Sixty Expected For CHS Football Workouts Monday

Some 60 candidates for the 1984 Cisco High School football team are expected to report to Coach John Parchman and his staff as practice begins at 9 a.m. Monday, August 13. The new season will begin with a home game Sept. 7th.

Equipment was issued to most of the squad last Wednesday and Thursday at Community Gym. Practice sessions will be on the Community Gym grounds at 9

a.m. and 2 p.m. daily until school begins August 20.

Eight lettermen from last year's Lobo team are expected to be among the squad of 60, which will include last year's junior varsity and freshman players plus at least half a dozen players new to the team.

Lettermen include Johnny Seabourn, who made all district and all Central Texas last year as a defensive player as well as an of-

fense standout; Willard Johnson, defensive tackle and starter last year; Johnny Rameriz, fullback and starter last year; Josh Potter, all-district line backer last season; Patrick Qualls, tight end and starter from 1983; Wade Shackelford, backup quarterback last year; Stanley Callahan, running back and letterman; and David Seabourn, running back and two-year letter-

man.

The quarterbacking job is expected to be between Shackelford and John Gonzales, junior varsity quarterback last year. John Seabourn, backup kicker last season, is expected to handle the punting and other kicking chores this year.

James Deadman, 190-pound lineman, is among the best prospects up from the junior varsity. He transferred to Cisco late in

the 1983 season and will be a junior this fall.

Mr. Parchman said that "we're pretty excited about prospects as the practice season begins. Our boys are full of enthusiasm and we are expecting a lot of hustle and spirit."

The Lobo coaching staff includes Mr. Parchman, Rick Land, line coach; Rusty McLeskey, line coach; Doyle

Walker, offense and defense backs; Jerry Reeves, receivers and defensive ends; Steve Young, junior varsity; and Ron Mouser, junior high.

Mr. Reeves, a veteran of 17 years in coaching, is new to the staff. He is a graduate of Texas A&M University and came to Cisco from Carthage in East Texas. Mr. Young, also new to the staff,

is a recent graduate of Texas Tech.

Nov. 2 - Jim Ned at Cisco.* Nov. 9 - Cisco at Baird.* (*Denotes conference games.)

The Lobos will play in District 11-AA this year. Pre-season polls have picked Colman to win the district with Cisco and Eastland due to finish in the two-three slots.

CJC's Football, Band And Drill Team Expected Here

More than 200 football players, band members, and drill team prospects are expected on the campus of Cisco Junior College as pre-fall semester activities begin during the coming week.

Coach Bob Keyes and his Wrangler staff are expecting between 70 and 80 freshmen to report Tuesday, August 14, to be issued equipment and begin two-a-day workouts. Some 42 varsity players are due two days later to join the workouts.

The college will open a dormitory and the cafeteria on Wednesday, Aug. 15, to accommodate the young people.

Director Tim Jones expects 61 musicians to report to begin practice, both with instruments and marching. Nicki Harle, director of the Wrangler Belles, expected between 45 and 50 young women to report as candidates for the Wrangler Belles Drill Team. They will begin practice on August 15th.

Coach Keyes and his staff, including Coaches Rick Frazier and Bobby Anderson, were pleased with the large group of freshman recruits and are hoping that all of them show up.

Among the top prospects are Wayne Hutchinson of Knox City, who looked good in the All-Star game at the annual coaches convention in Houston last week. Hutchinson is scheduled to play this weekend in the annual oil belt game. He was an all-state Class A quarterback. He is six feet tall and weighs 185 pounds and is expected to play strong safety for the Wranglers.

Another good prospect is Oscar Cervantes, six feet and five inches tall and 285

pounds, who is an offensive tackle from Rosenberg. Derrick Blowe, six feet and three inches and 275 pounds, is due from El Paso to play in the line. A tight end prospect is Robert Beauchamp, 210 and six feet and six inches tall, from Springtown.

Joe Perry, last year's Cisco High School quarterback who had an outstanding season, will be a freshman at CJC. Coach Keyes expects to play him at tight end.

Matt Allen of Ballinger is another freshman prospect. He plays wing back and is a

punter.

An outstanding candidate for the quarterback job is Mike Frazier who transferred to CJC from New Mexico State last spring. He did a fine job in spring workouts and is expected to begin workouts as the potential starter. Recruits include five freshman quarterbacks. There will be two sophomore quarterbacks in camp, including Gene Kennedy who was No. 3 last year.

