Letters From Needy Families Seek Goodfellows Help

Letters from needy families seeking help from the Cisco Goodfellows all contain the same message -

need. But they are all different in the way they are prepared.
A granddaughter writes, "My grandmother could use

a food basket this year if there's any left. She is widowed, and is 81 years old and lives alone. She is on a fixed income. She is not able to cook for herself and she needs to eat a lot of fruit. As far as I know she's never received a basket in the past. Even though she has no children to buy Christmas for, the elderly like to be remembered at Christmas, too. Thank you."

A daughter-in-law writes, "I am filling this out for my mother-in-law. She is on a low fixed income (\$314.00) a month and small amount in food stamps. My son, age 12, lives with her because her health is not good and we've

had a hard time recently. We have other children. She never has had much in her life, she is widowed, but she's the type of person that will share any small amount of food or money or her time with any one who needs it. She would never ask for help herself. All her bills are due around Christmas time so there won't be any left over for Christmas. Any help would be appreciated."

A lady living alone writes, "I do not get money to buy food and it is hard to get by without food stamps. I have been cut off of food stamps for I do not know how long, just \$10.00 worth and that won't buy much food.

However, was appreciated."

An elderly lady who lives with two other elderly women writes, "Two of them is sick. One has sugar diabetes and has been past doing anything for a long time and the other has two cancer operations and is very poorly. I take care of them the best I can. The operations cost lots of money and you can check the drug store and find out how much their drug bill runs. If you have anything, we would be thankful for it."

Another person living alone says they believe they are in need of the Goodfellow's help "due to illness, prescriptions and

drugs and doctor's bills."

A friend of a family of seven writes, "The husband has not been working and the wife has been in the hospital for three weeks and had surgery and no one has had any money coming in. The wife will be off (work) for some time due to the surgery."

Another friend writes concerning a single mother with three children, "She is by herself and trying to make a living for three kids without any help from anyone."

A woman writes, "Because I just get a pension and don't have money for anything at Christmas."

behind on some bills cause we need some groceries and we buy some groceries instead."

A family of seven writes, "I have five children and my husband does not make enough to pay all the bills and buy anything for Christmas. We barely make it on what he makes now. During the holidays it is even harder."

A friend writes about a couple, "The husband had an accident about one and a half years ago. He had an operation on his back because of the accident. His wife works and gets paid every two weeks. After she pays rent and buys a few groceries, they don't have anything left."

The Goodfellows of Cisco had received 28 similar requests by Friday of last week and they had a little over \$1,000.00 to work with in trying to provide Christmas food baskets for those who have requested aid.

Letters of request for help from any family in Cisco will be accepted by the Goodfellows through December 10. The requests are invited for review by the Goodfellows Board of Directors.

The letters must be accompanied by an official Goodfellows application which may be picked up at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office, 619 Conrad Hilton Avenue.

All letters seeking aid

should contain the complete address of the person requesting help and the telephone number, if the family has a telephone. Letters should be mailed to: Goodfellows of Cisco, Box 1072, Cisco, Texas 76437.

Those wishing to make donations to the Goodfellows are asked to mail them to the same address listed above, or give their contributions to one of the directors.

All contributions will be tax deductible, since the local organization was informed on Wednesday of last week that their application for a tax exempt status had been approved. In a letter received from the Internal Revenue Service on Friday, the statement is made, "Donors may deduct contributions to you as provided in Section 170 of the Code."

A donor list will be published in The Press listing donors and their contributions. Anyone wishing their donation remain anonymous will be listed as such upon request.

City Will Begin Actively Enforcing Ordinance

As part of the City's comprehensive efforts at removing health and safety hazards throughout the City and in cleaning up our community, the City, through the Cisco Police Department, shall be actively enforcing local ordinances and state laws in the removal of junked and wrecked vehicles from public and private land.

