Veteran's Day Brings Memories To CISCO, TEX 76437 most woundans

Peace.

No condition has been more sought after during human history, and none has proved to be more illusive.

But in the lives of all of us there comes some glimmer of peace - golden, flawless days which give some premonition of what it would be like to be totally secure.

Those who have lived through wars always remember that it was like when the battles were over. Such was the case as World War I ended on Nov. 11, 1918. This was true on the home front as well as the battlefield.

Judge Earl Conner Jr. of

Eastland remembers that he was a boy in his class at the Eastland School on that first Armistice Day. He recalls that the school building was located about where Eastland Memorial Hospital

"As soon as the news got to the school they turned it right out, and the pupils hurried downtown," he says. "The old Courthouse was still standing then, and we gathered around it for a pro-

"People were coming in Model T cars, wagons and on foot - any way they could get there for the celebration.

"All the 'old nesters' in

as people who had moved into town because of the oil

"Songs such as 'It's a Long Way to Tipperary' and 'Over There' were sung.

"A number of our young men from Eastland, such as the Hargis boys and Gene Andrews, were overseas. Everyone was rejoicing because the war had been won. 'Our doughboys are coming home!' They said."

Vera Johnson of Eastland, retired teacher, recalls that her father was particularly glad to see the end of World War I. He was Dr. J.L. Johnson, a pioneer Eastland

physician. During this war he was also member of the Draft Board.

By the time of World War I the doctor was making his rounds in the area in a Model T Ford. His office was near the northwest corner of the Courthouse Square.

Vera Johnson, like Earl Conner, was in school in Eastland on that day in 1918 when the big news reached town. She remembers how school hurriedly turned out, and how happy everyone was as they gathered in the

Ella Andres White of Cisco, musician and retired teachers, also has memories

of November 11, 1918. During that time she was living in Lampasas, Texas with her

"We dreaded the war news so much every day," she says. "There were always names of young men who had been killed, or of something else we would have to give up. There were shortages of meat and sugar, among other things. One of my classmates had a saying: 'Sweetless days and meatless days and eatless

Mother, who was a widow.

"I was in school on Nov. 11 when the news of the Armistice was announced. We children were so excited we hardly knew what to do!

Classes were dismissed, and we went to a special gathering. The whole town had turned out - it was an unforgettable time.

World War I, in my opinion, was much worse than anything we've had since," Mrs. White says. "It was a brand new experience - we didn't know what to expect.

"How I hope we never have to go through anything like that again!"

Out at Scranton, southwest of Cisco, the war was felt as keenly as anywhere in Eastland County. At that time Scranton was a thriving little town.

Academy had closed several years earlier, there was still a good public school near the

Mrs. John (Eunice Slatton) Penn of Cisco remembers Nov. 11, 1918 in Scranton. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. Will Slatton, who lived on a farm near the

Alonza Bailey, her mother's brother, had been killed in action in Europe on Oct. 8, 1918. So the war was particularly vivid to the

Eunice was in a schoolroom when the end of the war was announced on Nov. 11. Classes were immediately turned out, and

students picked up some flags in the school and marched down to Main Street.

The weather was pleasant that day, and the children were light-hearted and hap-

"It seemed like all our troubles were over," Mrs. Penn recalls.

So that was the first Armistice Day, in Eastland County and elsewhere. Three more wars have come and gone since that day. But the end of World War I still shines through it all.

Its Armistice Day now continues in the form of Veteran's Day - a time to think again of the joys of

Gordon Peter Getty, the son of the late billionaire J. Paul Getty, led the list with something like \$4.1 billion. The founder of Wal-Mart stores, Sam Moore Walton, was in second place with \$2.3 billion, and David Packard, co-founder of Hewlett-Packard, was in third place with \$1.8 billion.

And Texas' own Perot, of Dallas, was shown with a paltry \$1.4 billion.

7,389 Countians Turn Out Tuesday

Over 65% of the registered voters in Eastland County went to the polls in Tuesday's general election. There are 11,270 registered voters and 7,389 voted in the presidential election.

The Republican candidates carried all nine boxes in the county and the absentee vote, also.