Two of the freshman quarterbacks due are Neal

Kemper of Groveton, who won honorable mention for all-state honors last year. He weighs 190 and stands six feet and three inches. Another is Kim Barteo of Bridgeport, who weighs 200 and is six feet and five inches tall.

Plans call for the football players to work out at 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. at the CJC practice field. The two-a-day sessions will continue until the fall semester begins with registration August 27th. Freshman orientation is scheduled for August 23-24.

AN ITEM of interest turned in at this office Monday was printed in The Dallas Morning News on Thursday, December 13, 1962. The article contained a recipe for Syllabub and was the McKinney's recipe, remembered by Lucille McKinney Roan. The McKinney's recently held a family reunion in Cisco.

The title of the article stated: Syllabub Still Festive Bowl But Made Without the 'Cow'. The article states that Syllabub is a favorite drink of the holiday festive season.

Richard Brigg's "New Art of Cooker," published in Philadelphia in 1792, gives the following recipe for: "Syllabub under the Cow."

"Put a bottle of either red or white wine, ale or cyder, into a China bowl, sweeten it with sugar and grate in some nutmeg, then hold it under the cow, and milk into it till it has a fine froth at the top; strew over it a handful of currants, cleanwashed and picked, and plumped before the fire. You can make this syllabub at home, only have new milk. Make it as hot as milk from the cow, and out of a teapot, or any such thing, pour it in, holding your hand very high."

The article from the Dallas paper states, "Actually this is a perfect example of an out-dated recipe, but fundamentally the recipe is just the same. I feel the direct milking method is not quite practical in our way of living."

