Public School Teachers Need Support Of Parents

by Wanda Hallmark Morale among local teachers is low and one reason is the new state regulations, according to a recent interview at Cisco Jr., Sr. High School. "Just the interpetation of the new rules is hard enough," responded one teacher.

Other teachers said the paperwork is time consuming and reported that around 30 hrs. a week is needed to fill out the required lesson plans for their classroom teaching.

But, when asked if they still enjoyed teaching, everyone responded with "yes" or "I love it." "It's not as easy to teach students now as it was 10 years ago," one teacher commented. "The pressure on teachers now makes teaching

harder," said another. "The competentcy test we

slap in the face. We go to college and have to pass a teacher's exam and then they tell us we are required to take this test," exclaimed one teacher. Another stated. "People other than teachers can pass this test. Several smart people could be instructors, but only a certain type really care for students and will work extra hours to help them." "If feel like the test is totally useless," said

One of the new rules is that a student must make a grade higher than 69 to pass a course or to be able to participate in extra curricular activities for the next six weeks. When asked if students are learning more because of this rule, the answers were divided. One said students are not learning any more, but, they are not learning any less. One felt like in time students will

learn more.

Only one teacher agreed with the new rules, and that teacher said only 75 per cent

RETIREMENT PLANS

Ulala Howard Burnet and Ella Hudson Day.

J.B.F. Wright is best known for his son "Precious Memories", which was written before he came to Cisco. He lived here in the late 1940's until about 1955, while his brother, the Rev. G.E. Wright, was pastor of the Cisco Church of God.

Ulala Howard Burnet was a teacher in the Cisco schools during that time. She is the composer of "Texas Star" and some other attractive songs.

The best known composition of Ella Hudson Day of Rotan is "Texas, Pride of the South", which has been

widely used. This program is part of the February celebration of the Parade of American Music, a month set aside to call attention to native composers. Since 1955 this event has been sponsored by the National Federation of Music Clubs and Texas Federation, of which the Cisco Music

Club is a part.



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County Roads And **Damaging Traffic**

For a long time Eastland County Commissioners and a number of citizens - particularly those in rural areas - have been aware of increased traffic on county roads.

Some of the heavy traffic has been caused by increased oil exploration in the county, and a lesser amount by large modern farm equipment being moved from one tract of land to another.

Eastland County Commissioners are attempting to deal with the problem of damaging traffic, but realize that it is not an easy matter to solve. The isolation of many of the roads and the difficulty in enforcing load limits calls for some really creative thinking on their part.

Texas statues do provide a mechanism whereby counties may protect their roads, bridges, and culverts from damage from overweight oil field and other equipment. If limits below those allowed on state highways generally are required, the Commissioners Court must adopt these limits and post ap-

propriate signs. Violations of these signs are punishable by fine or imprisonment. Only certain officers are authorized to enforce these limits, however the Department of Public Safety, County Sheriff, or Deputy Sheriffs.

On Jan. 14 Eastland County Commissioners voted to restrict or prohibit damaging travel on rural roads in the county. On Jan. 28 a further reference to this problem was on the agenda. The latest discussion ranged over the kind of signs to erect, load limits, and enforcement. All Commissioners agreed that the problems on these unpaved roads were a lot worse in wet

The weight of vehicles operated upon the public highways of the state are of course regulated by the state. Generally a vehicle operated on public highways shall not have a greater weight than 20,000 lbs. on any one axle, 34,000 lbs. on a tandem axle, or a total weight of more than 80,000

These loads obviously exceed the capacity of many county roads and bridges. The state has given the Commissioner's Court the authority to limit the maximum weights to be transported, moved over and upon any county road, bridge, or culvert.



Eastland County's united effort to "stop giggling" about the GM plant and start working to make it happen moved into high gear this

A group from the County Economic Development Council was in Austin Friday working with the Texas Economical Development Board, making sure that Eastland County's name is firmly in the pot for consideration by GM in its work with the state officials.

In Austin where Carl Conger and Delton Ake, both of Eastland, Ron Butler of Ranger, Monty Montgomery and Tom Clark of Gorman and Dick Woolley of Cisco.

The County Council is make up of these plus Tom Brashier of Ranger, Joe Bennett of Gorman, Brad Kimbrough of Cisco, Don Landers of Rising Star and Kenn Norris of Carbon.

