Law Cooperation Recognized At County Banquet

Joe Cooper of Cisco and Cecil Funderburgh of Gorman were honored Saturday night, August 18, at the 13th Annual Eastland County Law Enforcement Association Banquet. The banquet, starting at 7 p.m., was held at Wendell T. Siebert Elementary School in Eastland.

A Cisco certified public accountant, Joe Cooper was named by District Attorney Emory Walton as the county's outstanding citizen. The award is presented each year by the law enforcement association.

An award is also presented each year by the Eastland County Newspapers to the

outstanding lawman in the county. This year's award was presented to Cecil Funderburgh, the Chief of Police in Gorman. The award was presented to Chief Funderburgh by Herrel Hallmark, editor of The Cisco Press.

Cooper was recognized by Mr. Walton for his interest in, and his contributions to, county law enforcement. Raised in Eastland County, Cooper is a graduate of Texas A&M. He returned to Cisco from Dallas in 1971 and he owns his own CPA firm there.

Instrumental in establishing People Against Dangerous Drugs (PADD)

in Eastland County in 1981. Cooper is a frequent speaker against drug abuse. He is a member of the Jaycees, the Lions Club and Rotary Club.

PADD's purpose is to inform citizens of the dangers of drugs to inform people about drug abuse in the county and to support the local law enforcement agencies.

Earlier this year, the Cooper family was named a Great American Family under a program endorsed by First Lady Nancy Reagan. The Coopers were one of five families named in Texas.

Cooper and his wife, Jan, have two daughters, Kelley

and Kori.

Cecil Funderburgh, a graduate of Poly Tech High School of Fort Worth, attended T.C.U. He also took various military courses and correspondence courses while in the U.S. Air Force.

Born in Gorman, Funderburgh returned there in 1973 and opened a television repair shop. In the latter part of 1979, he hired on as a patrolman in Gorman and in early 1980 he was appointed Chief of Police.

Funderburgh is noted as a "very efficient and active law enforcement officer." Locally, he has been very active in fighting the problems of alcohol and drug abuse

and he is involved in both the MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Drivers) and PADD programs in the county.

Also very active in Crime Stoppers. Chief Funderburgh organized the Gorman Chapter of the Crime Stoppers program. Reported as one of Funderburgh's main interests, is "providing guidance for youth so they might avoid problems in their lives."

Funderburgh, noted for his cooperation with all law enforcement agencies, said upon his acceptance of the award, "I feel I am accepting this award on behalf of all law enforcement officers in the county. Cooperation makes it possible for us to do our jobs."

Funderburgh and his wife, Ann, have four children, David, Debby, Kathy, and Cecil III.

A.F. (Floyd) Hacker, a top state lawman with close Eastland County ties, was the guest speaker. Mr. Hacker is Chief, Criminal Law Enforcement Division, Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin.

He is responsible for activities and supervision of 359 commissioned officers and 146 civilian personnel of the Narcotics Service, Texas Ranger Service, Motor Vehicle Theft Service, Criminal Intelligence Service/Crime Analysis Section.

A Hermleigh High School graduate, Hacker attended Ranger Junior College where he played football and met his future wife, the former Linda Brockman, an Eastland High School graduate.

With the Department of Public Safety for 28 years, Hacker has served as a trooper, sergeant, training specialist, intelligence agent, intelligence captain, director training and narcotics service commander, a position he has held for the past six years.

He is the nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Manning of Eastland and his wife's mother, Mrs. C.T. Brockman, lives in Eastland.

In speaking to county law officers, Hacker said, "To enforce the law, you must first respect the law."

In speaking to citizens of the county, he said, "You have to support the law officials when they are right, as well as when they think they are right and acting in the best interest of the community. See that the criminal justice department of your area operates correctly."

Loboes Will Scrimmage In Anson Thursday Night

Coach John Parchman will take his Cisco High School Loboes to Anson Thursday for a controlled scrimmage program that will commence at 6 p.m.

The junior varsity squads of the two schools will meet at 6 p.m. and the varsity elevens will tangle at about 7:30 p.m. A squad of some 60 Cisco players will make the trip to Anson.