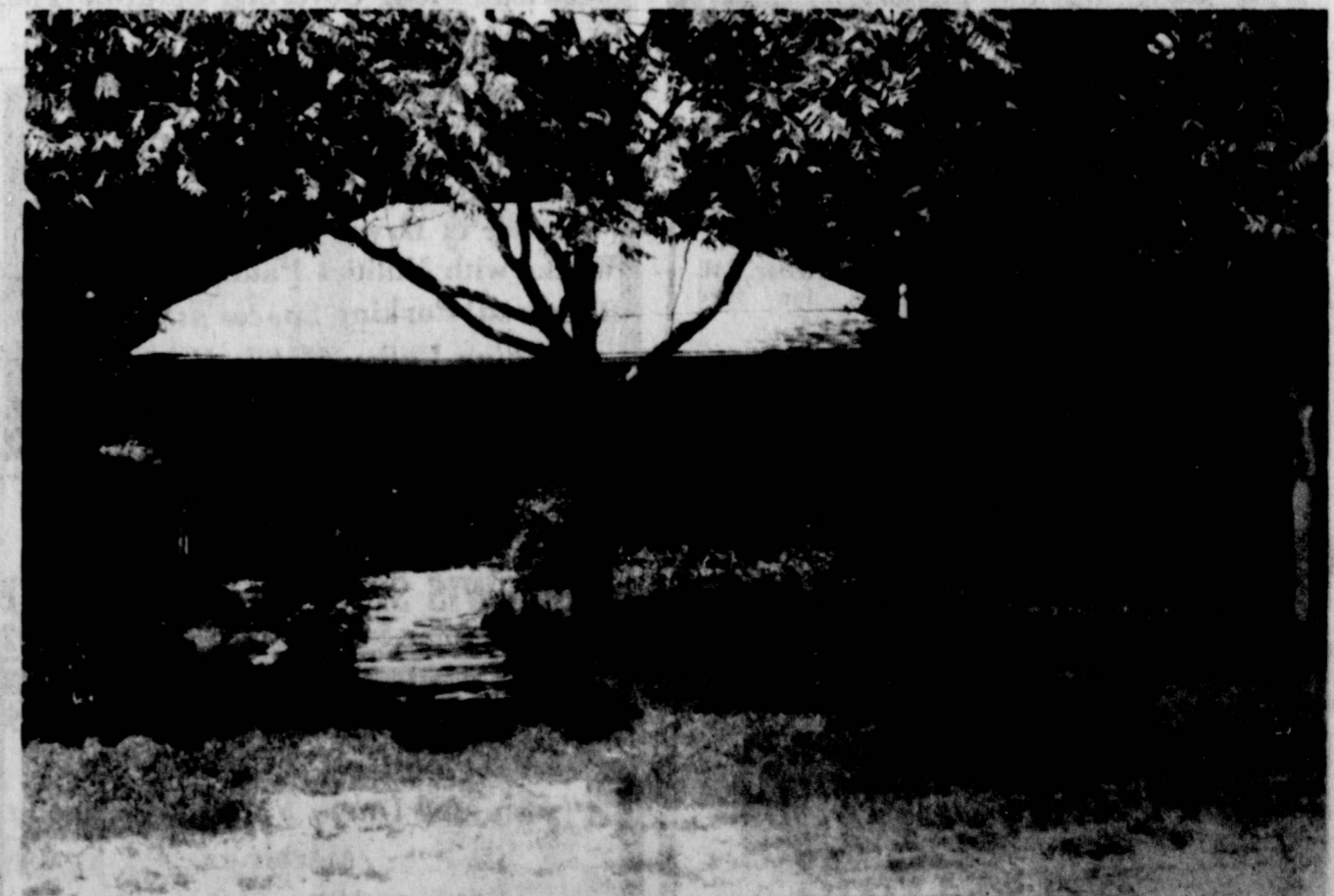

Brady Leveridge Awarded Purple Heart August 9

On Thursday, August 9, 1984, Brady Leveridge, a life-long resident of Cisco, was awarded a Purple Heart for an injury he received during WWI. Marine Capt. Thomas L. Linder presented the medal at the Clayton Leach VFW Post 2012 in Abilene.

Mr. Leveridge was hit in the right jaw, while he was a private in the Marines stationed in France. He said he was sitting on a ravine with his legs dangling over the side when he decided to get under some trees for shelter from airplanes. He heard the gun go off and the shrapnel hit Brady in the jaw knocking him down. Leveridge said two guys had just went by with a stretcher and he called out to them. The "Stretcher Boys" came over and asked him if he could walk. He could, and he walked to the field hospital.

He was then sent to the R.C. Station #1 just outside of Paris. Later he was sent to a health resort near Visbee, France. Several wounded soldiers were sent there for treatment with mineral waters. Brady was then put to work in the clinic.

Brady said, "I was hit with a fine shrapnel. The whole side of my face was hurt. I had two pieces removed after I came back to the

states."

His commanding officers were wanting him to come back to the front, but the doctor wouldn't let him because he couldn't eat the rations.

Finally he was well enough to leave, and he was told to start walking to the front and find his outfit. He would stop and eat with other soldiers along the way. One group of soldiers told him to stay the night, and the next day word came that the Armistice was signed.

He was sent to Germany to help push the Germans back toward Germany. He served among the occupation troops following the end of the war and was discharged Aug. 13, 1919.

During his stay in Germany, he made a ring out of two Franc pieces, that he still wears today.

His dad had told him that he had to go to war. He asked if he wanted to be drafted or to enlist. He went to Dallas but he was 3 lbs. underweight for his height! "And this was during wartime!" he exclaimed.

"I went to my cousin's house and drank sweet milk for 3 or 4 days and went back and they enlisted me," he said.

"After I had been at camp, my dad died on a Saturday night, and I went home and

asked for furlough to stay with my mother for awhile longer. My company went on and if I had gone on with them, I would have been on a ship during the war, but instead I was sent to France with another company," he remembers.

Leveridge, who was born near Cisco on Jan. 24, 1896, enlisted when he was 20.

Following his discharge he returned to Scranton near Cisco, and married the former Lexia Sprawls. They had one son, John Thomas, who later was killed in an auto accident in Houston, in 1951. His wife died in 1965.

Leveridge now resides at the Cisco Care Center, where he remains active, nursing home personnel said.

Sheriff Morren said all of the stolen items were recovered.

