## County Health Fair Set In Cisco April 25

Would you like to know your blood sugar level, determine your risk for getting cancer, learn if you have high blood pressure, or have an ultra sound screening of your arteries to determine if there is any plaque build up and blockage? Eastland and surrounding county residents will be available to do everything from having their hearing checked to knowing their stress level Thursday, April 25 at the Eastland County

Health Fair at the Cisco Senior Citizen Center, 400 Conrad Hilton Avenue in Cisco. The Health Fair will be open from 10 a.m. until 6:30 p.m. The Health Fair is being sponsored by the Family Living Committee of the Eastland County Agricultural Extension Service and the Cisco-Eastland A.A.R.P. Chapters. During the Health Fair, various medical personnel including dentists,

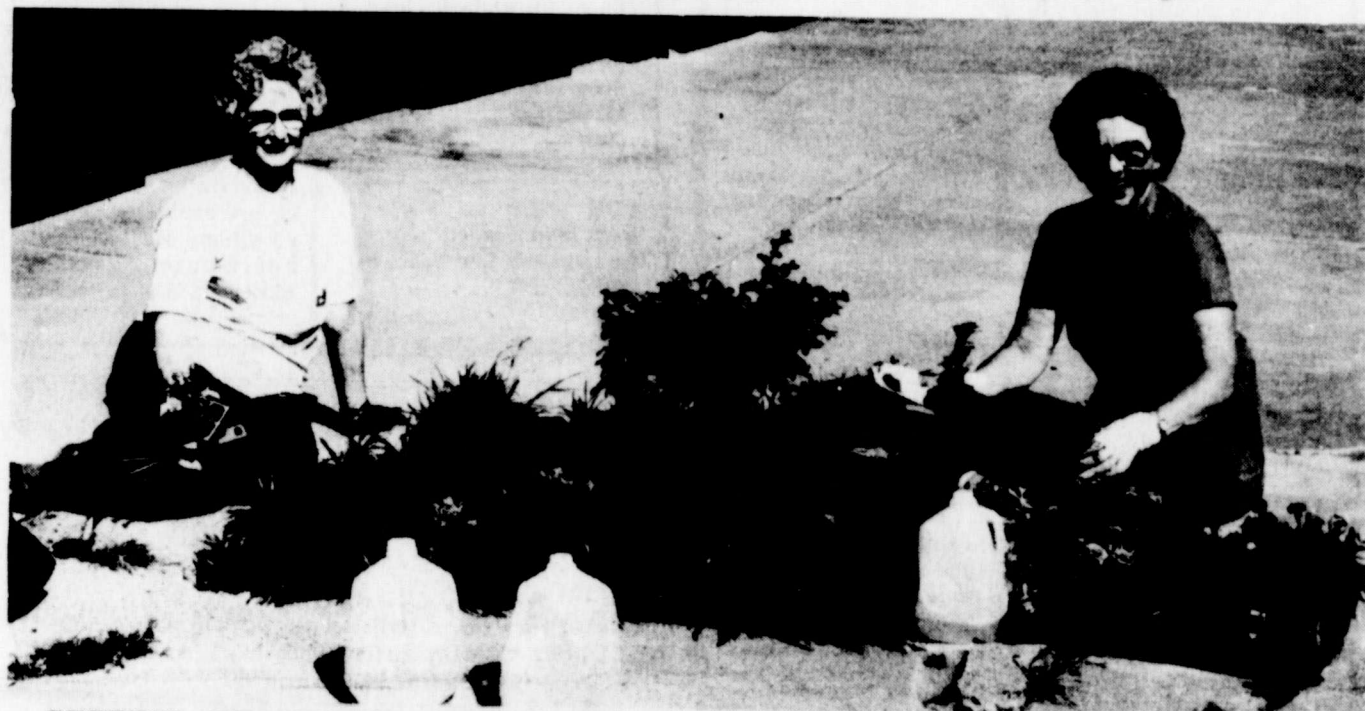
registered nurses, audiologist, laboratory technicians, physical therapists, registered dieticians, pharmacist, and other representatives from health care organizations and hospitals will be giving free health screenings, demonstrations, and information. A variety of health screenings will be done by the Texas Department of Health including accessing skin disorders, blood pressure, glucose, and colorectal cancer kits. Hendrick Medical Center of Abilene will be providing free laboratory analysis for anemia and blood glucose. Registered dieticians from Hendricks Medical Center will provide nutrition and special diet information. Special diets might include diabetic, low sodium diets along with food allergies. Free individual consultations and height-weight analysis will be offered. The Hendrick Hospital Care/Unit Stress Center will assess a person's stress level and provide individual consultations. Dr. Larry Harris and Dr. Gary Harris, Eastland and Cisco dentists, will provide oral hygiene information and discuss any dental problems.