Two-a-day workouts ended last Friday after two weeks of general conditioning activities. Six more players

joined the squad as classes began Monday at the high school. This brought the squad about 60 players.

Coach Parchman and his staff have the task of finding 14 replacements for 1983 graduating seniors as they prepared for the 1984 season.

"We lost some good boys and replacing them is a difficult job," the coach said. "We are pretty well pleased with the work of our boys and feel that they will continue to improve as the season opens and moves

along. Our boys are working hard and have a fine attitude."

The training activities during the past two weeks were without disabling injuries to players, the coach said.

West 17th Street Contract Awarded

A contract was awarded Monday afternoon by the Cisco City Council for the paving of West 17th Street. Bids were opened and the contract was awarded to J.H. Strain and Sons of Tye, Texas, according to City Manager Mike Moore.

The amount of the contract is for \$86,926.02 and will be paid for from the city's oil

and gas royalties revenue. The project has a 45-day completion date and is anticipated to get underway very soon.

City manager Moore said J.H. Strain and Sons are the contractors who have been doing the Conrad Hilton job the State Highway Department.

Water Reservoir Will Be Cleaned

The City of Cisco's water reservoir at College Hill will be drained and cleaned Wednesday, August 22nd, as a part of the Water Treatment Plant project. Four inches of silt is reported to be in the reservoir at the present time.

City Manager Mike Moore said he does not anticipate any loss of water in the city because the reservoir can be by-passed for city water customers. However, due to

the way they are tied into the line, Westbound Water Supply Corporation's customers will be out of water possibly all day.

Mr. Moore stated that the Westbound office has been notified of this event. He also said the crews cleaning the tank will be taking all steps necessary "to get the job done in the shortest amount of time necessary" so normal water usage may be restored.

Prevent Tractor Theft

COLLEGE STATION--Already in a financial crunch, many Texas farmers are having to cope with another growing problem--tractor thefts.

"Tractor thefts in Texas are up 20 percent for the first half of 1984 compared to last year," says Dr. J. Fred Cross, of Stephenville, community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Texas farmers and ranchers have already lost an estimated \$45 million in tractor thefts this year."

Cross says that tractor owners can reduce this loss by putting an identification number on the tractor.

Properly identified tractors can deter crime in three ways. A thief will often pass up a tractor with a prominently displayed identification number because it will be harder to sell as stolen property. If the thief is caught, the identification number will enable law enforcement officers to notify the owner that the tractor has been recovered. An identification number also can be used as evidence in court

that the thief had possession of stolen property.

"The proper number to use for property identification in Texas is the owners driver's license number," notes Cross. "This number is preferred over other identifying numbers because it can be readily traced through the Texas Department of Public Safety computer system."

One's Social Security number is not a good number to use for identifying property since federal law prohibits the Social Security Administration from releasing the name that goes with any number. Another numbering system, often referred to as the Iowa System, is being used in several states but is not recommended in Texas, Cross says.

Marking locations have been standardized to make it easier for law enforcement officers to locate the identification number. Place the identification number on the rear of the differential housing, Cross says. If the center of housing is not accessible, place the number on the top

or rear.

The specialist advises placing the identification number on the tractor with a metal stamping tool. An arc or acetylene welder also may be used, but the stamping tool number is easier to read and harder to remove.

Before marking the tractor, and pit or paint surfaces to insure a clear-cut imprint. Cross suggests making a stamp in wood to ensure the correct number and making a practice imprint on scrap metal to get accustomed to the surface.

When ready to proceed with the numbering, use a heavy hammer to make sure the imprint is legible. If the number is blurred, make a second imprint directly under the blurred number, advises the specialist.

Other farm equipment should be identified in the same way, says Cross. Extension Service publication B-1404, "Home and Farm Security--Machinery and

Equipment Identification," shows the standard marking locations for farm machinery and equipment. The publication is available from any county Extension office.

In addition to putting identification numbers on farm equipment, Cross advises recording and safeguarding all serial numbers. These numbers also can aid in recovering stolen property although they are not as useful as the driver's license number in identifying the owner.