Working hand in hand with the state agency the local county group is updating material and making plans to "put the best foot forward" in the effort to encourage GM or whoever to this area

A public workshop is being planned for Lone Cedar Country Club for March 12 for a public updating and input workshop so that all citizens may be a part of the program. It'll be a round table discussion and a keynote speaker is being lin-

Conger spoke to the Eastland Rotary and Lions Club this week briefing them on the work underway.

A current Newsweek article details the frantic wooing of GM across the country .-

The first thing Illinois Gov. James Thompson did when he heard about General Motors' new Saturn Corp. was to sing a long-pending mandatory seat-belt law - a pet GM cause - that he had taken no position on before. The very next day he called GM chairman Roger Smith to set up an appointment and the day after that he flew through a blinding snowstorm to Detroit, zipped out to the General Motors Technical Center and, for the benefit of photographers, shoehorned his 6-foot-5 frame into a tiny Saturn proto-type car. Said he determined Thompson: "I wanted to be the first in the door.'

That he was - and the door has been revolving ever since. In the wak eof GM's announcement on Saturn four weeks ago, at least five governors and scores of other politicians and industrial-development experts have invaded the company's headquarters in an effort to lure Saturn to their state, county, city or, in one case, city ward. "There is literally no way in the world to know how many states, mayors, governors and development directors have contact the company," said a hurried Stan Hall, the GM spokesman assigned to Saturn. "There are 15 eninto this trances (headquarters) building for one thing, and there are so many conduits into the company that we can't keep up with all the contacts that have been made.'

Small wonder. Saturn, GM's "clean sheet" effort to create not only a state-ofthe-art small car of the future but a brand-new hightechnology company as well, will spend about \$3.5 billion to build its new facility, which will employ some 6,000 workers. But there is much more to Saturn than that; in an attempt to keep transportation, labor and inventory costs to an absolute minimum, Saturn will establish many of its key stamping, engine and other component plants within easy distance of the main assembly facility. That would bring the total number of jobs to 20,000 - enough to turn any politician's head.

As a result, they are pull-ing out all the stops in an effort to snag Saturn. Chicago Mayor Harold Washington called on both God and Mammon - in the persons of the Roman Catholic archbishop, Cardinal Joseph Vernardin, and John Swear-ingen, the chairman of the Continental Illinois Corp. - to head that city's effort to bring Saturn there. Not to be

outdone, the mayor's citycouncil nemesis, Edward (Fast Eddie) Vrdolyak, lived up to his nickname by getting to the GM building ahead of Washington to make a personal pitch to locate the plant in Vrdolyak's own 10th ward. Donald Avenson, speaker of the Iowa House, said his state would pay half of Saturn's first-year payroll if GM would locate there. Gov. John Ashcroft pledge that Missouri would make GM "an offer it can't refuse" - a package including up to \$30 million worth of sewers, roads and other public facilities and another \$30



Prevent Falls For Older Adults COLLEGE STATION --

Anyone can fall, but older adults are more likely to take a tumble and suffer injuries as a result.

Most older adults fall at home doing everyday activities at floor level - not on stairs or from heights. The falls are often caused simply by tripping over low furniture, rugs and clutter on the floor.

"Older adults fall more frequently for several reasons," says Dr. Judith Warren, a gerontologist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics pro-

"Body changes that occur with aging contribute to falls. Eyesight is not as sharp as it once was, and bifocal or trifocal glasses can give the elderly a momentarily distorted picture when changing fields of vision," she explains.

Coordination and balance also change during the aging process, Warren says. "The body doesn't react as quickly, posture changes and older people don't lift their feet as high, which contributes to tripping and falling."

According to the gerontologist, simple, easy exer-

cises can improve coordination and muscle movement for older adults. And rather

than limiting their activities because they fear falling, Warren suggests that older adults take some common sense precautions to prevent mishaps. · Store things so excessive

reaching is not necessary. Don't climb on chairs to reach high places. When extended reaching is necessary, use a sturdy step stool with handbars. · Choose well-fitting and

comfortable clothes, including shoes. Proper fitting shoes give good traction on floors, while walking in slippers or stockings often causes slips on floors and stairs. Clothes with large sleeves and flowing skirts can easily catch on furniture and also cause a fall.