Local ordinances and state laws provide that any vehicle that does not have a valid safety sticker and a current license tag can be considered a junked or wrecked vehicle. In accordance with these laws, property owners who have such a vehicle will be notified by mail and given ten (10) days to either remove the vehicle or screen it from public view. If the vehicle is not removed or screened within the allotted time, the City will either cite the property owner to court or have the vehicle removed at the owner's expense.

Starting December 1, 1984, the Police Department will be identifying vehicles that are in violation of the law and sending out notices to the property owners regarding the violations. The Police Department will concentrate their efforts on the property owners considered the worst offenders and in the "areas of concentration" as identified earlier by City Hall. The first "area of concentration" will be in the northwestern and western portions of the City.

The administration firmly believes that there are many individuals in the community who want to cooperate and participate with the City in these efforts to remove the blight of junked and wrecked vehicles from our community. Therefore, the City is strongly soliciting from citizens voluntary compliance with these ordinances.

To help this voluntary effort, the City has made ar-

rangements with local wrecker services who are willing, upon request, to come out and remove a junked or wrecked vehicle for the vehicle only-at no cost to the property owner. Anyone interested in having a vehicle hauled away, please call one of the numbers listed below: Ingram Wrecker Service, 442-4413; Edd McGough, 442-3407; and Patton's Auto Salvage, 442-4402.

The City strongly encourages all citizens who have junked or wrecked vehicles on their property to support the city-wide efforts at cleaning up our community and have the vehicles removed. Again, these efforts will be successful only when everyone becomes concerned and participates. Additional information regarding either the mandatory or voluntary vehicle removal program can be obtained by calling the Cisco Police Department at 442-1770 during normal working hours.

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Agricultural Work Has Hazards

Agricultural work is among the most hazardous of occupations.

Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says the agricultural environment is hazardous for a number of reasons.

First, unlike other industries which usually employ safety experts or assign part-time safety responsibility to a supervisor, farm managers must set up their own safe operating procedures without the advantage of corporate guidelines, resources or training in safety.

In addition, each farm or ranch has unique hazards associated with ground cover and landscape features such as hills, gullies, brush, trees, ponds, ditches and nearby roads.

Each farm or ranch also is different in the type and age of machinery and facilities used, Nelson points out. Although some improvements have been made in most new agricultural equipment, no occupations has a higher exposure to the variety of machinery and their moving parts than does agriculture.

A fourth factor affecting agricultural injury rates is the labor force itself. A significant portion of the part-time farm labor force is supplied by the farm family,

including wives and children. Often this labor force is relatively inexperienced in recognizing and coping with agricultural hazards.

General industry can exercise management control over a large group of workers, notes Nelson, but the majority of farms and ranches have no employees outside the owner's family. And no safety regulations apply to family operated farms.

"In no other industry do wives and children get involved in the operation of complex mechanical equipment associated with severe injury potential as in farming and ranching," Nelson points out.

Furthermore, hired farm labor is frequently migratory and relatively unskilled. Such brief periods of employment and language barriers can hamper successful long-term safety training.

Another factor related to farm and ranch safety is the variety of stresses associated with agriculture. Medical experts have contended that agriculture is the occupation with the highest level of general stress in the United States. Extra long work hours, particularly at different seasons of the year, plus the responsibility that goes with managing a farm or ranch, can create severe stress, says Nelson.

Shouldering all the responsibility for planning and managing his business, operating and maintaining a wide variety of hazardous equipment, and usually providing most of the required labor while dealing with many stressful uncertainties can take a heavy toll on farmers and ranchers, says Nelson. Uncertainties include weather conditions, disease and pest conditions, and economic conditions, particularly ever-fluctuating commodity prices and interest rates.

"These unique features of agriculture produce an environment which is loaded with opportunities for severe injury as well as unique stresses which tend to divert a farmer's or rancher's attention away from safety," Nelson says. "However, recognizing that agriculture is a high hazard industry, special attention must be given to safety education and accident prevention if injuries are to be reduced."