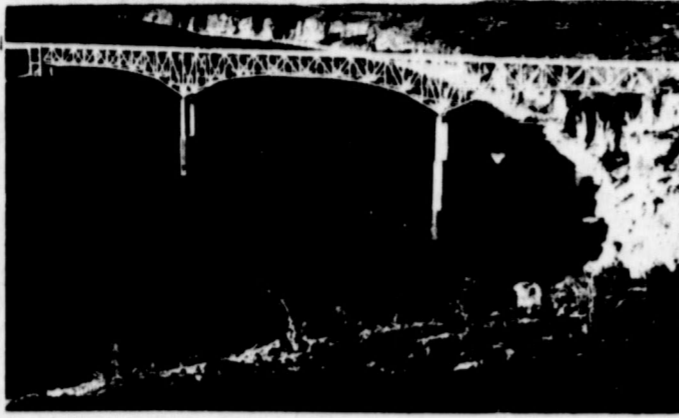

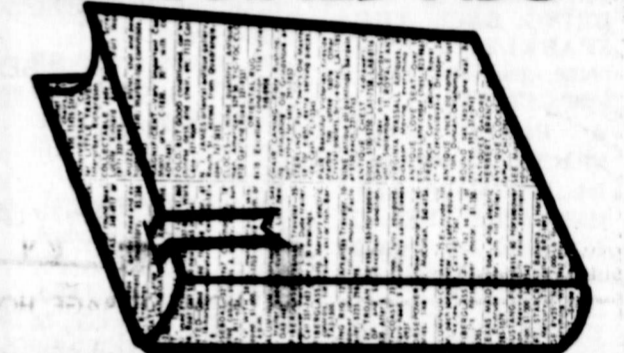

REMEMBER THE old days when many of us (?) (not all) were so quick to say: "How can we get some federal aid in here?"

Or "Why doesn't the federal government shovel some 'free funds' to us so we could do this, or do that?"

Well, a recent report by the Texas Research League is now answering these questions -- and it's frightening.

coming from -- guess who? -- US!

That's you and me. Folks in Texas and 18 other states are "shoveling a lot of tax money to Washington" but guess what again -- we're not getting it all back, by a long shot. "Each \$1 of Federal Grants cost Texans \$1.71 in Federal Tax."

Texas residents, for the third consecutive year, paid the highest premium for federal grants-in-aid. In fiscal year 1983, according to data compiled by Tax Foundation, each dollar of grants cost Texans \$1.71 in federal taxes. Other top paying states were Connecticut (\$1.38),

Florida (1.38), Colorado (\$1.29) and New Jersey (\$1.28). At the low end, each grand dollar cost the residents of the nation's capital 24 cents.

In FY 1982 the Texas ratio of federal tax burden per dollar of aid was \$1.59. The 12 cent increase to the FY 1983 level of \$1.71 was the highest among all states.

Federal Grants Up The federal government disbursed \$88.8 billion in grant-in-aid to state and local governments in FY 1983, \$3.3 billion or 4% more than the previous year.

The five largest grant programs are Medicaid, interstate highway construction grants, Aid to Families With Dependent Children, subsidized housing and general revenue sharing. Together these accounted for \$45.3 billion, more than 51% of the 1983 total. Federal grants across the

nation averaged \$381 per capita in 1983. State by state, the range was from a high in the District of Columbia (\$2,114) to a low in Texas (\$245). Other high ranking states were Alaska (\$1,029), Vermont (\$596), and New York (\$568). Just above Texas at the low end of the scale were Florida (\$265), Arizona (\$282) and Indiana (\$282).

"Payers" and "Receivers" Residents of 19 states--those where the aggregate federal tax burden exceeded the amount of grants received--bore the cost of supporting federal aid.

The 125 million persons in the "paying" states sent \$30.8 billion to Washington and got back \$41.2 billion--for an average federal tax burden of \$1.23 for each dollar of aid.

On the flip side, 108 million residents in 31 states and the District of Columbia--the

"receiving" states--paid an average of 80 cents for each \$1 of federal aid (\$38.0 billion paid versus \$47.5 billion received).

