## Delegation Attends Monday School Board Meet

Mrs. Curt (Sue) Covert was declared the winner of the April 6th school board Place 6 election after a ballot recount at the monthly meeting of the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District Monday night.

Mrs. Covert had received 128 votes to 126 for Bill Kendall in last Saturday's election. Mr. Kendall asked for a recount of the ballots because of the close vote. A committee composed of Ted Fields, Dean Madison and Ken McCullough was appointed by the board to re-

count the votes.

The committee found the count as turned in by Mrs. Thelma Smith, election judge, to be accurate. It was determined, however, that nine absentee ballots were still sealed in an envelope and had not been counted. All nine of the ballots were for Mrs. Covert, and this increased her margin of victory to 11 - 137 to 126.

The committee's findings were not announced until after the board meeting was adjourned, and it was decided to hold an emergency meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday,

April 9, to swear Mrs. Covert in as a trustee. The board was to elect officers after the ceremony.

Emmett Rich, member of the board for nine years, was sworn in Monday night by County Judge Scott Bailey. He was unopposed for re-election and received 260 votes in Saturday's election.

A delegation of more than 100 school patrons attended the meeting, which was held at the high school auditorium. The Rev. Ronnie Shackelford, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, served as spokesman for the

group. The delegation asked the school board to re-consider its decision last month to reduce the agriculture faculty to one teacher, pointing

out that 76 students were enrolled in the program. Board President Howard Worley had reported that the faculty reduction was ordered as an economy

measure.

Complying with recently enacted state laws, the board found that they had an alternative of reducing the staff or raising taxes, school officials pointed out. The board agreed to reconsider the matter at a future meeting.

David Gill, local fireman, appeared to show the board an electronic device that would enable school officials to have immediate contact with police, firemen or the hospital. He said it costs about \$185 and that the PTO would purchase one for each school if the board approves. The board promised to look

into the matter.

The resignation of LeAnn Agnew, 6th grade teacher, was accepted. Supt. James Couch reported that Miss Agnew planned to move to Austin after the school year ends.

The transfer of 11 students into the Cisco district was approved by the board.

## 281 Voters Elect Officials Saturday

A total of 281 voters went to the polls here Saturday and elected two city, two school and two hospital board members for terms of office to begin this month.

Mrs. Curt (Sue) Covert scored a 137-to-126 victory over Bill Kendall for Place 6 of the Cisco Public School board of trustees in the only contested race. Mrs. Thelma Smith, judge of the election, reported that "we counted and re-counted" before determining the victor. Returns of the election were canvassed and certified Monday night.

John Gerhardt, who filed and withdrew as a candidate, received 9 votes. Emmett Rich was re-elected without opposition. Hold-over board members are Howard Worley, Dr. Allen McGinness, Bobby Smith, Ralph Berry, and Roland Stroebel.

In the City Council election, incumbent Roy Dennis received 211 votes and Bill Roberts received 201 votes for the two vacancies. They were to be sworn in at the regular April 9th meeting of the council, which includes Mayor Eris Ritchie, Mayor Pro Tem Bobby Ingram, Linton Baiteas, Brad Kimbrough, and Joe Besselaar.

Dr. Vergil Patrick and Mrs. DeAlva Chambers were re-elected to the board of directors of the Cisco Hospital District. They will be sworn in for new terms at the regular meeting April 22nd. Other members of the board are Dr. Charles M. Cleveland, president, Dr. E.E. Addy and Mrs. Emma Lee Donovan.

M.L. Bailey served as judge for the city and hospital elections. Voting was at the Laguna Hotel's Corral Room.

## City Trucks Helping In Clean-Up Campaign Here

City trucks were busy this week helping to haul off trash, debris, and tree limbs for Cisco residents during the annual Cisco Spring

Clean-Up Campaign which began Monday, April 8th, and will continue through Friday, April 12th.

City Manager Mike Moore reminded citizens to pile their debris in containers along with tree limbs near the curb where they usually put their trash. Those with unusually large amounts of debris or limbs were asked to call the City Hall. A work order will be issued to facilitate handling of large loads, Mr. Moore said.

