A new producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Hanvey Field, with Richey & Co. of Ft. Worth as the operator.

Located two miles northwest of Cisco the well is in a 40 acre lease in the SPRR Survey. It is designated as the the No. 1 Ivie-Wallace. On a 3/4-in. choke it flowed 650,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 700,000 CFD on absolute open flow. The well bottomed at 3,930-ft. and will produce from a perforated interval in the Lake Sand Formation, 3,513 to 3,519 feet into the hole.

Eastland County's REB Field gained a new producer when Snow Oil Co. of Ft. Worth completed the No. 2 Lowrance-East five miles north of Eastland.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 35 barrels of oil and 120,000 CF casinghead per day on an open choke. It was taken to a 4,063-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,546 to 3,564 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in an 80 -acre lease in the H & TCRR Survey

A Rising Star-based operator has staked locations for the Nos. 15 and 16 D. Dunn, developmental wells to be located two miles north -northwest of Rising Star. With projected total depth of 1,500-ft. each, the wells are in a 120-acre lease in Eastland County's Regular Field, ETRR Survey. The operator is Jane Petroleum Co.

At a location three miles northwest of Eastland, Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge has finaled a new oil producer in Eastland County's REB Field.

### County Sales Up 15% Over '83

received \$799,000.

State Comptroller Bob **Bullock recently sent checks** totaling \$98.3 million in local sales tax payments to 988 cities that levy the one percent sales tax.

Although bookkeeping changes that were part of last year's tax deadline speedups made the August 1984 payment smaller than the previous August payment, Bullock said year-todate comparisons can be made accurately.

"This 12 and a half percent increase is honest growth over last year because both this August payment and last August's are based on all sales reported during the first half of both years," Bullock said.

Eastland received the largest check in the county, \$31,576.91, however, it was down from \$34,361.86 received for July, 1983. This brings the Eastland 1984 total to \$206,231.46, up 38.12% over last years \$149,311.04.

Cisco's check for \$24,257.47 was down from \$25,212.88 last July. 1984 payments to date total \$137,293.14, up 55% over last years \$136,537.55.

Gorman received a check for \$4,233.31 to bring this years total to \$17,106.23, up 4.10% over 1983's \$16,431.72. Ranger's check for \$15,070.10 brought this years total to \$77,525.32, down 1.27%, over the 1983 total of \$78,522.26.

Rising Star's check for \$3,055.20 was down from last July's check for \$4,253.38. This brought the 1984 total to \$17,961.09, up 21.39% over 1983's \$14,796.51.

The total sales tax payments received in Eastland County total \$78,192.99 compared to \$82,198.45 for the same period last year. This brings the total for the year to \$456,117.24, reflecting an increase of 15.30% over last year's \$395,599.08.

Houston received the largest check, \$17.1 million, bringing Houston's yearly total to \$99.3 million. Dallas' check was for \$11.7 million. Dallas has received \$66.9 million so far this year.

#### NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS **OF HIGH TURBIDITY**

Dear Customer: The City of Cisco during the month of June, 1984, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards", which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act." Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity of cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water. However, up to five tirbidi-

ty units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent

throughout the distribution system, or (3) interfere with microbiological measurements. The water system is being

studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date. This notification of the public is in compliance with the Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act" as a means of keeping the public informed.