Indirect Costs Not Included In addition to direct costs in federal taxes, the residents must also pay state and local taxes to meet the matching funds required by most Federal grant programs. The Office of Management and Budget estimates that state and

local governments had to ante-up 43 cents out of their own funds for each \$1 aid in FY 1983. This is in addition to any administrative or overhead costs that recipient governments must bear.

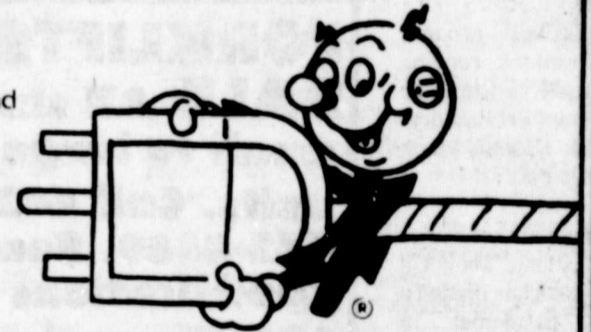

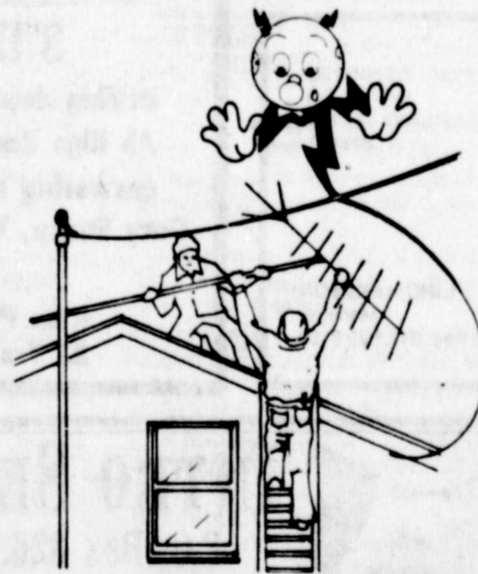

Oil Belt News

Eastland County's Waldrop Field gained a new producer when Taurus Energy Operating Co. of Euless completed the No. 1 R.A. Stone three miles north of Rising Star.

The well indicated ability to pump 22 barrels per day. It was taken to a 1,150-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Strawn Formation, 1,098 to 1,125 feet into the wellbore.

Church Conference To Address Computers, Information Age

COLLEGE STATION--Churches are benefiting from computer technology along with other segments of society. These benefits as well as other effects of computers on churches and society will be the focus of the 1984 Town and Country Church Conference at Texas A&M University, Sept. 10-11.

With respect to computers and computerese, the conference has as its theme, "More Bits, Bytes and Buzzwords for Your Church."

"The annual conference provides an opportunity for church leaders to obtain information which can help satisfy a growing need for overall community understanding and cooperative action," points out Dr. David Ruesink, sociologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, and conference chairman.

"This year's conference is designed to help church leaders learn more about computers and the role of these electronic marvels in the church community," he adds.

The conference will begin at 1 p.m. the first day with a keynote address by Robert L. Robertson, senior minister of the New World United Methodist Church of Garland, who will discuss the church in the midst of the Information Age.

Computer workshops the first afternoon will focus on the basics of a microcom-

puter, expanded application of software packages, and effects of computer technology on the family and society.

A non-computer workshop also will be featured and will deal with job burnout and clergy isolation.

A special banquet will be held that evening to honor all nominees for the Texas Rural Minister of the Year. The award is presented annually by Progressive Farmer magazine.

A panel discussion on "Computers in the Church" will kick off the second day's program, with panelists being computer users with low, medium and high budget systems ranging from \$1,000 to \$20,000.

A "Computer Cracker Barrel" will follow featuring a roundtable discussion by computer users who will address problems, solutions and other considerations.

A session on "Time Management" will conclude the morning session.

Discussions at the afternoon session will focus on "Clergy and the Law," "Continuing Education for Clergy," and "Theology and Ethics in the Information Age."

The annual conference is a joint venture of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Department of Rural Sociology at Texas A&M University.

Microwave Pork Safe And Delicious

COLLEGE STATION--Pork prepared in a microwave is tender, juicy, flavorful -- and safe, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

Many people have been legitimately concerned about cooking pork in their microwave, says Dr. Dymple Cooksey. The problem is that heat distribution patterns vary in meat cuts cooked by microwave, she explains.