The city landfill was to be open throughout the clean-up campaign every day, April 8 through April 13. Normally, the landfill is open Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays.

Mr. Moore urged citizens to "make a real effort to

clean up our community." He also said, "Citizens are encouraged to mow their lawns, especially after the spring rains, and to keep them mowed throughout the summer."

He indicated that not only will this effort help beautify the city, but will also help greatly in controlling mosquitoes and improve the general health conditions.

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce also urges citizens to become involved in the clean-up since the month of April will bring many visitors to the city with the Cisco Folklife Festival set for the last weekend of the month. Also scheduled for the month of April are the All-School Reunion and the Eastland County Health Fair.

Can you remember the days of the steam engine trains? Perhaps not many can, but Ciscoans will have a unique opportunity to see one come "chugging" through town at least once during Texas' Sesquicentennial celebration next year...and there's even a possibility of being able to RIDE on the old antique passenger train, the Texas and Pacific No. 610!

These possibilities will be presented to all interested persons this afternoon (Wednesday, April 10) at 4:00 p.m. in the Community Room of the First National Bank when Dan Catania and Andy Briscoe of the "Texas Independence Express" visit Cisco. Mayor Eris Ritchie has invited one and all to come to the presentation at the bank, which should last no more than an hour.

Catania and Briscoe will show slides and describe the promotional activities now going on to get the old T&P No. 610 "out of mothballs" and operational for the Sesquicentennial. Their program will include color slides and information regarding securing "stock certificates" which will convey special privileges for discounted rides on the train when it comes through. The train will be dubbed the "Texas Independence Express."

The two will fly into the Cisco airport Wednesday afternoon after having made other presentations in Midland and San Angelo earlier in the day.

"If you're the least bit 'nostalgic' or if you simply loved the old steam engine trains, you'll want to come to the meeting this afternoon," the mayor concluded.

# Harrington Grant To Help

Canyon, Texas... This year, in the musical drama "Texas," the engineer can drive his train along the base of the towering cliff of the Palo Duro Canyon with new confidence. A new engine is under construction for the branch of the "Peavine Railroad", because the engine built by Pete Cowart in 1966 had become old and faltering. There will also be new sets including a more imposing ranch house, many new costumes, revised lighting, and a sense of renewal about the whole show.

These exciting changes are possible through a grant from the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation. It is for \$180,000, large enough so that the Director has been able to employ experienced professional designers to direct the refurbishing of the show.

George Petit of Dallas who designs the Marriott theme parks and Knott's Berry Farm has made the sketches for the sets and L. Lynn Hunt, production designer for Disneyland has been here to consult with Director Neil Hess and Sound and Light Director, Pat Jarrett, about the most effective ways to use lighting in the Pioneer Amphitheatre.

It is rare for a Foundation to approve a grant for such a purpose. The interest in the members of the Board of the Harrington Foundation stem from Sybil Harrington's experience in the theatre. Some time ago, she began to help the Metropolitan Opera by financing new productions of old and new operas from her own funds. In a conversation with Beth Duke of Amarillo Globe Times, she

mentioned that she felt that this was a lasting way to help the arts, since the sets and costumes for each production are used for many years. It is also a way to aid the creative people needed in the theatre: the set designers, costumes scenic artists, etc. Her contributions of this kind in New York have been so significant that she was chosen for

the Distinguished Achievement to Music Award for "Outstanding contribution to cultural health and civic endeavors, in particular the Metropolitan Opera" in November of 1982.

When Mrs. Harrington was Woman of the Year in Amarillo in 1980, several of her friends mentioned her interest in making things beautiful and done well.

Following the pattern set by Mrs. Harrington in New York, the Board of the Harrington Foundation made a grant to the Lone Star Ballet last year to purchase new sets, some costumes and new lighting for the "Nutcracker" and the stunning 1984 performance were the result.