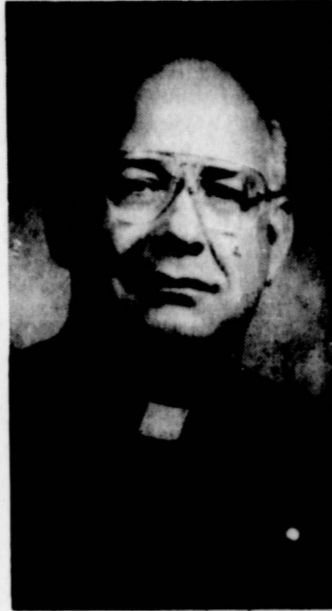
Historical Body To Meet Monday

Cisco Nominated As Historical Site

Cisco's nomination as a Texas historical site has been accepted by the Texas Historical Commission's board of review, according to information here Friday. The acceptance followed a meeting of the board at Palmer Memorial Episcopal Church in Houston on Saturday, July 28.

At the Houston meeting, a slide presentation made of the Cisco site area was presented by a member of the Commission's staff along with other areas being considered for nomination to the National Historical site Registry.

Candidate Doggett Campaigns County

Some 70 Eastland Countians greeted U.S. Senate Candidate Lloyd Doggett in the lobby of the courthouse Thursday as the Democratic standard bearer "asked for the job" and pledged to work for a government that is "responsible and responsive."

State Sen. Doggett, on a campaign swing that began

in Abilene and which would take him to Brownwood and Mineral Wells the same day, was introduced by County Judge Scott Bailey. A wave of applause greeted him as he stepped off the elevator.

Appealing to those who supported him, and to those who hand't Sen. Doggett began with a humorous remark, calling himself "landslide Lloyd" - referring to the fact that he was the party nominee in the spring by a mere 1,345 votes in the June run-off over Kent Hance.

He said that his opponent (Phil Gramm, Republican) was trying to make it a clear cast of "conservative vs. liberal" or "right or left," when in fact the choice is more accurately a case of "right or wrong."

He labeled the present administration's foolish economic measures "wrong," and pledged, if elected, to work for what he called "the little people."

Joking about the upcoming Republican convention in Dallas, Doggett said he'd heard that they were building a fence around the convention center and he didn't know whether it was to keep the people out or the Republicans in.

"The choice Texans face in the election for the U.S. Senate is a clear one," U.S. Senate Democratic Nominee Lloyd Doggett said today on a tour of Texas. "It is a choice between a Texas Senator with a record of getting things done for people and caring about their needs and a politician who is insensitive and callous to the real needs of Texans."

"When the honest, hard-working family farmers and ranchers of West Texas were being driven to the brink of bankruptcy by a devastating drought," Doggett said, "they turned to the people they sent to Congress to represent them. And every single Texas Democrat supported a bill to extend disaster loan assistance to farms and ranches affected by the 1983 drought. But not Phil Gramm. When it was time to take action to help Texas who were being driven out of farming and ranching because of something beyond their control - all Phil Gramm had to offer was excuses."

"I'm just glad Phil Gramm isn't in charge of the Fire Department."

Doggett explained that in one area in particular - the issue of giving Texans the lean, efficient government they deserve - the difference between Phil Gramm's record and his are extreme. "I am proud of the pay-as-you-go system of state budgeting which I have fought to protect for more than ten years as a Texas Senator."

Area Water Supply Topic Of Discussion

Executive members of the Eastland County Program Building Committee received an evaluation of the area water supply at a meeting in the Courthouse on July 27. Possible solutions were also discussed.

M.H. Perry, spokesman for the Eastland County Water Board, and Bob Ingram, Cisco city councilman, brought the latest information on Lake Leon and Lake Cisco.

Also present were County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon, Janet Thomas, John Blair and Faith Ballard, County Judge Scott Bailey and Richard Robinson, commissioner of Precinct 1, were among those in attendance.

The Program Building Committee, which is sponsored by the Extension Service, identifies problems in the county and seeks ways to improve them. All agreed that the unusual drought was the County's major problem right now.

Dorothy Underwood, chairman of the committee, introduced the speakers. M.H. Perry stated that the Water Board was pleased with some of the information from the latest survey of Lake Leon - that the silting of the lake was minimal in comparison with most other lakes.

In normal times, Lake Leon has 28,000 acre ft. of water. With no rain at all, the lake will be good under present usage until May of 1985, then another age would have to be opened to about 4,000 acre ft. of water.

At that time the Water District would go on a strict conservation plan, which would enable the water to last until 1986.