Annette, an honor student with a .93 point average, is attending school here under the American-Scandinavian Student Exchange Program. She lives at the home of Curt and Sue Covert, who have a ranch out north of Lake Cisco. Their place has choice views of hills, valleys and oak trees.

The Coverts also have an attractive daughter, Leslie, who is a Junior at Cisco High. Annette and Leslie have become very good friends, so are enjoying this special year together.

Recently I went out to the Covert home to meet Annette and learn about some of her impressions of life in America.

As Annette entered the living room my first though was - "Well, she looks like an American girl. Large grayblue eyes, soft golden-brown hair, bright smile."

But then I noticed her skin, and it had a certain clarity which was somehow different.

I began to wish for some kind of a magic potion which would create skin like that for older women who have been buffeted by the wilds of West Texas.

When we think of Topiary Art we think of small animals that have sphagnum moss worked into their frames and small ivy plants implanted into the sphagnum moss. Topiary is a form of art that has been practiced for centuries and consist of many different forms other than animals. I have seen Topiary Art in the form of boats, airplanes and even a full size chair and table.

You must first take galvanized wire and shape it into the form that you desire. Then you spot weld the wire at the various places that it intersects the other wire. For good long lasting quality the wires are never tied, they are welded. Then you work in unmilled sphagnum moss into the framework and tie it together to the wire framework with an a nylon cord that is invisible. Within the center of the item that you are making you add a good potting soil mixture and NOT dirt. This use of a

Microwave Heating Extends Milk

Freshness

COLLEGE STATION--Consumers can use their microwave ovens to restore a fresh taste to week-old milk without affecting its nutritional value, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service food and nutrition specialist.

Researchers at Cornell University have tested microwave heating as a way to kill the souring bacteria that develop in stored milk, reports Dr. Dymple Cooksey. Their tests show that a two-minute treatment at 2450 MHz reduces the bacteria in a cup of 10-day old milk to level present in fresh milk.

Milk "goes bad" long before it is actually unsafe to drink, noted Cooksey. One study has shown that over 40 percent of 10-day old milk samples rated poor because they have a fruity, fermented and rancid off-flavor, she explains.

One of the main causes of deteriorating quality is psychotropic bacteria which lead to stale, bitter or sour flavors as milk is stored. Milk becomes contaminated with these bacteria during handling, so the pasteurization process which improves the quality of fresh milk cannot prevent the development of these off-flavors, says the specialist.

But microwave heating of pasteurized milk when it is eight to eleven days old reduces the contaminating bacteria and the off-taste as well, says Cooksey.

According to the specialist, one advantage of microwave heating is that it uses fairly low temperatures, so the milk is not left with a "boiled" taste. Most importantly, microwave heating does not destroy any of the important nutrients in milk, she emphasizes.

The microwave treatment is most effective on store-bought milk that is about eight days old, or two to three days before the "pull-date" marked on the carton.

Milk can be kept in its original paper or plastic carton for microwaving. Heating the milk to 60 degrees C or 140 F at 2450 MHz would preserve it up to 21 days, or double the average shelf life, the specialist says.

Most microwave ovens run at a frequency of 2450 MHz, but consumers should check the oven manual to make sure, Cooksey adds.



Home Builders Value Trees

COLLEGE STATION --Without question, a wooded lot adds value to a home.

Alan Dreesen, forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, cites a study done from 1979 to 1982 to determine if home builders realized het gains by protecting existing shade trees on lots. The study involved 85 homes in Atlanta, Ga., area in the \$122,000 range built by 22 different builders with an average of 13 years of experience.

These builders indicated that the average cost of clearing a lot was \$860, while the average cost to preserve trees was only \$574 per lot, notes Dreesen. In addition, the builders reported that lots with trees sold for \$5,700 more per lot than those that had been cleared.

Builders in the study agreed that trees helped houses sell sooner, says Dreesen, and that any cost involved in protecting trees could be recovered at a profit when homes were sold.

As long as the homeowner is willing to pay a higher price for a home on a wooded lot, builders will continue to preserve trees on the lots, Dreesen says.