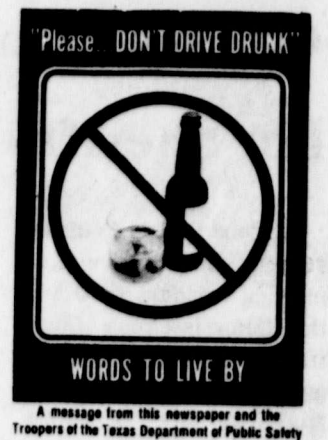
Now "Texas" is fortunate enough to receive the same kind of help, and the refreshed production will open on the twelfth of June celebrating its twentieth season.

## County Commissioners Approve Cars For Sheriff - Other Agenda Items

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting Monday, April 8 in the Commissioners Courtroom. All Commissioners were present: Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

A number of items were on the agenda, some of them requiring the expenditure of County funds for various projects.

The first matter, however, dealt with a request for permission to cross County Road 454 in Pct. 2 with a pipeline. Gilbert Meredith, for Enserch Corp. Inc. made the request. Approval was granted.

On the next item, Richard L. Johnson brought a request that the Commissioners approve a Plat for subdivision - Willow Beach 11, on the C.C. Nelson Property on Lake Leon. He explained that Willow Beach 11, on the south side of the Lake, was approved in 1965, and that this was an addition to same.

Willow Beach 11 consists of about 30 lots on a hill behind the lake front lots in the first subdivision. The lots have already sold, he said. They cannot get under water in the event of Lake flooding, he added.

The request was approved by the Commissioners.

Sheriff Don Underwood appeared before the Commissioners with two re-

quests, that an amount be set for the Sheriff's Petty Cash fund, and that the Commissioners consider replacing some of the vehicles in use by his Department.

The Commissioners approved a Petty Cash Fund of \$300 for the Sheriff's Department. This will be a revolving fund, and the Sheriff to turn in cash tickets for expenditures each month.

Underwood said the vehicles in use by the Sheriff's Department were worn out and inadequate for the workload of his Department. During one weekend, in particular, one car was in Rising Star on a call and the other conveying a mental patient to the State Hospital in Wichita Falls - so there was

nothing on hand in Eastland in case of an emergency.

Underwood said he had been consulting with the Department of Public Safety, and they advised him that they had several Supervisor's cars for sale in Austin. The prices would be \$4250 per vehicle. He requested that the Commissioners authorize a letter of Intent to Purchase from the DPS.

This request was approved, with a request from the floor that the budget be amended to accommodate these purchases.

Other business again concerned rural road matters. A request came from Scranton that the Commissioners put speed limits on the community roads out there - that vehicles of various types were being driven in a reckless and dangerous manner.

In the discussion which followed, Commissioners exchanged stories from all the Precincts, with the apparent conclusion that fast driving was a County-wide problem. All expressed a desire to look into the matter further, and talk to more people in the

Scranton area.

Approval was granted for an additional phone line for the Courthouse computer, and an air conditioner was considered for the Probation office. A check will be made to see if one is already available for this Department. Other furnishings will possibly be needed for this office.

After a noon recess, bills, claims and accounts occupying most of the afternoon meeting.

**Cong. Charles Stenholm Reports...  
1232 Longworth Ofs. Bldg.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - A federal report concerning Medicare payments made to rural hospitals is long overdue, Congressman Charles Stenholm said last week in a speech in the House of Representatives.

Speaking on behalf of small hospitals, Congressman Stenholm called for "the prompt delivery" of a report being conducted by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). The study, which was due to be released seven months ago, will determine how the Diagnosis Related Group (DRG) payments affect rural hospitals. Congressman Stenholm, and other rural area representatives, believe the current reimbursement system favors urban area and is unfair to small town hospitals.

"The payment system assumes that rural wages and other costs are lower

than those in urban areas," Stenholm said. "Because of this theory, rural hospital reimbursements currently are 25 to 47 percent less than those to their urban counterparts for precisely the same services. I am convinced this is entirely unfair."

Congressman Stenholm, who presented President Ronald Reagan with a work paper on the same subject at a private meeting two weeks ago, said the report should have been released by Secretary Margaret Heckler's office in August, 1984. The delay is costly to rural hospitals, which have had to operate under the unfair system. The group of congressmen has asked that the system be modified as soon as possible.