any possible calcium deposits or narrowing of the carotid arteries. The use of an ultra sound machine allows the technician to see directly inside the carotid arteries. The exam is free and takes 15 minutes. This test is recommended for people approximately 50 years of age or older, who smoke, or may have high blood pressure are leading candidates for experiencing strokes. The Eastland Memorial Hospital will sponsor free pulmonary function tests. West Texas Rehab Center of Abilene will provide Grip Strength Measurements and hearing examinations by their audiologist. The Ranger General Hospital under the direction of Mike C de Baca, hospital pharmacist, will display generic drug information. Use of generic drugs as an effective way to lower a person's drug bill. The Cisco-Eastland AARP Chapters will also have a drug display and "55 and Alive" booth. The Abilene Social Security Administration will provide consultation on medicare, medicaid, and other government programs. Patterson's Ambulance Service will supply an ambulance so that people can see inside and learn about the emergency care equipment available in their time of need. An exhibit sponsored by

the Eastland County Extension Service will feature a computerized nutrition evaluation test. Personal nutrition diet information is programmed into the computer to determine if individuals are eating a balanced nutritional diet each day. A variety of health screenings will be offered. Other exhibitors will include Wood Psychiatric Institute of Abilene, Eastland Manor Home Health Care, Girling

Home Health, March of Dimes, Cancer Society, Extension Homemakers, RCG Leasing, Dept. of Human Resources, Red Cross, West Texas Council of Governments, Diet Centers, Cisco Jr. College Nursing School, Extension Homemakers, Cisco Garden Club, Texas Dept. of Public Safety and Cisco Police. Free balloons, door prizes, apples, drinks, and much more will be available at the Eastland County Health Fair.

## Stroke Clinic Set

A free stroke prevention clinic will be held in conjunction with the County Health Fair for the general public on Thursday, April 25 at the Cisco Senior Citizen Center at 400 Conrad Hilton Ave. in Cisco.

The stroke prevention clinic is being sponsored by Cisco City Drug, Cisco Junior College, First National Bank of Cisco, Winnett Oil Company, and Stovall and Winnett Transports in conjunction with Ultra-Tex, Inc. of Waco.

The stroke prevention clinic is being held in an attempt to find those people who unaware of the potential health hazard found in the vessels of the neck that supply the blood to the brain.

With the use of an ultra-sound machine there is now the ability to see directly in-

side the carotid arteries. The ultra sound image shows any calcium build up and possible blockage of the vessels which is one of the possible causes of stroke.

People who are approximately 50 years of age and older, smoke, or may have high blood pressure, are leading candidates for experiencing TIA's (transient ischemic attacks) or strokes.

Since the exam is painless and only takes 15 minutes makes this an excellent opportunity to evaluate your arteries.

If you are interested, please pre-register prior to April 25 by calling 629-2222 or 629-1093 at Eastland County Agricultural Extension Service Office to set up your appointment. This test is limited to the first 100 people that pre-register.

## Christmas In May Committee Appeals To Local Churches

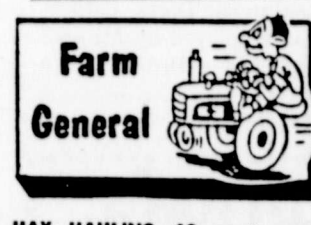

# Oil Belt

Operating out of Dallas, Don Hanvey Oil Interests has staked drillsite for the No. 2 Kupp in the Eastland Regular Field four miles west of Nimrod. It is under permit for maximum depth of 4,500 feet. It will be spudded in an 88-acre lease in the SPRR Survey A-457.

The No. 2 McGaugh is scheduled for spudding in the Eastland Regular Field with Glen's Backhoe Service of Breckenridge as the operator. Drillsite will be in an 88-acre lease in the A.T. Burnley Survey A-11. Total depth is projected to 1,700 feet.

Two new producers have been brought on line in the Stephens Regular Field, with Sun Exploration & Production as the operator.

Located three and four miles northwest of Ivan, the wells are in the SPRR Survey. They are designated as the Nos. 165 & 166 Eliasville.

Each well will pump 125 barrels of oil per day along with 134 & 490 barrels of water, respectively.

The wells will produce from perforations in the Caddo "A" Formation, ranging from 3,244 to 3,310 feet into the hole. Bottomhole was 3,450 and 3,430 feet, respectively.

