A STORY OF interest to our area appeared in the Tuesday, March 5 edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram in the front page column written by George Dolan. The article deals with the old flea market tank at Putnam.

Entitled "Ideas come by tankful for former flea market" the article was written as follows:

There's a "For Sale" sign on an old 64,000 barrel crude oil tank near Putnam that during its heyday was the subject of a half-page story in the New York Times and a commentary by Charles Kuralt on CBS News.

And that heyday had nothing to do with oil. It came during the eight years when the tank housed a flea market.

It's a tank with a special magic that sparks imaginations, says owner R.W. Reynolds.

He says he has been approached by people with all sorts of ideas for it. Among them:

•"Some trucking people from Alabama want to put in a truck stop and cafe."

• "A producer of mesquite wood chips wants it for a factory site." •"A guy in the Middle East wants it for an antique

shop." •"Two fellows would like to build homes in it."

• "And just the other day it was suggested that it might be used to bottle mineral water, since Putnam has a plentiful supply."

The old tank, along Interstate 20 a mile east of Putnam, Callahan County, was one of three tanks built on a 15-acre site by Humble, which is now Exxon, **Reynolds** says.

They were used to store crude oil during the 1930s but had outlived their usefulness in the late 1940s. They were purchased by a group of seed men who used

them to store milo maize under the government grain loan program. Then Reynolds, who was

superintendent of Putnam schools, bought the tanks for storing milo, wheat, oats, peanuts and hay. "Before I could get started

"Flea markets were just being introduced to this part of West Texas, so this one did a booming business," Reynolds says.

He sold the other two tanks back to Exxon during the steel shortage of the mid-70s. Exxon used the material for construction of tanks on the Gulf Coast.

Now Reynolds, after triple-bypass surgery, has slowed his pace. He operates an antique store closer to Abilene. The flea market hub-bub is absent. "I feel as lonely," he con-







Your car breaks down on a lonely stretch of highway late at night. You need to signal for help, but like most drivers, you're not carrying emergency flairs or a CB radio. To get help, you have to leave the safety of the car.

Now a lifesaver for stranded motorists is as close as your glove compartment. It's called a Highway Emergency Banner, available from the non-profit National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW), Greater Minneapolis Section, and it helps a driver call for help. The banner is easly secured to a car rear window with preaffixed double-faced tape. Reflective lettering makes the words CALL POLICE, printed in eightinch florescent letters, visible both day and night.

Some 150,000 banners have been distributed nationally in the past six weeks since they became available through the NCJW. Proceeds go to community service programs. The banner began with volunteers working at the kitchen table in a member's home. But a notice about the banners in the syndicated Dear Abby newspaper column

YIELDS HIGH RETURN FOR COMMUNITY

Tested by a simple fundraising idea that bloodsomed into a national revenueproducing effort, a group of local volunteers found that they could act with all the business acumen of corporate executives.

And in the case of the Highway Emergency Banner project, the bottom line is an important contribution to community service.

Initiated as an allvolunteer project by the **Greater Minneapolis Section** of the National Council of Jewish Women, the emergency banner program revealed a national demand for the simple safety device. When 1,700 requests appeared in a recent Friday's mail, sixteen volunteers were hastily called together to work a ten-hour day processing the orders. When yet another 20,000 requests appeared the following Monday and orders grew by the tens of thousands each successive day, the volunteers shifted from clerical duties to implementing management initiatives to meet the growing demand.

Donated office space soon replaced the living room. Electric letter openers replaced serated kitchen knives. Telephone lines were ordered and installed. Ban-

the NCJW was not only to fulfill the orders efficiently,

but also to return the proceeds to the community. Sheltered workshops were contracted to package orders. Seniors, displaced homemakers, the handicapped and others in need now process orders which continue to arrive in batches of hundreds. Proceeds are returned to community service projects that benefit women, children and the elderly.

"The demand for banners exploded in just three weeks,

" noted Judith Traub, section president. "In this effort, every step provides a community service and the end result assures that car trouble will not become car tragedy."

Eastland County History

One of the grand old men of the Carbon community was Rev. W.B. Cobb, who first settled in the county near Cisco at what was then known as Red Gap, where he with Rev. C.G. Stephens organized the Red Gap Baptist Church in or about 1877. He probably moved to the farm so long owned by him, near Carbon, in 1878 or 1879 as he organized the Live Oak Bpatist Church, afterwards the Jewel Baptist Church, in 1879 and was one of its charter members.

He assisted in the organization of the Red Gap Baptist Association in 1878 and was prominent in that organization for many years. In 1883 he was in the organization of the Carbon

Baptist Church and was its pastor until 1886 and probably a member of that body until his death. He was active in the service of his master for many years filling the pulpits of Carbon and other neighboring churches until incapacitated by age.