When the study is released, the administration will have the option to rectify the system.

The Stamford Democrat

cited several imbalances in the DRG program during his special order address. He said the DRG formula does not take into account that in order to provide quality care, rural hospitals must pay competitive salaries to the sparsely-populated areas. Hospitals in small towns also do not have the opportunity to buy goods in quantity, at discount prices, like larger hospitals do.

Rural areas, Stenholm continued, also have a disproportionately higher percentage of elderly residents than metropolitan areas. On the average, elderly patients require more care and a longer hospital recuperation period. The higher percentage of elderly citizens should be considered in the DRG formula, Stenholm said. Such a consideration would greatly aid the rural hospitals.

The congressman gave a brief sketch of the 17th District to make his point. According to the 1980 census figures, the median age in the country was 30.0. At the same time, the median age in 27 out of the 35 counties in the 17th District was higher than the national average. Coke County had the highest median age of 44.3. The median age for Eastland County was 39.2 in 1980.

Along with a high median age, the percentage of resident aged 65 or over is higher in the district than in the nation. The national rate of elderly citizens was 11.3, but

in the district that percentage is 15.6. Coleman County has a population of 10,349, or which 25.6 percent is at least 65. Eastland County has an elderly population that makes up 23.2 percent of the residents here.

"In my district, this situation is coupled with the fact that my constituents live in areas where many have to travel quite some distances to receive health care. The sparsity of the population and the size of the hospitals may not be typical for the nations, but that make those West Texans no less deserving than other Americans of access to quality health care. The only way they're going to continue receiving that care is if the DRG formulas are adjusted to allow the rural hospitals to survive," Stenholm said.

The four hospitals in Eastland County list 190 beds.

**Sen. Bob Glasgow Reports

A Conference Call with Senator Bob Glasgow and area newspaper representatives on Monday, March 11 brought news of the latest developments in School Legislation and other matters.

Speaking from Austin, Glasgow first mentioned what he called "The Horseracing Bill". (This was apparently the bill concerning Pari-mutual betting).

"I have had a lot of inquiries about the 'Horseracing Bill,'" he said.

"When this first came up, it was only 3 votes short of passing. But a lot of people jumped ship, and 97 voted against it.

"There is a Horseracing and Greyhound (Dogracing) bill in the Senate at the present time. But I understand the Speaker won't put a bill back on the floor if the House didn't pass it. So I consider the Horseracing and Dogracing bills dead for this session."

Senator Glasgow expressed a very strong opinion against the present HB 74 rules on School Extracurricular activities. He referred to the rule where one failing grade (under 70) disqualifies a student for sports, band, stock shows or other extra activities for a 6 wk. period.

"It is unfair - abusive to children - no one favors it," the Senator said.

He introduced a Bill last Tuesday to change the period of suspension from 6 wks. to one wk.

"The Senate then passed a Resolution to that effect," he explained, "but the State Board of Education (15 members appointed by Gov. White) simply said they were not going to change that rule.

"The Senate then voted not to confirm the State Board of Education," Glasgow told members of the Conference Call. "So now they will have at least a week's ineligibility.

"A Resolution is expected from the House before we vote to confirm or not confirm them."

The Senator also discussed bills he had introduced to modify other aspects of HB 74. One is about the rule

which states that a teacher may not have more than 22 students in a classroom. Glasgow said he believes there should be some leeway in using aides in a classroom if there are only a few students above the 22.

Another Bill would set up summer Pre-Kindergarten for "deprived" children. This project would cost around 90 million, he said. Upon being questioned, Glasgow said that many of these students were non-English speaking, and the children of illegal aliens. Under Federal law, Texas is required to educate the children of illegal aliens.

Other matters were about Tutorial classes - not too successful - and the County Court-At-Law being set up in Johnson County.

"I believe the election of Judiciary will be resolve this session," Senator Glasgow said.

## 40 Years Later

**Milan**  
On our last morning in our hotel across the Venetian Lagoon, we gathered for breakfast. We had a great view as the three sides of the restaurant were enclosed with glass.