The same operator has filed first production figures on two more oil wells in the Stephens Regular Field. The Nos. 35 + 37 Balck Stoker showed combined potential to make 151 barrels of oil daily, along with 13,000 barrels of water.

Drillsites are one mile southeast of Breckenridge in the I.A.I. Survey.

The wells will produce from 3,132 to 3,162 feet into the wellbore. Total depths were 3,300 and 3,325 feet, respectively.

The Stephens Regular Field gained a new producer when Sun Exploration & Production completed the No. 6 C.M. Caldwell one mile east of Breckenridge.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 56 barrels of oil and 124 barrels of water. It was taken to a 3,300-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Caddo "A" Formation, 3,168 to 3,182 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in the T&P Survey.

Hilco Petroleum has completed two oil wells in Stephens County.

The No. 1 Copeland-Mitchell "C" will flow at the rate of three barrels of oil per day. The wildcat will produce from perforations in the Ranger Formation, 3,973 to 3,977 feet into the hole. Total depth was 4,520 feet.

The operation is four miles southeast of Ivan in the TE&L Survey.

The No. 3 T. Flournoy will pump at the rate of ten barrels daily. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Strawn Formation 1,806 to 1,816 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 2,500 feet.

Location is one mile southwest of Necessity in the Stephens Regular Field, T&P Survey.

Wildcat drilling action is slated in Palo Pinto County two miles south of Pickwick, with Williams Petroleum of Burk Burnett as the operator. The explorer well will be known as the No. 7 Tesco. It is in a 1,765-acre lease assembly in the CEPI&M Survey and carries permit for 4,500-ft. maximum hole.

The Dalton Bend Field will see more developmental action when M.O. Rife Jr., independent operator from Fort Worth, starts making hole for his No. 1-A State of Texas. Location is four miles southeast of Pickwick in a 100-acre lease in the J. Pointevent Survey, Palo Pinto County. Total depth is projected to an even 4,000 feet.

The No. 1-A Green is scheduled for spudding in Palo Pinto County's Richardson Field about one mile west of Brad. Cayce Enterprises of Fort Worth will be the operator.

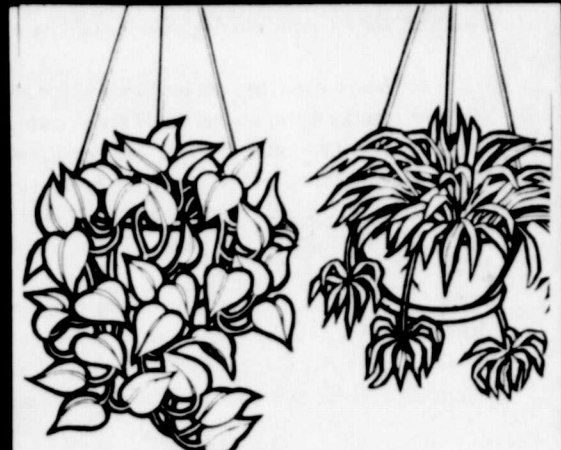

of the hearts of all mankind."

## NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER, 1985 BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

### A PROCLAMATION

The history of the American Nation is one of conviction in the face of tyranny, courage in the midst of turmoil and faith despite the roils of doubt and defeatism. Throughout our 208 years of freedom, the people of the United States have drawn upon the lessons learned at the dawn of our liberty by acting "with a firm reliance on Divine Providence" and expressing gratitude for the many blessings a loving God has showered upon us.

These lessons have not been learned and honored without difficulty. During the Revolutionary War, the Continental Congress proclaimed a National Day of Prayer each year for eight years, a practice that ended with the winning of the peace in 1785. Decades later, while the Civil War raged, this observance was renewed by Abraham Lincoln. Responding to a Senate Resolution requesting the President to designate and set apart a day for prayer and humiliation, Lincoln said, "Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us." He then called the Nation to prayer.

Our very existence as a free Nation, then, has provided potent witness to the efficacy of prayer. Grover Cleveland, in his First Inaugural Address, said, "Above all I know that there is a Supreme Being who rules the affairs of men and whose goodness and mercy have always followed the American people, and I know He will not turn from us now if we humbly and reverently seek His powerful aid." Franklin D. Roosevelt, in his Fourth Inaugural Address, expressed the same thought,

"The Almighty God has blessed our land in many ways. . . . So we pray to Him now for the vision to see our way clearly—to see the way that leads to a better life for ourselves and for all our fellow men—to the achievement of His will, to peace on earth."