In the case of pork, thorough cooking is necessary to insure that micro-organisms such as trichinella do not survive, says the nutritionist. Since evaporative cooking occurs when meats are cooked in a microwave oven, the internal temperature of a pork roast might reach the recommended 170 degrees F, while the surface temperature would be only 120 F.

However, through research for the Pork Industry Group of the National Livestock and Meat Board, conducted at Iowa State University and private laboratories, recommendations for proper and safe microwave cooking methods of pork have been developed, she says.

In order to create an environment in which pork can be prepared safely, the researchers used a "cooking bag" to produce a vaporous atmosphere while the pork cooks. The procedure has been tested extensively using meat from hogs infected with trichinella, and no organisms were found to survive, says Cooksey.

Here are the resulting recommendations for microwave fresh boneless pork roasts:

- Choose evenly shaped boneless roasts weighing no more than 3 to 2½ pounds

and having a diameter of no more than 4 inches.

- Place roast into a 10-by-16-inch oven cooking bag and place in microwave-safe baking dish or place on a microwave-safe rack with sides.

- Evenly sprinkle roast with a package (24 grams) of pork or brown gravy mix.
- Close bag loosely with string or a ½ inch strip cut from open end of bag.

- Allow 22 minutes per pound.

- Cook at medium low or 30 percent lower (approximately 200 watts).

- Invert or turn roast halfway through cooking period and rotate dish ½ turn and continue cooking.

- Cover roast (in bag) tightly with foil and allow to stand for 10 minutes.

Day-To-Day Money Management

COLLEGE STATION--Where does all the money go? You'll never have a good answer to this question, or a grasp of your family finances unless you have a method for keeping financial records, says home economist Mary Clayton Nance.

Record-keeping should be a cooperative effort among all members of the household, although the person best qualified should assume major responsibility for the task, she says.

The first step is to organize a work space, which includes a table surface and adequate facilities for storing records, says Nance.

Then you will need to develop a workable record-keeping system. This is simply a procedure for forecasting expected income, estimating money you need, making spending plans, keeping a record of how money was used and reviewing family money management, explains the home economist.

"Develop a system to get started, but don't feel like you're locked into it," says Nance. "It's better to make changes in your system than to abandon it because it's too difficult to follow."

Here are the home economist's suggestions for starting a basic family record-keeping system:

- Keep all cash register tapes and receipts for bills paid in one place--like a box or drawer--until they can be filed or recorded in a monthly record keeping book. Be sure that each tape or receipt identifies the amount of money spent and what it

was spent for.

- Have each family member record the money they spend and its use, then give it to the person who is keeping the monthly bills.

Decide who will pay the bills and record the spending plans and expenditures. Also decide whether the recording will be done weekly, every two weeks or monthly.

- Set a specific time, like a once a month, for a family council to evaluate goals, spending plans and records of how money was used and to make spending plans for the next month.

It's important that accurate records and plans are kept for all money, says Nance, otherwise, you can't leak and improvements in your family financial situation.

Good Hunting Expected Despite Dry Weather

Dry weather and sun-scorched habitat so far have failed to seriously hurt the state's white-tailed deer populations, and may even contribute to a better hunting season this fall.

This is the view of Horace Gore, white-tailed program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, who said so far no drought-related deer die-offs have been reported.

"The deer are doing pretty well, even in the really dry areas," said Gore, "but fawn crops and antler development are extremely poor in some regions." The deer season in most counties will be Nov. 17, 1984, through Jan. 6, 1985.

Gore notes that hunter harvest traditionally is higher during a dry year when deer are forced to move around more than usual to find food. "I'm almost certain the acorn crop this year will be poor so the deer will be moving around quite a bit more during the daylight hours."

Many landowners have inquired about the feasibility of supplemental feeding of deer during the current drought, a practice biologists consider marginal in terms of benefit to the deer herd. "A landowner may help the deer a little by feeding corn, and it may serve to hold the deer in a particular home area," Gore said. "But supplemental feeding in the quantities usually provided probably has very small long-term effect on the overall nutritional well-being of a deer herd."