As we were just across the street from the landing stage for water buses and gondolas and 10 minutes from Venice, many people were going to work there, and it seems an equal number was coming across to work on the Lido Island, where we stayed.

Our tour buses had left early on the ferry for the mainland, but by the time we were ready to depart, a heavy fog had rolled in and all water transportation had been stopped for awhile. This gave us another opportunity to walk in the town and view the shops, which were closed as this was Monday. When the fog lifted, we went by motor boat to the mainland in Milan, we saw many Manufacturing plants, that had familiar names, Ford, GMC, Coca-Cola, Carrier, etc.

The industry is located in northern Italy, in the triangle that includes the three cities of Milan, Turin and Genoa. Italian craftsmen are proud of the excellence of the machines they make such as automobiles, sewing machines, motor scooters, typewriters, business machines and machine tools. The Po Valley is the most important region of Italy. It has the greatest number of people, the greatest density of population, the most cities, the best railway and road systems, the most agriculture, and the most industry.

The valley is fertile and has rainy winters and dry summers. The melting of the snows of the Alps furnish

water which is distributed through great canals during the summer months. This region is called the Lombardy Plains.

Milan, population 1,582,534, met area, 2,600,000 at 367 feet, is the second largest city in Italy. Capital of the province of Milan, it is the chief financial and banking city of northern Italy. In Italian, its name is Milano, and is about 165 miles west of Venice.

Italy has very few lakes, however the ones they do have are located in this area, and our guide pointed them out to us, Lake Garda is the largest, and Lake Iseo and Lake Como.

Milan's written history began about 222 B.C. when the Romans took the city from the Gauls. In the time of Constantine the Great it was considered the second city of the Roman Empire.

It was attacked and partly destroyed by the Huns and again by the Goths, who killed most of the people and then burned the city. It was rebuilt, but was again burned to the ground by the Emperor Frederick I. Milan

was rebuilt again and became the strongest of the great city republics of Northern Italy. It joined a league of Italian cities that defeated Frederick in 1176. Milan became a duchy of the powerful Visconti family 100 years later.

Milan passed into the hands of Austria, and later became the capital of the Napoleonic kingdom of Italy. Milan was restored to Austria in 1815 and continued to be the capital of the Austro-Italian kingdom until 1859. In that year it became a part of united Italy under the House of Savoy. Milan was a thriving city at the outbreak of World War II. It had a prosperous trade in food products and manufactured artificial silk, motorcars and other commodities. It was during World War II, Allied bombs destroyed much of the city. The defeat of Italy left Milan poverty-stricken. The Italians dragged the body of Mussolini through the streets of Milan, after he had been assassinated. He was buried in a papuer's cemetery there in August, 1957. After World War II, the city began an extensive rebuilding program. New homes, offices and factories rose on the damaged sites. The first skyscrapers in Italy were in Milan. They were

the first buildings we noticed as we approached the city, as there are no skyscrapers in the south, nor in Venice or Florence.

It was later in the afternoon, that we drove to the square to see the Milan Cathedral. The sun was shining directly on the face of the building, and it seemed to be made of gold.

It was very beautiful and striking sight. This great Gothic cathedral is the third largest church in Europe. It ranks next to Saint Peter's in Rome and the cathedral in Seville, Spain.

Its foundation was laid by Gian Visconti in 1385. From 1805 to 1813, it was completed by order of Napoleon I. Marble was carried by boat on the Ticino River and the Naviglia Grande (Grand Canal) from the quarries of Candoglia for its construction.

The cathedral is built of white Carrara marble in the form of a Latin cross. It is 490 feet long and 180 feet wide. The tower rises 354 feet high, and affords the beautiful view of the distant Alps and the country surrounding Milan.

The colors of the marble in the building of the Duomo of Milan are indefinable, between grey, golden yellow, brown, pale pink, and violet, depending on the direction of

the light, as our guide said, that the marble covering the building is a rosy white, lightly pearly with incarnate shades and bluish veining.