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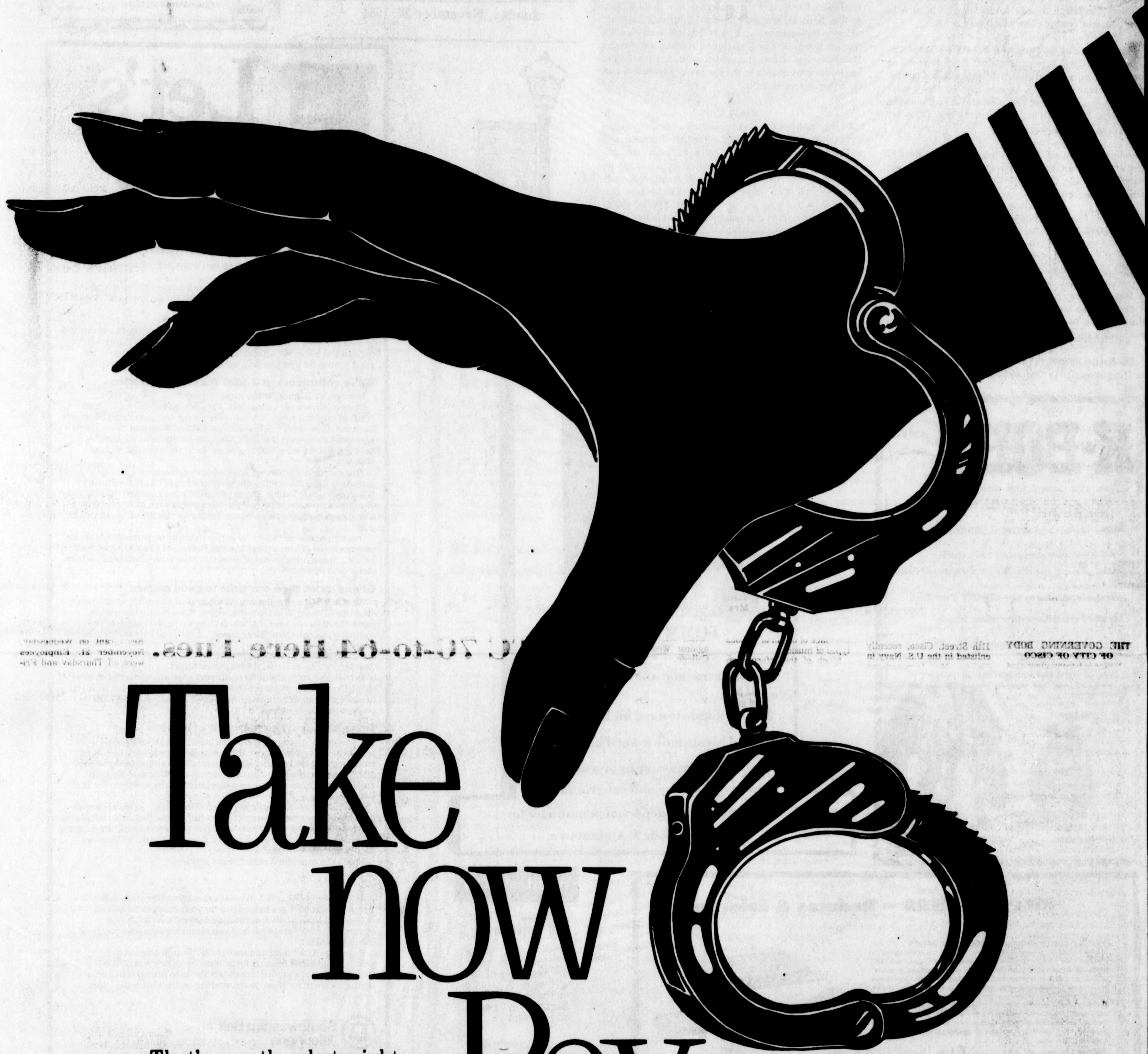
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County News Briefs