The study also showed that builders are more likely to preserve trees on a lot if the job involves custom built rather than speculative tract development construction. Builders also are more likely to preserve trees on larger

In addition, builders tend to preserve trees where they are more dense because clearing costs are higher, notes Dreesen. Clearing costs also increase as tree size increases.

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



Defensive standouts were Bill White, Lonnie Pevey, David Reyes, Curtis Taylor, Phillip Allen, and Pete DeLeon



(until top is golden brown).

Bullock Sends Checks

State Comptroller Bob **Bullock Monday sent checks** totaling \$99.5 million in local tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the onepercent local sales tax.

"So far this year, we've sent 13 percent more money to these cities than we did last year," Bullock said. "And they can expect another increase next month as we begin sending them receipts we collect for the new items and services that became taxable October 2. We'll be getting this extra money later in November and sending it to the city halls in December."

Houston's check was the largest -- \$16.9 million -bringing 1984 payments to \$134.8 million, up four percent. Dallas received \$11.4 million for a total \$92 million, a 15 percent increase over last year.

San Antonio's payment of \$6.2 million brought the city's 1984 allocations to \$46.1 million for a 16 percent increase. Austin's check for \$4.8 million increased total 1984 payments to \$34.4 million, a 30 percent jump.

Fort Worth received \$3.6 million for a yearly total \$28.4 million and a 15 percent increase over 1983. El Paso's check for \$2 million pushed 1984 payments to \$16.9 million, up 15 percent. Bullock also sent checks totaling \$41.1 million to the state's four Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston MTA received \$19.6 million for total \$155.3 million. Dallas' DART check was for \$16.9 million, bringing yearly payments to \$93.8 million.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and the third quarter and reported to the Comptroller by October

Eastland County cities received checks totaling \$87,463.49 this period, compared to \$85,813.75 in 1983. This brings the 1984 total to \$628,336.96, up 16.56% over the 1983 total of \$539,067.98.

A check for \$27,360.15 was mailed to Cisco, down from the \$30,560.76 received for the same period last year. The 1984 total to date is \$193,206.94, up 3.69% over \$186,340.01 in 1983.

Eastland's check was in the amount of \$34,846.91, up from \$30,043.41 received in the same period last year. 1984 payments total \$280,736.66, compared to \$200.877.07 last year.

Gorman received a check for \$7,397.12, down from last year's \$4,867.10. Yearly totals are \$27,054.14 for 1984 and \$26,564.16 for 1983 an increase of 1.84%.

Ranger's check for \$15,038.32 was down from last years \$16,352.71. This brings the 1984 payments to \$104,571.65, down 1.15% from the 1983 total of \$105,791.48.

Amsterdam was not as well kept as I had expected it to be, but it was a very interesting city. It was one of the first 17th century cities in Europe to be laid out in a pre-plan. The buildings in the city are built on wooden poles which were shipped from Sweden and are placed 40 ft. into the ground.

We enjoyed a boat ride through the canals which were hand dug in the 13th to 17th centuries. These 100 canals, which are 10 ft. deep, are crossed by 1203 bridges. It is called the Venice of the Nrth. We saw some of the 2000 house boats floating on the canals and many beautiful old buildings which are protected by the government. They cannot be demolished. 600,000 cubic meters of fresh water is flushed through the canals each day, and sewers no

longer empty into them. The crime rate in Amsterdam is high because of drugs coming into Europe through this port.

The evening of Monday, July 30, we went to a nice restaurant for an Indonesian dinner. The food was very different and delicious. We were served 16 or 18 different dishes. There are two beef dishes, also pork on skewers, chicken, rice, cabbage, slaw, zucchini salad, shrimp bread, boiled eggs, meat balls and others.

Before leaving Amster-

dam on Tuesday, we stopped at Holshvyren Stoeltis, a diamond polishing works, which was established in 1664. They get the rough diamonds from south and southwest Africa and the sawing, shaping and polishing is done here. We were told and shown many interesting things about diamonds. A few in our group bought diamonds

We then went to a bulb farm. Seven billion bulb e bulbs are exported each year. 90% of all bulbs shipped come from the Netherlands. An ambassador moved from Turkey to Holland and brought tulips with him, beginning the growing of tulips in Holland. Some of us bought bulbs which will be shipped to us.