This building does have a name and was directed to Maria Nascente, but to all Italians is the Duomo, (The Cathedral).

Over 2,000 statues set in niches in the walls cover the outside of the cathedral. A maze of marble spires, each bearing a life-size statue of a saint, Biblical character, or historical figure, rises from the roof of the cathedral.

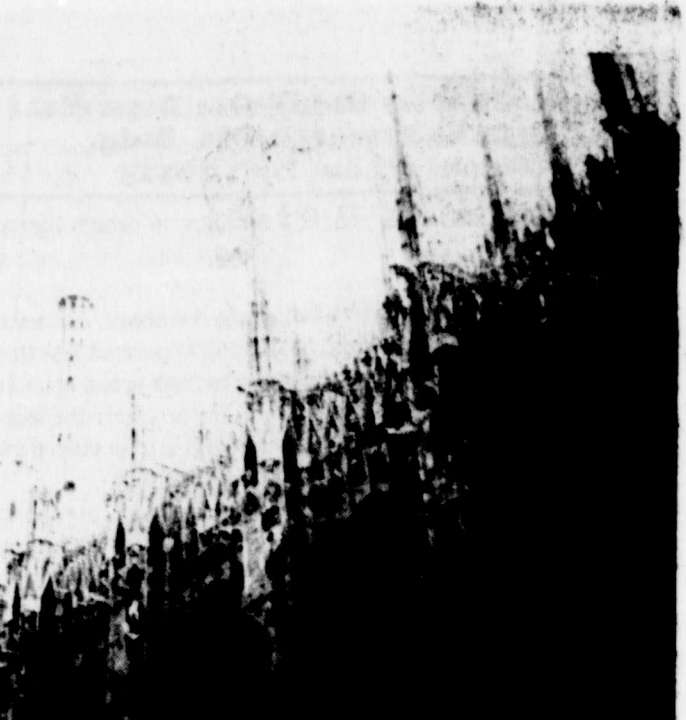
The windows tell Biblical stories in a stained glass.

Many great figures of Milan's history are buried in the cathedral. There are many precious treasures that the Duomo has collected, paintings, statues, tomb monuments,

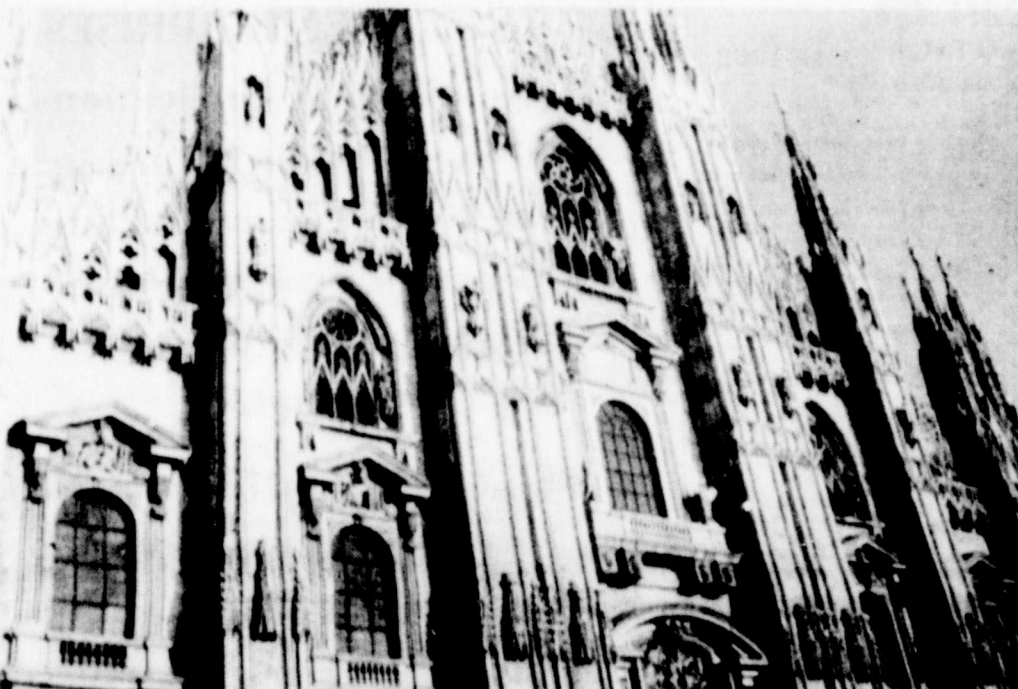
goldsmithery, tapestries, materials, marquetry and marbles, which are displayed inside the building.