Gore said some parts of the state are not hurt by dry weather so far, but others are as dry as experienced observers have noted in years. "Most of the Edwards Plateau is extremely dry, and that drought area extends through the western half of South Texas," Gore said, adding that this is a region which provides a high percentage of the state's annual whitetail harvest.

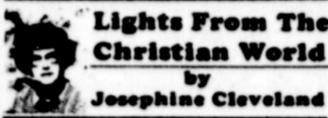
The bone-dry area also includes a West Texas region roughly bounded by San Angelo, Abilene, Mineral Wells and Waco. Oddly, one of the lushest regions of the state is the usually-arid Trans-Pecos, which received larger than normal amounts of rainfall in 1984. Biologists hope this

will give a boost to mule deer populations which have declined in some areas during the past few years.

The East Texas Pineywoods, as well as the hardwood region centered around Leon, Robertson and Anderson Counties, are drier than normal but not significantly so, Gore said.

One of the hardest-hit regions this year and during the past three years is around Cotulla in South Texas. The Chaparral Wildlife Management Area in LaSalle County south of Cotulla is facing its fourth year out of the past five with low fawn production because of drought conditions.

Gore reminded hunters that even with the possibility of some losses of deer due to the drought, most of Texas' deer range is overpopulated with deer. "Landowners and hunters should try to use all the antlerless deer permits they are entitled to, because deer populations and dry weather are placing even more pressure on overused habitat," Gore explained.

Catholics Plan Adult Training

An article in the Sunday issue of this publication about the Catholic communities of Eastland, Cisco, Ranger and Strawn and the Fall RCIA program had typographical errors which made it unclear.

The RCIA, (Rites of Christian Initiation of Adults) will be held by the churches in October. The program reintroduces the early Church's Catechumenate Program and is for adults who are interested in learning about the Catholic Faith and/or becoming a member of the Catholic Church.

The RCIA Program takes the candidates through well-defined stages during their preparation which is seen as the Journey of Faith.

The first of these stages of study and growth is called evangelization and is a time of inquiry. It consists of six sessions which allow the inquirer to hear the call of God and how this is experienced and celebrated in the Catholic Community.

This publication apologizes for the errors and any confusion which may have resulted.

The second stage of study and growth is called: CATECHUMENATE - During this time each candidate will receive a sponsor; preferably some church member they already know. There are 13 sessions in this stage. We look at the life of the Church in greater detail by studying and experiencing: Prayer; Jesus; Ministry; Morality; Sin; Forgiveness; Reconciliation; Marriage; Faith; The

Community of Faith; Church History, with sessions for questions. At the end of this stage those candidates who choose to continue will participate in the Rite of Election of Catechumens on the First Sunday of Lent. The Bishop presides over this ceremony at the Cathedral in Fort Worth. The ceremony draws many candidates from throughout the Diocese of Fort Worth.

The third stage of study and growth is called: PERIOD OF ENLIGHTENMENT - The Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist are studied as well as their implications for our life, death and resurrection. This consists of five sessions.

After this Faith Journey, those who decide to become members of the Catholic Community are initiated during the Easter Vigil Service. This is the traditional time that new members become part of the Christian Community from the earliest times of the Church.

There will be two follow-up sessions after the Easter Vigil Initiation.

All sessions will be held on Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30 in Saint Rita's Church Hall in Ranger.

He stressed that citizens need to become aware of what is going on in the criminal justice system, to get involved and to support lawmen.

Hacker said, "I am seeing a lot of things today that I have never seen before." Law enforcement gets very dangerous and officers are

facing a more violent and sophisticated criminal today, than ever before."

In trying to stop the flow of illegal drugs, he said, the DPS cannot compete with the budgets of drug traffickers. He said the estimated retail value of illegal drugs in the United States during the past year is \$87 billion. The DPS has a \$7.5 million budget for its 169-person narcotics divi-

sion. Hacker concluded, "We appreciate what the people in the grass roots are doing." He said that in smaller communities the police officials and citizens interact with each other and know each other, therefore, the citizens become more involved with the law and its enforcement.
