POISONING--The "poison"** in food poisoning is actually produced by a certain bacteria, a type of staphylococcus, which contaminates food, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service food and nutrition specialist. The poison is eaten with the food and produces symptoms such as nausea and vomiting. The bacteria often reach food from the hands of the person preparing it. But even when you're careful to wash your hands, bacteria from the skin, hair or throat can be spread to food, she explains. The best way to prevent food poisoning is to keep hot foods hot and cold food cold, so that bacteria don't have a chance to produce their poison.

**Dr. Mary Ann Heussner**, a health education specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. Malignant melanoma is common in light-skinned middle-aged or elderly people who have spent most of their lives in the sun. Most of their melanomas develop from moles they have had since childhood, she explains. In addition to taking common sense precautions against sunburn, people who work in the sun should consult a physician at the first sign of a new mole, or if old ones change in size, shape or color, advises the specialist.

# Drug Treatment Involves Whole Family, Doctors Say

Effective treatment of drug and alcohol abuse involves the patient's entire family and deals simultaneously with all substances being taken, according to an article in Texas Medicine.  
"The basic assumption is that the entire family is affected by the chronic drug abuse of one or more of its members," wrote Dr. Stuart S. Nemir, a psychiatrist, and Dr. Charles McDonald, a psychologist, both of Austin. Family members can learn how they may be contributing to the patient's problem and how they can change this, the doctors said. They also noted that treatment programs no longer focus on alcohol as the primary drug of abuse. A

wide range of abused drugs—both prescription and illegal, often combined with alcohol—are now dealt with in the same program, the doctors said. Their article appeared in the June issue of Texas Medicine, the journal of the Texas Medical Association. Nemir and McDonald said the primary goal of chemical-abuse treatment is "to get the person off drugs without triggering withdraw symptoms." "The process is complete when the patient is mentally clear, is off all medications used for detoxification, and has been restored to physical health."

Resorting physical health involves an exercise program, balanced meals, vitamin supplemental, and sufficient bed rest, the doctors said.

Another goal of treatment is to break through the isolation and loneliness that keep the patient separate from others and make him unable to accept the help needed to begin recovery.

"To do this," the doctors said, "the patient must explore changes in the lifestyle and personal associations which might lead to a return to drug taking." And, they added, new ways of having fun must be learned. Group and individual therapy may be involved.

"There is also a grieving process over the loss of the drug and the lifestyle associated with it," the doctors said, explaining that this is similar to losing a significant person in one's life.

The treatment also teaches the patient how to manage stress and cries more effectively, the doctors said. Finally, the patient learns the signs of a possible return to drug abuse and its consequences.

## Agricultural Briefs

**SOYBEAN PROSPECTS BRIGHT**--Soybean price prospects look good this year, and that will likely encourage increased plantings, says an economist with the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Prices should average \$7.50 to \$8.15 per bushel during the crop season. More soybeans may be planted in the Midwest where cool, wet weather has delayed corn planting. Also, soybeans are the best bet for double-cropping behind

winter wheat. U.S. soybean stocks on April 1 were down 36 percent from a year earlier, and the demand for soybean oil is strong. At the same time world oilseed production is expected to be down about 8 percent this year compared to a year ago.

The Cisco Historic District will be considered by the State Board of Review for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places at its meeting on Saturday, July 28, 1984 at 9:00 a.m. at Palmer Memorial Episcopal Church, 6221 Main Street in Houston. The proposed district is roughly bounded by 3rd St., Conrad Hilton Ave. K., and 9th St.

The verbal boundary description is as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of W. 8th St. and Ave. K. proceed eastward along the center of W. 8th St. to the centerline intersection of Ave. H. At Ave. H. turn southward 90 degrees and proceed along its center to W. 9th St. At the centerline intersection of W. 9th St. turn eastward 90 degrees and proceed along its centerline to the centerline intersection of Conrad Hilton Ave. At Conrad Hilton Ave. turn northward and proceed down its center. Continue to the centerline intersection of W. 7th St. and turn eastward 90 degrees.

Proceed along the center of W. 7th St. 1 block. Turn northward 90 degrees and follow the east boundary of Lots 10-6, Block 31. Thence east along the northern boundary of Lot 6, crossing the alley and continuing down the center of the east-west alley to the intersection of the centerline of Conrad

Hilton.

Turn northward 90 degrees and follow Conrad Hilton to its intersection with the center of W. 5th St. Turn 90 degrees eastward and proceed along the center of W. 5th to the eastern boundary of Lot 29. Make a right angle turn northward and follow the eastern boundary of Lot 29 to the centerline intersection of W. 4th St. Turn 90 degrees westward and proceed to the centerline intersection of W. 4th St. Turn 90 degrees westward and proceed to the centerline intersection of the north-south alley of Block 29 1/2. Turn 90 degrees northward and follow the center of the alley of Block 29 1/2 to the centerline intersection of W. 3rd St. Turn westward and follow the center of West 3rd St. to the centerline intersection of Ave. J. Make a right turn southward and proceed along the center of Ave. J crossing West 4th, West 5th, and continue to the east-west alley intersection of Block 90.1, crossing Ave. K and continue along the alley centerline of Block 90.4 to the west boundary of SE tract 6, Block 90.4.

Turn 90 degrees southward and follow the west boundary of the same property to the centerline intersection of W. 6th. Make the 90 degrees turn eastward and proceed

along the centerline of W. 6th. Make the 90 degrees turn eastward and proceed along the centerline of W. 6th to the centerline intersection of Ave. K. Turn 90 degrees southward and follow the center of Ave. K. continue to the point of beginning.

A listing in the National Register, the Federal Government's official list of historic properties worthy of preservation, results in the following for historic properties:

1. Consideration in planning for Federal, federally licensed, and federally assisted projects. The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation must be given an opportunity to comment on all federally related projects affecting listed properties. For further information see 36 CFR 800.
2. Eligibility for Federal tax provisions. The Federal Internal Revenue Code encourages the preservation of depreciable historic structures by allowing favorable tax treatments for rehabilitation and also provides for charitable contribution for conservation purposes of partial interests in historically important land areas, or structures. For further information see 36 CFR 67.
3. Consideration of historic values in the decision by the Federal Government to issue a surface coal mining permit where coal is located. For further information please refer to 30 CFR 700, et seq.
4. Eligibility for Federal grants in aid, whenever funds are appropriated by Congress. For further information contact Curtis Tunnell, Executive Director, Texas Historical Commission, P.O. Box 12276, Austin, Texas 78711.

Owners of private properties nominated to the National Register may concur and or object to the nomination in accord with 36 CFR 60. Any owner or partial owner who objects to listing should submit a notarized statement (certifying ownership and objection to listing) to Mr. Curtis Tunnell, State Historic Preservation Officer, Texas Historical Commission, P.O. Box 12276, Austin, Texas 78711 by July 27, 1984. Each owner or partial owner has one vote, regardless of how many of whole or partial properties in a district are owned by that party. If a majority of private property owners object to the nomination, it will not be listed; however the State Historic Preservation Officer shall submit the nomination to the Keeper of the National Register for a determination of eligibility for inclusion in the National Register. If the property is determined eligible but not formally listed, the Advisory Council must still be given an opportunity to comment on Federal projects which may affect the district.

A copy of the nomination, the criteria used for evaluation, and more information on the results of listing are available from the State Historic Preservation Office at the above address or telephone inquiries can be made at 512-475-3094. Comments on the nomination should be received by the State Historic Preservation Office before the State Board of Review meeting.