We found Belgium to be mostly a flat country. All the highways are lighted because there is a lot of fog.

Paul had the privilege of being used to write more of the Christian Greek Scriptures (Commonly known as The New Testament) than anyone else. (14 Books) Paul had a "thorn in the flesh," possibly an affliction of his eyes. (2 Cor. 12:7; compare Gal. 4:15 and 6:11)

While he was entitled to receive material support from his brothers he chose to work with his hands in order not to be an expensive burden. (Acts 26:33-35)

As a result, a close bond of brotherly affection existed between Paul and those to whom he ministered. Reference See: Harper's Bible Dictionary page 529.



The Dallas County District Attorney's Office has furnished the following chart so that the public may be more aware of the actual time a person serves in the Texas Department of Corrections on sentences accessed by a judge or jury. The figures are based on the premise that a prisoner becomes a "trusty" at TDC and earns "good" time while he is incarcerated.

Also, it should be noted that parole eligibility falls within the exclusive powers of the Governor of Texas acting through the Board of Pardons and Paroles. Neither the judge nor the jury has the power to determine a prisoner's release from TDC.

Column Reprinted Editor's Note: Clipped the following from the Livestock Market Digest's Monday, July 30 edition. It was writ-

ten by Carol Wilson in a column entitled "Just My Opi-My bill at the grocery store last week was \$137.00.

If I had five kids and a hungry husband at home. that wouldn't have been too bad. But I thought it was terrible price to pay for food for two people.

I was home stashing my supplies in the cabinet when a friend came over. In the midst of my singing the grocery store blues, she commented. "Oh well, you probably bought a lot of meat."

She didn't know that we have half a beef in our freezer. The \$137 went for flour and sugar and canned goods and cabbage, but not for meat. But her comments piqued my interest. Her opinion was a popular one. Most people blame their high grocery bills on the "high" cost of meat.

I decided to do some comparative pricing next time I went shopping. I found that the same grocery store that sells beef loins for 16 cents an ounce charges 31 cents an ounce for halibut steak and 37 cents an ounce for lobster. Something was starting to smell a little fishy.

I like good home grilled hamburgers, so I decided to find out what they were really costing. Ground beef was a bargain at seven cents an ounce. But the accompanying catsup, mustard and mayonnaise retail for six. 16 and nine cents an ounce. Ouch!

In the next aisle, peanut butter was selling for 13

cents an ounce...and an ounce of crackers to go with it cost 26 cents. The new sugar-free jello is selling like hotcakes, at the prohibitive price of \$1.36 an ounce. And corn chips at 90 cents and cheese puffs at 98 cents could sure run the bill up quickly! At those prices, I didn't think eight cents an ounce was too much to pay for a pork roast.

Prepared breakfast cereal was selling for 18 cents an ounce, four cents more than the cost for an ounce of Choice Sirloin steak. Beef was looking like a better buy all the time! I was glad I didn't like steak sauce when I found it would cost 23 cents an ounce to put sauce on my 14 cent steak.

I found that a quarter would purchase an ounce of toothpast or shampoo and razors retailed for 30 cents a piece. Deodorant costs 30 cents an ounce. And you can take a Porterhouse steak home for 20 cents an ounce, a nickel less than it takes to buy a roll of toilet paper.


And the list continues. One ounce of tea bags sells for 89 cents, but we haven't seen a reenactment of the Boston Tea Party. An ounce of Kool-Aid costs 75 cents and coffee goes for 27 cents an ounce. But boneless hams are sold for nine cents per ounce. I just can't figure why peo-

ple will complain about paying eight cents an ounce for Round Steak and turn right around and buy Stove Top stuffing for 16 cents an ounce. That is double the money! I prefer standing over a hot grill tending the beef ribs I bought for six cents an ounce to dusting furniture with my 11 cents an ounce polish. (Mmmm, I can almost taste the barbecue

right now!)