"All people must be aware of the water situation," Perry said. "The Eastland pumps are at full capacity, pumping all the settling basin can handle. Water conservation will help immensely."

He told of the high quality of water the District had always delivered.

Ranger has had special problems, he said, due to old lines and not enough storage capacity. The town is helping that situation by changing lines and making improvements.

He mentioned that the cities of Eastland and Ranger always cooperate fully with the Water District.

When asked about rural water lines, Perry stated that they were loaded to capacity, and he did not see how any more customers could be accommodated.

He reviewed possibilities of their sources of water to further supplement the two major lakes, but indicated that some underground water systems had already been ruined by oil well drilling and improper plugging.

"We could hunt for something else to dam up," Perry said, "but if it doesn't rain it doesn't matter how many dams you have."

Bob Ingram stated that the city of Cisco had just installed a new filter system, with a 12 inch line laid to College Hill. The city has just put an inline flow meter at the lake, and next year will install others at College Hill and the storage tank. This will provide a way to monitor water loss.

With normal rainfall, Lake Cisco has 8,800 acre feet of water. But Scott Hibbs, an

record reflects that," Doggett continued. "I don't offer the people of Texas more slogans and more slick advertising to try to convince them that deficits aren't bad."

Senator Doggett was first elected to the Texas Senate in 1973 at the age of 26. Since then, he has authored 125 bills which were passed into law. He and his wife Libby, who holds a Ph.D. in special education, live in Austin with their two daughters, Lisa, 10, and Cathy, seven. engineer, estimated a 36 ft. depth of water in the lake prior to July 24, Ingram said. This is 13 ft. over the 3rd intake, with the 4th intake in the lake silted over.

Ingram said there was 6 to 8 feet of silt in Lake Cisco. By August 5, 1985, with no rain, the lakes is expected to be 8 to 10 feet down from where it is now. If the drought continues there will be no water in the lake by August 1986.

"Cisco residents are already conserving water," Ingram explained. "A water conservation ordinance will be reviewed at the next City Council meeting."

He said that a good feature of Lake Cisco is that it has a low rate of evaporation. Being a deep lake with a small basin.

"But we need alternate sources of water," the councilman said. "Water controls growth. Lake Cisco hasn't been full since 1969, and there has been no appreciable runoff on our watershed since 1981."

After these talks DeMarquis Gordon, County Agents, offered the help of the Extension Service to work on the water problem. He mentioned a large amount of educational material available.

The Extension office is equipped to give programs, slide presentations and exhibits on water conservation. A booth on this subject is planned for the Eastland County Fair.

In the discussion which followed, various individuals declared that water is the most precious commodity we have, and should be used very wisely. There were also wishes for "a ten inch rain all the way from here to Putnam - a few inches at a time of course."

plied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity of cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, or (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.

This notification of the public is in compliance with the Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act" as a means of keeping the public informed.

Wednesday, August 8th the Eastland County 4-H Council Executives met. The 1984-85 council officers are:

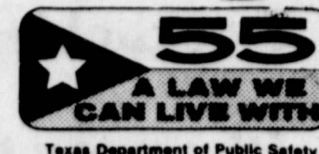

These are only a few possible activities for this year.

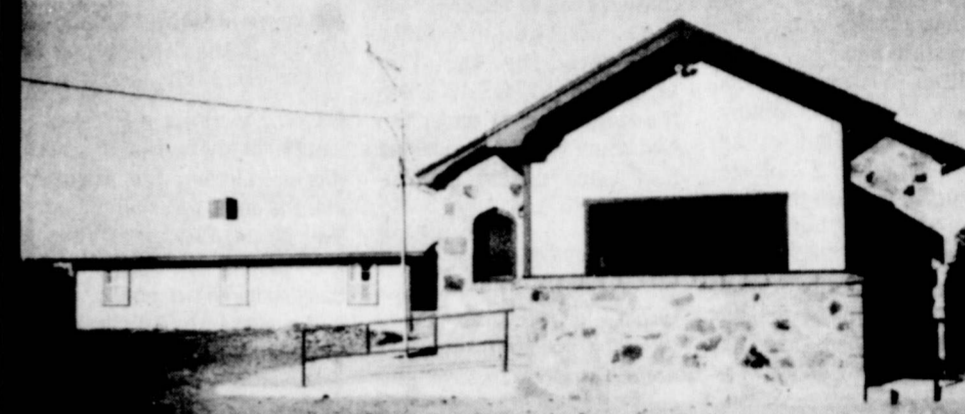

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Black Leg In Cattle Is Preventable

Blackleg is a sudden onset, febrile disease of cattle and is characterized by gaseous hemorrhagic swelling in the heavier muscles of the body. The disease is usually limited to young animals 6 to 18 months of age. Occasionally a calf will be found lame, then rapidly become depressed and die several hours to a couple of days later, but most clinical cases are characterized by going to the pasture and finding a 300 to 600 pound calf dead.