Today our Nation is at peace and is enjoying prosperity, but our need for prayer is even greater. We can give thanks to God for the ever increasing abundance He has bestowed on us, and we can remember all those in our society who are in need of help, whether it be material assistance in the form of charity or simply a friendly word of encouragement. We are all God's handiwork, and it is appropriate for us as individuals and as a Nation to call to Him in prayer.

By joint resolution of the Congress approved April 17, 1952, the recognition of a particular day set aside each year as a National Day of Prayer has become a cherished national tradition. Since that time, every President has proclaimed an annual National Day of Prayer, resuming the tradition begun by the Continental Congress.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, RONALD REAGAN, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim May 2, 1985, as a National Day of Prayer. I call upon the citizens of this great Nation to gather together on that day in homes and places of worship to pray, each after his or her own manner, for unity of the hearts of all mankind.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-ninth day of January, in the year of our Lord 1985 and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and ninth.

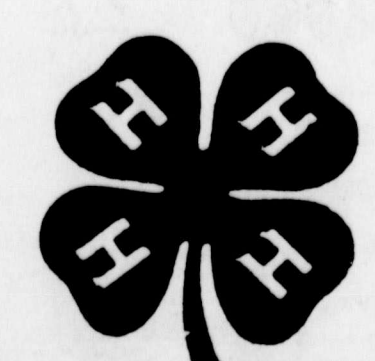

# County History

A flour mill was in operation in Cisco as early as 1884, owned and operated by Porter and Worrell. This mill and successors continued to operate for some years but the time came when the local grain crop was insufficient to support such an enterprise and it was transplanted in "greener" fields.

A.H. Johnson, a former banker of Cisco, is responsible for the statement that the bank in Cisco with which he was associated, paid for five hundred bales of cotton, marketed from wagons, in one day; a small item of

some \$25,000.

The first nursery, for the propagation of fruit trees etc., established in this section of the country was by Willard Robinson about one mile South of the business section of Cisco, in the early eighties, and continued to operate for several years.

The Cisco Cemetery Association was organized March 15, 1899 with Mrs. J.D. Alexander as President; Mrs. C.S. Vance as Vice President; Mrs. M.T. Whitesides, Secretary and Mrs. L.E. Brannin, Treasurer. The association has faithfully performed its

duties through the years and Cisco can justly be proud of its accomplishments. The boundaries of the cemetery next to the streets are marked by a fence of beautiful native stone and the grounds are nicely kept.

Another organization which has rendered valuable service in the development and beautification of the city is the Cisco Garden Club, of which Mrs. R.Q. Lee was the first president.

The beautiful and useful pecan was chosen as the club tree.

Among the early physicians who served the citizens of Cisco and surrounding country, for an extended length of time were C.S.

Vance, C.F. Morris, W.E. Mancill, S.H. Stout, E.J. Bettis and M.C. Cameron, all of whom became citizens of Cisco before 1882.

One of Cisco's citizens, now deceased, who did much for Cisco and for Eastland County was Mrs. J.D. Alexander. Coming to the county and state as the bride of the late J.D. Alexander, who was the in business at Eastland, in 1881, they moved to Cisco in the following years where for many years she was active in business and civic affairs. She was the organizer of the first Civic Improvement League in Cisco, was active in the work of the Eastern Star and Rebecca organizations; first president of The Cisco

Cemetery Association and continued as an active member until her death. Mrs. Alexander was also a member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

To the North-West of Cisco, near the lakes built by The Cisco Water Company, evidence of efforts to mine coal are still to be seen. Considerable shale coal, along with a mass of soil, are still scattered around the entrances of abandoned shafts.

A shaft was also drifted into the hill on or near the Bacon old place about four miles South of Cisco, but old timers state that the principal production was from near Lake Bernie.

The late Joe Wilson is authority for the statement that coal was mined in commercial quantities near Cisco in 1883-84 and Mrs. Langston, in her History of Eastland County, states that there were as many as one hundred fifty miners in the shafts at two different times.

In the fall of 1919 Breckenridge was without railroad connections and was willing to co-operate with any interest by which such connections could be

obtained. The Wichita Falls and Southern Railroad had been completed to New Castle in Young County some

years before but no successful effort had been made to project it further South.

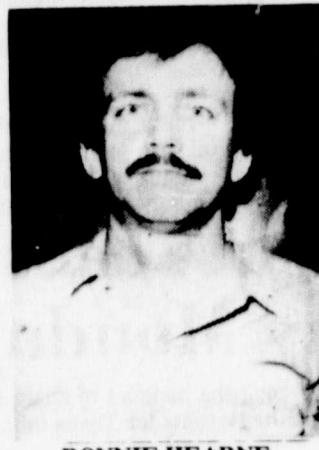