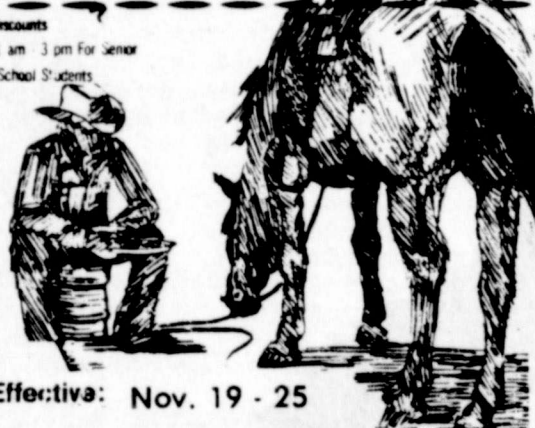

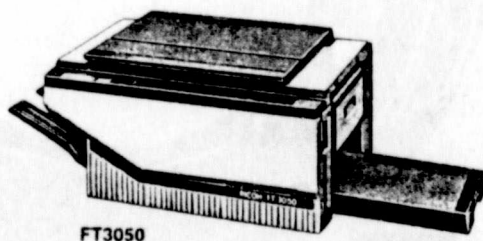

The Eastland County Pecan Show will be held December 7 & 8, for the 32nd consecutive year, reports Charles Walker, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The pecan show is sponsored by the pecan grower's association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. The event will be in the courthouse lobby.

The pecan crop is small due to the drought of the past spring and summer according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. However, he expects some good quality entries for the pecan show.

Anyone producing pecans in 1984 may enter the pecan show. An entry consists of 43 pecans of one variety of 43 native pecans from a single tree. All entries should be sacked and labeled with the grower's name, address and variety of pecans.

All entries of nuts must be entered by 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, December 6. They may be sent or left at the County Extension Agent's office in Eastland prior to December 6.

The first place entries will be sent to the Regional Pecan Show. Entries not winning first place will be sold to pay expenses of the show.

Walker said there will be a class for every variety provided there are at least two entries in that class. There will be a class for the smallest pecans, native

pecans, and seedlings as well as all varieties. Plaques will be given to exhibitors of champion in-shell, shelling and native entries. Rosettes will be awarded for reserve champions and the first three place ribbons will be given in each class.

Pecans will be judged by Extension Service and Experiment Station Horticulturists. They will be judged on the basis of size, color, appearance, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality and other factors.

Members of the pecan grower's association and Eastland Chamber of Commerce will assist with the pecan show work.

After the pecan show on Saturday, the grower's organization will sell shelled and in-shell pecans that do not win first place to help pay expenses of the pecan show reports Walker.

Drilling Bits

First production data have been posted for the No. 2 Crawford-Ritchie, a new producer in the Palo Pinto Regular Field, five miles northeast of Pickwick, Palo Pinto County.

With Ropar Operating Co. as the operator, the well indicated it can pump 15 barrels of 42-gravity oil daily.

Ropar bottomed the well at 2,193 feet total drilling depth. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Upper Strawn Formation, 1,299 to 1,240 feet into the hole.

Drillsite was in the T.W. Moore Survey.

First production data have been filed for the No. 3 Lenoir "A", a new producer in the Stephens Regular Field, seven miles west of Crystal Falls, Stephens County.

With Ridge Oil Co. as the operator, the well indicated it can pump 28 barrels of 42-gravity oil per day, along with 84 barrels of water.

Mobil took the hole to a 3,305-ft. bottom and perforated the Caddo Formation for production at 3,174 to 3,286 feet into the hole.

Raider Oil Co. has finaled a new producer in Stephens County's Manning-O'Conner Field, pumping nine barrels and 65 barrels of water daily. Drillsite was in the T&P Survey, ten miles east of Moran. The well is designated as the No. 6 O'Conner.

The operator took the hole to a 4,104-ft. bottom and perforated the Bend Conglomerate Formation for production at 3,674 to 3,680 feet.