Black leg is caused by Clostridium chauvoei a spore forming bacteria that grows in the absence of oxygen. Spores are formed when the growing or vegetative form that multiplies the diseased muscles of the dying animal become exposed to air. These spores will remain able to infect other cattle for many years. This is why cattle that die of blackleg should be burned or covered with quicklime and buried deeply in an area not subject to washing.

The bacteria enters the body by the mouth when cattle graze contaminated pastures. The incubation period of the disease is 1 to 5 days and is usually fatal in 18 to 72 hours after symptoms appear. Blackleg is world wide in distribution and is especially prevalent in the western United States including Eastland County. In the past 2 years we've seen approximately 25 cases and they are distributed evenly throughout the county.

A post mortem exam usually makes for a fairly easy diagnosis of the disease. The affected

muscles are dark red to black in color and have a dry spongy texture. Occasionally only a very small area of muscle is involved and in rare occasion specimens are sent to a diagnostic laboratory to confirm the diagnosis.

The most important fact to know about blackleg is that it cases costly severe losses that are easily prevented by inexpensive vaccines. There are many brands of vaccine and any veterinary clinic or feed store sells them. Some vaccines are administered differently from others so stop and read the label before you use the vaccine. It must be administered properly to achieve the best possible immunity. Vaccination should be repeated at 4 to 6 months of age in any calves initially vaccinated at less than 3 months of age. I personally recommend vaccinating the whole herd including cows and bulls when blackleg is diagnosed on a farm that has not vaccinated against blackleg in several years.

Consumers Can Save Dollars

Careful shopping for seconds and irregulars can save consumers money, if they know how to look for signs of quality, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

Many manufacturers set standards for their products, says Bonnie L. Piernot. When those standards aren't met, they don't discard the items. Instead, manufacturers label the imperfect produce a "second" or an "irregular" and direct stores to sell it below regular price, she explains.

A factory irregular is usually only slightly below the manufacturer's standards, says the home economist. Irregular stockings, for example, may be not quite standard size. Irregular towels may be not quite perfect in color or weave and there may be a slight oil spot on an irregular shirt.

"Often you won't be able to spot the defect in a factory irregular," says Piernot. In general, you're more likely to find damaged goods

among products labeled as seconds, she observes. A second is often broken, torn, or poorly made and the defect is easily identified.

But it can pay to carefully examine seconds, says Piernot, because sometimes they are perfect. Occasionally a company wants to clear out some goods at sales price without having to lower prices on similar items. So the company calls the goods seconds and sells them at a lower price.

To get irregulars or seconds that meet their needs, consumers should determine the marks of quality for the product they're buying, advises the home economist.

Whether the product is a kitchen appliance, sweater or carpet, there are specific indicators of quality that can guide the purchase decision, she points out. Reading about the product in consumer books or magazines and comparison shopping in person or by calling can help consumers discern these quality features.

Cars with diesel engines can be damaged by driving through standing water. Avoid water more than 8 inches deep; even in shallower areas, it slowly so water won't be splashed up and sucked into the engine through the air intake.

Harder steering and maneuvering, shimmy, and road wander are trouble signals. Suspect wheel bearing trouble and get the car serviced promptly.

Though today's new batteries no longer need to be filled with water regularly, they do require SOME attention. Be sure battery is firmly seated and clean. Have cable connections checked for looseness, corrosion, broken clamps, or fraying.

Wheel bearings and grease seals are usually serviced during a complete brake job.

Safety tip: if your gas sticks, tap it lightly to see if it will spring back. Use the toe of your shoe to pull it up—but don't take your eyes off the road. If you must stop, turn ignition OFF (but not into "steering lock" position) and apply brakes.