· Install grab bars in the bathtub, shower and next to the toilet to aid in body balance when moving. Tubs and showers should also have slip-proof floor sur-

· Add a low-wattage bed-

side light so that it is not necessary to walk in the dark. Even when the room is very familiar, the possibility of a fall increases with darkness.



May Offensive The night of May 11 marked the beginning of a fullscale Allied offensive in Italy, designed to tear down the last barriers before Rome. For the opening phase, an attack against the strong Gustav Line covering Cassino, all Allied artillery that could be spared was used. The four battalions of the 36th were sent into the Minturno sector to support the 8th Division while dummy pieces were set up in the rear area to Qualiano to mislead the enemy. At 2300 a heavy barrage signalled the opening of the attack; a surprise was complete and initial advances were scored. Hard fighting ensued for several days, but by the 17th, the left side of the enemy's defense line had been reached and the success of the attack assured. With its mission completed on this front, Division Artillery returned to Qualiano to await shipment to Anzio where the second phase soon was to get underway.

Upon arrival at the Beachhead, two battalions, the 131st and 155th were immediately sent to the 1st Special Service Force attacking on the right flank of the beachhead. The 132nd and 133rd prepared to lay down their fires for the 3rd Division whose objective was Cisterna

The Beachhead breakout was launched at 0730, May 22, with only slight progress reported the first day. Continued strong pressure on the Germans during the second day forced the fall of Cisterna. Beyond Cisterna, Cori, too, was taken. The enemy ring of steel which had enclosed the Allied forces was broken. The 36th, in

reserve during the first days of the offensive, was committed May 27 before Velletri. Division artillery units then returned to their respective combat teams.

When Fifth Army attacks in the south met with assured success, the 36th prompty switched to the beachhead at Anzio. There, where a bitter stalemate had lasted from mid-January, preparations were underway for a powerful attack to break out and link up with the forces moving up from the south.

The Division sailed from Pozzuoli near Naples beginning on the 18 of May. Its first bivouac was in a wooded area east of Nettuno. Though traffic and army routine with in the confining perimeter seemed normal, troops and headquarters were both living mole-like, underground. Enemy artillery was light and had been for the preceding two weeks. If notorious "Anzio Annie," the big German railroad gun, dropped in during this time it was not reported. The "Texas" Division followed up through Cisterna and entered the line at the approach to Rome astride the road to Velletri. Velletri

The last barrier to an Allied entry of Rome loomed ahead a line pinned on Velletri and Valmontone.

The City of Velletri lay white and lovely, nestled in the Alban Hills. Velletri faces to the south; it is an ancient town, and Nero once sent his favorite mistress into exile here, but the tired and dirty men of the American 36th Division did not know about that and they did not care. They had been dug into the vineyards

before the town for several days, harassed by snipers and machine guns around them and eighty-eights from the German batteries above Velletri. Early on May 31, two regiments of the 36th silently pulled back from their frontal assault, had circled around to the right side roads and had climbed the two-thousand-foot height behind Velletri before the Germans were aware of it.

It was a gamble. If the Germans could close their lines again, these men might have been lost. If not, they had turned the key in the lock of the great door barring them from the Roman

plains and the capital. At 2255, under the pale light of a new moon, the 2nd Battallion left off and by -130 had crossed the Velletri-Valmontone highway. On their right, men heard the steady exchange of machine gun fire where the 141st was keeping the enemy engaged. Just as the first streaks of gray dawn broke through, the head of the column made its way up the slopes of the objective. There had been no opposition, not a shot fired.

It wasn't until 0800 that the enemy was awakened to what had occurred, and even then, he underestimated the strength of the infiltrating force. The 143rd, combing behind, secured the east end of the Atremisio ridge.

The 142nd, continuing on, hurriedly pushed to complete the hold on the entire hill. German counterattacks were fierce but without avail. The 141st, in the flatland, were on to attack Velletri.

Velletri fell the following day. Hundreds of prisoners were rounded up. German dead lay among the ruins Sunday, February 10 1985

and loss of material to the enemy was extreme.