The store was full of paradoxes. Salad dressing mix is sold for \$1.87 an ounce and breakfast bars go for 30 cents. Chuck steak, on the other hand, can be bought for less than a dime. Ounce for ounce, candy bars sell for more than three times the price of Chuck steak.

When steaks are cheaper than paper towels or chocolate chips or coffee, I find it hard to believe that people can gripe about the prices they pay over the meat counter.

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Foreign Ownership Of **U.S. Farmland Small**

While foreign ownership of U.S. farmland is a concern to some people, the level of such ownership is relatively small and has remained fairly stable.


Just over 1 percent of U.S. agricultural land-about 13! million acres-is owned by foreign investors while in Texas that amount is even less-about six-tenths of 1

percent, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Fifty-seven percent of this foregn-owned land in the U.S. is timberland in the eastern one-third of the state, points out Dr. Bill Black.

While the total amount of foreign-owned land in Texas is relatively small, it is

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Co. 110 Sandler Sq. Cisco, TX 76437 spread out over much of the state, adds the economist. Fifty-seven percent of Texas' counties have one of more foreign landowners, with the largest number in Hidalgo County in the Rio Grande Valley. One-seventh of the land in that county

belongs to foreigners. Other countries with a large number of foreign landholders are Cameron, Colli and Harris.

Despite the wide distribution of foreign-owned agricultural land in Texas only 19 percent of the coun-

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ties boast a foreign ownership of 1 percent or more on their land, says Black.

The largest amount of foreign-owned acreage-mostly timber-is in Maine,

Drilling Bits

Flowing 53 barrels of 42-gravity oil and 18 barrels of water per day, the No. 1 Peel-White has been brought on line in the Reb Field, Eastland County, by T.L. Robertson Operating Co.

Location is in the H&TC Survey, A-879, 990 feet from the north line and 2,310 feet from the east line of the survey, three miles north of Eastland.

Robertson took the hole to a 3,590-ft. bottom and perforated the Marble Falls Formation for production at 3,445 to 3,517 feet into the hole.

At a location six miles northwest of Eastland, H.G. Sledge has completed the No. 1 Keller in Eastland County's Reb Field.

The well pumped 55 barrels of 43-gravity oil and 26 barrels of water per day.

With drillsite in the H&TC Survey A-305, the well was drilled to 3,940 feet total depth. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,558 to 3,572 feet into the wellbore.

The well is located 467 feet from the north line and 600 feet from the east line of the survey.

Snow Oil Co. has finaled a new producing wildcat in Eastland County, pumping 38 barrels of 40-gravity oil and 42 barrels of water per day. Drillsite was in the H&TC Survey, A-235, two miles northeast of Cisco. The well is located 2,159 feet from the north line and \$30 feet the east line of the survey and is designated as

the No. 1 McCune. The operator took the hole to a 3,931-ft. bottom and perforated the Marble Falls Formation for production at 3,514 to 3,538 feet.

Pearson & Adams of Abilene are preparing to drill three 4,000-ft. wildcat wells in Eastland County. 

We are having a reemergence of Fire Ants when there should be of less of prominent because of the time of the year. This onslaught of fire ants is due to the excessive rains we have experienced over the last few weeks. The excess amount of water has brought the fire ants from the depths of the ground in an attempt to keep from drowning. They have enlarged their mounds in order to get them above the rain water that is collecting in the heavy rains we have had.

We can attempt to control this new onslaught of the fire ants chemically with the use of Diazinon and or Dursban. However we now have a new method of controlling the fire ant for the first time. This new way to control the fire ants electrocutes (or cooks) the fire ant. It is a mechanical unit that operates with electricity.

The unit is about two feet long with a six inch prong that is inserted into the center of the fire ant mound. An extension cord is attached to the unit to supply the power. The unit is very safe even when the ground is wet. If you happen to touch the prong when the electricity is on you would receive only a slight tickle. This unit is very safe under the adverse weather conditions.

You simply insert the prong into the center of the fire ant mound and let the electricity cook the fire ants. This insertion of the prongs into the fire ant mound distrubs the fire ant to the point they act very crazy. The fire ants that come into contact with the prong that is inserted into the mound are electrocuted. The other fire

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