Another of the beloved preacher citizens of the Carbon community was Rev. I.N. Reeves, familiary known as "Uncle Ike." He was born in Lawrence Coun-

ty Alabama December 18, 1830 and died at his home near Carbon, December 13, 1910, lacking but five days of reaching four score of years, sixty of which were spent preaching the gospel. During the civil war he was chaplain of the 16th

Mississippi Regiment and continued to be active in the ministry in his native state until his coming to Texas in 1875, where he joined the North-West Texas Conference and continued with that body until 1893 when he was superanuated. He spent the last twenty years of his

life as a resident of the Carbon community. "Uncle Ike" as he was familiary called much to his pleasure, was a man of strong convictions which he

When we hear how people came to America to escape religious persecution we usually think first of the Pilgrims in New England. There were a number of others, however, people lesser known but still enduring much in order to have freedom of worship.

Not only was religion a cause for the settlement of American and the southwest, but political and economic repression also played a big part.

The Wendish people have a number of reasons for taking time out to celebrate. In Europe they were an ancient but embattled race - they trace their origins to Mazan, one of the grandsons of Noah.

The Prussians conquered them in 1167 following a 300 year war of extermination. After that many assimilated into the Prussian (later German) culture.

By 1800 the minority who held on the Wends conservative religious beliefs. customs and language settled in the Lusatia area along the Spree River, which is now in East Germany.

The Prussian King had them in one place and he hit them hard. He denied them citizenship, property ownership, and admission to professional guilds. They were ordered to take German names, speak the German language, and join a stateregulated church.

It was the church order which proved to be the final blow. The Wends, believing this would dilute their pure Lutheran faith, made plans to come to America. A small group had already come to Texas, and they decided to follow

The stormy voyage from

Europe lasted 80 days, and 74 out of the 500 who began the voyage died of cholera and yellow fever. The survivors landed at Galveston, and walked and rode ox carts to Lee County. The first years there must have been extremely hard. They bought land for \$1 per acre, and had little left in the way of money. There were few tools and food was scarce. But eventually they

managed to build a church, begin a town, survive the

Civil War, and make their homes more comfortable. After the war more Wends came to join those already in Texas.

But on the frontier the very thing began to happen that they had worried about in Prussia. They found that they were becoming closer to their German neighbors so close, in fact, that some Wends were marrying Germans and many were speaking German instead of Wendish. They got along very well together, in fact, helping each other in various

ways. In 1929 the last Wendish services were held in St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Serbin. But today there is revived interested in the Wendish language, customs and beliefs. The Texas Wendish Society was formed in 1971 so Wends across Texas could help save their disappearing culture. It has been estimated that 100,000 people of Wendish blood live in America today, with 7,000 in

Texas.

And what is left of the Wendish culture in Eastland

County? More than a person would think, at first glance. For it is hard to weed out ways of thinking and ways of doing things, in a people which - like the German were family oriented.

Ther is an enduring love of the land, a love or order, love of the home and the church. There is hospitality, selfreliance, and even a love of gardens and flowers.

Go past some of the farms south of Cisco and see if the land is being taken care of. Or go past Ed Wende's home in Cisco any day of the year and see what is in bloom. If you don't se anything outside, you can be sure that his carefully tended greenhouse is bursting with colorful blooms.

"I think Ed's mother, Ida, taught him how to raise flowers, smiles Mrs. Wende. "She always had beautiful ones out on the farm, even when she had to save dishwater to water them with. She was great on gardents, too.'

And the thought comes that agriculture will have a better chance of survival if some of these skills are prac-

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

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

A LOT OF progress has been made in the past dozen years in oil drilling equipment. That's the conclusion we reached the other night when we accepted an invitation to visit the site of TAD Energy's oil test on the W.B. Wright, Jr., Ranch northeast of town.

The drilling rig started work on Monday, Feb. 25, and the hole was bottomed at 3,999 feet in the Ellenburger lime on Friday, March 1. They used diamond tipped drilling bits that go through rock formations a lot faster than when we last visited a drilling rig in the early 1970s. They drill 24 hours a day.

Mr. Mike Anderson, boss man of TAD Energy, was on hand while a crew from a service company was running an electric log. While we watched, they lowered equipment measuring about 30 feet long and weighing around 500 pounds into the hole. It went to the bottom and the logging began as they slowly pulled the instrument out.

Mike spent the entire night there, he told us next day. The log result was such that they believed the well can be completed as an oil and/or gas producer, so they ran pipe to the bottom and had it cemented. The cement must set at least 72 hours.

They've drilled a couple of other wells on the Wright place lately with good pro-