The German line before was further fighting over the Rome now folded but there Alban Hills and around Lake

Albano. On Mt. Cavo, last resistance was offered by a

group holed-up in a walled castle. The gateway to Rome

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

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AUSTIN-Attorney General Jim Mattox last week urged a Senate panel to increase funding for his agency, and the next day news broke that Mattox has urged a probe of the district attorney who will prosecute his felony bribery indictment in two weeks.

Mattox is scheduled for trial Feb. 11 on a charge of commercial bribery stemming from a 1982 incident in which he allegedly threatened to put a Houston law firm out of the bond business unless they ceased attempting to question his sister in an unrelated legal matter.

He had asked the Senate Finance Committee last Wednesday to give him funds to recover outstanding court judg-ments owed the state, and told them: "If you take Jim Mattox, my personality, my political hangups out of it (your decision) and look at this and give it some money, I'll go out there and collect some of that dough." Abilene Sen. Grant Jones asked why he hadn't already been collecting the money.

The next day, House Speaker Gib Lewis confirmed he had received a letter from Dave Richards, Mattox's executive assistant, urging a probe of District Attorney Ronnie Earle's office.

Lewis said he was hesitant about starting an investigation just two weeks before the trial. "It was a spooky deal," Lewis said.

Speaker Lewis did not reveal the name of the individual who had complained to Mattox's office about the alleged misuse of state funds by Earle's Gov. Bill Hobby introduced his

Taking A Risk

Most legislators are taking a hands off attitude on the affair, following Lewis' example, letting justice take its course in what promises to be an historical courtroom battle between Mattox and the Travis County DA.

Given the impact this case may have on the course of Texas politics, it's surprising that the controversy has waited until two weeks pre-trial to erupt again. A spokesman for the DA said they had been waiting for someone to create a diversion prior to the trial, and Lewis, himself, said the Mattox request "smelled a little bit of politics."

But Mattox's assistant Richards said he felt compelled to send the probe request to the House, and although the move might be misinterpreted by some, it was "taking a risk."

Standing In Line

Of course, Mattox's future is on the line. If found guilty, he will face pressure to resign, rather than appeal, even if he gets probation. If he doesn't resign, he will surely face primary opposition from his own Democratic Party in '86, a race he probably couldn't win under the cloud of a conviction.

If Mattox is acquitted, he will still carry the indictment in his political baggage, and he will surely draw opponents. Among the Democrats, there is already mention of '84 U.S. Senate candidates Kent Hance and Lloyd Doggett, state Sen. Kent Caperton and Tyler attorney John Hannah. Among Republicans, former AG candidate Bill Meier and state Sen. Buster Brown have surfaced their interest.

Observers note that people are standing in line to run against Mattox next year, despite his record as a highly effective, though controversial, attorney general. But although Mattox raised \$750,000 early this year, his war chest will likely be decimated by legal

plan to avoid cuts in higher education funds by tripling tuition at state colleges and universities by 1987. The plan would still leave the institutions about \$133 million short of current spending levels over the next two years.

Speaker Pro Tem Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, filed the parimutuel wagering bill but with changes that threaten its passage. Berlanga omitted a statewide referendum clause but gives veto power to voters in counties where racetracks may be located. Governor Mark White earlier this year said he would veto any bill without the statewide referendum clause.

Some minority legislators are considering withdrawing support unless part of the proceeds are dedicated to welfare programs. Berlanga thinks he can persuade them all, including Gov. Mark White, to support his bill which failed to pass by two votes last session.

Stacy Dam Agreement

Stacy Dam and Reservoir, planned for construction on the upper Colorado River, hasn't gotten a lot of publicity, but efforts to stop it almost ruined passage of the Texas Water Plan, the omnibus water legislative plan now undergoing

Last week Central and West Texas water agencies agreed to terms for building Stacy Dam, and may have cleared the way for quick passage of the legislation. West Texas lawmakers, angry at efforts to halt the dam, threatened to bottleneck the legislation unless an agreement was made.

The dam will be built about 50 miles east of San Angelo, where water is a precious commodity.

Oil Price Drop

The decision by OPEC last week to drop oil prices by as much as \$1.40 a barrel left state officials without much hope for averting the budget crunch. As the price drops closer to \$25/ barrel, they remember State Comptroller Bob Bullock's forecast of another budget estimate reduction being forced at that magic number.



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
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
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