The modern appearance of Milan sets it apart from such cities as Rome, Naples and Venice. It lacks the ancient ruins that give other Italian cities so much of their interest, but it has many famous buildings other than the Great Cathedral which does tower over the Cathedral Square.

Modern streets and street cars are seen throughout the city. The elaborate Archiepiscopalia and Royal palaces are just south of the cathedral. In 1918, King Victor Emmanuel gave the Royal Palace Milan, with its great art collections, to the city. The Church of San Carol Borromeo, modeled



after the Pantheon of Rome, is southeast of the cathedral. As this had been a long day to travel from Venice to Milan and to visit the square in Milan, we were ready to return to our hotel for dinner and to rest. We had a TV in our room, with American programs, but with the Italian Language "dubbed" in, but it was amusing to watch it and imagine what the words were in English.

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# Home Improvement Fraud

With the onset of spring, it is time once again for home improvements and repairs, and, as usual the "rip-off" artists are taking full advantage of it. Whether it's repairing a leaky roof, putting on a new room or contracting for a complete remodeling, the process of improving your home can be an economic nightmare to the unwary consumer.

Though most of those in the home improvement business are honest, an alarming number use lies and deception to defraud millions of dollars from unsuspecting consumers every year. Hopefully, the information contained in this article will prevent you from becoming victimized.

Remember, it's YOUR home, so YOU make the decisions!

(a) **WHAT YOU WANT DONE:** It's your home and you are the boss! The contractor works for YOU. The kinds of improvements, large or small must suit your needs, so plan ahead. Know what you want done. It's your decision, not his! Beware of door-to-door solicitors or the contractors who want to "sell" you improvements that you don't need for want for YOUR Home.

(b) **WHAT YOU CAN AFFORD:** The money will come out of your pocket, so consider the total cost of improvements you need; material and supply costs;

labor costs; finance charges; and any extras such as permits, bonding costs, etc. Beware of the contractor who tries to "sell" you more than you can afford or who will not put your total costs in writing.

(c) **WHO DOES THE WORK:** You're the boss; know whom you are hiring; demand references--other jobs, local suppliers--give them a call; is he licensed or bonded?--check it out; know where to find him--address, phone, license number, etc.; if your remodeler is a construction company, who's really in charge? Will the work be subcontracted? To whom? Get the facts! Beware of the contractor who is reluctant

to talk to you about his business or his former customers.

(d) **WHAT PAPERS YOU SIGN:** It's your responsibility! Make sure ALL promises are in writing; work to be done, quality of materials, total cost, completion time, etc. Take your time. You don't have to sign today. Know what you are signing: a mortgage? a loan contract? a promissory note? job contract? completion certificate? (This documents means the job is finished, so never sign it until it is!) It's YOUR contract, so be sure it contains everything you think is important. Read it and keep a copy of all papers. Beware of promises not in writing.

(e) **HOW YOU PAY:** It's your money! You have the right to decide how you pay and where get the money. It

can be cheaper to arrange your own financing--you don't have to take the contractor's deal--shop for your money! Beware of the contractor who wants big payments of money from you before work is begun. It's your decision; but you can say "NO!"

(f) **HOW TO CONTROL THE JOB:** You're the boss. Know who's working for you and who is to be paid; get names and addresses of all subcontractors, laborers and material suppliers. Check each to be sure they're getting paid. Check the quality of the work and materials as the job progresses. Make sure you're getting what you are paying for and don't pay until you get it. Get lien waivers from the subcontractors and suppliers BEFORE final payment to the contractor. Beware: If your contractor doesn't pay

subcontractors or suppliers, they sometimes can foreclose on your home!

**WARNING SIGNS:**

- (1) if he comes door-to-door
- (2) if he just happens to have material left over from a recent job
- (3) if he tells you your job will be a "sample"
- (4) if he offers you discounts for finding him other customers
- (5) if the price is TOO cheap
- (6) if he wants to high pressure you into an immediate decision

**HOW TO BE RIPPED OFF FOR SURE:**

- (1) Hire a high-pressure door-to-door salesperson.
- (2) Insist on a verbal contract. Read nothing. Sign every form he gives you!
- (3) Pay cash IN ADVANCE.
- (4) Go on vacation while the job is in progress. (Give the contractor a key.)
- (5) Ignore lien statements that are received.
- (6) Be too embarrassed to complain to your local police or district attorney.

## Prescribed Burning Of Pastures Pays

**COLLEGE STATION**- Prescribed or controlled burning of pastures can be a paying practice, even in a dry year. Despite the drought of 1984, a prescribed burning demonstration in Goliad County resulted in a 36 percent increase in the fall crop and a 30-pound increase in calf weaning weights. The demonstration on 1,000 acres of pasture on the Swickheimer Ranch in February of 1984 was conducted by Dr. L.R. Sprott, Dr. David Bade and Dr. Wayne Hanselka, specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System, and Dennis Hale, Goliad County Extension agent. The activity was a part of the Extension Service's Integrated Livestock Management Program.

An additional 1,000 acres of pasture on the ranch was left unburned to serve as a check to the demonstration. Each pasture was stocked with about 250 cows, which were checked monthly following the start of the fall calving season. Because of improved forage quality of the burned pasture, cows stayed in better shape and those that unburned range and this improved body condition likely explains the increased calf crop from cows on the burned range, notes Sprott. "This clearly shows that prescribed burning is an economical method for increasing production at a minimal cost," says Sprott. "If it would not have been for last year's drought, the results might have been even more favorable."

## Gordon Spot County Extension Agent

DeMarquis Gordon

The cool rainy weather received in Eastland County while peaches were in bloom will do much to insure a chance of making a peach crop in 1985. However, all is not good about the timing of the rainfall says County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.

A disease that is referred to as peach leaf curl is caused by the fungus, *Taphrina deformans*. This organism

lives in the bark and in years when there is no rainfall during bloom it does not become a problem. However, if rain is received during the time peaches are in full bloom, or at least coming into full bloom, these disease organisms usually show up. The leaves on the tree will thicken and take on a grotesque, rubbery, almost artificial-looking appearance. The leaves will discolor from

green, to a yellow, to a red, in these disfigured areas, reports Gordon. If the disease is severe enough it can also attack the small fruit and cause premature abortion, or loss of fruit.

The agents says once you see this problem it is too late to do anything about it. These leaves will soon drop off and by mid-season you can't tell that the disease was present. The fruit that is left will be fine. It will not kill the tree.

The time to control this disease is during the fall and winter when the tree is dormant. Kocide 101 at 2½ pounds per 100 gallons of water should be applied to the trees the first week in November and again early in the year prior to any bud

swell. At this time, as previously stated, the disease has progressed to a stage too far to worry about control. Gordon says peach producers can only think about control this fall.

With our lakes flooded and acre after acre of weeds, willows and other cover in the water, tubing, wade fishing, or belly boating becomes of the most economical means of fishing. 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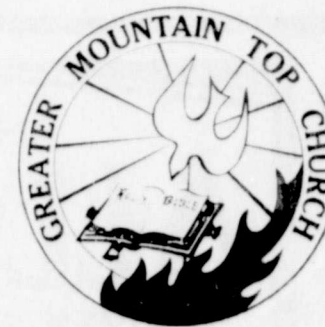

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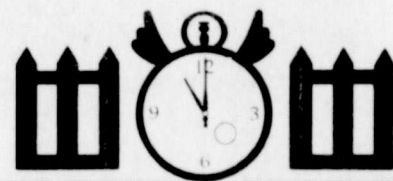
